Roy Garcia named outstanding farmer

The 24th annual Hansford Soil & Water Conservation Bankers Awards banquet was held Thursday evening, Nov. 15 at the Spearman High School Cafeteria.

The banquet was sponsored jointly by the Gruver State Bank and the First State Bank. Mike Schnell of the First State Bank was master of ceremonies.

Ivey's Hungry Cowboy Bar-B-Que catered the banquet.

Speaker for the occasion was Bob Murphy of Nacogdoches, Texas, an entertaining and amusing speaker.

Outstanding conservation farmer was Roy Garcia.

Roy Garcia, his wife Maria and their daughter Maria live in the eastern portion of Hansford County. Their son, Robert, lives at Killeen, Texas.

Roy operates 960 acres of irrigated cropland on a partnership basis with B.N. Williams of Dumas, Texas.

Several years ago technical assistance was requested through the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District from the Soil Conservation personnel at Spearman to correct some irrigation water management problems. In 1983 Roy entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract, which provides cost-share assistance for installation of conservation practices.

Under this program, assistance is being provided for instal-

lation of underground irrigation pipelines and the shaping and seeding of a 3 acre grassed waterway. To date 5,504 feet of underground irrigation pipeline have been installed under the GPCP program. Several thousand feet of underground irrigation pipeline, 176 ac. of land leveling, and 3 tailwater recovery systems have also been installed without

the benefit of cost-share assistance.

Roy's cropping system usually consists of corn, grain sorghum, and wheat. A portion of the grain sorghum is usually devoted to seed production.

He does an excellent job of managing crop residues to prevent wind and water erosion as well as conserve soil moisture.

Roy has been cooperating with SCS personnel on measurement of crop residue reduction by

various tillage operations as well as measurement of soil moisture through the use of gypsum block moisture meters.

Homemaker of the year was Virginia Trindle.

Mrs. John Trindle, an active homemaker of Hansford County, has many accomplishments to her name. She is the mother of Jan Holt and Connie Steger, who have

given her six healthy grandchildren. Her devotion to her family and friends are exhibited in the outstanding qualities through trust and leadership.

Virginia was an active member for many years on the Hansford County Family Living Committee. While on this committee, she helped sponsor Health Fairs, Sewing Fairs, and other major projects that helped in the development and growth of the county. One of the organizers of Home Demonstration in Hansford County, Virginia was a member of the Medlin Community Club. They have since disbanded and she has been involved in other ways.

Currently, she is on the Hansford Hospital Auxiliary and the library Board. Other organizations included were W.I.F.E., 20th Century Club and flower club. Virginia is very involved in her church, she does a lot of outstanding work in the Union Church.

Virginia and John work as a team on efforts to improve their farm through wise soil conservation methods. During the seasons of the different harvests she participates through cooking to driving a truck or tractor. During her spare time she enjoys such hobbies as toile painting, canning, sewing, and takes pride in her back yard.

This year we salute Mrs. John Trindle as Homemaker of the Year for continued interest, time and support of the home and community life.

84th District Court sentences

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin reports the following sentences assessed from Judge Blackburn's 84th District Court.

Johnnie Howard Thomas, 26 years old, Spearman, Texas, was found guilty of forging checks on local citizens. This was his second offense and he was sentenced to 10 years at the Texas Dept. of Corrections.

Stephan Wayne Crisp, 32 years old, Dumas, Texas was found guilty of forgery and given three years probation. He made restitution and this was his first offense.

A female, Kristine Lee Prince of Amarillo, 19 years old, was found guilty of burglary of the contents in an auto. She was fined \$1,180 and given 1 year probation.

Ricky Dean McDowell, 26, Amarillo was arrested for burglarizing the E.E. Greene Insurance Building in Spearman. He stole saddles, trophies, and all property was recovered by the Hansford Sheriff's Dept. He was fined \$1,080 and received 2 years probation.

Calvin Battiest, 54 years old, Ada, Okla. was arrested on theft of saddles from Hansford County. He was brought back to Hansford County to face charges and given 4 years probation extended.

Danny Darden, 29, Spearman, was arrested on DWI felony probation. He has posted bond and is awaiting trial.

Ronald Loyd Goodman, 21 years old, was arrested for probation violation and is out on bond awaiting trial. Goodman is from Spearman.

Ronald Berry Southwood, 19 years old, Gruver, was arrested on a federal warrant violation and was released to U.S. Marshall in Amarillo.

In September, 1984, Caprock Feedlot officials reported that a problem at No. 2 feedlot had arisen that did not involve the actual weighing or scaling at the feedlot in anyway. The problem was caused by manipulation of the ticket machine. Hay, wheat, and corn that wasn't delivered was involved in the investigation initiated by Caprock. The investigation was headed by Robin McIntyre, investigator for Cargill, according to R.L. McFarlin, Hansford County Sheriff. The following were arrested on alleged "theft by appropriation" and assessed the following sentences in Judge Blackburn's 84th District Court: Elbert Buddy Shipp, Rotan, Texas, was sentenced to 6 years probation, fined \$2,160 and will make restitution on his part of the Caprock fraud.

Richard Wagner, Spearman, was given 6 years probation, fined \$2,160 and will make restitution for his part of the Caprock fraud.

Mike Glass of Boise City, Okla. was given a 6 year probation, fined \$2,160 and will make restitution for his part of the Caprock fraud.

Others alleged to be involved in the feedlot scam will be tried at a later date.

City receives sales tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$99.5 million in local tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax. The November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and the third quarter and reported to the Comptroller by October 20.

The City of Spearman received a check for \$11,119.06 for the period ending 10-26-84 which is off 39% from the comparable payment of \$23,203.76 for the

The City of Gruver received a check for \$4,095.38 for this period compared to \$5,858.67 for 1983. Total payments to the City of Gruver to date in 1984 are \$34,454.53 as compared to \$35,170.67 for the same period last year. They are off 2.04%

same period last year. Payments to the city to date in 1984 amount to \$197,885.14 as compared to \$176,873.41 for the same period in 1983.

City Council meets

The City Council met in regular session November 13, with Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett president. Aldermen present were Wilson McClellan, Ed Garner, Bob Pearson, Burl Buchanan, Jim Nicholson. Staff present were Jim Murray, city manager; Charlotte Sheets, city secretary and D.J. Alberts, police chief.

Council authorized the city manager to engage Stephens Management Consultants, Inc. to develop bid specifications and evaluations for all the city's insurance needs excluding health and accident insurance.

The council authorized the mayor to execute and interlocal agreement with the Texas Municipal League Joint Self-Insurance fund.

The awarding of a bid for janitorial service contract for the new city hall was tabled.

The city manager was authorized to take bids for various public safety equipment for the fire department, and new carpeting for a portion of the new city hall. Resolution #13-84 approving

the revision to the personnel rules and regulations for the City of Spearman and providing an effective date carried unanimously. The council nominated Rosa Lee Butt to serve on the Health Coordinating Council.

Monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court, and animal control were presented and approved.

Monthly bills payable in the amount of \$682,733.21 and the current cash position were approved.

Dwight Hobson and Kay Magarra with General Telephone Company were present to discuss any service problems which

citizens may be having and to introduce the helping hands program and child identification program which GTE is sponsoring in conjunction with local community organizations.

Traffic complaints on 11th street and 7th and Endicott were discussed with the police chief.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

Jim Keister, head of the physical therapy department at St. Anthony's Hospital, will conduct a session on physical therapy for arthritic children.

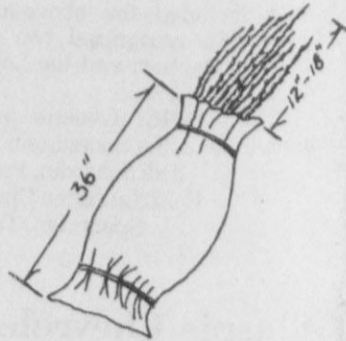

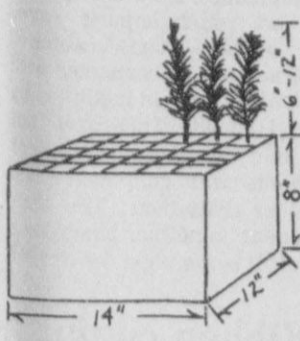

Seedling trees available

The Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District is now taking orders for windbreak seedling trees. The cost of trees this year will be \$32.00 for thirty containerized evergreens and \$35.00 for one hundred bare root hardwood type trees and shrubs.

Some of the more popular evergreen windbreak trees that are available include: Austrian, Pinon and Ponderosa Pines; Eastern Red Cedar; and the Rocky Mountain Juniper which is probably the best overall windbreak tree.

Shrubs available this year include: Lilac, Plum, Nanking Cherry, Cotoneaster, Honeysuckle and Sumac. Shrubs are usually planted on the north side of the windbreak causes snow to drift into the inside rows of trees and thus provides extra beneficial

moisture. While shrub rows on the south side of windbreaks helps to protect inside rows from hot summer winds.

Trees available this year are Green Ash, Cottonwood, Hackberry, Honeylocust and Russian Olive. Land users are reminded that these trees and shrubs are susceptible to damage from broadleaf weed herbicides such as 2, 4-D and dicamba.

Soil Conservation Service personnel are available to assist land users with planning a windbreak and can provide technical assistance on the management of the windbreak after planting.

Orders for the seedlings can be placed at the Hansford SWCD office located in the Pittman-Shieldknight building in Spearman or by calling 659-2330 and requesting an order blank.

On Sunday, roast beef will be served and boneless breast of chicken will be the entree for Monday evening. Accompaniments include wassail, based on an Anglo-Saxon drinking pledge which means "Be in good health;" relish trays; Yorkshire pudding as a side dish to the meat; Canterbury carrots; peas with mushrooms; roast apples; and plum pudding.

During the Middle Ages in England, many vegetables were considered poisonous, except by poorer folk who could not afford meat. Kitchen gardens were

grown in England during the 16th Century with peas among the first vegetables grown.

The boar's head presentation is a central celebration of the feast. First introduced as a Christmas dish by Henry VIII, the boar's head is traditionally dressed with a garland of rosemary and laurel and a lemon, symbol of plenty, in its mouth.

Guests will be entertained with Renaissance tunes and Christmas carols played on authentic instruments by members of the WTSU Matilda Gaume Early Music Consort. The group, named to honor a former WTSU music professor, is directed by Dr. Robert Krause, associate professor of music, and includes Krause playing recorder, krumhorn and harp; Cand Benefiel, recorder and krumhorn; Donna Bogan, from Borger, recorder and cornamuse; Suzanne Rhynes, from Levelland, recorder and percussion; Cristina Mireles, from Los Fresnos, percussion; and Richard Rhynes from Barid, recorder and cornamuse.

Schola Madrigalis is conducted by Monty McGee and includes Greg Meek, from Spearman.

The Madrigal Dinner committee is chaired by Jim Holston, assistant to the dean of student affairs.

Tickets each evening are \$6 for WTSU students with meal cards; \$8 for WTSU students with identification cards; \$12 general admission; and \$25 for the scholarship tables. Tickets are available by calling the WTSU Virgil Henson Activities Center.

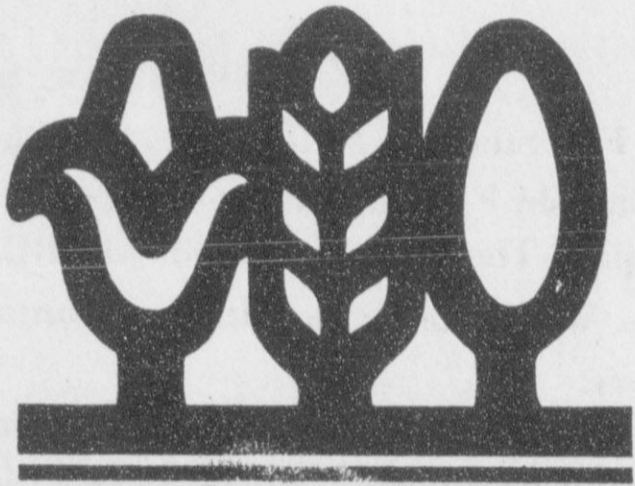
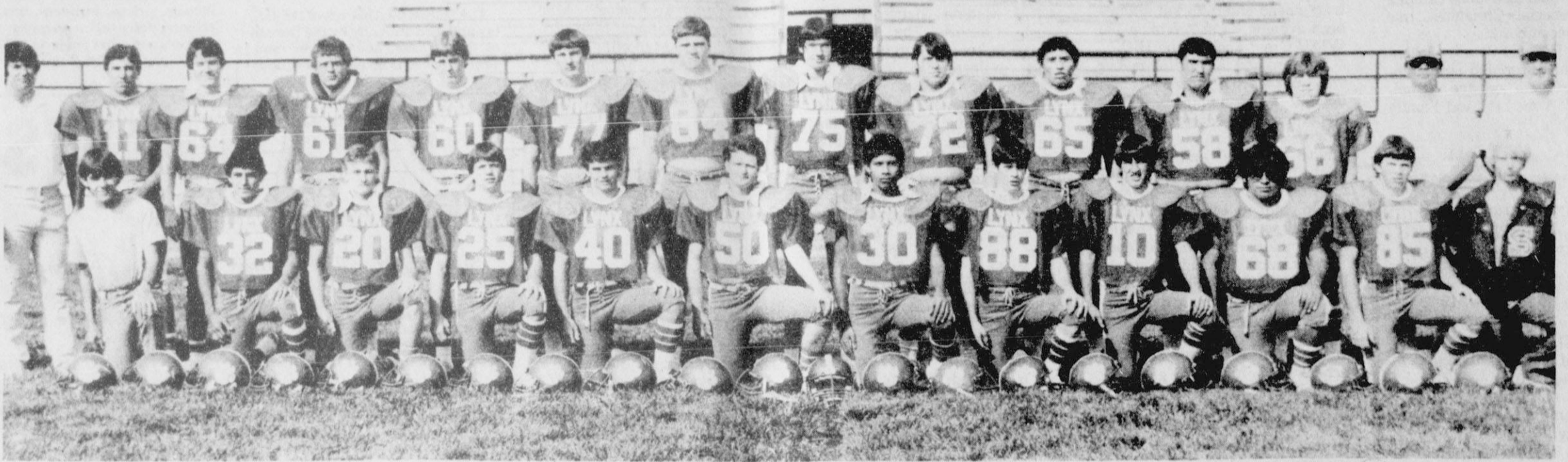
