

In the course of all this discussion, Terhune's line of conversation reverted to the fact that a collective "they" didn't like it. This matter of "they" was an old saw by now in the airport situation and Mayor discussion strayed from the Blodgett demanded to be told who "they" were by name or he would assume a nebulous old airport was being closed to

'they' really meant Terhune. Terhune then began naming names, most of whom were present and all present named by him vociferously denied they were against the new airport. Even Councilman Gene Cudd was named as one of the opposition.

After much time on this tack, Mayor Blodgett as chairman of the council meeting called the discussion back to the matter of the private leases which was the only business that could be considered by law at that point. Miller and Terhune departed.

Cudd explained at this point that his only conversation with them about the airport had transpired some two years previously and he had said at that time he approved leaving the taxi-way open and would oppose its closing as much as possible from his position.

Leasing is set at seven and one-half cents per square foot for a 12-year period. At that time the leasing charges would go to the current (at that time) commercial rate per square foot. Some of the prospective lessees felt this was a high figure so the council agreed to

(EDITOR'S NOTE: It had not been our intent to publish the exchange regarding one man's valuation of the City of Spearman but, before any report of the meeting could get into print, work of the remark had spread throughout the city and we had numerous inquiries both by phone and in person concerning the exact nature of it-so it is included in this report. The only comment we could elicit from these inquiries in return came from one "old timer" who said Spearman folk were proud and he felt, along with many others, that the firm whose spokesman made the remark would lose enough business to realize Spearman represented more than two-bits.)

Once council meeting procedures had returned to a more mundane pace, the panel approved the annual renewal of the city's participation in the Texas Municipal League's workmen's compensation joint insurance fund. City Manager Jim Murray pointed out that such participation saved the city some 15 percent annually over the coverage previously carried.

The council also approved advertising for bids for the purchase of two police cars and approved the monthly reports from the various city agencies, fire, ambulance, police, animal control and municipal court reports. Monthly bills were also

On Sunday afternoon, January 4, many friends and relatives visited Mrs. Fullbright at a special "Open House" at her residence, 322 South Hazelwood in Spearman. Mrs. Fullbright's children who hosted the reception were Mrs. John Pipkin (Edith) of Spearman, Orville Fullbright of Amarillo, Mrs. Carl Scroggs (Edna) of Waka, Wilbur Fullbright of Boston, Massachusetts, Mrs. J.W. Depew (Ethel) of Fayetteville, Arkansas, and Mrs. Leslie Banks (Reba) of Hardesty, Oklahoma

Mrs. Ralph Depew, a granddaughter of Perryton, baked and decorated a beautiful cake for the occasion. The unusual cake featured a top layer in the shape of a Bible with the scripture: "Her children shall arise up, and called her blessed." Proverbs 31:28.

Mrs. Fullbright's four daughters served the cake, along with candy mints and nuts, with a sparkling strawberry--cranberry punch.

Mrs. Fullbright wore a lovely aqua dress which was a gift from her daughter, Edith, with a corsage of deep red roses given by her grand-daughter, Mrs. Thomas Mayes of South Yarmouth, Massachusetts. All of Mrs. Fullbright's children wore a corsage/boutinniere which had been sent by Mrs. Mayes who was unable to attend.

On Tuesday evening, Mrs. Fullbright and her six children continued the birthday celebration at a special dinner hosted by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Scroggs of Waka. Among the gifts which Mrs. Fullbright received was new carpeting for three rooms of her home in Spearman--a gift from her children

Mrs. Fullbright moved to Hansford County on April 4, 1920 with her husband, Ralph, where they settled on a farm southeast of town where they lived for two years. For a few years the family lived 17 miles north of Spearman, then back close to Spearman. In 1955 the farm house was moved to town to its present location on South Hazelwood.

Members of the family have many pleasant memories. During the difficult years of the depression, the family faced many challenges, but there was much happiness, and everyone worked hard. The Fullbrights did their own butchering, milked cows, raised chickens, and maintained a big garden to provide fresh vegetables for the summer months and food to be canned for the winter. One year Mrs. Fullbright canned over 1,000 quarts. There were many projects in

which the whole family became involved. One winter Mrs. Fullbright taught all of her children how to crochet rugs, and another year she let each of the children make a cake at Christmas. During the summer, it became a tradition to make ice cream on Saturday evenings which was served with Mrs. Fullbright's special hot cream

Mrs. Fullbright has always been active in religious work and has been a member of the Union Church since it was built in 1921. In 1946 Mrs. Fuilbright attended Bible School in Baxter Springs, Kansas, after which time she became a pastor and an evangelist, holding special meetings in Oklahoma, Texas. Colorado, and Missouri. After her husband's death in 1958, she served as pastor of the Range, Oklahoma Community Church for sometime. At present she teaches a Sunday School Class at the Union Church in Spearman.

To avoid delays in receiving the W-2, employees should furnish their employers with a current address, the IRS says. If employees do not receive the statement by February 2, they should first contact their employer. After February 15, 1981, the employee should ask for help by calling the IRS toll-free number listed in the telephone

The IRS reminds taxpayers that they must have a W-2 form from every employer they worked for during the year. 



The American Red Cross and the Seventh-day Adventist denomination have signed a simple but comprehensive working agreement. The six-page document solidifies what they already have been doing for many years. Its overall job is to further refine the cooperative relationship each has shared with the other before and

during an emergency situation. The Adventists' Community Services organization and the American Red Cross will work shoulder to shoulder on all levels--national, regional, state. and local--during clean-up operations following a disaster.

The Adventists' 2,127 church-based societies, its 687 functioning centers, and its 1,458 additional service units in the U.S. will act as support units for the Red Cross's 3,100 chapters here in the States. Adventists also have 179 mobile vehicles outfitted for day-byday projects as well as on standby for disaster relief duty when and where needed. Both organizations are dedicated to the alleviation of human suffering caused by hurricane, tornado, flood, fire, famine, explosion, earthquake, or any of their interrelated results affecting

In practice, both will continue to maintain a close liaison, share on-the-scene damage assessment data, and encourage predisaster cooperative planning and Red Cross training.

Each, however, will maintain its

own identity.
Seventy-day Adventists, by belief and experience, have been active in this type of humanitarian work since 1874. In other countries the church's relief program is under Seventh-day Adventist World Service-known in brief as SAWS.





The flu usually takes one to three days to develop. When it does come out into the open, you may notice chills, fever, headache, backache, muscular pains and a loss of appetite. Your temperature may go up quickly during and first day of symptoms, and will gradually drop over a few days. Fever usually lasts for about three days, but it may go on for as

long as seven. As your fever drops, you may notice more stuffiness in your nose and the cough may continue. There might also be a pus in the discharges from your nose and throat. From that point on, however, you'll begin healing quickly.

While most patients recover completely within a week, many continue to feel unusually tired for some time. The standard remedies of getting plenty of rest, drinking fluids and taking aspirin still hold true says the TMA. Hot chicken soup coupled with tender loving care couldn't hurt either.

In most cases, the flu leaves no permanent after effects, but occasionally, people do develop other illnesses. The most common complication is pneumonia. Other sicknesses that piggyback the flu are persistent cough or bronchitis, sinus trouble and ear infections.
