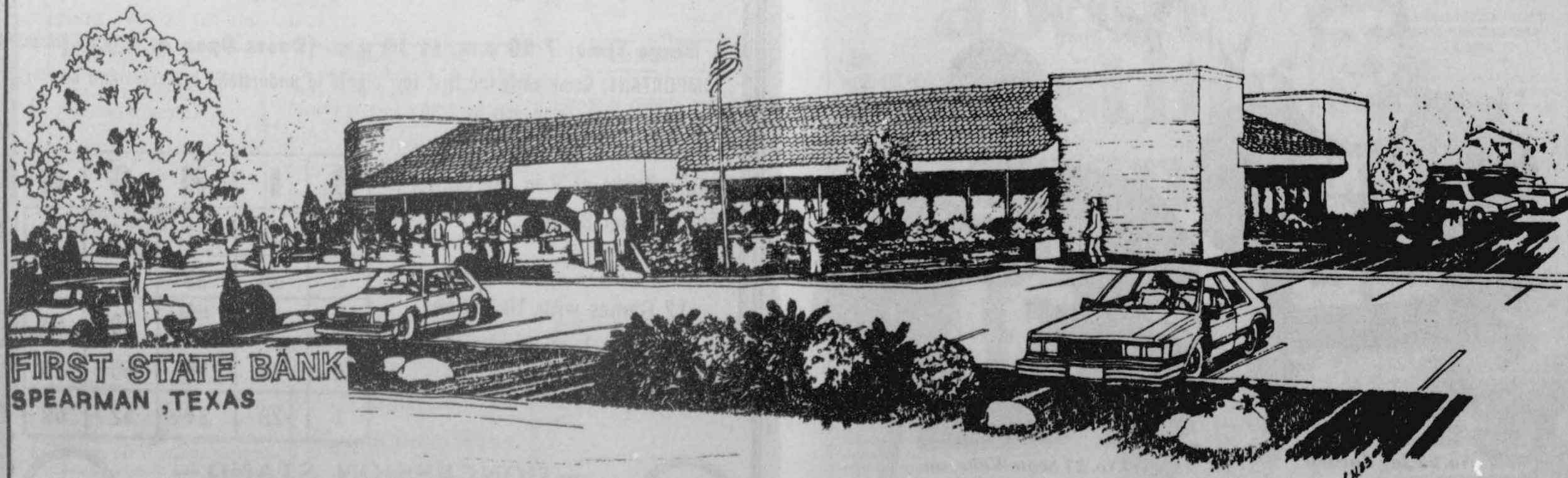

## TACT

Today's teenagers are often engulfed by influences and stresses which threaten their physical and emotional health, their social adjustment and their plans for the future. Parents and professionals are constantly seeking ways to improve the communication process with teens and combat potential problems. Six organizations have combined efforts to address these issues by sponsoring a dual event entitled, "Teens and Parents: How To Talk - How To Listen."

A unique educational experience, using drama to heighten the awareness of teen problems and pressures will be available for teens Thursday, September 11, 1986. An evening performance by the TeenAge Communication Theatre (TACT) is an exciting approach to exploring youths problems.

TACT is an improvisational theatre troupe comprised of teens dealing with issues such as peer pressure, teen pregnancy and substance abuse. The troupe stages a three-part production. Part one consists of a series of open-ended skits addressing problem issues. In part two, the actors return to the stage and, while remaining in character, invite questions and comments from the audience. Part three is a question and answer time with the actors about their participation in the TACT project. TACT is popular with teens and adults alike, and has received rave reviews for their unique performances.

"Teen Stress: The Pressure Cooker", "Developing Self Esteem in Children", "Families in Transition", and "Communication About Sexuality" will be some of the topics for the

day-long workshop Friday, September 12. The keynote address by Dr. Drew Alexander, Associate Professor of Pediatrics, University of Texas Medical School in Dallas, will define what a "normal teen" is, the changes that occur and how these changes affect behavior. This special workshop will offer new approaches and solutions to teen and family problems. The emphasis will be on learning to discuss everyday dilemmas and avert crisis before they arise.

The co-sponsoring agencies for the two-segment event include: Golden Spread Chapter of the March of Dimes, High Plains Perinatal Association, Texas Department of Human Services, Panhandle Social Services Forum, Texas Tech University Health Science Center-Department of Pediatrics and Planned Parenthood.

Both the TACT performance and the workshop will be held in the Fellowship Hall of the First Presbyterian Church at 1100 S. Harrison in Amarillo. The TACT performance on the 11th will start at 7:00 p.m. and the cost is \$2. The workshop the next day will start at 8:00 a.m. and will cost \$25 (\$15 for students).

## Teens Banding Together to Say No to Drugs

American teen-agers have been the most drug-pervaded youth in the world. According to the September READER'S DIGEST, a recent survey of some 40,000 youngsters revealed that over one in 10 seniors uses marijuana daily.

Despite these alarming statistics, tens of thousands of young people are banding together to fight drug use in what the magazine describes as a major national movement.

By participating in anti-drug rallies, conferences and forming national organizations with names like Just Say No, World Youth Against Drug Abuse and College Challenge, along with a host of state organizations, teen-agers are taking positive steps to rid their lives on drugs. The first by law of most of these groups is: no illegal drug use and on alcohol until you reach the legal drinking age.

Those involved in the teen movement say their role is to counter the enormous pressure faced by teens to take drugs, to act as a support system and to teach their peers how to say no. As Rick Lautman, 23, head of Teen Connection in Mississippi, told READER'S DIGEST, "Parents don't begin to fathom what peer pressure is. Today you find kids who get wasted on alcohol, pot and speed. Ninety percent will say, 'I really didn't want to, but I was afraid everyone would call me a wimp.'"

The leaders of the teen-age anti-drug groups are anything but nerds or wimps. They are, in the main, popular youngsters, respected by their classmates. As 17-year-old Billy Coletti, founder and president of Florida's Informed Teens, said, "Even the druggies don't resent me that much, because I'm making a stand."

Many of the groups use a simple approach to combating the drug scourge. "The best way to fight drug abuse is with the three E's: Educate, Educate and Educate," said Lori Smith of PUSH (Prevention Using Student Help).

Another successful approach is to provide activities that are drug- and alcohol-free. STOPP (Students to Offset Peer Pressure) in Hudson, N.H., holds high school dances, which in turn serve as fund-raisers for even more events — such as midnight cruises, mountain climbing, cookouts and bowling.

Each success seems to spawn additional teen groups. Said Mary Cobbs of Atlanta-based PRIDE (Parent Resource Institute for Drug

Education): "the youth groups are multiplying faster than we can keep track of them."

Dr. Donald Ian Macdonald, Administrator of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration, feels the teen-age anti-drug movement bodes well for the country. "Those kids who do learn to handle peer pressure and think for themselves may well be the strongest, most responsible, finest youngsters that we have seen in this nation."
