For the past several mon-hs, personnel throughout

ths, personnel throughout the T exas Department of Health Resources, public health regions, and local health departments, all across the state have been building up to the massive effor required for a success-ful N ational Influenza Im-munization Campaign. Ac-cording to Dr. Frais L. Duff, Director of Health Resources and head of the T exas Department of Health Resources and head of the T exas Department of Health Resources, the program is still "on schedule" in spite of uncertainties at the national level. "It appears at this time we have the bivalent vaccine for the elderly and chroni-cally ill by late August," Dr. Duff said recently, He added that a second vaccine for the rest of the population should be ready sometime in September. According to Dr. Duff, the bivalent vaccine "is a combination vaccine con-sisting of the A/New Jensey strain (S wine Flu), and the A/Victoria strain which is currently circulating in T exas." The combined vac-cine is intenced only for persons over 65 yeass of age, or victims of chronic ill-nesses such as diabetes, kidney disease, emphysema, and so on. In cases of doubt, Dr. Duff suggetts that a person contact his private physician. "The general population will receive a monovalent vacclue consisting of a single vaccine providing protection against the A/-New Jensey strain of flu.

New Jensey strain of flu. As soon as the vaccines arrive from the four phar-maceutical companies that are producing them (all under contract to the fed-eral government), they will be distributed across the state, for administration to the public. "Private physicians, part-iculary pediatricians and family physicians, have given flu shots for years, and they will continue," Dr. Duff said. In addition, "the local health depart-

mens will be running well-publicized clinics for those who do not have a family physician." He said that the public health clinics will be operated in virtually every community in Texas. A program of this scope requires not only a large effort on the part of public health personnel, but many voluntcers as well. Dr. Duff said, "We welcome the voluntcers. We are certainly glad to have them on the team." The program is being co-ordinated on a statewide basis by the Department of Health Resources and the First Lady's Voluntcer program is an agency of the Covernor's Office, and of course Ms. Dolph Briscoe, the Governor's wife, is the leader of the organization. The First Lady's program has taken a very active role and is superimenting all of the procurement and use of voluntcers in this program." Cattle Scabies On Increase

Only one outbreak of cattle scables -- in Nebcattle is cables - in Neb-raska--was reported nation-wide during June, the U. S. Department of Agri-culture (USDA) reports. This compares with four outbreaks in June, 1975. The Une outbreak brings to 77 the number of cases found in 10 states during the past 12 months. This is a sharp increase over the 45 cases in the previous 12 months. The Nebraska case was

The Nebraska case was in Fillmore County. Ac-cording to officials of US DA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), quarantines have been place on affected

premises. The quarantines will not be lifted until such cattle are treated with permitted perificides under federal or state supervision and found free of scables mite infestations. APHIS officials said scab-ies outbreaks cannot be prevented without the help of ranchers. Cattlemen are urged to check their stock regularly and report suspected scabies to their veterinarians, or federal or state animal health officials. Symptoms of the disease include constant tail switching, scratching, scabby zores, rubbing ag-ant objects, and hair pat-ches on fences.
