## Area Farmers Attempt Agricultural Diversification

Area residents are accustomed
o corn and milo harvest at this time of year. But a recent visit to the Mike Garnett farm revealed a different crop being harvested by special machinery. Garnett, along
with other Hansford County farmers, is part of an experiment that could prove beneficial to this area and to residents of Europe. The three-year experiment involves
growing green beans for seed. A growing green beans for seed. A
total 500 acres in the Texas Penhandle area were planted this year, with plans for expansion to 1,000 acres next season. There is apparently a "growing" market
for garden seed in Europe, and for garden seed in Europe, and
conditions are dry enough in this conditions are dry enough in this
area to produce good seed for planting in home gardens. With assistance from Spearmans' Andy Watley and Watley Seed Co., the seed grown here will be shipped to
Idaho by Caprock Garden Seeds, a company handling distribution for Bakker Brothers, whose home office is in the Netherlands. From daho, the seed will eventually be sent to Europe. Hansford County

include Garnett of Spearman, who planted 65 acres; J esse Francis of Spearman, with 19 acres; and Bob Gillispie of Gruver, who planted 50 acres of green beans. Expected
yields range from 2,000 to 4,000
