ment kit.' Postal Inspectors found Midwest did not really operate a clinic, nor did it do any health research.

What it did was make some wild claims for its so-called health handbook. "In this book you find a cure through scientific preventive solutions for the forty diseases and illnesses listed on the next page..." The handbook sold by mail for \$9.95.
