IRS NEWS Amatilio, Texas-Tax payers expecting refunds on their income tax can speed up those refunds by filing now and using the pre-addressed label and enrekope that came with their tax package, the Internal Revenue Ser vice (RS) said today. Ronald Archer Director Representative of the In-Archer Directo ntative of the In

Ronald Archer Director's Representative of the in-rernal Revenue Service (BS) for the Amarilio area, aid taxpayen filing their returns now can expect to receive their refund within four to five weeks. Those who wait until March or April to file, he said, could face a delay of up to E weeks. Archer explained that the Autin Service Center can process returns faster if they arrive with the labels afficed and in envelopes provided by the RS. The envelopes are magnetically coded for automatic sorting and the pre-printed labels are designed to save time in the actual processing of the return.

In the actual processing of the return. Even if you have moved or some information is printed incorrectly on the label, the IRS prefers for the taxpayer to simply correct the label rather than discarding it. "We're obviously very busy at this time of year," Archer said, "But we try to get the refunds back to tax-payers as soon as possible. With many people a little short of cash right now, we hope taxpayers will help themselves by using these time-saving features."


