He was a student pastor at Marshall, Friendship, Harrah, Little City, Boxwell, Roff, Okla. and his first church was in Roff, Okla. He has pastored churches at Santa Rosa, N.M., El Paso, Clinton, Okla.,

Albuquerque, N.M. and Abilene. He was named District Superintendent of the Amarillo District in 1981.

He and his wife, the former Marilyn Towers, have four grown children, three daughters and a son.

Dr. Williams has published articles in the "Church School Pulpit Digest", "The Minister's Manual", "Foundation for Evangelism", UMC and has written numerous articles in "The Texas Methodist/United Methodist Reporter" as well as columns in local newspapers. He wrote a book "God in Unexpected Places" published by Abingdon Press in 1974.

He has participated in preaching missions in Mexico, Scandinavia, Australia, Liberia, West Africa; spoke on college campuses in Okla., Texas and New Mexico. He has also had radio and television broadcasts

in Albuquerque and Abilene.

Police Report

The officer transported the bicycle to the

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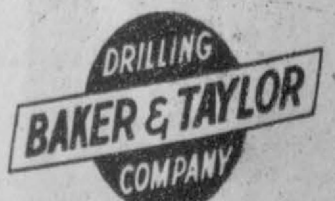

The 3 million workers whose wages were negotiated by unions in 1983 accepted contracts limiting pay raises to an average 2.8 percent over the next two or three years, making them the lowest settlements on record, the government said recently.

Choir director and students attend clinic

Jim Reed, Spearman High School choir director, and choir students Greg Meek and Buddy Pool have just returned from Ft. Worth where they attended the Texas Music Educators Association's annual clinic and convention.

The Texas Music Educators Association, the nation's largest state organization of music teachers, held its annual clinic/convention in Ft. Worth February 2-5, 1984. At the convention, plans for a Symposium entitled "Music is Essential to a Quality Education" were announced. To be held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin July 11-13, 1985, the Symposium will involve more than 200 delegates in detailing the role of music as a basic component of a child's education.

Highlighting the convention was the presentation of the six All-State performing groups under the direction of some of the finest conductors in the United States. The 812 students in these honor organizations were selected in a series of rigorous tryouts which initially involved more than 30,000 Texas high school students.

A survey conducted at the convention revealed that the academic achievements of the All-State performers are equal to their musical accomplishments. 38 National Merit Scholarship Finalists and Semi-Finalists performed with an All-State organization. Although membership is open only to juniors and seniors, disqualifying the significant number of underclassmen all-staters, 40 per cent of the 812 all-staters have attained membership in the National Honor Society.

The most significant measure of the academic achievements of these gifted musicians is their average score on the SAT test:

1984 Texas All-State Performers: 1134

1982 Texas average: 868

1982 National average: 893

The breakdown by performing group is as follows: All-State Jazz Ensemble: 1154, All-State Symphonic Orchestra: 1150, All-State Philharmonic Orchestra: 1139, All-State Choir: 1137, All-State Symphonic Band: 1125, All-State Concert Band: 1100. 80 per cent of the students indicated that they were college-bound.

Trees for windbreaks

Landowners wanting to plant seedling trees for windbreaks, shelterbelts, erosion and they also reduce fuel other conservation type plantings, may place orders now for trees through the Hansford SWCD. The trees are supplied at production cost by the Colorado State Forest Service Nursery in Fort Collins.

Twenty-three species of trees and shrubs, both deciduous and evergreens, are available to rural Hansford County landowners in addition to bare root varieties. The small potted trees have exceptional adaptability to harsh environmental sites.

The very cold temperatures, high wind and extreme snow drifting experienced in the Great Plains area this winter have caused much hardship. Successfully planted windbreaks can relieve much of this

hardship. Properly planted windbreaks will reduce wind velocities and trap snow so that farmyards and feedlots can be kept free of drifted snow.

Tree windbreaks increase the value of a farm or ranch; and they also reduce free costs. A Nebraska experiment station measured the fuel requirements for two similar houses. One house was fully exposed to the winds. The windbreak protected home used 23 percent less fuel.

Trees also provide homes and escape cover for wildlife as well as improving the aesthetic value of the farmstead.

Landowners who wish to make plantings this spring should contact the Hansford SWCD. Tree Order blanks and helpful planting and maintenance information is also available from this office.

Video Taping

Another Aid Program

The Kissinger Commission, headed by the former Secretary of State, has recommended to President Reagan that the U.S. Government (American taxpayers) launch a new, massive aid program to aid the people of Central America.

The initial outlay would be \$8 billion, over a five-year period beginning in 1985. The money would go to those governments in Central America which would cooperate in trying to improve the lot of their citizens.

Whether Congress will enact the necessary legislation is a question but it seems there's a very good likelihood this spending program will be approved. That's because the situation in El Salvador and Nicaragua have focused much attention on the political and military threat in this area.

Whether U.S. dollars can solve the problems of Central America is a debatable question. More dollars are also needed for South America. The question eventually arises as to how much more the United States can afford, if it can afford anything, while operating on annual deficits of almost \$200 billion.

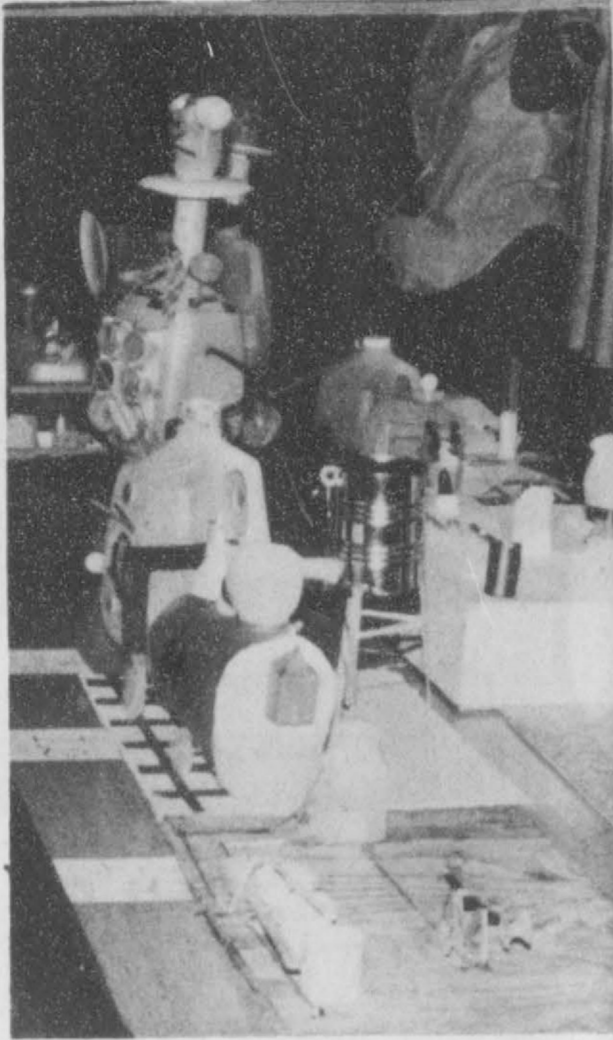

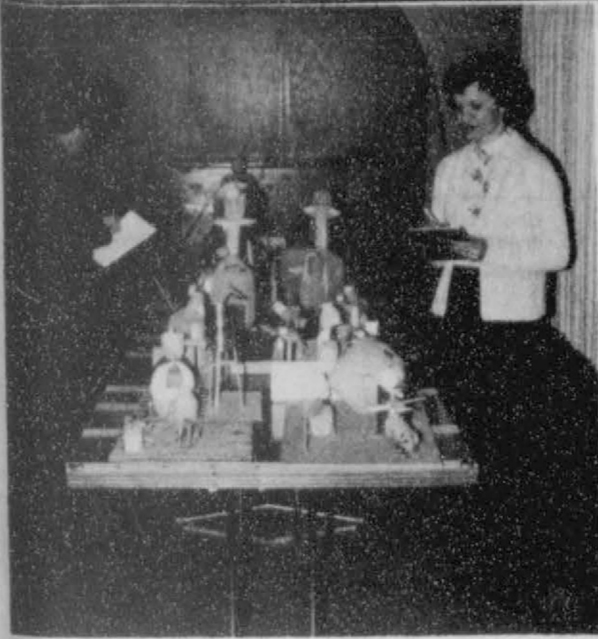

Parallel terrace.

A parallel terrace system is designed to fit the type of farm equipment to be used in tillage operations. Parallel terraces will reduce erosion and better utilize rainfall while having a minimum number of point rows. They help prevent pollution of ponds and streams by silt. Parallel terraces can be constructed with cost-share

assistance under the Great Plains Conservation Program which is administered by Soil Conservation Service or under the Agriculture Conservation Program which is administered by ASCS.

For additional information on terraces and other resource conservation practices contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Spearman.

TV COMMENTARY

MILLIONS of Americans now subscribe to cable television—and pay a monthly fee, which seems a bit high, in many cases for what viewers are offered.

THE attraction of the cable business is that one can get films without those annoying and increased advertising breaks. But few U.S. films are worth watching and that scarcity of quality programming is slowing the growth of cable TV.

BUT there are thousands of old films, most of them better than the rot produced by today's industry. That's because until the permissive age of the past twenty years, films met a certain standard of taste and decency.

SO the best cable offerings these days are older films, such as *Five Fingers*, *Intermezzo*, *The Third Man*, etc. They are worth cable prices—even if one sees only a few each month.

THE newly-made films are shockingly vulgar, base and degrading, with few exceptions. They reflect the decline of American standards and morals. The use of a few naked women

to attract viewers, most of them pitiful, homely types or coarse young girls, is trite and boring.

PRODUCERS now hang entire films on the attraction of a few nude scenes. Most of these films are sewage, and tend to commonize the impressionable. Scripts are worthless trash. Acting is non-existent. Plots are childish.

THE weather channel on cable systems is losing its former strong image. A fast line of talk goes on 24 hours. But the young chaps with their fast gab are often silly and too many commercials are creeping into the channel. One prefers a full weather forecast of one minute's length every five minutes.

ESPN is good for sports fans. The general religious programming is good for others. The health channel is quite good. The Catholic channel is dignified. But cable TV in this country could be much, much better. The U.S. film industry must somehow get out of the gutter and begin to produce something better.
