

I want to thank you for your votes and support in the past two elections and will appreciate your vote on April 7th.



Video Taping

The recent surprisingly close Supreme Court decision allowing private home owners to use their video taping machines as they wished is a consumer victory.

The court confirmed a legal bar against use of the machines for commercial use--already against the law. The issue now goes to Congress. But there seems little chance Congress will act in favor of the film industry--against the interest of the millions of private citizens who own video tape recorders.

Last year, 139 members of the House cosponsored a bill to clarify the rights of consumers to use their machines in their own homes for non-commercial purposes. Though it never got to a committee, and therefore not to the House floor, the bill reflects massive sentiment





Another Aid Program

The Kissinger Commission, headed by the former Secretary of State, has recommended to President Reagan that the U.S. Government (American taxpayers) launch a new, massive aid program to aid the people of Central America.


The initial outlay would be \$8 billion, over a five-year period beginning in 1985. The money would go to those governments in Central America which would cooperate in trying to improve the lot of their citizens.

Whether Congress will enact the necessary legislation is a question but it seems there's a very good likelihood this spending program will be approved. That's because the situation in El Salvador and Nicaragua have focused much attention on the political and military threat in this area.

Whether U.S. dollars can solve the problems of Central America is a debatable question. More dollars are also needed for South America. The question eventually arises as to how much more the United States can afford, if it can afford anything, while operating on annual deficits of almost \$200 billion.



SO the best cable offerings these days are older films, such as Five Fingers. Intermezzo. The Third Man, etc. They are worth cable prices--even if one sees only a few each month.


to attract viewers, most of them pitiful, homely types or coarse young girls, is trite and boring
