Weight Loss Program

Weight Watchers will get its more than 800,000 members on the move in 1987 when it introduces its Quick Start Plus Exercise Plan and Self-Discovery Plan. According to the Department of Health and Human Services, staying overweight and not exercising regularly are among the top "unhealthly habits" in the U.S. The 1987 Weight Watchers program elements are a direct response to that fact.

Along with the Quick Start Plus Food Plan and a group support system, the Quick Start Plus Exercise and Self-Discovery Plans complete the Weight Watchers four-pronged approach to weight control.

**For beginners with a fairly inactive life-style;

*For those who participate in some physical activity from time to time; *For those who engage in physical

"A sense of self-efficacy has also proven to be extremely important in the area of weight control," Sternberg says. "Along with the other components of the Weight Watchers Program, the Self-Discovery Plan teaches members that they have the resources to look good and feel good."

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Gruver left without Natural Gas service

Residents of Gruver could not cook on gas stoves or use gas heaters from 7 p.m. Friday to 2 p.m. Saturday because gas delivery provided to the town by two companies failed.

City Manager Jim Ratliff said a Texas Oil and Gas Co. line west of town froze. Cause of failure at the other company - Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Co. - was undertermined, he said.

Ratliff said nearly 30 volunteers from Spearman, West Texas Gas Co. and the Gruver Volunteer Fire Department helped correct the malfunction. A priority, he said, was turning off 575 meters.

Any meter that might have been overlooked could have been site of an explosion once the gas supply was restored, Ratliff said.

Through cable television, Gruver residents were informed their meters were being turned off and that volunteers were working as fast as they could, Ratliff said.

He estimated that 525 of the 575

meters are located at residences and 50 are at businesses.
"I think we did a good job of getting

"I think we did a good job of getting everybody turned back on," Ratliff said.

Be sure to take advantage of this occasion, not only for a taste treat but also for an opportunity to help the finances of the PCC.

An interesting fact showing up in our statistics is that, whereas our earlier clients were comparatively new victims of domestic violence, our clients now are tending to be longtime victims. What does this mean?

Possibly that the results obtained for the young women are encouraging the older ones, who had given up hope that anything could or would be done to alleviate their situation, to realize that they too can benefit from our services.

Again, let me explain how it is that the victims so often stay with their batterers, or change their minds after having reported their abuse-much to the frustration of the law enforcement officers who try to serve them; or perhaps never speak of it at all.

First, they can't believe this is happening to them. Then they think it surely will never happen again, especially since the batterer usually assures them that it won't, and even woos them with gifts and little treats and sweet talk. Many women continue with their batterer through loneliness. or feelings of inadequacy, or the sober realization that it will be difficult if not impossible to support herself and her children in the crowded labor market. To make it worse, their cultural training makes them think of the problem as all their own fault: If you were a better wife, if you wouldn't trigger his anger; if you were more considerate of his needs; divorce is evil;etc.

All this ignores the fact that NO ON ONE should ever be beaten. It also ingnores the fact that violence is a learned response to negative situations.

What has been learned can be un-learned. Betterers can un-learn their violent reactions and discover other ways to work out their frustra-

Easy? No. It requires commitment. Many familes are now living in comparative peace because the batterer's attention was caught and with help, he did succeed in changing his ways. The quickest and easiest way to catch his attention is for the victim to leave him for as much as 30 days. This helps him realize that she means business.

Meanwhile, the victim, at our Shelter, is participating in a support group that helps her to realize how she can change herself-improve her self-image, which has been shattered by the verbal and or physical abuse; to increase her skills, so that she is not so dependent as she had been on the economic value of her partner; and how to cooperate with him in his

violent reactions.

In addition she may have been learning some useful budgeting skills. Sometimes the two of them learn budgeting skills together.

Next time I'll have a report on how we did with the Mexican Pile-On.

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

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
