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

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Research Foundation Plans

Tenth Annual Field Day

A new feature to be shown visitors soon and at the Tenth Annual Field Day on Thurs-day, September 8 at the High Plains Research Foundation is

what a recent visitor called

the "United Nations Garden." This plot area has been planted from the "world wide seed bank" accumulated and recently received from foreign scientists. Seeds from all over the world have been planted in the "garden" to determine if any of the strains and varieties are suitable for economic production in the High and South Plains of Texas, or perhaps even in a wider area of the United States. While some of the seed resembles our own, many others have previously never been seen by scientists at the

Foundation.
Included in the planting are strains and varieties of soybeans, clovers, cane, sesame, sunflowers, corn, grain and forage sorghums, grasses of all kinds, legumes, beans, and peas of many varieties.

A scientist to scientist or

person to person exchange of interesting and sometimes valuable seed has been a part of the program of the High Plains Research Foundation for several years. Scien-tists in the different countries send the Foundation small quantities of seed they have developed for trial here. The Foundation staff reciprocates by sending seed to them. "Who knows but that this 'garden' might be a source of a further contribution to the worlds food shortage,"
Dr. Collister, Executive VicePresident of the Foundation

President of the Foundation said.

Seeds received this year were from Australia, West Pakistan, Sene 1, Bolivia, France, India, Greece, Belgium, Yugoslavia, South Africa, Turkey, Suriname, Argentina, Israel, Brazil, Montpelliar, England, and

Italy. Seed were also received from the New Crops Research Branch of the United States

Department of Agriculture.
The wold seed bank at the Foundation already had in storage seed from the follow ing countries, some of which were planted in the "United were planted in the "United Nations Garden"; Iran, Anglo Egyptian Sudan, Ethiopi, Korea, Japan, Venzuela, Peru, Brazil, Mexico, Canada, Egypt, Russia, Morrocco, raq, Spain, Portugal, Tunisia, Jordan, Israel, England, Netherlands, West Germany, France, Finland, Austria, "Rhodesia, Tanginika, Tibet, and Cuba, Thousands of small packages of seed are small packages of seed are stored in protected cases at the Foundation for future experimentation in develop-ing food and fiber crops for our own and the world's food and clothing needs.

An entirely new kind of ed-ucational institution, the Lab-oratory is financed by a development contract with the US Office of Education. By early autumn, Laycock and other autumn, Laycock and other coordinators expect to have projects ready in many sections of the two states for operational funding by the Laboratory, utilizing funds provided through the US Office of Education, Action research projects and demonstration programs are planned for the Texas and Louisiana region, all with the single obthe Texas and Louislana region, all with the single objective of improving educational opportunity for all the
region's students.

Laycock will work with a 24member Area Advisory Council, composed of eight re-

3 Crosses Up Weights

McGregor, July 15--Researchers at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Center, here, are making something of an improvement on crossbred cattle.

Instead of breeding a crossbred cow back to one of the parent breeds, the cow is mat-ed to a bull of a third breed. For example, a cow that is one-half Hereford and onehalf Brahman, is bred to a Charolais, Charbray, Brown Swiss, Red Poll or Santa Ger-trudis bull.

The results have been outstanding. According to Walter Kruse, animal husbandman at the A&M station, average weaning weight of straight bred calves at the McGregor station for the last 11 years is 392 pounds.

Average 180 day weaning weight of three-breed cross calves is 460 pounds, says Kruse. Calves from the standard, first-cross, (F1) mothers averaged 420 pounds at weaning time.

Reason tro the increase in weaning weights, says Kurse, is the boost in hybrid vigor brought in by the bull of the third breed. Breeding firstcross mothers back to a bull of one of the parent breeds means the calves are approaching a pure breed again, thus losing much of the hybrid vig-
