Beef For Father's Day



What's cookin' for Father's Day? Turkeys have their day at Thanksgiving. Hams generally grace the table at Easter. Why not beef for Father's Day? It's nutritious, fun to cook and dads love it!

"We want to tie beef to Father's Day like turkey has been tied to Thanksgiving," says Lucille Sterling, president of the Texas CowBelles, an organization devoted to the promotion of beef in the state. "If we can establish that connection, we can get people to head for the meat case in June and think of beef when they think of Father's Day."

Governor Mark White strengthened that connection by signing a "Beef for Father's Day" proclamation which states...

"Beef is a basic American food. It is rich in protein, iron, B-vitamins and other essential nutrients making it a food that fits well into today's active lifestyle. The beef industry is a vital part of our State's

food chain and contributes millions of dollars to the state economy annually..."

Texas CowBelles from across the state and representatives from the Beef Industry Council were on hand May 15 as Governor Mark White signed the proclamation in the Governor's Reception Room at the State Capitol. A beef rib roast was presented to the Governor during the ceremony.

"Consumers are often surprised at how low in calories and cholesterol beef is," says Anne Anderson, Texas Beef Promotion Coordinator. "The rib roast presented to Governor White, for example, contains a mere 217 calories per three-ounce, roasted, trimmed serving. It contains only 68 milligrams of cholesterol as compared to the same amount of roasted chicken which contains 76 milligrams of cholesterol."

According to the American Heart Association, no more than 300 milligrams of cholesterol should be consum-

ed per day. A three-ounce serving of beef rib roast accounts for less than one-fourth of the American Heart Association's recommended maximum.

To encourage consumers to purchase beef for Father's Day, the Beef Industry Council in Texas is working with food editors around the state on everything from special features to exclusive photography. Photography and interview sessions with grandfathers, fathers and children are being scheduled for food editors to help them with their "Beef for Father's Day" features. The nutritional value of beef, which is often overlooked or misunderstood, is being stressed in this promotion.

As the Beef Industry Council and the Texas CowBelles join efforts to promote beef as a nutritious, tasty component of the diet, beef should be making an appearance at quite a few tables on Father's Day across the state. Why not at yours?

FmHa Announces Operation Assist for Farm Financing

Hansford, Hutchinson, Ochiltree, Lipscomb County Farmers Invited to run for Committee

The Farmers Home Administration office in Perryton will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist," Jay R. McKay County Supervisor, announced today.

Operation Assist is a new effort for FmHa to help farmer obtain guaranteed operating loans: County Supervisors for FmHa will take completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said Mr. McKay. We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements, and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent.

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program. County FmHa officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the paperwork done beforehand by FmHa.

Borrowers and lenders interested in an FmHa guaranteed loan should contact the FmHa county office.

Eligible farmers in Hansford, Hutchinson Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration County Committee, FmHA County Supervisor, Jay R. McKay announced today.

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA County Committees must be elected. The third member is appointed by FmHA. The Hansford, Hutchinson, Ochiltree and Lipscomb County Committee assists the FmHA County Office in reviewing applications for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit matter.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA County Committee. "Farmers in this county, serving on the committee can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Mr. McKay.

For this first election only, two members will be elected at the same

time. One will serve a one year term of office and the other will serve two years.

In the future, all terms of service will be for three years each on a staggered basis.

Nominating petitions must be returned to the FmHA County Office by June 10, 1986.

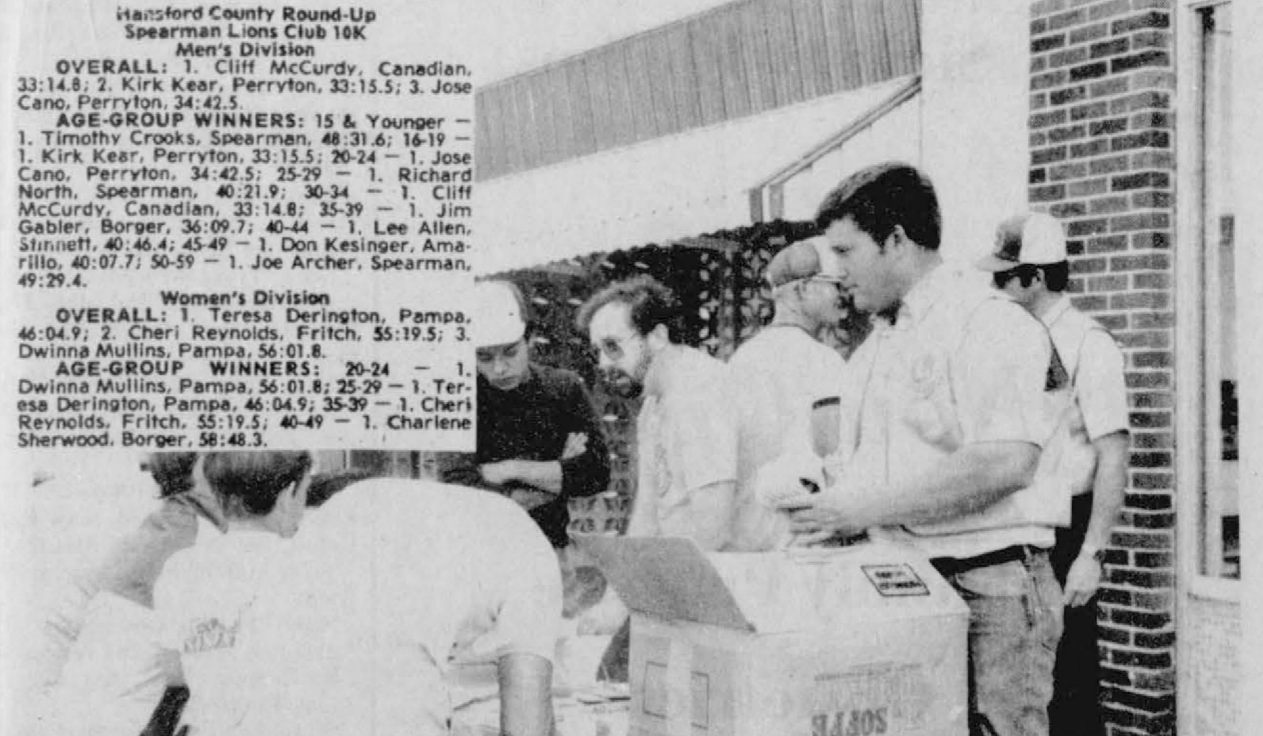

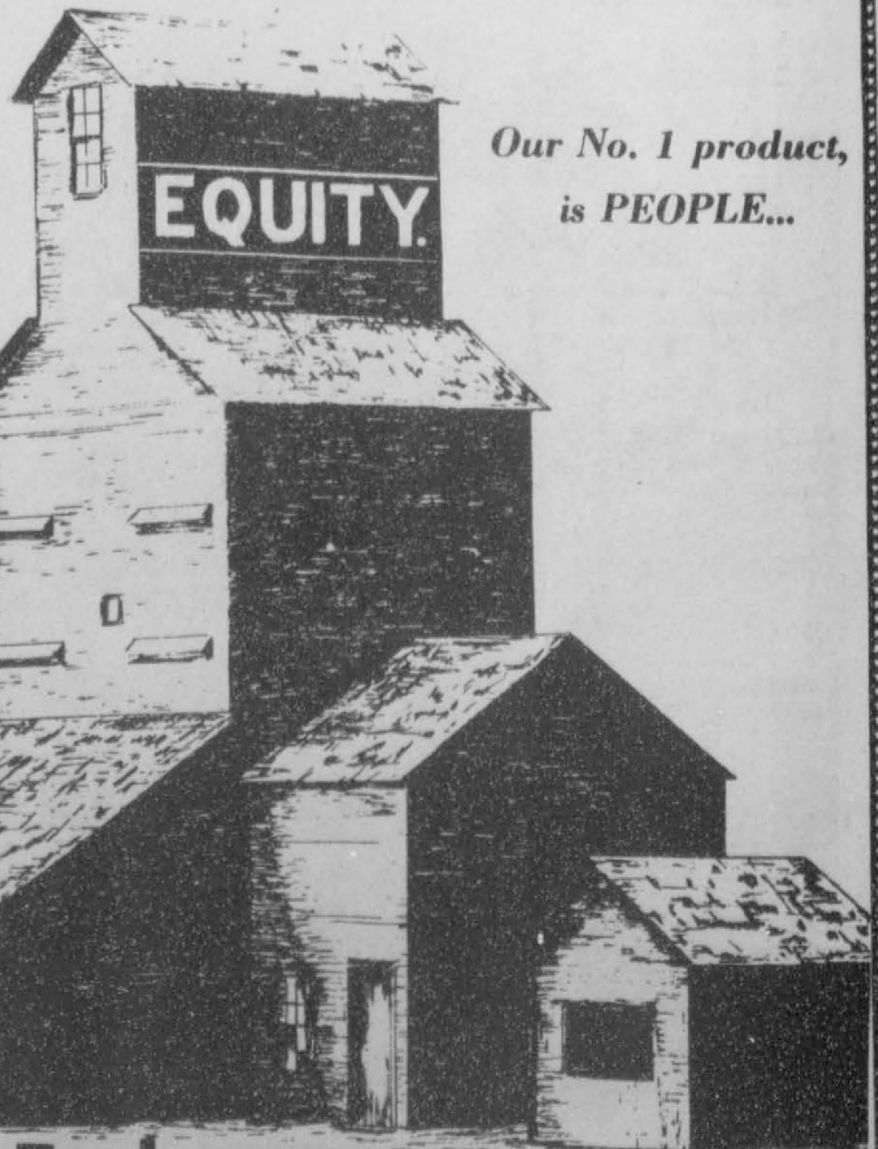

Beef Rib Eye Roast

4 to 6-pound Beef Rib Eye Roast

Consult owners manual for preparation of coals. Insert roast meat thermometer so bulb is centered in thickest part. Make certain bulb does not rest in fat. When coals are ready (low to medium temperature*), set drip pan in place in center of the lower grid. Place roast, fat side up, on top grid directly above the drip pan. Cover kettle (leaving all vents open) and cook roast until meat thermometer registers 140 degrees F for rare; 160 degrees F for medium, allowing 15 to 20 minutes per pound.

NOTE: Roast may also be cooked on a rotisserie over low to medium coals, using indirect heat method, to desired degree of doneness. Allow 18 to 24 minutes per pound.

*To Check the temperature of the coals, cautiously hold the palm of your hand about 4 inches above the coals. Count the number of seconds you can hold your hand in that position before the heat forces you to pull away.

Cold Grilled Fillet of Beef Rocket Salad

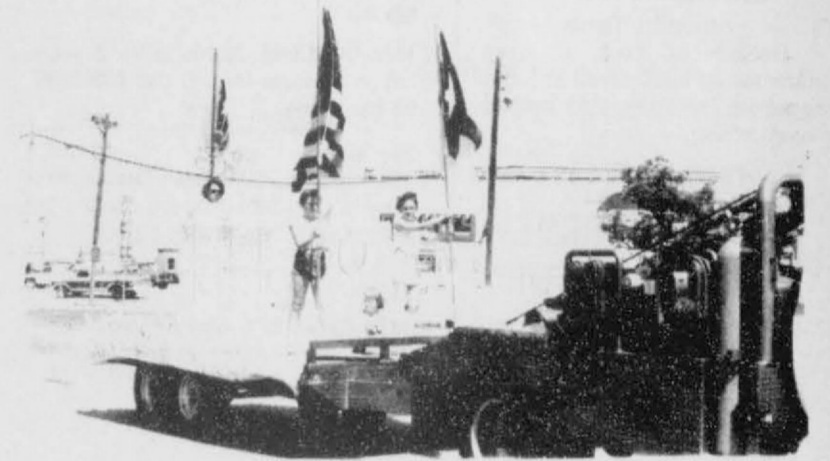
1-6 to 8 pound fillet of beef
2 medium yellow onions, peeled and sliced
2 bay leaves, crushed
10 to 12 black peppercorns, crushed
1 bottle red wine (Beaujolais or Chianti)
1/2 cup virgin olive oil
10 to 12 sprigs Italian parsley
salt and pepper

Completely trim beef of fat and connective tissue. Place in a large, wide dish. Put onions, bay and peppercorns around fillet, then add red wine, olive oil and parsley. Cover; marinate refrigerated for several hours or overnight, turning several times. Prepare a me-

dium - hot wood charcoal fire. Remove fillet from marinade, rub with a little olive oil, salt and pepper. Fold thin tail of the fillet toward the center; tie securely to form a roll of even thickness. Put over hot coals when flames have just subsided. Cook about 25 minutes, turning 5 or 6 times for even cooking. The fillet is done when its internal temperature is 125 to 130 degrees or when it is firm yet springy when pressed lightly with a finger. Remove from fire; cut off strings. Cool completely. Carve into three-eighths of an inch slices on a slight diagonal. Serve with a rocket salad with vinaigrette and garlic mayonnaise. Makes 8 servings.

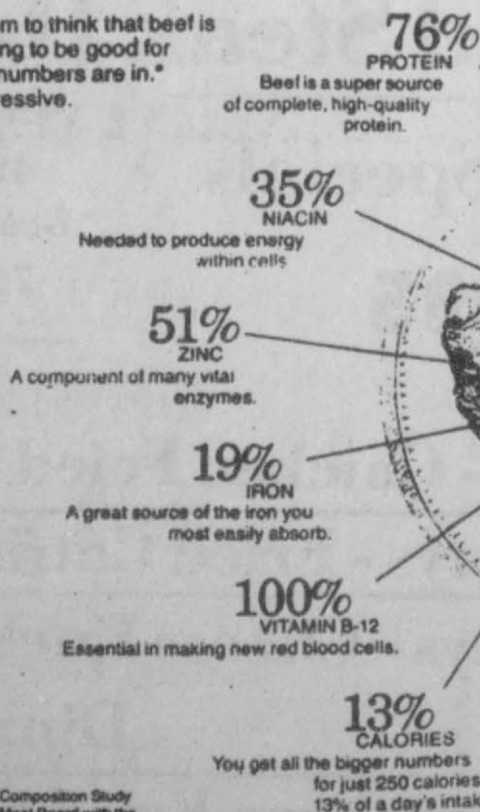

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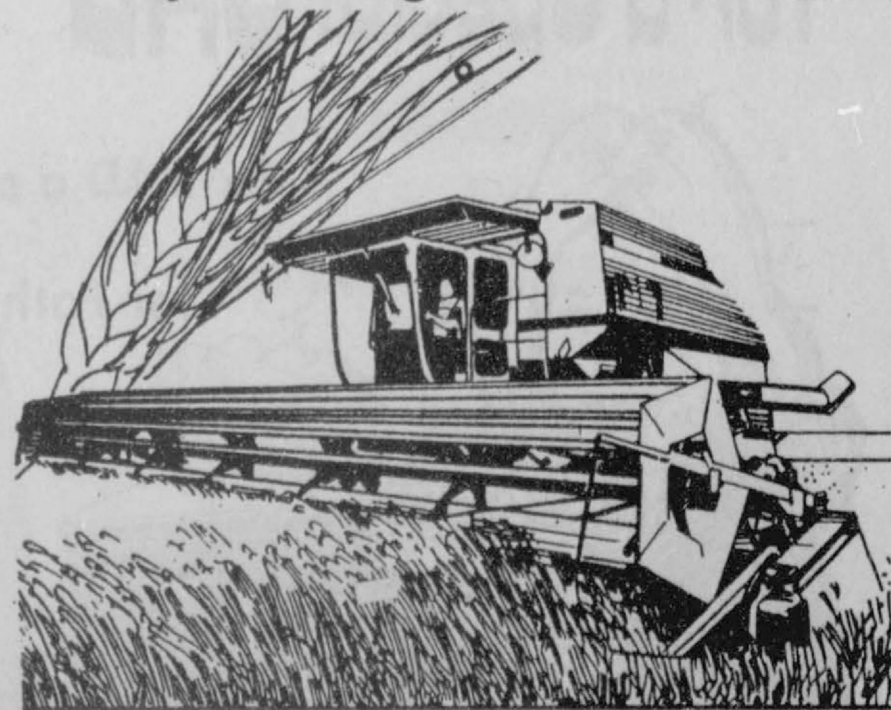
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Student Recognized

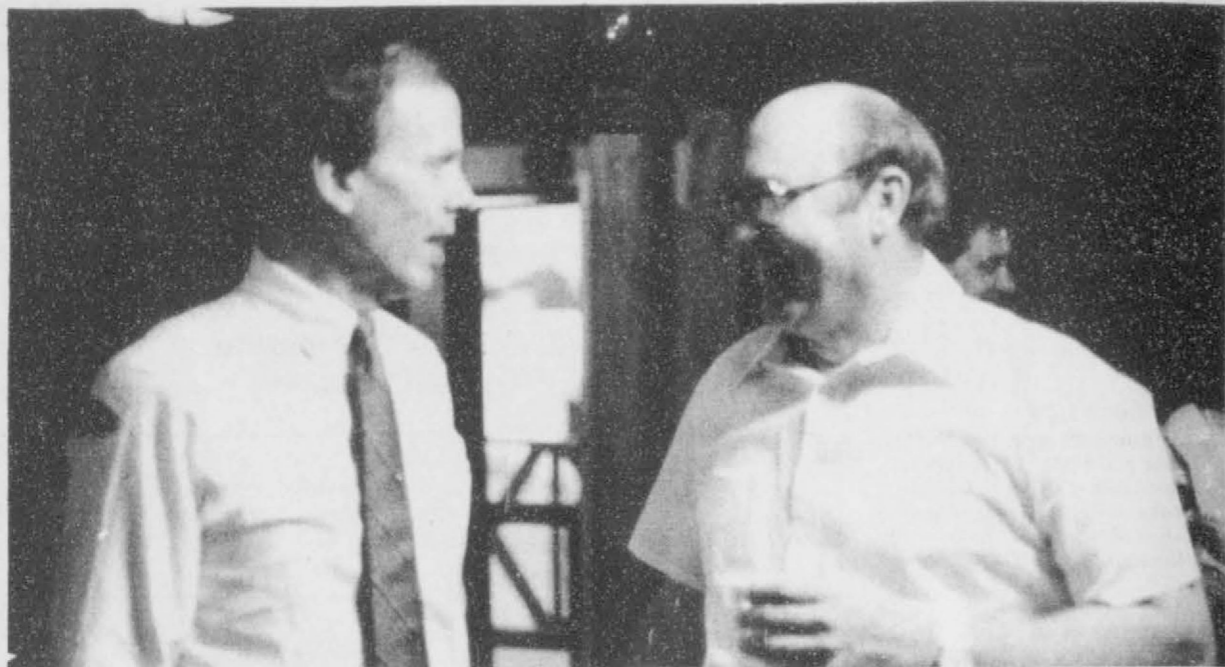

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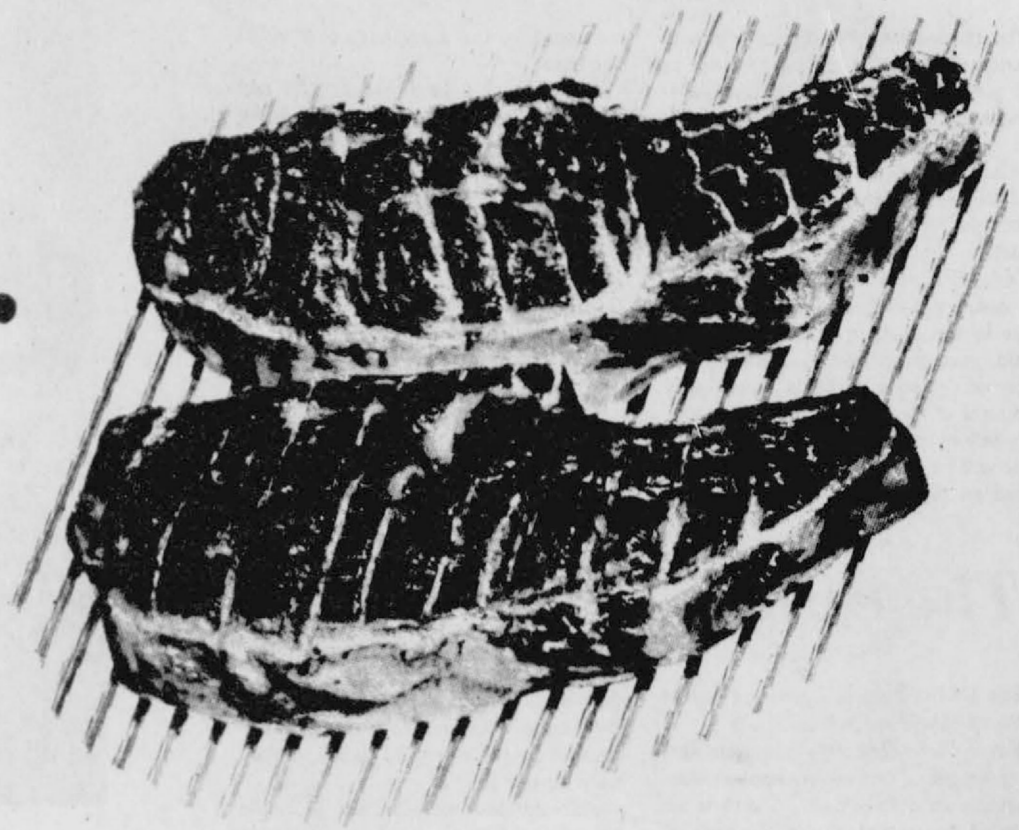

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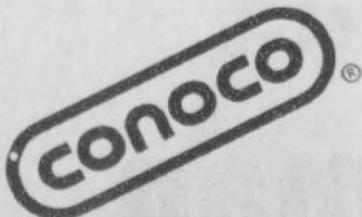
