#### Adverse Weather Conditions 9 In Review. **New Business Buildings** Affects Area Crops... Added To City

Hansford County farmers and ranchers did not fare too well in 1974 with adverse weather conditions affecting the cartlemen. Most of the dryland wheat was grazed out or plowed up. Yields for irrigated wheat were down considerable due to the hot derable due to the hot windy days before harvest. The wheat crop suffered early in the year from wheat streak mosaic and a very dry spring and early summer finished it off. Over 250 county farmers filed for complete failure with the ASCS office and many more filed for low yield.

Weather also took its

weather also took its toll of mile and corn production in the county.
Cooler than normal tem-Cooler than normal temperatures in August and September slowed the crop's maturing and an October 15 frost came much too early for the condition of the crop, resulting in very light grain. Milo and corn yields were some 60 to 70% average. Many cattlemen in the county suffered severe losses, as the price of beef fell in the fall of 1973 and stayed low through 1974,

stayed low through 1974, forcing them to sell their cattle at big losses. Losses ranged from \$50 to \$100 or more per head.

A check with the First State Bank on December 31 revealed that deposits were

\$19,513,745.40 at the close of the year as compared with deposits at the end of 1973 of \$18,472,714.49.

Loans were listed at \$10,058,508.48.

Residents of the area experienced an earth tremor on February 14 at 8:30 a.m. which lasted about 30 seconds, and extended from Gage, Okla. southwest to Amarillo, a radius of 250 miles. No damages or casua kies were listed as a result of the tremor which registered 4 pt. on the Richter scale.

## License Plates May Outlast Cars

AUSTIN--If all goes according to plan, the Texas motor vehicle license plate might soon outlast the motor vehicle that "wears" it. Beginning February I, the majority of motor vehicles operating in Texas may be eligible to use the new "muiti-year" license plate.

eligible to use the new
"muiti-year" license plate,
renewable annually for five
years of driving. According to Bob Townsley, Director of the Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division, approximately 9.2
million renewal notices are
already in the mail to vehicle owners announcing

"Motorists will notice no change in the registration procedure this year," said Townsley. "Only the license plate to be issued will be different,"

Instead of the usual metal

plate, a heavier, non-corrosive steel will be used for greater endurance. Also, the plate will be reflector-ized and will feature black letters and numerals on a white field, considered by experts to be the most easily readable color combin-

"The real change in registration procedure will come in 1976, "explained the Highway Department official. Next year, instead of buying a new license plate, owners will purchase a 1- by 2-inch adhesive-type validation tag that will be placed in the debossed upper left corner of the plate. In 1977, the tag will be stuck in the upper right corner to cover the debossed "75," and alternated for the ensuing years. Townsley said the tags cannot be easily removed without deterioration, a part of the plan to discourage vandalism or theft.

The "multi-year" plate to be used in Texas is almost identical to the one adopted by C alifornia some years ago.
Specifications for plate design, letters and numerals were obtained from that state after careful study by Highway Department officials. We found California to be completely supposeful with the pletely successful with its 'multi-year' licensing system and it came closest to the

'new look' we wanted for Texas, ", said Director

rew look' we wanted for Texas, ", said Director Townsley.

The 1975 Texas "version" is expected to cost the state 44 cents per plate to produce, almost double the manufacturing cost for the '74 plate. The difference in costs being attributed to different materials and plate design. However, the validation tags to be used beginning in 1976 will run some three cents aplece. According to Townsley, the state will realize an \$8.5 million savings in additional revenue from using the semi-permanent plates for the five-year license plates have been used in Texas. During the war years 1943 and 1944, small metal tabs were issued to renew the 1942 plate. Then again in 1947, when there was a shortage of metal plates, windshie kl stickers were issued as evidence of the payment of registration fees.

Townsley praised the convenience the five-year plate will afford motorists. "Especially those who find changing license plates

Townsley praised the convenience the five-year plate will afford motorists. "Especially those who find changing license plates annually a chore! " He reminded, "Certain classes of motor vehicles will still require annual purchase. require annual purchase of plates. These include radio operators, dealers, state officials and those

state officials and those passenger cars displaying 'personalized' plates."

Motorists using the new plates will notice the use of vowels for the first time. Since 1965, when the "English" system of a three-letter prefix and a two to three digit basic number was adopted, only consomants were used. Townsley says there are Consonants were used.
Townsley says there are just too many vehicles in Texas to allow consonants only. The first 1975 license plate will be AAA 10 to be issued in Bastrop County.
Also for the first time, a new five-year travel trailer.

new five-year travel trailer plate will be available. This classification includes all camper trailers and house trailer-type vehicles which are (1) not in excess of 6,000 pounds gross weight or (2) not in excess of 8

feet wide or 55 feet in overall length when measured in combination with the towing vehicle, regardless of weight. The registration fee is based on actual weight including all furnishings. Annual license plates and movement permits will be available for mobile homes and house trailer-type vehicles exceeding these specifications.

Annual registration fees for motor vehicle owners will remain the same as in the past - \$12.30 for

Bursitis or heart attack? Pain in one arm or both arms occurs frequently in combination with chest pain as an early warning sign of heart attack, according to The American Heart Association. But pain can also occur in the arm without being in the chest at all.

It can be mistaken for bursitis, arthritis or muscle strain, says the Heart As-

strain, says the Heart Association.

In the absence of an obvious reason for a pain or discomfort in either arm or both arms, a prompt checkup by your physician is indicated.

MIX Your Own Poison

A conscientious housewife was not satisfied with the way her bathroom bowl cleaner was removing stains so she added a dash of household bleach. She was found on the bathroom floor - dead! An unsuspecting victim of deadly chlorine gas.

Mixing household cleaners can be dangerous. The deadliest mixture is the combination of chlorine bleach with an acid-producing substance, such as bathroom bowl cleaner or vinegar. The result will be chlorine gas.

One Medical Newsletter told of 20 persons in separate incidents being overcome by gases from the combination of chlorine bleach and

aning agents, especially alorine bleach. Make sure you read the directions and warnings on the labels of all cleaning products.

that persons who experience early warning signs should call physicians first. This enables the doctor to participate in a decision on the mode of travel if the patient needs to go to the hospital. In many cases, a physician may advise a patient that transport by auto might be preferable to ambulance, as a time saver, especially in rural areas.

areas.

In any case, one physician advisor says that a patient who does not feel faint is more comfortable sitting up. The most common mistake made by well-meaning friends or relatives is to have someone who is experiencing heart attack warning symptoms lie down. The physician stresses, however, that the patient must not drive himself.

Second to this discomfort

This may be a sensation of pressure, fullness, squeez ing or aching, and can also occur in the neck, jaws, back or upper abdomen or in a combination of those areas. There may also be shortness of breath, sweating, nausea or vomiting.


The Heart Association urges that you don't gamble that a pain in your arm is bursitts rather than a hear attack. Have it checked by a physician.

There's good sense in the Early Warning Signs' rhyme "Early attention can mean prevention".

Encourage children to pursue hobbies and activities which help develop their minds and bodies, to use their creative abilities, to think for themselves, to have the satisfaction of personal achieve ment--rather than to just sit back and "be entertained," Dr. Jennie Kitching, family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, advises.



Welfare today.

Some 11,000 uninsured
persons 65 and over are
enrolled under this program. The premium increase does not affect the
23.5 million insured persons covered by Medicare's
hospital insurance, and who
pay no premium. The
Department's announcement
appeared in today's FEDERAL REGISTER.

The amount of the
premium and the increase
are determined by a formula required by the
statute, and based on increases in hospital costs.
Under this provision of the
law, enacted in 1972, the
uninsured person 65 and
over who elects hospital
insurance coverage pays
a premium that reflects
the full cost of the coverage. The premium amount
rose from \$33 in fiscal
1974 to \$36 in fiscal 1975.


