initial level of training is ECA (Emergency Care Attendant) who has approximately 40 hours of emergency care training.

The EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) has 120 hours of classroom and hospital training and is tested before certification. The EMT can take a patient's vital signs and provide initial basic life support treatment.

The Paramedic has 400 additional hours of training and may administer drugs under a physician's direction. The Paramedic is qualified to handle more complex injuries and illnesses.

Dear Senator Sarpalius,

After reading and studying House Bill 72, I am beside myself to think that you voted for this bill. I have supported you in your campaign for election in the past. I feel you do a very good job in representing this area of the state - which I feel is often overlooked or looked down upon by most other parts of the state. I honestly feel you have been a very good Senator. I am not so sure I can support you in a re-election bid.

It is ironic to me that while at the federal level the government is giving back more control to the local levels for many programs, that at our state level they feel the need to take local control away and put it in the hands of the state government. This is not what your constituents want! I feel that this is the biggest tragedy of House Bill 72 - it takes away the local control of our schools.

Another area of this bill that greatly disturbs me is that Mark White has been given the power to appoint the members to the State Board of Education of Texas, when in the past, these positions were elected. Why should he have this privilege or power? This Board has enormous power and they represent Mark White - not the people.

The Teacher's Test does not measure a teacher's competency but that they can take an achievement test under stress. I do believe there are teachers who are incompetent, but surely we could find a way at the local level to terminate their contract without the expense that this teacher testing will cost. The figures are outrageous and ridiculous. I have read that the cost is estimated to run between 23 to 50 million dollars, with most of that going out of our state.

The prekindergarten section upsets me. It sounds good, but now that it is written down, will the next bill say it is mandatory for all 4 years olds to go to prekindergarten classes? We will come to that? Our children do not need to be in school at such a young age. They need to be at home with their mothers, being loved and cared for - not thrown into a school situation where performance, competition, and etc. is expected of them.

There is more to this bill I dislike but this is enough at this point. I dislike the bill even though there are a few good sections. I know you were playing politics when you voted for this bill. I know you were under alot of pressure and your chairmanship and committee re-

sponsibilities were being threatened. I still think you should have voted the way your constituents would have wanted you to vote.

I would like to see you begin actively campaigning to repeal this law. If you do not, I will actively campaign against you in the next election.

One other point I would like to make about this State Board of Education of Texas...I have read that they are ruling on this law or parts of this law to apply to private and church schools. This is an invasion of our privacy. My children go to the public school system, but I should have the right to send them to a private or church school, knowing that there will be no government intervention. We do not want them to have any control over these schools. The more we legislate - the more freedom we loose. It must stop now. The pressure must be put upon these board members to leave our private and church schools alone!

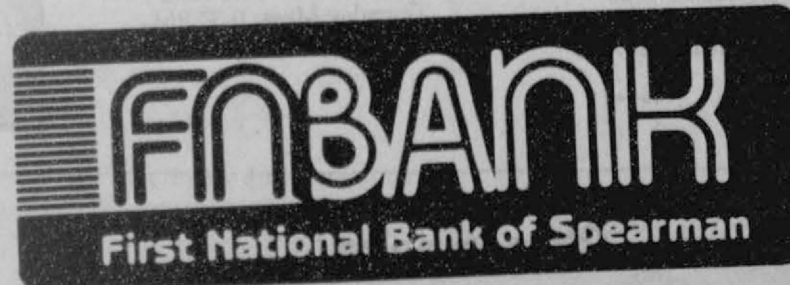

Two special features of the meeting in addition to the spiritual feast will be a potluck dinner for

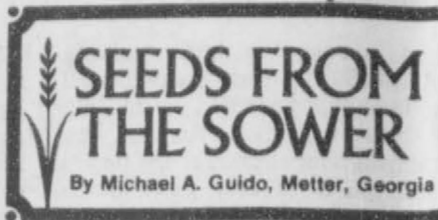
everyone after Sunday morning services on the 16th, and the

He is our living Lord who is ever-present, never-failing, and all-sufficient. That is what Easter is all about!

Child Abuse



King

ARLINGTON, Texas - A recent study by the National Institute of Justice indicates that more than 90 per cent of the nation's child abuse cases never go forward to prosecution.

"In many of these cases," the study said, "the decision not to proceed is based on concerns about the child's possible performance on the witness stand or their impact of the court process on the child victim's recovery."

Despite this gloomy report, some success stories have been reported in the battle against this insidious crime.

Such is the case involving Clarence Marvin King, who this week has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list.

King is charged with Aggravated Sexual Assault in connection with the molestation of an eight-year-old

Arlington girl.

According to police reports, she reported that she had been fondled on a number of occasions last year.

She told police that King had taken care of her after school when her older step-brother was unavailable for babysitting duties.

Investigators say King denied ever touching the girl, but did admit that he showed her three books about the female anatomy and how babies are made.

An arrest warrant was issued for King on October 1, 1985, after it was determined that he had failed a polygraph exam.

However, by then King had disappeared. Law enforcement officials have been unable to catch up with him since.

King is described as a white male, 46 years old, 5-9, 147 pounds, with brown hair and brown

eyes. He lists his occupation as a truck driver.

This is not King's first brush with the law. He was convicted of indecency with a child in Tom Green County in 1984 and had just been paroled to Tarrant County when the alleged attacks on the eight-year-old girl began.

A reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered by the Governor's Office for information leading to King's capture. Anyone with information concerning King's possible whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers programs.

- 3/4 c grated American cheese

- 1 c milk

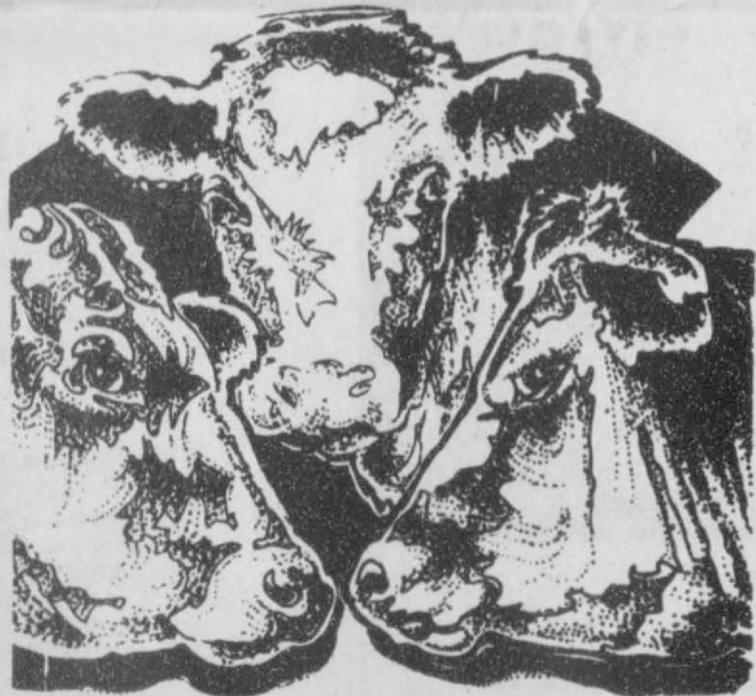

Area Men Elected Director of Sorghum Association

AREA MEN ELECTED DIRECTOR - Area Men Elected Directors of Sorghum Association

In a recent election, three area men were elected to offices in National Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Each will serve as a director at different levels of responsibility.

Francis and McCloy are County Directors: Jesse Francis of Spearman will serve as Hansford County Director and Clyde McCloy of Morse will be the Hutchinson County Director. The primary responsibility of each county director is to work with sorghum producers within his county and represent their views to the GSPA district board. Directors are encouraged to appoint community representatives within the county to advise and assist them. They will also help build GSPA membership and leadership within the county.

Loyall Turner is District Director: Loyall Turner of Spearman was elected district director of a district which includes Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Roberts, and Hemphill counties

The district director works with the county directors within his district and represents them to the GSPA regional director. It is Turner's responsibility to relay the views and interests of the sorghum producers within his district. He will also assist in the development of GSPA membership and leadership within the district he represents.

National GSPA was established in 1955 by grain sorghum farmers. The association's stated objective is: "To increase the profitability of grain sorghum production through market development, research and education and legislative representation." National GSPA has members in twenty-nine states with state organizations in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

The main objective of GSPA has always been to work for better prices through market development. GSPA promotes sorghum in the export market through the U. S. Feed Grains Council and also conducts specific sorghum promotion which cannot be done by the

Council. In the past year, GSPA and the Council have conducted sorghum promotion projects in Mexico, Egypt, Algeria, and the PRC. Market development teams and market and feeding information have been exchanged with more than a dozen other countries.

GSPA promotes the use of sorghum in the U. S. by working with livestock feeding industries and sponsoring research and demonstrations to prove the value of sorghum. The association conducts conferences for livestock feeders and publishes information about sorghum's value and use.

Area sorghum producers are encouraged to contact Francis, McCloy, or Turner with any recommendations, questions, or problems about grain sorghum.

The Malones

TYLER, Texas - Edna and Clyde Malone might not have gained the same amount of notoriety like Bonnie and Clyde, but they have caught the attention of Texas law enforcement authorities.

The Malones are wanted on warrants charging them with aggravated sexual assault, parole revocation and escape from the Smith County jail.

And this week Edna and Clyde achieved something that not even Bonnie and Clyde were able to accomplish -- they made the Texas Most Wanted list.

Their latest skirmish with the law occurred more than a year and a half ago.

Clyde and Edna were arrested April 30, 1984, on charges that they molested an 11-year-old boy. Edna was able to bond out of jail. But Clyde remained behind bars and

eventually was made a trustee at the jail.

On August 25, 1984, Clyde walked away from the jail. Invest-

igators say they believe the escape was well-planned and evidence indicates Edna was waiting for her husband when he made his bid for freedom.

The pair apparently drove to the outskirts of Dallas in their late-model white Pontiac Grand Prix and then abandoned the vehicle. They have remained at-large ever since.

This week the Governor's Office is offering rewards of up to \$1,000 each for information leading to the capture of Edna and Clyde Malone.

Edna Malone is described as a white female, 48, 5-5, 125 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. Prior to her arrest for aggravated rape, she worked as a salesclerk at a children's store. Investigators say she sometimes wears a blond wig and walks with a limp on her left leg.

Clyde Malone is a white male, 51, 6-0, 170 pounds, with brown hair and hazel eyes. He has a tattoo with the name "Etta Mae" on his right shoulder.

Anyone with information about the malones whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

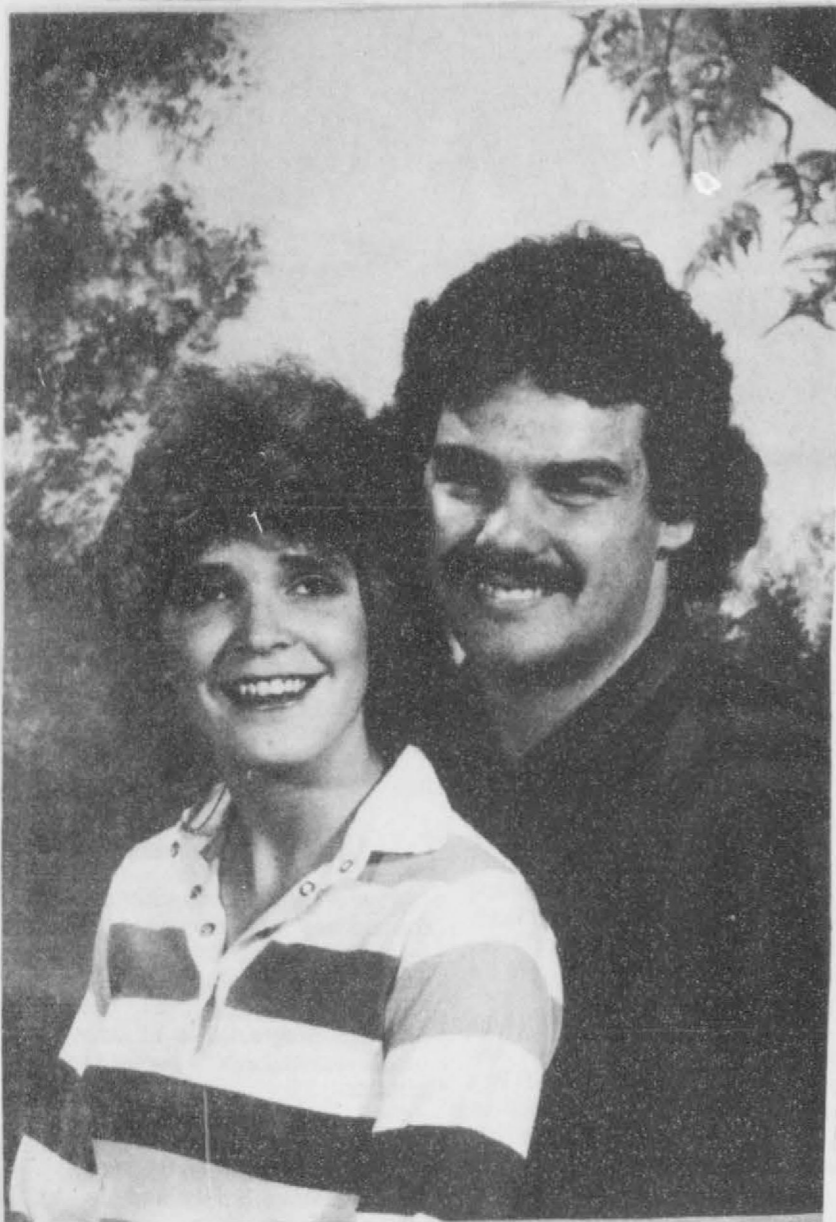
