The recent session of the Texas Legislature made sweeping changes in the School Finame Laws, aff-ecting all school districts in the State of Texas. At a meeting held in Amarillo, on Tuesday, June 24th, re-presentatives of the Texas Education A gency attempted to explain these changes so that each school district could estimate their fi-nancial aid for the year be-ginning September 1, 1975. A base salary increase of our local district approxima-tely \$40,000. The local fund assignment, that portion of the Minimum Foundation Cost that must be paid by the local district, will increase from \$279,693. to \$606,000. The net ef-fect of this is that the school will become budget balanced by the 1976-77 school year, resulting in a loss of \$199,000 in state revenue. For the 1975-76 school year, the law was written with a provision that each school will get 104% per stutendance of what it got the previous year. Since we are expecting a slighty lower enrollment, the amount of state funds will be very close to the same as 1974-75 for one year only. This then indicates a need for an additional \$259,000. in local revenue by the 1976-77 school year, just to pro-vide the services at the present level, not adding anything for the continued increase in the cox of materials and supplies. This is a very common dilemma in our part of the State due to the use of a Market Value Index being used, instead of Courny Assessed values, in determining local ab-ility to support schools.
