





Outstanding Homemaker BARBARA STAVLO



Jimmy Greene owns or operates several thousand acres of land in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles.


In 1984 Jimmy requested technical assistance through the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District from the Soil Conservation Service personnel at Spearman to correct some erosion and irrigation water management problems. A Great Plains Conservation Program contract, which provides assistance for installation of conservation practices, was then developed.

Under this program, a low efficiency surface irrigation system has been reorganized by installing 3,151 feet of underground irrigation pipeline and a center pivot sprinkler system.


To control erosion, 2,555 feet of level basin terraces and 2,352 feet of diversion terraces were installed. Approximately 4 acres of waterways were shaped and seeded to grass to serve as stable outlets for the diversions.

He seeded 108 acres of cropland back to permanent vegetative cover. About 60 acres of the Plains yellow bluestem which was seeded will be irrigated for hay production or grazing.

Jimmy, his wife Donetta, and their daughter Carla reside northeast of Spearman. They also have 4 other children: Lonita James of Childress, Debbie Schuman of Spearman, Sherry Thompson of Tulia and Dean who attends Odessa Junior College. They also have two grand-children.



He then went to work for United Supermarkets in 1980, and moved to Perryton as store manager, until resigning recently.





Taking Pride In A Healthy Community

When 11-year-old Bobby Rouse broke his only pair of glasses, his family couldn't really afford a new pair. In addition, the glasses provided little relief for Bobby's wandering eye condition.

The local Lions Club not only promised help, but provided Bobby with contact lenses, giving him 20/20 vi-sion for the first time.

This kind of concern is not musual. All 1.3 million Lions Club members worldwide work regularly to ensure their community's health in a

variety of ways.

As with Bobby, the Lions have traditionally served the blind and sight-impaired. They conduct vision and glaucoma screenings, recycle eyeglasses, build medical facilities and support eye banks, as well as fund eye re-

> Diabetes is a complex disease, attacking the health of millions. They conduct diabetes screenings and seminars, as well as support extensive research in diabetic retinopathy, the complication leading to blindness.

The Lions-Quest "Skills for Adolescence" program reaches students ages 10-14 in thousands of schools acros the United States and Canada. Designed as a life-skills course, students learn how to cope with peer pressure, make good decisions and increase their communication abilities. These interpersonal skills, research shows, will help them resist the lure of

Inspection of **Hansford Manor**

There were four inspectors, including a Registered Nurse and Registered Pharmacist. These individuals talked extensively with Manor residents, family members and employees to determine the adequacy and quality of care being provided.

They reviewed compliance with State rules and regulations and surveyed the ability of the Manor in meeting the health, recreational and social needs of its residents. The results of the survey were very gratifying and only confirm what we

Up to 78 feet . . .

Meredith level raised by rains

Fall rains have raised the level of Lake Meredith by four feet with the depth of the Canadian River lake "now hanging at 78 feet" at its dam near Sanford, says John Williams, manager of the Canadian River Municipal Water Author-

Lake waters had been receding throughout the summer, dipping to 73.5 feet in August -- the low point for the

"We got a 3-foot rise from September and October rains," reports Williams. "The lake was up to 76.56 feet on Nov. 1. We picked up another 11/2 feet the first week of November.

He adds that Lake Meredith is holding steady at the 78-foot mark since the Canadian River still is flowing.

The river was running at a 212-foot depth Sunday and was slowly falling, as noted in records kept by the National Park Service. Earlier this month the river flow was measured at three feet deep.

"We very rarely get any significant runoff after October," notes the CRMWA executive. "This will carry us through the winter and the lake will start spring in good

shape. The runoff is from heavy rains which fell across the Canadian River watershed in he Texas Panhandle and astern New Mexico the first

of November. Farmlands and pastures in the watershed had been saturated by earlier fall rains.

At the current 78-foot depth, Lake Meredith has 275,000 acre feet of water in storage and an area of 8,400 acres.

Williams notes that the storage is adequate to supply the 11 Panhandle-South Plains cities which depend on the lake for water supplies.

At the current 80 percent affocation, normal demands are for \$2,400 acre feet of water per year," he says, "We may not deliver that much for 1986 because demands

have been less, especially during last summer.

He anticipates the total delivery will range from 72,000 acre feet to 74,000 acre feet at the end of this year.

Advice issued to hunters

With hunting season in midswing, Game Ranger James Wilson has issued a few safety and legal reminders to marksmen and archers.

"A license is required to and it will be hunt. enforced," Wilson said. "Some nunters may be confused by the fact that there used to be exemption for hunting within the county you live.

"The other exemption was for age," Wilson said. "Now, the license is less expensive for those over 65 and under 17 years of age."

The special resident hunting license, at \$6, is good anywhere in Texas. The regular hunting license is \$10, and is required of all Texas residents who hunt any wild bird or animal. Lifetime resident hunting licenses are available for \$300. All hunting and fishing resident and non-resident licenses are available

There are no changes in restrictions on hunting weapons, Wilson said. Still in effect is the requirement that all shotguns used to hunt any migratory bird be plugged to allow for three or less shells. Manufactured plugs are not required, Wilson said. "I just use a pencil."

Plugs are not required when hunting pheasant, quail and turkey, but are required for dove, duck, geese and crane

'Most of the crane are sandhill, but some whooping crane pass through, and we don't want any of those shot," Wilson

warned. "There's only a little over a hundred left in existence. They sometimes fly with the sandhill.

"We are always concerned with the problem of random poaching," Wilson said. "Some years ago, hawks got into the chickens, but I only know two farmers in the county who are even raising chickens anymore. The good hawks and eagles do far exceeds the

Even the vulture is protected under federal and state law, Wilson said, because of their potential for good. "For instance, if a cat dies of some contagious chronic disease. birds of prey will eat the carcass and pass off the remains, killing the disease," Wilson explained.

"I get so exasperated with people who see some unique and shoot it. If it's unique, the last thing you should want to do is shoot it. Careless, indiscriminate destruction is disgusting to me," Wilson said. The fact that it is illegal (to

shoot a protected species) is a secondary problem to me. Destroying something beautiful is worse. My best advice is to stay with the species you are hunting. Don't shoot at hawks while you are going after phea- Sesquicentennial package of pasta. ant," Wilson counseled.

Wilson implored hunters not to engage in wild shooting. Every year we have the problem of livestock and equipment being shot."

Shriners burns hospital first-rate

(Editors note: This is the second and final part of a series of articles about the work that Perryton's Wheatheart Shriners do for the crippled and burned children of the area. By raising money through dues and special events the Wheatheart Shriners support a network of 21 hospitals across the United States. This is the story of one of those hospitals, The Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children-Burns Institute Galveston.)

"This facility is not just a hospital," said Chief of Staff, Dr. David Herdon. "This is a twenty-four hour a day intensive care facility.'

description demonstrates the special care that children receive at the Shriners Burns Institute in Galveston. The hospital is recognized as the lead facility for the treatment of burns of children in the world. The thirty bed hospital is staffed by over 250 professionals that specialize in the emergency treatment of burns, reconstructive surgery and burn research.

"One of the things that we are proud of at this hospital is that there is not a cash register in ministrator Dr. Nick Wilson. "Everything that we do here is at no cost to the parents. We don't accept government funding, except for research, or insurance payments. We are funded totally by the Shriners of North America."

Over the twenty years the hospital has been in operation, over 125 children from the Panhandle area have been treated by the facility. In all over 25,000 children have been patients of the hospital.

Functionally the hospital is divided into three parts. The first is the acute care unit. This group treats the child as soon as possible after the injury oc-

curs. The second phase of the hospital is reconstructive surgery to repair the damage to the child the burns caused. The third phase of the hospitals function is to do research into the best way to treat burn victims.

"The most important time in the treatment of a burn victim is the first 24 to 48 hours after the injury has occurred," said Dr. Herdon. "If we can get the victim to our hospital within that time period their chances for survival are excellent. This is true even with patients that are burned over more than 90 percent of their body.'

According to Dr. Herdon the latest technique in the treatment of burn patients is to totally remove all the skin that was injured. Then either cadaver skin or artificial skin is used to cover those areas until enough of the patients own skin can be transplanted to the wound.

"Eventually the artificial or cadaver skin is rejected by the patient," said Dr. Herdon. "A small area of undamaged skin of the patient can be harvested many times to provide transplant skin." The undamaged skin is removed and the facility," said Ad- expanded to cover an area fifty of burns in small children is times as large as the original skin area.

"Unlike the heart or liver, skin replaces itself over time,' continued Dr. Herdon. "We can return to the original site within five to ten days and remove another section of skin for transplanting."

The victims of burns also suffer other complications. "A child that is badly burned has its entire body thrown into shock. Massive amounts of adrenaline are released into the blood stream. There is a tremendous amount of water that escapes from the body as a result of the burn.'

Large amounts of food and

water are needed to help the child recover from the trauma associated with the burn. "As much as three times the normal calorie intake is needed by the

child," Dr. Herdon said. After the child has recovered from the initial shock of the burn injury, reconstructive and plastic surgery is begun. The skilled doctors of the hospital have reconstructed noses, ears and fingers of patients that have lost those appendages in

Along with the reconstructive surgery, the hospital provides physiological counselling to both the children and their parents. "Most of our former patients are living normal lives," said Dr. Herdon. "They have jobs, families, hobbies and are socially adjusted. It is society that needs to redirect its expectations of individuals. Physical appearance shouldn't be the only way a person is

judged by society."
One of Dr. Herdon's goals is to educate parents about the causes of burns in children. 'We see a large number of burn injuries that can be prevented through common sense," said Dr. Herdon. The leading cause scalding by hot liquids. The child pulls a boiling pot off the stove or a hot cup of coffee off the table.

Another cause of burns is hot water heaters that are set above the 180 degree scald threshold. "A number of burns in small children could be avoided if the parents turned the water heaters down to 140 degrees," advised Dr. Herdon.

A surprising large number of burns in children are cause by child abuse. Twenty-five per-cent of the cases at the hospital are confirmed cases of abuse and an additional twenty percent are suspicious in nature.

Research is a large part of the function of the hospital. "Over the past five years we have made tremendous strides in the treatment of large burns in children. Because of our reputation we have patients that no other hospitals will treat. Children that are burned over 98 percent of their bodies come here for treatment."

The hospital has had an outstanding record in treating


severely burned children. In the last five years they have treated 739 children that were burned over more that 50 percent of their bodies. Of those children all but three have survived.

The hospital has developed a number of advances in the treatment of severe burns. Artificial skin was perfected by the hospital. A special type of bed that prevents bedsores was also invented by the hospitals researchers.

In addition to the services that are available to the patients, the Shriners also look to the needs of the parents. Apartments are made available to the parents that stay with their children in Galveston. Transportation to the hospital is provided and a meal allowance is available if needed. All of this is at no charge to the parents.

Over \$9 million is spent by the Shriners Burn Hospital in Galveston each year. "If some of our patients were in private care," estimated Dr. Wilson, 'the cost of the acute care, plastic surgery, physiological counselling and housing would be in excess of \$500,000 for that patient." The Shriners, through their dues and contributions. fund the hospital.

The cost to transport a patient to Galveston is also a ma-


Obituary

"I was telling Victor just the other day about how he ought to get THREE WAY CALLING just like I've got. I may be retired, but I haven't slowed down yet. It just makes it a whole lot easier to handle my consulting work. When I'm talking to Fred, I just push the switch down and dial Dudley's number. Then when he

answers, we're all three talking on the phone to one another. THREE WAY CALLING is also a great way to get our children all on the phone with us once in a while, since they live so far apart.

Being a teenager, you know, isn't the easiest thing in the world in general. So CALL WAITING sure helps out. Since we got it, our phone is never really busy, and my dad and mom sure like that. Like if I'm talking to Jennifer or Chris or somebody for a long time. I'll hear a little beep on the line

that means someone's calling our number. So with this CALL WAITING. I just push the switch to click over and see who it is, and the same way to get back to my friend to tell him I've got to get off the phone now.
