## Venneman and McCloy Win Top Conservation Awards

Johnny Venneman and Willard McCloy received the two top awards at the annual Bank-

er's Award Banquet held in the Spearman Elementary School Cafeteria Thursday night.

Venneman received the "Outstanding Conservation Farmer-Rancher" award and McCloy was named the "Outstanding Soil Conservation District Supervisor".

O. R. Stark Jr., Executive Vice President of the First National Bank in Quitaque and a soil and water conservation evangelist, discussed the great need for conservation and the strength this nation derives from its agriculture.

Stark pointed out that when Khrushchev visited this country he spent more time at agriculture research centers and on a visit to an American farm than any other place. He did it because he did not understand how American farmers can produce so much.

In advocating soil and water conservation Stark said in the Holy Bible man is told by God to watch over and replenish the soil.

The young banker said he was happy to have had a small part in the great amount of soil and water conservation work that has been done around his hometown. The value of the work cannot be put in dollars and cents.

Venneman has been active in conservation for many years and was one of the organizers of the Hansford Soil District. He was a director until 1956.

He has approximately 5,000 acres in grass and under irrigation. There are presently about 4,200 acres in grass and 800 under irrigation. His most recent conservation work includes seeding 505 acres back to grass and 391 acres of grassland to better grass. He has installed 9,224 feet of irrigation pipeline, 4 farm ponds, a farmstead windbreak, eight livestock wells and tubs for improved pasture grazing and is a consistent heavy producer on his irrigated land.

McCloy was elected to the Board of Supervisors for the Conservation district in 1962 as a representative of the Morse area. He has long been active in conservation work and his family is active in agriculture and community life.

Entertainment for the banquet was by the Barkley Brothers of Gruver. Wayne Chapman of the SCS office here showed picture slides of conservation work going on in the county.

J. C. Harris of Gruver presented the Supervisor award and Clay Gibner of Spearman presented the Conservation Award.

## Cage Season Starts In Miami Friday

Spearman's Lynx join the Lynxettes on the basketball trail Friday night when both teams play the Miami Warriors and Warriorettes in Miami.

This will be the first game for both boys teams. However, cage boss Dean Weese says the Miami clubs are rated to be tough this year.

Weese has been working the Lynx hard this week as they prepare for the opener. Most of the squad came off the football field, or have been running and are in shape. However, some of the boys have been bothered with sore feet.

The coach has been working with a large varsity squad, but will cut down before the season starts.

While the boys have been getting ready, the Lynxettes have rolled to two one-sided victories. Friday night the Lynxettes walloped a veteran Panhandle squad 68-38. Tuesday the Lynxettes rolled over Sunray 53-18.

Friday night the Lynxettes jumped off to a 27-4 first quarter lead and Weese alternated

several combinations of forwards and guards.

Phyllis Patterson led the scoring with 24 points, Vickie Wilde had 20, Helen Greever 17, Susan Hutchison 4 and Linda Bengé 3. Barbara Hager and Wanda Ware each scored 18 for Panhandle.

Spearman started a little slower Tuesday in Sunray as they held only a 10-1 lead at the end of the first quarter. However, the girls rolled on to 29-5 at the half and 41-13 at the end of three quarters.

Weese was very pleased with the work of all of his guards. Besides the front line three of Joan Hackley, Sharion Close and Robbie Ownbey, he praised Kathi Pattison, Sharon Cook, Bethany Donnell and guard-forward Barbara Wilde.

Weese said his defenders only committed eight fouls and are improving on their defensive play rapidly.

In scoring Patterson again led with 25, Wilde again sunk 20, Greever, who played only a few minutes scored 2, Hutchison 1, Bengé 4 and B. Wilde 1.

## County Taxes Paid Rapidly

People may gripe about their taxes, but they pay them quickly, according to figures in the County tax office.

County taxpayers paid 87 percent of the county tax roll during October. This percent is \$479,358.09 of the \$548,807.73 tax roll.

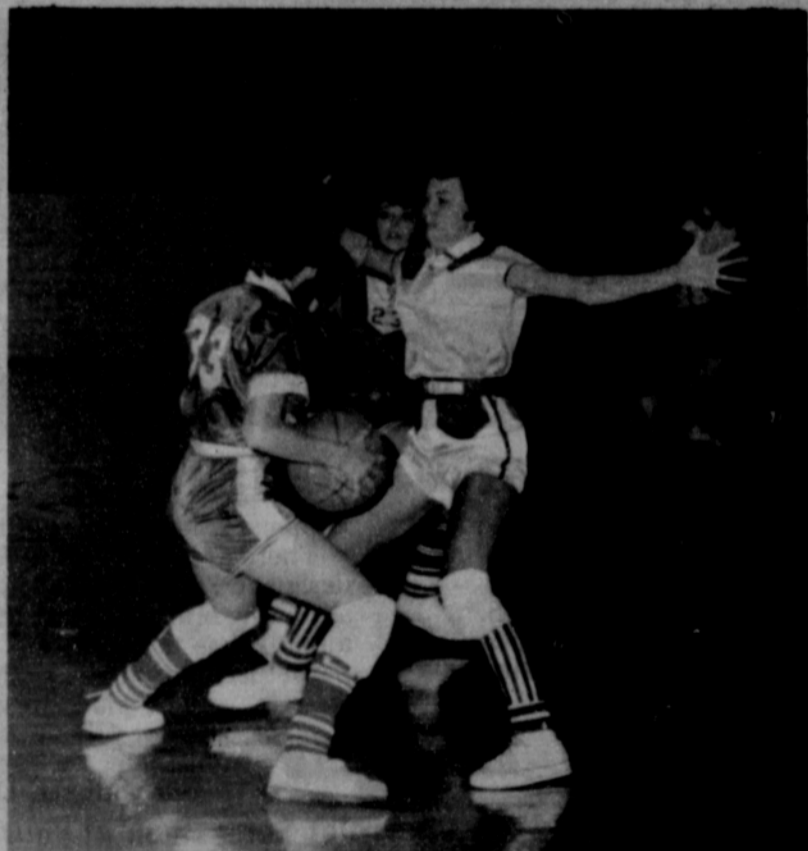
Tax Assessor J. B. Cooke urged residents to go ahead and pay their poll tax now, since the amendment to do away with the tax as a requirement for voting was defeated.

Cooke had been advising people to wait until after the election Nov. 9 to pay the tax. He said only 219 poll taxes have been paid and there are about 2,000 more to go in the county.

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# County Agent's Report

Following the lines of least resistance is what makes both rivers and men crooked.

## BRUCellosis TESTING

Brucellosis testing started this Monday on cattle in Precincts I and II of Hansford County, which is the east half. Twenty percent of the herd or 50 head, whichever is greater, will be tested. Cow owners will be contacted as to the date their cows will be tested. Only cows will be tested, no steers will be affected. They are especially interested in testing older cows. Cattle owners are asked to cooperate in making this test as complete as possible.

## BEEF BY THE SIDE OR CUT?

Despite today's trend toward smaller packages of food and more convenient foods, the sale of quarters and sides of beef is on the increase, says Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In some cases, says the specialist, buying beef in this form can save the consumer money, but he advises them to look carefully at the economics of such purchases. Unfortunately, all the carcass is not steak and roast. A large portion is cutting loss, fat, bone and low price cuts. In fact, Uvacek says that it takes about 2.16 pounds of a Choice grade live animal to yield just one pound of U. S. Choice beef in a retail store.

In making the decision whether to buy a side of beef, first determine the price of each of the major retail cuts at the local food store. These

cuts are rib roast, 8 percent of the carcass; chuck roast 19 percent; ground beef, 18 percent; T-bone and porterhouse steak, 6 percent; round steak, 10 percent; rump roast, 5 percent; sirloin, 8 percent; and stew beef, 6 percent.

To compute the total cost of retail beef, multiply the percentage of each of the cuts by the price of that cut in the retail market, explains Uvacek. Then add these individual costs and divide the total by 80 percent, the carcass minus bone, fat and cutting loss. This gives the average retail cost per pound if the beef were purchased over the retail counter.

To compare this price with the one quoted for beef by the side, first divide the price per pound of side by 80 and add the price for storage of the meat, about 5 cents per pound. To decide if buying beef by the side is really a bargain, compare this figure with the retail price per pound, says the specialist.

Other factors to be taken into consideration when buying a side or quarter of beef are to make sure that the same grade is priced in both cases, storage costs may vary tremendously, and remember that processing, cutting and wrapping is assumed to be included in the original quoted carcass price given by the dealer. Also, many low priced cuts, such as flank, plate, brisket and short ribs are included in the ground meat or stew meat percentages, says Uvacek.
