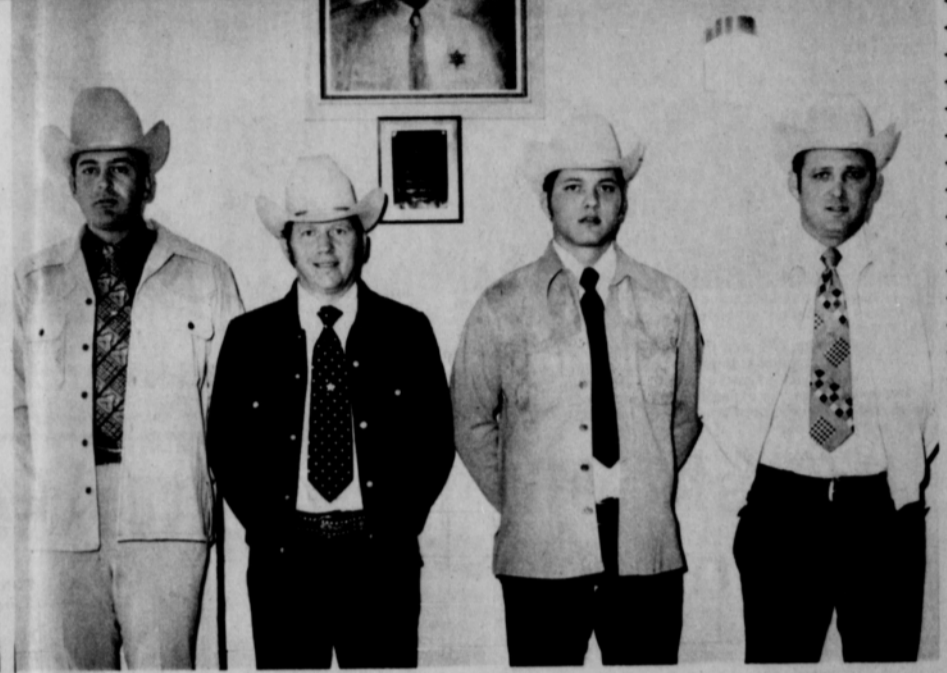

Day Care Center Needs Funding

The Spearman Day Care Center has been open for only a short time, but the needs as well as the potential can clearly be seen. First of all, the Day Care Center does render a service to many in the community.

The Center has been opened for inspection by residents on several occasions, but very few have taken the opportunity to visit the Center. You are invited to the Center at any time. It is for the community and the community ought to see how the Center is run and how they serve the children that are in the Center. Stop by and take a few minutes to visit with the staff and let them show you through the building and grounds.

Secondly, according to Beverly Jenkins, director of the Center, one of the staff members who has been with the Center since its opening will be leaving soon. There is a need for more applicants of people who wish to work. Anyone wishing to apply should contact Mrs. Jenkins at the Center for the necessary application forms.

Thirdly, if the Center is to become a continuing part of the community, there is going to have to be more financial support locally. For October, the Center is \$500 short of being able to meet current expenses. There has been some beginning attempts to get more local support which the board is grateful for, according to Rev. Victor Andersen, president, but these must continue and be expanded if the Center is to be maintained. Government support which is carrying part of the cost at present is only a temporary thing and a more permanent long term financial support must be found if the Day Care Center is to maintain its place in the community. Rev. Anderson stated that if anyone has ideas

on this, or can give financial help, to call Clay Gibner at the bank or Beverly Jenkins at the Day Care Center or Rev. Don Windsor of the First Christian Church. Fourth, the center is in need of a new location. A home, ever two story; or other building which might be suitable should be brought to the attention of the director, Beverly Jenkins. This could be either on a rental basis (as with the present building) or for purchase if arrangements could be worked out. This is not an immediate problem, but even to get anything worked out may take six months or longer. The Board of Directors

of the Day Care Center is open to all suggestions which anyone may have.

The regular meeting of the Day Care Board is the first Friday of each month at 9:30 in Judge Lee's chambers at the courthouse. Anyone interested is invited to attend these meetings.

A Day Care Center can render a fine service to the community, but if it is to survive, the community has to give full support to this project. It depends on the citizens of Spearman.

There are about thirty children being taken care of at the Center at the present time. The Center in its present location can take care of about forty.

Sorghum in the boot stage through soft dough will use about 3/10 of an inch of moisture per day for maximum production. The crop needs to be watered approximately every 10 days.

In order to apply water efficiently it must be applied according to the needs of the crop and the type of soil that is being irrigated. A well designed irrigation system will better distribute the water to the crop and eliminate water loss and expensive pumping cost. JV's should be on TV!

That's right, the Spearman JV, plays well enough to be on Teve! And, as a matter of fact, so do the Perryton Ranger Deputies. These two future varsity teams put on a real show for fans at Lynx stadium Thursday night, as the local JV won from the Deputies 20-12.

The Lynx kicked to the Deputies who took the ball on their 30. After running two plays, the strong Lynx defense, spearheaded by a host of good players, recovered a Deputy fumble on the 37. Eight plays later, the Lynx scored, as Reid sneaked into the end zone for the TD from the 1 yard line. The score came with 5:26 left in the first period. The PAT, a pass, failed giving the local JV a 6-0 lead.

The Lynx added another TD in the 2nd stanza. The touchdown came as a result of a beautiful Boone kick! Boone had punted to the 5 yard line, the Deputies fumbled and a pass from Quarterback Reid to Steele resulted in the TD with 5:50 left in the 2nd quarter. A pass for the extra point failed, leaving the halftime score at 12-0.

More action in the second quarter saw Trevino intercept a Ranger pass and set up another try for a TD. However, the Rangers held and actually the JV lost a real good chance to jump into a 3 touchdown lead before halftime, but lost the ball on a fumble!

The first half statistics saw the JV with the first down margin by 7-2; yards rushing, Lynx 115, Deputies 58. Passes attempted Spearman completed 1 of 4 for 7 yards and a touchdown. The Deputies tried 4 passes, and completed 0. In the punting department, both kickers could be playing for the Dallas Cowboys, as Boone averaged 41 yards and the Deputies 48 yards. The Deputies lost 2 fumbles the first half and the JV 1.

The Deputies came back in the third quarter and surprised the defensive minded Lynx, with a quick TD. The try for extra point, a kick, failed with 8:41 left in the 3rd period.

Boone took the kick off from the Deputies and

raced to the JV 38 yard line to give the local team good field position. Price picked up 3, Bodey added 25 yards, Bodey added another 12, Bodey 5, and Price sneaked around left end for 17 on a pitch out to set up the TD. Bodey ran the ball over on a trap play, to put the JV ahead 20-6, with 6:10 left in the third period.

The third quarter saw some superb playing for the JV, as Whitaker and Ortega both recovered fumbles for the JV and Price ran from the JV 47 to the 11 yard line on one of the most scintillating runs of the evening. However, the Rangers held, and finally intercepted a pass, returning the ball to the 28 yard line to stop the Lynx penetration. The third quarter ended 20-6.

Early in the 4th period end Scott Martin intercepted a Deputy pass, but the Deputies recovered a fumble, and completed a 76 yard pass, and scored a TD. With the score 20-12, the extra points became very important. The Rangers lined up to run for the PAT, and Chris McClellan literally "crashed" thru the entire Deputy line, and tackled the ball carrier for a big loss. This definitely fired up the Lynx. However, the sparkling Red Deputies were not quitting by any means. After kicking to the Lynx, and holding the Lynx, the Deputies came roaring back and on a pass interference ruling, had the ball on the Lynx 5 yard line. The "do or die" JV line held, and as time ran out, David Ortega broke through and tackled a Deputy for a big loss to end the game 20-12.

In the second half, the JV made 5 first downs to the Deputies 10. The Lynx rushed 134 yards to the Deputies 104 yards. Spearman tried 2 passes the second half, and completed 0. The Deputies completed 4 of 9 passes the second half for 113 yards. The Lynx had 1 intercepted and the Deputies completed one pass for a TD. The Deputies lost 2 fumbles the last half, Spearman lost 0 fumbles the last

half. Some rather outstanding visitors were on hand for this game. Harold Hudson of the Ochiltree Herald was present; Athletic Director Gregg Sherwood, and Supt. Cunningham, plus Principal Eddie Clemmons was also present. The local news media, plus local photographer E. Newcomb was making action newscasts for the Hansford Plainsman. Duane Smith of the local radio, and KEYE radio officials were also present for the Deputy-Lynx game. This was the largest news coverage of the year for the JV's and we at the local newspaper certainly want to thank these fine boys and their coaching staff for such an outstanding performance on the field. Also present, were former Spearman school officials, Mr. McKay and Coach Simpson! Above all, the sportsmanship by the Deputies and Lynx was spectacular!

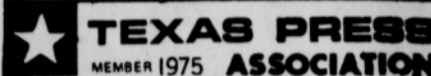

Lynx Claw Blackhawks

PHILLIPS--Spearman, playing flawless football as long as necessary, used a revitalized offense to strike quickly and its defense to strangle slowly as the Lynx whipped previously unbeaten Phillips, 41-21, Friday night here. The victory, assured by halftime when the Lynx led 26-7, left little doubt among 2,500 onlookers who's the team to beat for the District I-AA title. Spearman won last year as a first step into the state finals. Spearman showed many of the same strengths of a year ago--awesome offensive balance, consistently stingy defense and very few errors. The victory was a big one in the career of Lynx coach Greg Sherwood who has beaten Phillips for the last three years, and Friday night dropped the Blackhawks to 6-1 for the year while his Lynx climbed to 6-1. Quarterback David Steele, who hit four of five passes for 114 yards and two touchdowns in the first half, and freshman fullback Zane Newton, who

rushed 18 times for 169 yards and three touchdowns, sparked the offense. Their performances were made possible by impressive line play, led by guards Mark Cunningham, Terry Latham and Reggie Robertson and all-state center Terrill Evans--they led a team effort that controlled the line of scrimmage, and their defensive counterparts, which included Robertson at end and tackle Bo DeArmond, did the same. Newton scored on runs of 58 and 23 yards in the first period and added a third-quarter score covering four yards, mostly through gaping holes up the middle, while Steele possessed impressively in keeping the Blackhawks off balance. Steele, who guided Hooker (Okla.) High School to a 10-1 record last year, hit scoring tosses in the first half to Jeff Beedy covering eight yards and Mark Fox for 53 yards. The Lynx simply had the Blackhawks, who'll move down to Class A next year, outmanned, thanks to more depth, better overall quickness and a flawless game Fri-

day night. While the Lynx recovered six Phillips turnovers (three each via interception and fumble recovery), their offense didn't make an offensive error until its substitutes fumbled twice in the fading moments. Spearman amassed 409 total yards, far above its average of 278.2. Phillips had allowed an average 202.7 yards per opponent this season. "They are the most explosive team offensively we've faced this year, and the best defensively too," said former Blackhawk grid star and now Phillips coach Cozel Foster. "We just couldn't run the ball. Their linebackers shut off our trap com-

Rangers Rampage Past Mules, 56-8

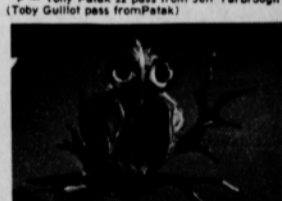

pletely. We didn't think they'd throw that much because their throwing hadn't been that caliber before. "They ran a five-man defensive front and we weren't expecting that because they had been running a 6-1, a split-4 or 6-2 as their basic defense." Ironically, Phillips scored the first and the last two touchdowns of the game. The Blackhawks went ahead 7-0 with 1:09 gone when on their third offensive play, Chris Purcell blasted over right tackle for 55 yards and the score. "After that first touchdown against us, we changed to a five-man line on defense," said Sherwood. "We felt we needed to do it, because they had had all season to watch us. "Our game plan was to come out throwing, because they put nine men on the line of scrimmage. David Steele had a great game throwing. "I was real tickled with our offensive line--I didn't know if we could block them or not, but our line gave David time to throw and blocked well. We moved the ball better than I thought we could." Spearman, now 2-0 in I-AA play, travels to Panhandle, while Phillips, 1-1, goes to Boys Ranch Friday night.

COUNTY IS 9TH IN CORN PRODUCTION

AUSTIN--Hansford County made an important contribution to Texas agriculture in 1974 by placing ninth in production of both corn and silage.

According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, local farmers harvested 42,400 tons of silage and more than 2 million bushels of corn. Compared with 1973 corn production for the county was up almost one million bushels.

Despite the dry weather, corn planting made excellent progress last year and had reached completion by the first of June. Rains in late July and August delayed harvest until late September and harvest was finally completed in early December.

Texas ranked sixteenth in the nation in corn production with 73.6 million bushels.

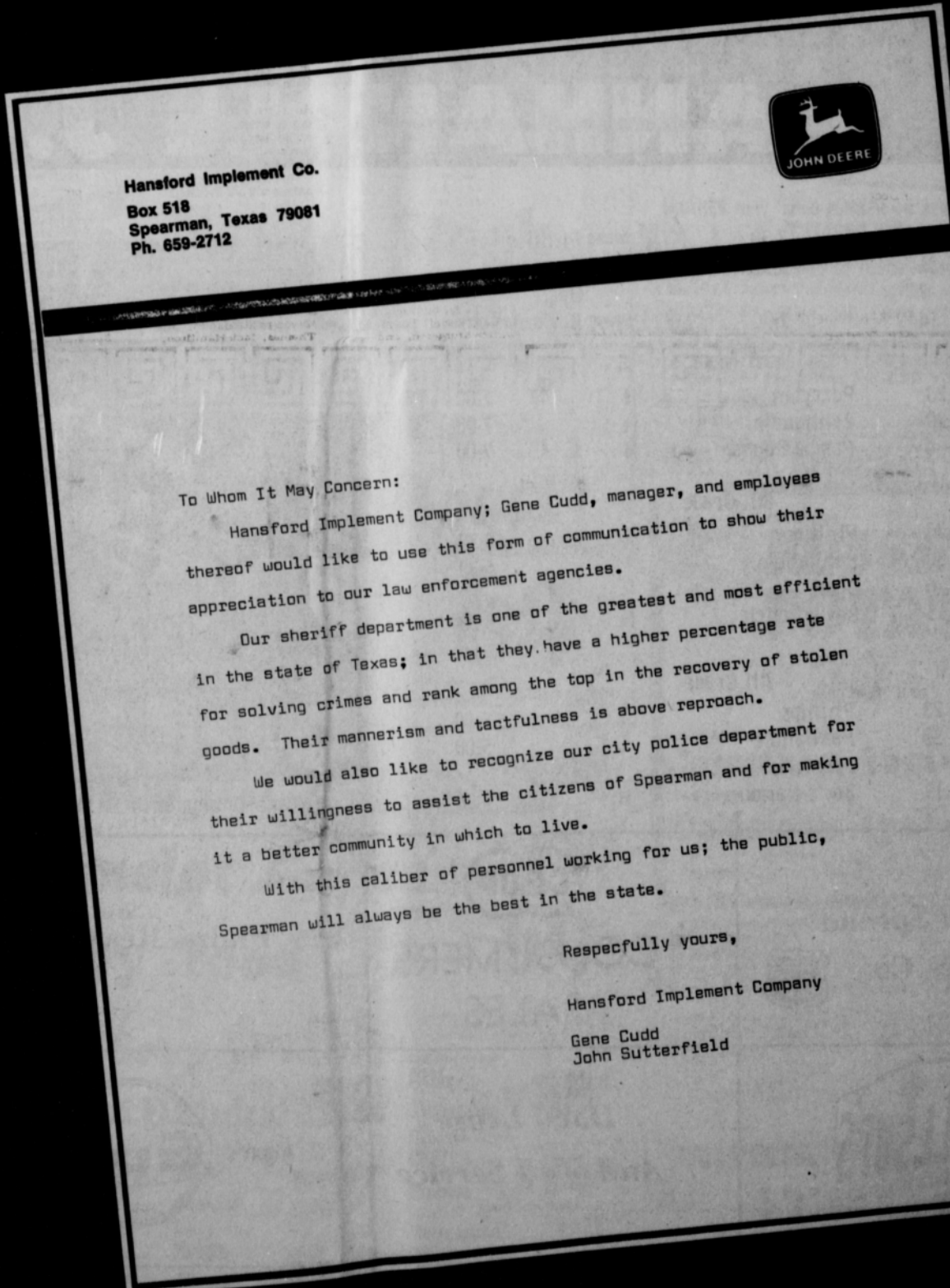

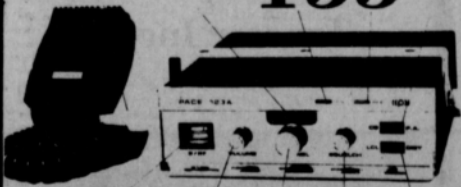

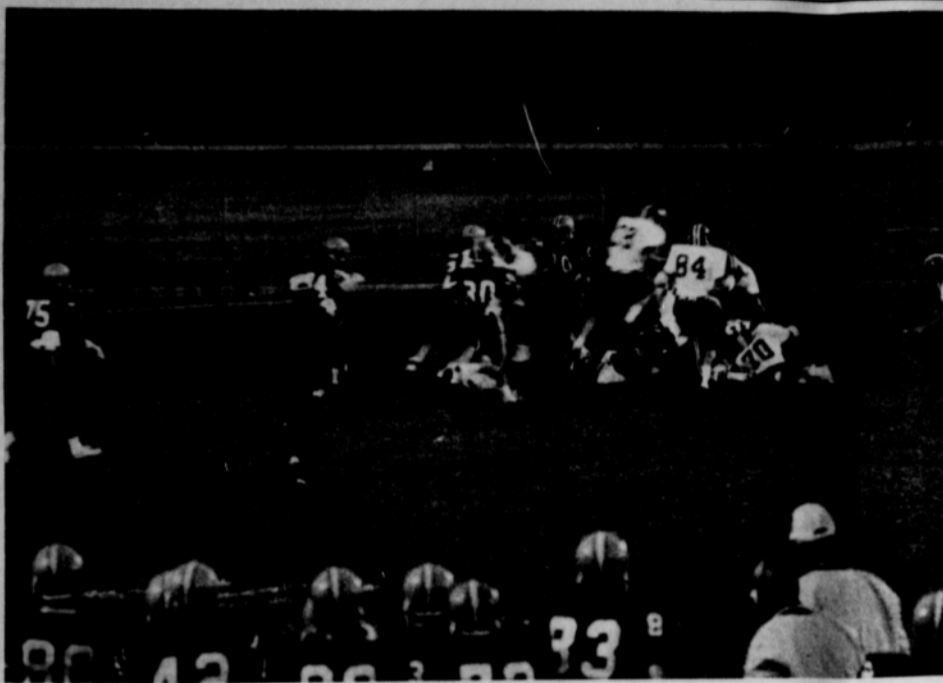

Criminal Justice System Improved

AUSTIN--October of 1975, the anniversary month for the Governor's Criminal Justice Division, finds Texas' criminal justice system in a considerably different state than was the situation seven years before.

An October 18, 1968 executive order established the agency to administer the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control Bill and Safe Streets Act.

Since that executive order, federal funding for the program has grown--from an original grant of \$1.1 million in 1969 to an approximate average of \$40 million during each of the past three years.

But what have those Criminal Justice Division dollars meant for the state of Texas?

"One effect, in the words of Governor Dolph Briscoe, "has been the implementation of a new, modern statewide police radio system, resulting in reduced police response time and increased percentages of crimes cleared by arrest."

This radio system, which enables departments to conduct multi-agency operations, has involved CJD-purchase of radios for virtually every police or sheriff's agency in the state, the governor added. It replaces an outdated system characterized by congestion, fading and unreliability.

"Another effect of the Criminal Justice Division," said Governor Briscoe, "has been the streamlining of court operations, and reduction of time between arrest and trial.

The Criminal Justice Division, for instance, has funded 178 projects employing assistant prosecutors,

investigators and secretaries, plus operating expenses, for district and county attorneys throughout the state since 1970.

CJD-funded court administration projects have also streamlined court operations at county and district levels. And a court administration project funded to Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has decreased the backlog in Texas' highest criminal court by 50 percent since the project first received CJD support.

Another major improvement by the Criminal Justice Division, Governor Briscoe said, is that "local jails in Texas are becoming more humane, more in line with court orders, and more susceptible to inmate rehabilitation."

Planning and construction costs have been paid by the Criminal Justice Division for county jails or correctional facilities in Gillespie, Bastrop, Wilson, McEnan and Kinney counties. A total of 37 other counties in Texas have received grants for feasibility studies and/or architectural plans for new or renovated detention facilities.

Construction of the Gore unit of Texas Department of Corrections is an example of CJD-funded projects at the state level.

But improved correctional facilities have not been the only contribution in the area of corrections, Governor Briscoe noted. "A total of 155 counties have requested and received CJD grants for adult probation services, and 152 have received support of juvenile probation services," noted the governor.

"Only a handful of these counties would have any probation services at all, were it not for the Criminal Justice Division's support," Governor Briscoe added.

Judge Lee Named Spelling Bee Director

Johnnie C. Lee, County Judge, Spearman has been named to direct the activities for the 1976 Hansford County Spelling Bee, to be held in conjunction with the 28th annual competition, co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University. April 24, 1976, will be the date for the regional eliminations in Amarillo and the location will be the Stephen F. Austin Junior High School. There will be 46 counties represented. The area assigned the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University covers 29 counties in the Texas Panhandle, 10 in Oklahoma, four in New Mexico and three in Kansas. All students in the public and parochial schools are eligible to participate. Any student who will not have reached his (or her) 16th birthday or gone beyond the eighth grade at the end of the current school term, will be eligible to enter any school contest and participate in the county eliminations. All details of the county's Bees will be available from the director. The Scripps-Howard Newspapers, headquartered in New York City, are the national sponsors. Last year more than 7 1/2 million school children participated at local levels throughout the United States. A unique opportunity is offered the elementary grade students to compete in the Amarillo Globe-News-WTSU event. Boys and girls in the sixth and lower grades may spell in the "Junior Division" and each county may select a champion in this category. The elementary county winners will not compete in the regional contest in April unless they should hold both titles in the respective county. County directors have complete control over their contests and may conduct the spelldowns either verbally or orally. The Amarillo regional contest will be oral competition. Most schools use the booklet prepared by the national sponsor, "Words of the Champions". The

1976 issue may be obtained by writing: Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166. The price of the book is 25 cents. The champions from Hansford County in 1975 were: SENIOR DIVISION: Etta McRoom a student in the Spearman Junior High School, from Spearman, Texas 79081. JUNIOR DIVISION: Shelly Friemel a student in the Spearman Junior High School, from Spearman, Texas 79081. An all-expense paid trip to national competition--to be held in Washington, D. C. early in June, 1976--will be awarded the regional champion when he is named next April. Gene Parker, director of placement at West Texas State University, is bee coordinator. Spelling Bee Editor is Ms. Jeanne Bartlett, Amarillo Globe-News. Interested students, teachers and school officials may contact the Amarillo Globe-News for additional information.
