Lions Enjoy Sweetheart Banquet

Boss Lion Lonesome George Young, acted as master of ceremonies for the annual Lions Club Sweetheart Banquet, held at the Jr. High School Cafeteria Thursday evening. Honored at the banquet was the Lions Club Sweetheart Denise Desimone, who is the acting Lions Club Sweetheart. Denise plays the piano for the Lions at each of their Tuesday noon meetings, and she always attends the regular Lions Club meetings.

Highlighting the evening's entertainment was the installation of two new members, Lions Bigger and Chapman. The installation program was headed by Lion Proctor, assisted by Lions Pogue and Ellsworth.

Lion Proctor told the new Lions "you have been asked to become a member of this club in order to better serve your community. You have enjoyed the association with the membership of this organization for the past several weeks as Lion Cubs". "Are you now ready to take your next step and become a full grown Lion?" After the new candidates stated that they were ready for the Lion initiation, Lion Proctor told the assistants to prepare the new members for initiation. The two were blindfolded, and Lion Proctor informed them "that since sight conservation is one of the many projects of the Lionism you have been blindfolded to show you the awfulness of blindness. You are fortunate indeed to have good vision in both eyes," Lion Proctor informed the new Lions. Next, he told the new candidates, "you will please stand erect and hold both hands in front of you." The Lion helpers will place your left hand in this pan of gold paint so that you will always remember that gold is the purity of Lionism." Then, the candidates were informed that they were to place their

right hand in the pan of purple paint, so that they would always remember that color purple means loyalty to their club (purple pride).

Lion Proctor went ahead to tell the new candidates that purple stands for Loyalty to country, loyalty to friends, loyalty to oneself and to the integrity of mind and heart. It is the traditional color of strength, courage and tireless dedication to a cause. Gold symbolizes sincerity or purpose, liberality in judgment, purity in life and generosity in mind, heart and purse toward his fellow man. The new Lions were told "You were not asked to join the Lions Club just by chance, for some good Lion member, prior to recommending you as a prospective member to his Board of Directors, watched you or worked with you. He was satisfied that you had a sense of community responsibility that you were interested in seeing your community become a better place, and better still, you were prepared to give of your time, your energy, and your talent, together with members of your community to see that it did become a better place to live, and that many of the needs of its population, which they themselves could not meet, were made available to them. This good Lion felt this so strongly that he chanced his reputation in the Lions Club to recommend and sponsor you as a fellow member."

When you become a member of a Lions Club, it is an indication to the other Lions that you do accept this responsibility to your community and to your club to support it in all of its projects and to give your club—freely of your time, your ability, and your knowledge, to enter into a sense

of fellowship with each of the members and to do all in your power to make your Lions Club grow and become a greater leader in the community. You will find, here among your fellow members, a sense of friendship and brotherhood, a deep and sincere desire among our leaders and members alike to search out ways of helping people less fortunate than we, and above all, there is the true and sincere desire to establish peace and trust, filled with friendship among the peoples of the world so that our nation may have the peace we search for and that we may live among the other nations of the world in harmony."

The Lions Slogan, "Liberty, Intelligence, Our Nations Safety." The Motto, "We Serve." The Emblem, "A large letter L standing for Law, Liberty, Labor, Loyalty, Love, Life, Lions"; on a circle representing the Lions, and Lions Club, all bound together into one; Lions profiles looking two ways, representing a Lion looking in every direction for an opportunity to give unselfish service, with the word "Lions" at the top representing the Association, and the word "International" at the bottom indicating it is an International Association. It is the unwritten obligation of every Lion to wear and display his emblem with pride.

The Lions believe in club meetings, where good fellowship and harmony prevail; in developing projects and activities geared to the needs of their communities; in broad participation in an international program of brotherhood and fellowship, based upon service wherever the need exists; in service to humanity without thought to race, creed, nationality, religion, or politics; in the ultimate leadership of Lion-

ism, but not at the expense of or in conflict with the programs of other organizations which, with different methods, seek the same goal of unselfish service to mankind.

The Lion Cubs were then asked to raise their hands and repeat after Lion Proctor, "I, Lion Bigger and Lion Chapman, promise as a member of the Spearman Lions Club to uphold the constitution and bylaws of Lions International, to serve to the best of my ability in any assignment given me while a member of this club. I now declare you a full grown Lion with authority to joke, heckle, and do anything suitable for a full grown ornery Lion."

The International Association of Lions Clubs started as a dream in the mind of a young Chicago Insurance Agent named Melvin Jones. His dream was the consolidation of several independent Clubs already in existence into one strong unit for service to humanity. His plan was presented to leaders of various groups at a meeting in Chicago in June 7, 1917. The association's first annual Convention was held Aug. 8-10, 1917 in Dallas, Texas with 23 Clubs participating. This was conceived and founded the world's largest, most active and most representative service Club organization.

The association became international in 1920 when the first Lions Clubs were organized in Canada. The 3rd, 4th & 5th Countries were China, Mexico, and Cuba. Then followed Central and South America. The first Lions Club in Europe was organized in Stockholm, Sweden on March 24, 1948.

Today there are more than 26,000 Clubs in 160 Countries of the world with a membership of over 1 million.

News From City Hall

City Manager Ed Thompson was informed by telephone Thursday by the city's lawyer in Austin that the Railroad Commission had denied High Plains Gas Company request for a temporary rate increase of 75¢ mcf from Spearman.

The gas company has petitioned the Railroad Commission for a 90¢ mcf from the City of Spearman and the temporary rate of 75¢ mcf.

The gas company presented their case to the commission in January and the city will appear before the commission with their presentation on March 17.

A representative from the Railroad Commission will be in Spearman the first of next week to inspect some of the company's gas lines to determine the value of the system.

Factors entering in the gas rate include the original cost, the replacement cost, inventory etc. Mr. Thompson said heretofore the gas company had always had the pipelines inspected in sandy soil and that the city wanted them inspected closer to Spearman in the soil we have.

In other city news, city manager Thompson stated that the city had received federal funds in the amount of \$39,219.24 for the swimming pool construction. The government has held out \$800.00 until the architectural barriers at the pool are eliminated. Ramps need to be built and doors widened according to a survey made recently.

A grader severed the gas line south of Perryton Thursday morning reducing gas to Perryton and Spearman. Thompson made the tie overs necessary to switch the system here to gas from Transwestern until the repairs could be made.

"The story of the American West has all the elements of the Iliad and Odyssey. It is a heroic world of quests and wars, of journeyings into remote lands, of daring hunts, last stands, and legendary exploits. It is an epic of mighty deeds of triumphs and failures, of inconsistent heroes and heroines"

In the Westerners Dee Brown follows the frontiersmen into this heroic world. His earliest gut-

Judge Johnny Lee stated that the county school board election will be held April 5 in conjunction with city and school elections.


Board members will be elected for Precinct 1, 3, and 4.

Q: What are some of the characteristics of a good breeding bull not necessarily required for good beef cattle? A: Most notable characteristics for breeding bulls not necessary in beef cattle include; a masculine appearance, breed markings, constitution and a good weight-to-age ratio. CONSTITUTION - Usually described as the positive tendency of an animal to perform well and survive during advanced age. Physical characteristics indicative of a good constitution are full development of the forequarters, wide-open and broad nostrils, a strong straight back and good body width and depth. MASCULINITY - Evidenced by the appearance of the bull. General features to look for are a full neck, strong horns (when this is a breed characteristic), full forehead with good development of chest and shoulders.

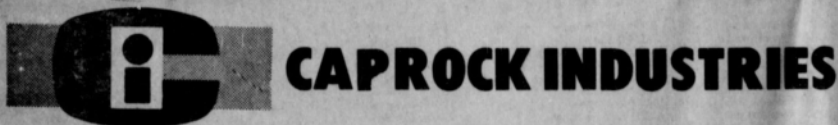



Have a good day, Suzie Spencer, nurse at Hansford Hospital. Keep smiling even though the hospital's full. You are all a great bunch out at the hospital.

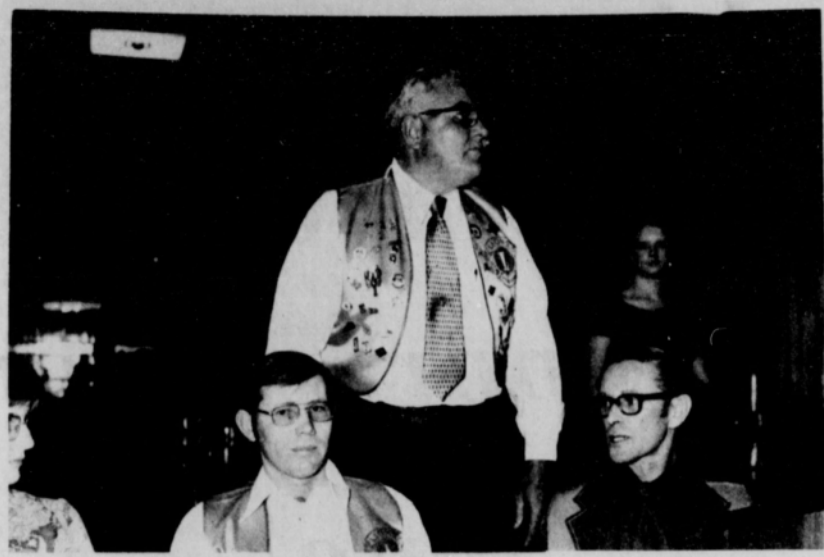

Public education, 25.8 cents, to reduce premature death and disability from cardiovascular disease by educating the public to the risk factors, etc.

Professional education, 14.8 cents, to provide continuing education of physicians, nurses, and paramedical personnel.

Community Service, 17.6 cents, to meet the needs and concerns of many public-patients, medical personnel, Community Service, 17.6 cents, to meet the needs and concerns of many public-patients, medical personnel, hospitals, and community health centers—through heart screening programs, blood pressure clinics, heart information centers, rehabilitation clubs, and instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Fund raising takes 8.8 cents for the kits, leaflets and materials to reach 11 million Texans with life saving information on Heart Disease, and to conduct training programs for 80,000 volunteer campaign workers.

Management and Supporting Services, uses only 5.9 cents of the dollar for public information, publicity, public relations, field studies and organization of local Heart Associations, administration, volunteer training, and leadership conferences.

The Easter Seal Representative is the person to contact to request services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing program and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

Last year 20, 152 handi-

capped people received help from the Texas Easter Seal Society. With the costs of providing expert professional care rising, more money than ever will be needed to assist more disabled Texans and remain ahead of inflation.

Funds help support Professional treatment centers in Texas, where services are provided to those crippled children and adults who cannot provide for themselves and who do not qualify for help from any other source.

"The people of Texas have always responded generously to helping the handicapped, and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year," Barkley said.

MARCH OF DIMES SCHEDULED

Last year with the help of volunteer workers and through the generosity of the people of Hansford County the amount of \$2315.77 was collected. \$1422.35 was sent to the National Office to be distributed for research grants; \$97.61 was spent on supplies; \$449.73 was spent on a Health Career Scholarship to Miss Barbara Farr. She is presently enrolled in Pre-Nursing Studies at Frank Phillips College. \$1625.08 is the balance of funds available for local use, this figure includes \$1470.04, a balance from previous years.

Human genetics is one of the lasting mysteries of life.

But some of its tragic aspects have become less unpredictable since the National Foundation, March of Dimes, turned its attention to birth defects in recent years after its marked success in the war against polio.

Primary aim of the campaign against birth defects is to prevent them as far as possible, or when that is not possible to reverse or mitigate the damaging effects.

Amniocentesis, or withdrawing samples of amniotic fluid through a hollow needle, has made possible the prediction of certain inherited conditions or biochemical defects.

The nation's most precious resource is our children. Each year, however, about 150,000 babies born alive in this country have some kind of birth defect. In the first year of life, birth defects are a leading cause of death.

Today, more than 1,500 genetic defects have been cataloged, and new defects are being described in increasing numbers. Some of these are pre-existing defects from parent to child, some are caused by factors in the environment such as radiation exposure, drugs, chemicals and infections, while the cause of others is still unknown.

Discovery that a baby has a birth defect is devastating to parents. In some families, however, the probability that a specific birth defect will occur can be predicted with some accuracy.

Some defects can be diagnosed before, at, or shortly after birth. Almost as many are discovered during the first year of life. A few do not become evident until years later. Some defects can be corrected during the earliest months of life, but others unfortunately result in life-long handicaps and are irreversible. Some defects are severe and some are so mild that they can be overcome with specialized medical management.

Birth defects occur in families in every social, economic, racial, and educational level. The problems presented by these defects today are different than they were 10 years ago. Damage caused to an unborn infant by the German measles virus can virtually be eliminated with the use of the German measles vaccine.

Further reductions in other birth defects can be made using knowledge already available. Good prenatal care from the earliest weeks of pregnancy, or, better yet, even before pregnancy, can help protect the pregnant woman and her unborn child from potential factors known to cause these tragic defects. In addition, new information about genetics and the effects of drugs taken by a pregnant woman upon the developing child is being used to prevent these disorders.

Linn Receives Athletic Honors
