Judge Denies Day Bond After Hearing Evidence

In an examining trial held Monday in Justice of Peace Court before Judge J. P. Vernon, Jack Lee Day, 37, was denied bond and bound over awaiting action of the grand jury.

Day, of Spearman, was charged with murder with malice in the same Justice of Peace Court Saturday morning. The charge was the result of the shotgun slaying of Harold Cook, 29, of Spearman Friday afternoon.

When Day was arraigned before Judge Vernon and charged Saturday, he asked that the case be investigated further. District Attorney Robert Galloway then asked for some time to get his eye witness to the shooting to the trial.

Judge Vernon then temporarily denied Day bond and set the examining trial for 10 a. m. Monday.

Judge Vernon said this week the examining trial was held Monday and he then denied Day bond. He would not elaborate on the evidence presented.

Cook was killed about 5:30 p. m. Friday in his car at Old Hansford by a single blast from a 12 gauge shotgun.

Cook, Day and Cook's brother, Ben, had been hunting that day. Investigating officers said a brief personal argument erupted between the dead man and Day.

When officers arrived at the scene about 5:45 p. m. Ben Cook was holding Day under citizen's arrest.

All three men had recently worked together for Phoenix Drilling Co. Ben Cook was a driller and the other two men worked as roughnecks.

Three Men File for Places On City Election Ballot

The deadline for filing for any of the three offices is 5 p. m., March 6, at the city hall. There is no charge for filing.

As in past years the election

will be held at the City Hall and Clyde Longley will be the election judge.

Bramlett Speaks To Educators About Local System, Building

The story of Spearman's windowless high school will be told tonight to the Ohio State Convention of School Administrators, School Board Members, Architects and Builders in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Superintendent of Schools and Chamber of Commerce President James Bramlett will be the featured speaker at a convention banquet there tonight.

Bramlett, who is enroute to the American Association of School Administrators Conference in Atlantic City, N. J., was invited to speak to the convention on the building and the operation of the school system.

The Superintendent said the organization asked him to discuss, besides the building, the ability grouping of students now being used in the Spearman schools. The Superintendent said this school is one of the few that has been able to use this program successfully.

Bramlett said he received the invitation after officers of the Ohio organization read about the school in an article in a Cincinnati newspaper when the building was opened, then the article about the Spearman

system in the Texas School Business Magazine. After speaking at the banquet Bramlett will go on to Atlantic City for the national conference. He will return to Spearman Feb. 21.

Lynxettes Slip to Eighth In State Coaches' Rating

Spearman's Lynxettes have slipped three places in the state ratings as compiled this week by the state association of girls' basketball coaches.

The Lynxettes have been dropped from fifth to eighth place in the state rating. The Lynxettes have lost one game since they were rated fifth at the end of 1963.

Frona still is rated as the number one team in the state. Floydada was moved to third and Abernathy was raised to 11.

The rating was upset Tuesday night when Abernathy beat Floydada for the district 2-AA title. Abernathy will be the bi-district opponent for this district.

The district race will probably be decided Tuesday night when the Lynxettes meet the White Deer Does in Lynx Gym. White Deer has lost only to Spearman in the district race.

Spearman teams will host Shamrock Friday night. This game could put the pressure on the Lynxettes. They just beat Shamrock three points earlier in the race. Should they lose to Shamrock they would have to beat White Deer to tie for the title.

White Deer has three more games. They play Dalhart Friday, then have make-up games at Shamrock and Spearman. It is expected that the Shamrock-White Deer game will be played Monday night.

Storm Cuts Out Holidays

Spearman students will make-up the storm lost school days before school is scheduled to be dismissed this summer.

The schedule for making-up the four days lost because of the storm was approved at the school board meeting Tuesday night.

Students will go to school on Saturday, Feb. 29, Friday, March 13 and Friday March 27 and Monday March 30. March 13 is the regional teachers meeting and is usually a holiday for students, but Spearman teachers will not attend this year. March 27 and March 30 are the regularly scheduled Easter holiday.

State law requires that Texas schools be operated 175 days a year and the Spearman school had only one extra day in the schedule. This was used when school was dismissed when President Kennedy was killed.



We have had numerous requests from snowbound residents to take the hide of the city about the poor snow removal program it had for the streets during the past storm.

We will have to agree that the work in getting the streets opened was very slow and even-erone in very was very much inconvenienced by the poor job of handling the snow.

The city's only defense against the charges of a poor snow removal job is that it did not have the equipment to move or pick-up the snow.

The city has only one backhoe and loader, a small maintainer that will do little more than level loose dirt, a big loader and some trucks for handling snow.

To have handled this job in the proper manner the city should have maintainers as large as the county for moving the heavy snow, some power snow plows that cut through the drifts and deep snow and blow it over on the curb, and some plows like the highway department uses for opening the streets.

This is a large amount of equipment and will require an outlay of several thousand dollars, but will be useful when we have such snows.

Since we have had two such snows in the four and one-half years we have lived here, we are now ready to receive demands for hot editorials against the city for wasting money on snow removal equipment that will be used maybe once a year.

If anyone has any doubts about the Groundhog myth, they should check around here. We have not had anything but winter since that rodent peeked out.

What has happened to the plan to have a foreign exchange student come to Spearman next fall? It may be that plans are coming along and the money and other arrangements are being taken care of, but I haven't even heard any talk about it lately.

I still think it is an endeavor worth putting forth a little work and time for and many of us might be willing to help if we knew what needed to be done.

So much has been said lately about our mistreatment of the Negro people and while it is not an immediate problem here in our area, the passage of the Civil Rights Bill in the House of Representatives Monday certainly might make it affect us all.

An article I read last week concerning a program on "Racism" had some enlightening thoughts on the subjects—some things I feel are true but had trouble putting into words.

"Negroes are not discriminated against because of the color of their skin alone, but because they have not proven themselves worthy of recognition by self-respecting responsible white people. True, they have some legitimate complaints but not as many as they contend. They must prove themselves as good by performance and behavior as the white neighbors they chose to live next door to. This the Negro has not been taught. He contends for "rights" but overlooks responsibilities.

"The editor of a large Japanese paper in California suggested the Negroes expend as much effort in improving themselves as they did trying to tear down the barriers of segregation and more would be gained. "Much of their troubles have been caused

ed by the actions of their own race rather than their treatment by the white people," the same editor implied.

"The Bible consistently stresses understanding, knowledge, enlightenment... the alternative is ignorance, darkness, superstition and prejudice.

"But let each man prove his own worth, and then shall he have his glorying." (Galations 6:4)"

Screwworm-Free

County Agent's Report

Vigorous participation in the screwworm eradication program by Texas farmers and ranchers will be necessary if the Southwest is to become screwworm-free in 1964.

Dolph Briscoe, Jr. of Uvalde, said detection of screwworm-infested animals and collection of larvae samples will be even more important this year than it has been in the past. Briscoe is president of the Southwest

Animal Health Research Foundation, which spearheaded the drive to collect \$3,000,000 from livestockmen to get the eradication program underway nearly two years ago.

Briscoe noted that several weeks have elapsed with no screwworm cases being reported in the five-state eradication area. He cautioned, however, that during cold weather, screwworm flies in the pupae stage can remain embedded in the soil for extended periods; when they emerge during brief warm spells, new rounds of infestations could result.

A single undetected, unreported case could set the eradication program back for several months, Briscoe said.

"We must always keep up our guard when dealing with this insect," Briscoe warned. "The screwworm fly has shown a remarkable ability of taking advantage of any lapses in vigilance by livestockmen."

Hurged livestock producers to watch their animals closely and treat cuts or scratches that could become infested. After several larvae have been collected from infested wounds and mailed to the Mission laboratory for positive identification, wounds should be treated with insecticide.

participate in the 1964 Feed Grain Program.

If he hasn't already done so, the farmer first files a report with the county ASC office on the farm's acreage and crops in 1959 and 1960. The county ASC committee will then send the farmer his feed grain base made up of the barley, corn and grain sorghum bases for each farm.

Next step is for the farmer to complete and file an intention-to-participate form at the county ASC office between Feb. 10 and March 27. At the same time, the farmer may request an advance payment for the number of acres to be diverted from feed grain to conservation uses.

SUGAR BEET REPORT

I talked to Don Anthony of Dumas in regard to the sugar beet situation early this week. He reported that they may know something definite after Feb. 15 on whether a plant will be located in the High Plains area. They have been contacting several sugar beet companies in regard to a plant.

Mr. Anthony also reports that it is possible that a thousand acres will be planted in the High Plains area this year. More information will be given on this as word is received.

FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

Hansford County farmers must take several steps to participate in the 1964 Feed Grain Program.

After these forms are filed, the farmer diverts the designated corn, barley, or grain sorghum acreage to a conserving use. The conserving use of diverted acres is in addition to the farm's normal acreage (1959-60 average) in conserving uses or practices, including summer fallow and idle land.

Further details on provisions of the program are available from the county ASC office.

United States cotton exports are up. J. E. Kirby, economist-marketing and policy for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says exports of the fleecy staple for the first quarter of the current cotton year more than doubled those of a year ago.

Exports of all types of cotton amounted to 1,019,000 running bales for the August through October period. This volume was 34 percent greater than the average for the same period in the preceding five years. This, points out Kirby, is good news for Texas producers since a good percent of their crop is exported.

The specialist says that Japan was the top buyer during the first quarter. It took 22 percent of the total or 221,000 bales. Total shipments to Europe amounted to 481,000 bales, an increase of 290,000 over the same period a year ago.

U. S. exports of cotton lintners, mostly chemical qualities, totaled 81,000 bales for the three-month period. West Germany imported about 65 percent of this total--an increase of 45 percent over a year ago.

The U. S., during the three-month period, imported 46,000 bales of lintners, mostly felting quality, for an increase of 77 percent over year earlier figures. Mexico supplied just under 40 percent of these lintners while smaller amounts were imported from Brazil, El Salvador and USSR.

Soybeans To Be Discussed In Gruver

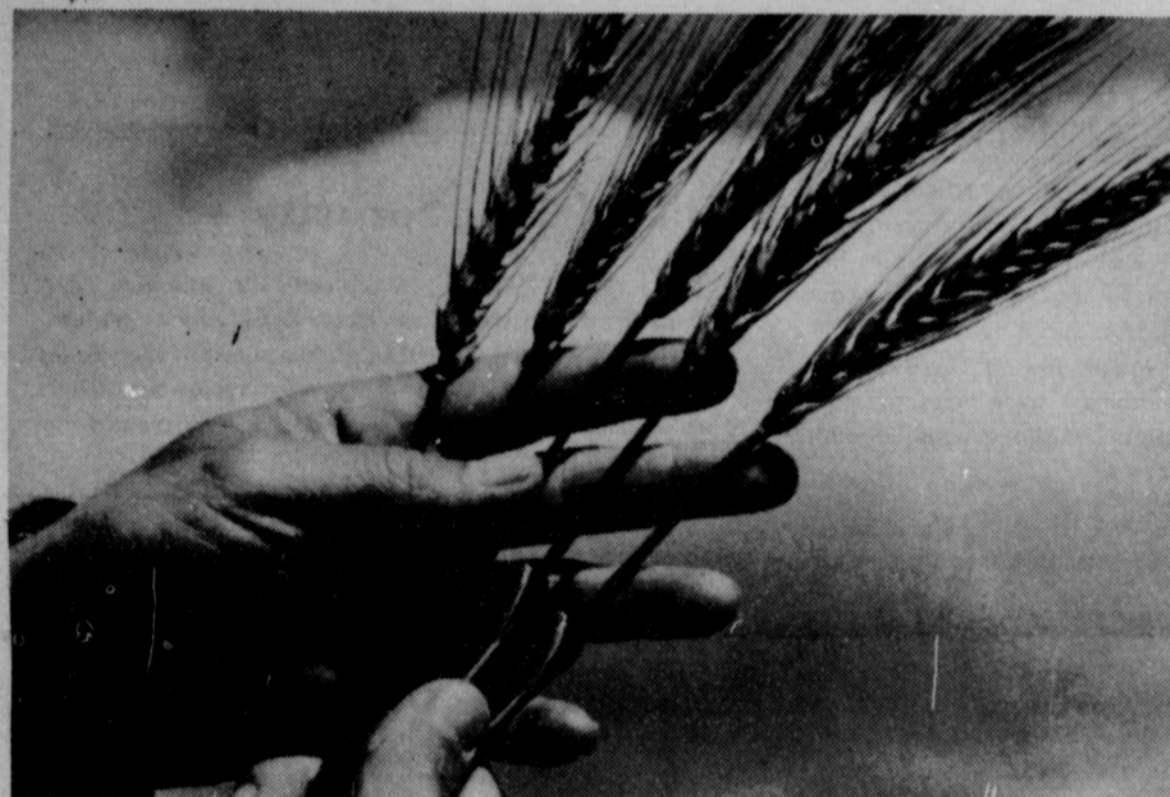
Barry Lover, agronomist at the High Plains Research Station in Halfway, will be the speaker. He helped develop the new, improved soybean at the research station.

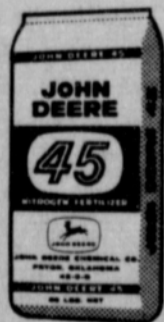

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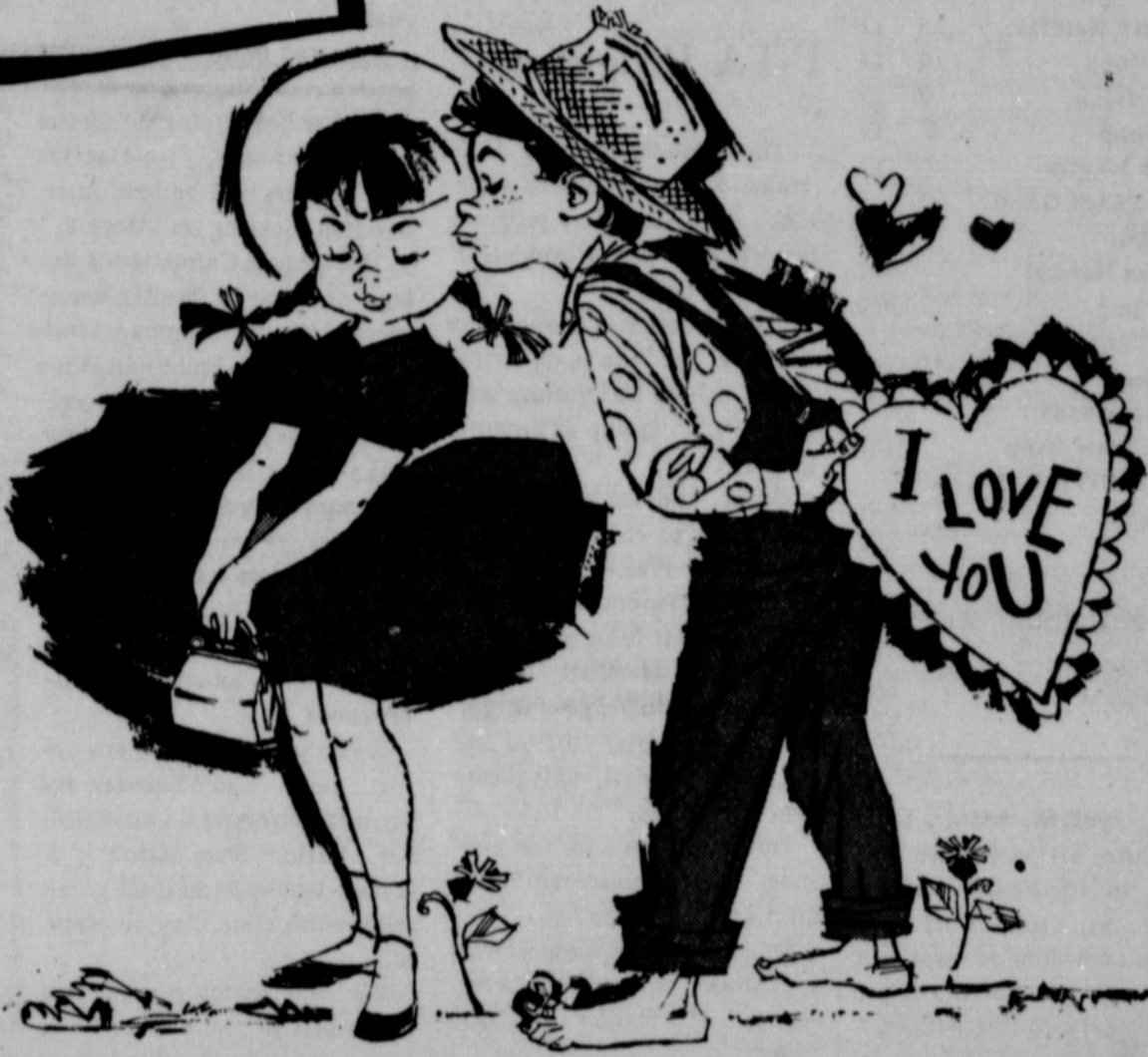

Garlic salt
Paprika

Psalms 51, written by sinful David, is typical of all of us. He cannot bear to think that God sees him in a sinful condition and asks God, Hide Thy face from my sin. . . .

"Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me." The Psalmist is not blaming everything on Adam or on his mother, but bearing witness to this bitter birthmark that every son of Adam bears.

He admits that alone he's licked. This problem of sin can't be patched up with more promises. He is tattooed indelibly with the viper's tongue. Sin leaves stains that can't be taken out by hand. We are fallen, crippled permanently with the marks of Cain. Guilt is upon us.

Our minds are filled with what we've done, seen, not done, not seen. Man-made de-

tergents cannot wash away our guilts. Self-improvement is a fantasy. Can the Negro change his color? The leper his spots? Then how can we who are accustomed to do evil change our natures? The Psalmist looks to heaven. This is not suicide, but unconditional surrender. Only God can wash behind the years.

Davis is asking God not merely to decontaminate him, but to make him over again. He is wrong side out. "Purge me. . . ." He needs a new Spirit, a right spirit, a willing spirit. "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me."

"Restore to me the joy of Thy salvation." He remembers Eden and wants that wonderful relationship restored.

"Cast me not away from Thy presence. . . ." There is nothing like life reunited with God.

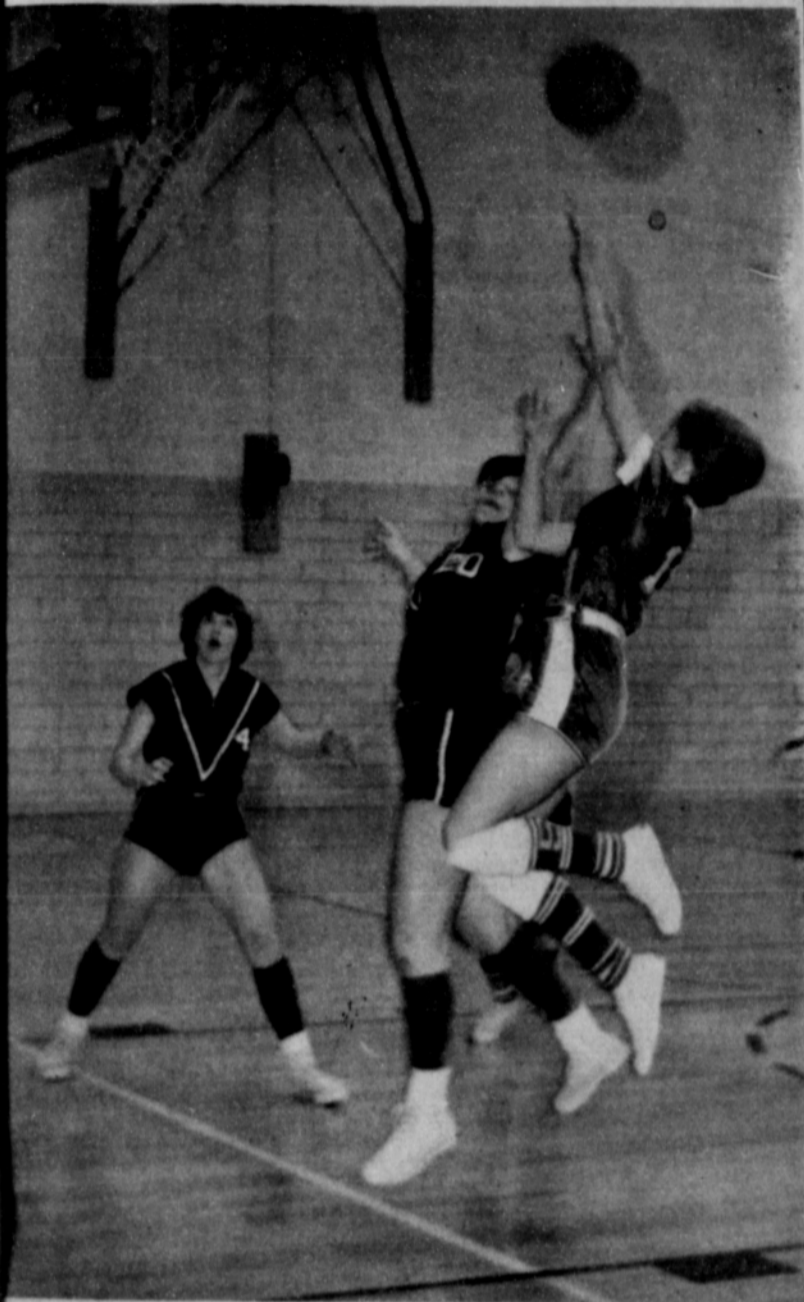

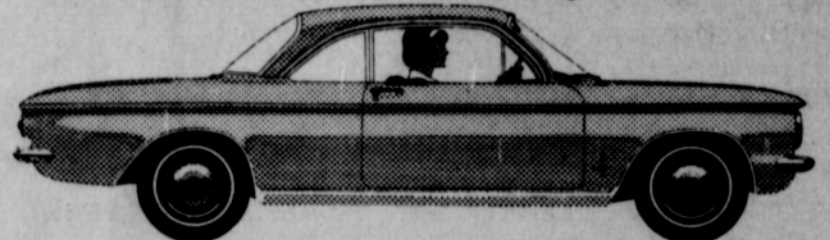

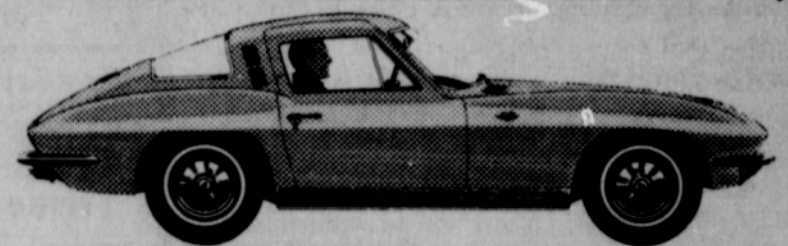
