He also recommended a butter paddle on the rears of the people who are rioting all over the country.

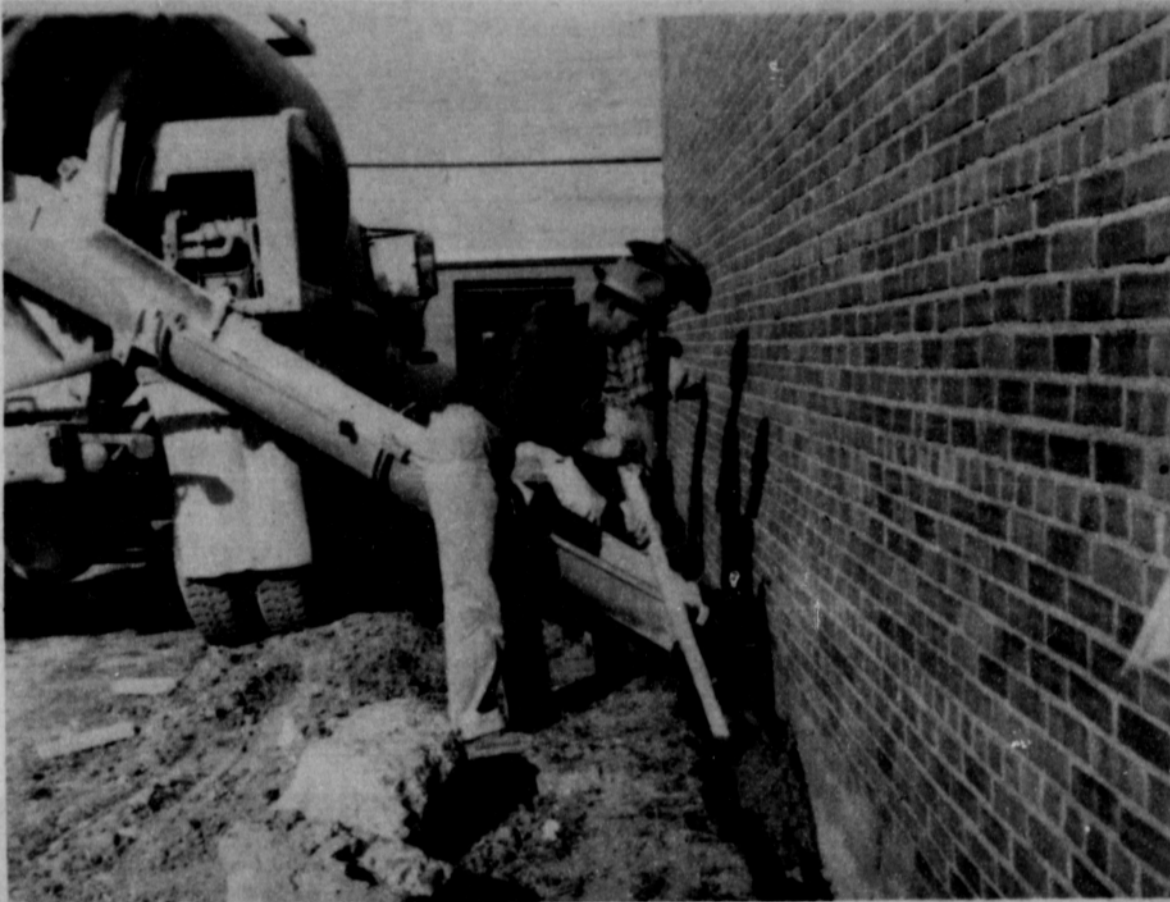
Whether you thought he was a good President or a bad one, everyone will admit that he stuck to his convictions and was not afraid of a decision.

Little League Meets To Study Finances

A meeting of Spearman Little League team sponsors, managers, officers, representatives from service clubs and others interested in the program are urged to attend a meeting tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 in the courthouse.

League President Burl McClellan said the meeting is for working out a program for meeting the \$700 deficit left in the league finances at the

end of this season.

McClellan pointed out that because the league was in the "red" at the end of the 1962 season, this year back salary to the program supervisor had to be made up. Also because some sponsors and other supporters of the program have been slow in turning in their dues, the program is in the "red".

The league was able to pay director James Pendergraft only \$145 of his 1963 salary. Pendergraft maintains the park and supervises the games four nights per week throughout the summer.

The Little League is a good program for boys, the president said, but the program is not the government and cannot spend itself into prosperity.

Coaches' Hopes Faint For County Championship

The coaches are both worried and the fans are delighted as the annual Spearman-Gruver football battle for the county championship approaches in Gruver at 8 p. m. Friday.

This annual battle of neighbors was resumed last year after being dormant for two years. Over the years Gruver had a decided edge in the win column of this contest and has won the last four games.

Spearman fans are cautiously predicting victory, but keeping their fingers crossed while doing so. They can remember

many times in the past when Spearman was favored, but lost its zip when confronting the Greyhounds.

Gruver coach Corky Chapman is not cautious when he predicts victory. He says Spearman will win with ease. He adds that he does not have anyone who can keep-up with Lynx backs and the Spearman line will rip his to pieces.

Lynx boss Don Seymour does not see the same set of players Chapman is worrying about. He also sees some Gruver boys that Chapman has apparently not recognized.

Gruver has a strong defense, Seymour points out. They have yielded only one touchdown this year. Clarendon got one, Groom none, and Claude did not score in a scrimmage.

Gruver's fullback, Ray Kelly is causing Seymour worry. He is the boy that kept going through us last year, Seymour remembers.

One regular from the Gruver team will not be in the starting line-up. Tackle Allan Salsman has a blood clot in his leg and is being marked out of action by the Gruver coaches. Spearman has all of its regulars ready.

Neither team will field a big team. The weights are about equal. Nor does either team have a fast break-away man. However, Spearman will have an advantage in the airways with two throwing quarterbacks in Johnny Crawford and reserve Dave Clement. Gruver has not developed a strong passing attack by quarterbacks Jim Cooksey or Danny Riley.

The Gruver starting line-up is expected to be: Ronnie Graham and Jim Rice at ends, Ronnie Ward and Rex Shapley at tackles, Bill Pittman and Jon Jarvis at guards, Jerry Gurfory at center, Danny Riley at quarterback, Jim Cooksey at fullback and Wayne Leatherman and Bob Gillispie at halfbacks.

For Spearman it will be Leroy Callaway and Don Arber at ends, Mac Crawford and Clayton Cochran at tackles, Wesley Brinkley, Skipper Robinson or Mike Babbs at guards, Bill Blackburn at center, Johnny Crawford at quarterback, Mike Morris and either Ronald McDonald or Larry Butts at halfback and David Bason at fullback.

Grad Has A&M Plan For Exes

COLLEGE STATION:—A Texas A&M graduate from Dallas has presented a plan to the school's board of directors that might help soothe feelings of some Aggie exes who object to women students.

Derrell N. Chandler presented a plan that would let women who attend classes at A&M be officially listed as members of a mythical "paper" college in which women could be enrolled.

Chandler, who says he is against women at his old alma mater, said many of the wives of A&M students, who can now attend the formerly all-male school, have told him they will attend classes if there is a mythical "Mary Smith College."

The spit and polish military school had kept up the bar against women since it opened in 1876. The board of directors decided last spring to admit women, effective this fall. But only women graduate students and wives of A&M men can attend.

"The exes will be pleased so long as the newspapers carry a story stating that A&M will still be an all-male college," Chandler said. "The expense for the paperwork to make women students of Mary Smith College will more than be paid by the losses that A&M will suffer if the present plans are carried out."

The A&M directors have not taken any action on Chandler's proposal.

FARM EXPANSION

Expanding the farm net income doesn't always mean adding more acres to the farm, says C. H. Bates, farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Operators generally think that increasing the farm acreage or adding more livestock is the only way to raise their income, says Bates. He admits that in some cases this may be the only solution, but careful analysis of the present farm operation would probably point to other means of increasing the net income, he says.

Bates points out some factors to consider in deciding how to increase the net farm income. First, are the labor and equipment on the farm fully utilized? Some operators increase their profits by cutting back on machinery replacements. The high fixed costs of baling hay or other harvesting operations may be avoided by hiring custom harvesters. When such harvesting equipment is purchased, it must be used enough to make its operation economical, he reminds.

Could new enterprises or methods provide additional returns from the available land and labor? Sometimes added efficiency in several areas of the operation can materially increase the total returns, says Bates.

Bates points out some factors to consider in deciding how to increase the net farm income. First, are the labor and equipment on the farm fully utilized? Some operators increase their profits by cutting back on machinery replacements. The high fixed costs of baling hay or other harvesting operations may be avoided by hiring custom harvesters. When such harvesting equipment is purchased, it must be used enough to make its operation economical, he reminds.

Could new enterprises or methods provide additional returns from the available land and labor? Sometimes added efficiency in several areas of the operation can materially increase the total returns, says Bates.

profits? Cases have been observed where additional capital used for fertilizer or fencing for rotation grazing have paid good dividends, he says.

Through better planning on his present acreage, the operator can often add to his income without buying more land, says Bates. A good manager must seek the best way to do things and must make full use of the resources available to him, he concludes.
