Bankers give support to fuel-alcohol co-op

The North Canadian Bankers Association will give its support to an effort by North Plains grain growers to form a fuel-alcohol cooperative and build a \$30-million plant in the area.

Support for the venture came Thursday following a meeting between members of the banking association, which represents 15 area banks, and the board for Northwest Texas Grain Products Cooperative.

"I am impressed with what you have told me," declared Kenneth Irwin of Gruver, association president. "I would venture to say that area

bankers will be behind you in the effort." The meeting was held in Dumas at the First State Bank. Its purpose was to detail the financing grain growers will need to set up the cooperative and build the fuel alcohol plants. Mike Metcalf, Dumas attorney, was the spokesman for the proposed cooperative. Also present were members of the temporary board of directors, Tommy Harbert, Jimmy Wells, Art Noack, Jim Dowty and Marion Garland.

Metcalf explained the financing grain producers will need to get into the cooperative. It figures out to a little more than \$10,000 per 10,000 bushel grain contract.

The funding will be required in stages beginning with a \$500 cash payment 10,000 bushel contract to provide front money for the venture.

The proposed coop is presently in a campaign to write 700 grain contracts to provide \$325,000 of base financing. This money will be needed for a feasibility study to determine if a 20-million gallon a year, or larger, fuel-alcohol plant is practical on the North Plains.

If cooperative members get a favorable report and decide to go ahead with the plant, its members will be required to make an additional \$1,500 payment per contract.

Farmer-members will also put up equity money for plant construction of \$8,751 per 10,000 bushel grain contract.

Metcalf explained that since Oct. 4, some 60 contracts for 600,000 bushels of grain have been pledged by Dumas and Sunray area growers. He added that grain producers in other North Plains counties would be contacted following grain harvest.

The effort to secure 700 contracts, he reported, has been slowed because of harvest.

"We anticipate that the cooperative will be fully subscribed within 30 days," he declared.

Know Weather What is coalescence That's how moisture droplets

in the air combine to form raindrops. There are two ways this occurs. First, moisture droplets

in clouds are of different sizes and in moving air the larger droplets move more slowly than smaller ones and often collide, building into bigger droplets, which eventually fall as raindrops.

The more frequent type of coalescence is where ice crystals and water droplets combine (usually in the middle areas of cumulonimbus clouds). Some of the water in the water droplets evaporates and then condenses on the crystals, which later drop as snow or or ice pellets.

In warmer climates these ice pellets often turn back to water, as they fall, and reach the ground as rain. Most hail forms in the middle altitude of a thunderhead, by the process of coalescence, and not -- as previously thought -by rising and falling in thunderhead vertical air cur-

rents.

Heat flow can be either the loss of heat from a house during the winter or heat gained from the outdoors during the summer. Both fiber glass and rock wool are mineral fiber materials. The U.S. Department of Commerce has estimated that mineral fiber accounts for about 70 per cent of all home insulation sold, making it the most popular type. Mineral fiber batts and blankets are rated at R-11, R-13, R-19, R-22, R-30, or R-38
