The USDA crop report for July 1 predicted record crop production in small grains for the country this year, despite much of the wheat in Kansas, North and South Da kota, and Minnesota being ruined by heavy rains this past week or so. Surely this prediction will have to be revised, with the crops which are normally good in that area being destroyed.


