

Wheat Hits \$3.67 Per Bushel

Farmers in the area got good news this week in the form of an increase in the prices of wheat, as well as corn and grain sorghum. Speculation that Russia is in the market for U. S. wheat has caused the price of wheat to go from below the \$3 mark during harvest to \$3.67 Friday afternoon locally.

Prices of corn and grain sorghum have also increased during the past week although not at the pace wheat has.

The crop in our area was good this year, with even the dryland wheat that most farmers had about given up on making 8-10 bushels and some doing as

well as 18-20 bushels per acre. Irrigated yields ranged from 35 to 60.

Many farmers felt they needed \$3 per bushel to break even since the costs of fertilizers, fuel, etc. have risen so drastically in the past year or so.

The USDA crop report for July 1 predicted record crop production in small grains for the country this year, despite much of the wheat in Kansas, North and South Dakota, and Minnesota being ruined by heavy rains this past week or so. Surely this prediction will have to be revised, with the crops which are normally good in that area being destroyed.

City Meeting Minutes

The City Council of Spearman, Texas, met in regular session in the Council Chamber of City Hall, June 23, 1975, at 8:00 p.m. PRESENT: Mayor Coy Pahner - presiding, ALDERMAN: Nelson, Jackson, Ellsworth, Nicholson. ALSO PRESENT: City Manager-Ed Thompson, City Secretary-Mark Neff, Attorney for the City-J. E. Blackburn, Police Chief-Lee Phillips, Fire Marshal-Charles Littlejohn, Water & Sewer Superintendent-Ted Scroggs, Chief Clerk-Janice McLain. VISITORS: Michael Parra, Billy Miller, E. J. Callaway, J. L. Brock, Earl Goodheart, Craig Hutchinson, James Cunningham, Tom Latta, Raymond Gilley, Britt Jarvis.

PLEDGE AND INVOCATION: The pledge of allegiance to our flag was led by J. E. Blackburn, followed by the invocation given by Roscoe Nelson.

MINUTES: Motion by Nelson, seconded by Jackson, to approve the minutes of the regular City Council meeting of June 9, 1975, as read. Motion carried.

LETTING OF BIDS - INSURANCE: J. L. Brock met with Council and presented his bid for insurance covering Workmen's Compensation, General Liability, and Gas Explosion. Mr. Brock's bid being the only bid that was submitted for these coverages, was discussed in depth by Council. Motion by Jackson, seconded by Nelson, that the City accept the bid of J. L. Brock Insurance Agency, as presented. Motion carried.

CITY DOG POUND: Dr. Tom Latta and Chief Lee Phillips discussed with Council a proposal for a new Animal Control facility. Council discussed the proposed cost of the facility, which would amount to approximately \$7,050.00, without the roof. No action was taken, pending further and more complete construction costs. Dr. Latta also discussed with Council the problems arising from the observation of quarantined animals. Council instructed Dr. Latta to meet with the Attorney

PROPOSED USE OF OLD FOOTBALL FIELD: Earl Goodheart presented to the Council a proposed Sports Complex that could be erected on the site of the old football field. At this time, Mr. Goodheart had no cost figures, and stated that he only came before the Council to get their feelings on the proposal. City Council instructed Mr. Thompson to set up a meeting with Mr. Goodheart, members of the Park Board, Citizens Advisory Committee, and a Park and Recreation engineer from the Extension Service, reporting back to the City Council with recommendations.

James Cunningham, Superintendent of Schools, discussed light poles, lights, and bleachers belonging to the Spearman Independent School District, that had been left at the old football field. He stated that the school intended to remove these from the field, unless the City was interested in retaining them. Motion by Nelson, seconded by Jackson, that the City request that the school leave the lights and the existing fence at the old football field site, with the school retaining the mercury vapor lights. Motion carried.

Motion by Nelson, seconded by Jackson, that the City purchase the bleachers from the school at a cost of \$2,000.00, with payment rendered when funds become available. Motion carried.

WATER LINE EXTENSION: Lengthy discussion between Council and Craig Hutchinson over proposed water line extension to his property, outside the City Limits. City Manager Thompson informed Council that the test holes for future water supplies indicate only half the supply that had been anticipated. His recommendation to the Council was that the City not take on any further additional out-of-town customers at this time, so not to endanger the water

supply of the citizens with in the corporate limits of Spearman. Motion by Ellsworth, seconded by Jackson, that the City decline the request of Craig Hutchinson and surrounding residents for water line extension at this time. Motion carried.

ADDITIONAL WATER TEST HOLES: City Manager Thompson reported the test hole drilled on the Santa Fe property indicated only half the potential that was anticipated prior to the drilling. He requested the approval for additional test holes to be drilled in the proximity of Well #4 and #5. Motion by Ellsworth, seconded by Nelson, to grant approval for the City Manager to go ahead with additional test holes. Motion carried.

CADET PROGRAM AND MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT: Fire Marshal Littlejohn informed the Council that the Parent's Release for Minor Liability had been drawn up and approved by the Attorney for the City, allowing insurance coverage at no additional cost to our present policy.

He also explained the Mutual Aid Agreement that had been drawn up by the Attorney for the City for mutual aid between the Cities of Spearman and Gruver, and the agreement was only a written form rather than a verbal agreement, which is already in effect. Motion by Jackson, seconded by Nelson, that the City enter into this agreement and that it be signed by the Mayor of Spearman. Motion carried.

REPORT ON CIVIL DEFENSE MEETING: Fire Marshal Littlejohn gave a brief report on the Civil Defense meeting that was held between the City Manager, Mayor, Judge Lee, Police Chief Phillips, Civil Defense Director Jim Evans, and two representatives from Civil Defense headquarters, one from Amarillo and one from Lubbock. No action taken at this time.

GAS LEAK REPAIRS: City Manager Thompson reported extensive gas leaks in the alley behind Bernice and requested authority to purchase \$2,500.00 worth of NIPAK pipe. Motion by Nelson, seconded by Ellsworth, that Thompson be authorized to make this purchase. Motion carried.

SEWER LAB EQUIPMENT: Water and Sewer Superintendent Ted Scroggs discussed with the Council the equipment and improvements needed at the Sewer Lab facilities. Motion by Nelson, seconded by Jackson, to lay water and gas lines to sewer plant facility, at an approximate cost of \$6,000.00 to \$7,000.00; and authorize Ted Scroggs and Jim Nicholson to go to Lubbock to check on used testing equipment. Motion carried.

1976 TAX REAPPRAISAL: Tax Collector-Assessor Mark Neff discussed the tax records and information on properties that the City presently has, and stated that the last update on tax information consisting of measurements and property classes was made in 1960. Motion by Jackson, seconded by Nelson, that the City work in a joint effort with the School and County on a tax reappraisal program for 1976, subject to their acceptance. Motion carried.

Motion by Nelson, seconded by Jackson, that Amelia Johnson and Mark Neff be sent to TAAO Tax School in Amarillo, July 20-23, 1975. Motion carried.

OTHER: Motion by Jackson, seconded by Nelson, to set meeting dates for July on the 14th and 28th. Motion carried.

E. J. Callaway discussed with Council tapping charge and procedure for properties adjacent to Golden Circle. No action taken.

City Manager Thompson informed Council that there will be a PRPC Director's Meeting Monday, July 30, 1975, at 3:30 p.m.; and a Representatives Meeting at 6:30 p.m. in Amarillo.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION: Motion by Nicholson, seconded by Ellsworth, that the Board of Equalization meeting be set for July 15th at 10:30 a.m. in Council Chamber. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE #377: Motion by Nelson, seconded by Jackson, to approve Ordinance #377 which will close Glover and 12th Street and approve the replat of Glover Terrace, and authorize the Mayor to execute the proper conveyances. Motion carried.

Discussion was held over the addition of stinch by our gas supplier, High Plains Natural Gas Co. The At-

orney for the City was instructed to send a letter to High Plains stating that they had five days to comply with the stinch requirements.

Discussion was held over Civil Defense sirens in the northeastern part of town. Chief Phillips stated that it would cost approximately \$2,000.00 for an additional siren.

Discussion between Council and Thompson over supervision of summer crews. No action taken.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Mayor Palmer called an Executive Session to discuss with the City Attorney pending litigation. The meeting was then called back into regular session, stating that no action had been taken, only pending litigation had been discussed.

ADJOURN: Motion by Nelson, seconded by Jackson, that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried.




