

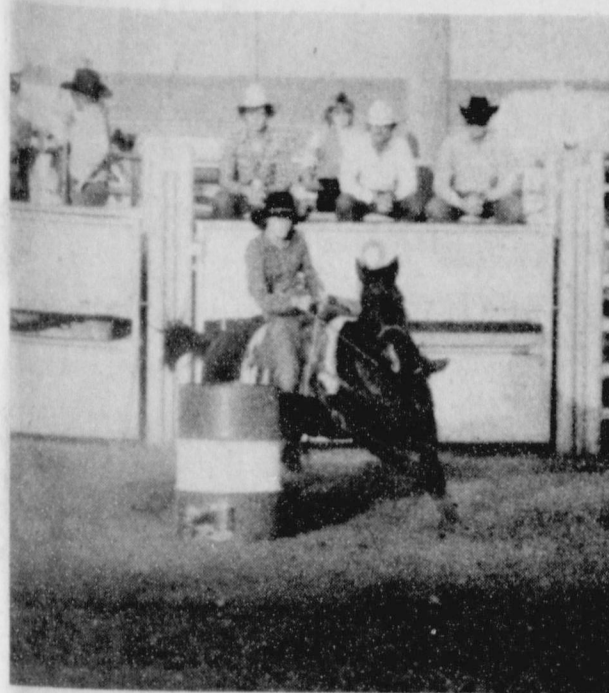

## Contestants In Finals

The Tri-State High School Rodeo Finals will be held in Amarillo from June 10 through June 12 at the Fair Park Coliseum.

Finalist contestants from Hansford County include Hadley Reed who is No. 1 in Barebacks with 78½ points.

In Calf Roping, Hadley will also be competing. He is in 8th place with 21 points. Brian Sparks of Gruver will also compete. He is in 15th place with 6 points. In Ribbon Roping, Hadley Reed is in 5th place with 23 points.

Two county girls will be competing in the Barrels finals. Suzanne Hart of Gruver is in 4th place with 34 points, and Andrea Archer of Spearman is in 13th with 6 points.

Andrea Archer and Suzanne Hart will also be competing in Goat Tying along with Donna Martin of Spearman. Andrea is in 10th place with 14 points, Suzanne Hart is 11th with 11 points, and Donna is 12th with 11 points.

The same three girls will be competing in Poles. Andrea Archer is in 8th place with 18 points; Suzanne Hart is in 10th place with 17 points, and Donna Martin is in 13th place with 4 points.

Suzanne Hart and Donna Martin will also compete in Breakaway. Suzanne is in 10th place with 17 points, and Donna is in 12th place with 4 points.

## Pack & Strawn Attending Boys State

Two Spearman High School students are among the 942 Texas high school juniors assembling in Austin at the Campus of the University of Texas for the 42nd session of American Legions Boys State which began June 5.

Jay Pack, son of Mr. and Mrs. Neal Pack, and Scott Strawn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Strawn, are representing this area.

Jay has lettered two years in basketball and tennis, was all-state in choir and vice president of the SHS Choral.

He is a state farmer degree applicant, president of the Pringle 4-H, member of the Hutchinson County 4-H council and a delegate to the District One 4-H council.

Scott is the president of the local chapter of FFA, vice president of the Top of Texas FFA district and a member of UMY, United Methodist Youth. He was junior class president, student council member, National Honor Society member and a state farmer degree applicant. He also has lettered in football.

Boys State is a program that teaches responsibilities of citizenship in an actual "Learn By Doing" type workshop which is sponsored by American Legion.

The political caucuses and conventions of Boys State are as exciting as any in real life. The secret ballot of the general election instructs the young citizens in the finer arts of being a gracious winner and a good

loser as they learn from their experiences of campaigning.

The 942 boys will be housed in 21 Boys State Cities and each city further divided into two precincts, one for the Federalist and one for the Nationalist political party. They will run for office or work for appointments as they organize city, county, and state governments. Climax of their effort is the election of a Boys State Governor, a Legislature, Supreme Court and other state officers.

"Boys State is one of the outstanding youth training programs of the Americanism Commission of The American Legion," State Commander Lee Guy stated. "Not only do the youths learn more about the functions of government but

they also see the importance of the role played by each good citizen in discharging his basic citizenship responsibilities in voting. They discover that each individual citizen is an integral part of, and responsible for the character and success of his government."

On Friday, June 11, the citizens of Boys State will visit the State Capitol and actually sit in chairs of the office to which they were elected and mythically run the state government for a day.

Boys State enrollment for Texas this year brings the total to 25,705 high school juniors who have attended in the past four decades, since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

DAYTON, OHIO--The Institute for Development of Educational Activities (I/D/E/A), a division of the Charles F. Kettering Foundation, announced today that Mr. James A. Cunningham, Superintendent, Spearman Independent School District, Spearman, was recently

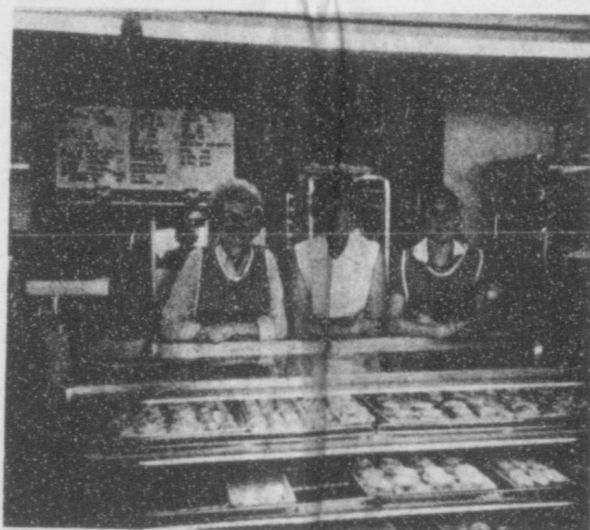

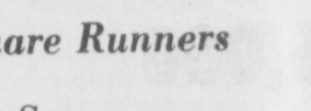

### State 4-H Roundup Set

COLLEGE STATION—The Texas A&M University campus will be a hive of activity June 8-10 when some 2,000 4-H members from across the state gather for the 1982 State 4-H Roundup and State 4-H Congress.

Roundup is traditionally held on the A&M campus each year, but this year the State 4-H Congress, a leadership event for senior 4-H members, has been scheduled to coincide with Roundup activities.

Theme for the three-day event will be "Discover Your Tomorrow," says George McArthur, 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, the Extension Service is the parent organization of 4-H.

Activities will begin with the State 4-H Food Show the first day followed by a special assembly that evening at 7 p.m. in Rudder Auditorium. Five individuals and businesses will be honored for their long-time support of 4-H and 72 outstanding 4-H members who will be awarded scholarships totaling \$350,000.

Competition in 39 different contest areas begins bright-and-early Wednesday, June 9. These range from method demonstrations in agronomy and clothing to judging of horses, livestock and soils.

State 4-H Congress, with some 800 participants, begins at 8 a.m. that same day with a general assembly in Rudder Auditorium. Congress participants will be involved in a number of special seminars the

remainder of the day dealing with educational and career opportunities.

And the State 4-H Project Show gets under way at 10 a.m. in Rudder Exhibit Hall.

A special luncheon that day will honor 29 outstanding 4-H adult volunteer leaders from across Texas who have been selected from the 14 Extension Service districts.

Roundup contest winners will be recognized at a special assembly that evening at 8 p.m. in Rudder Auditorium.

The final day's program will include special activities for Congress participants, including tours and visits in various academic departments at Texas A&M.

State 4-H Roundup is a highlight of the 4-H year for many members, points out McArthur. Those who qualify to compete in the various contests have worked long and hard to sharpen their skills. They must have won at the county and district level to qualify for state competition.

Those who compete in the Project Show are demonstrating their expertise in certain project areas which they have developed over the years, he adds.

And Congress participants are working to expand their leadership skills and knowledge bases as they prepare to make choices relating to continued education and careers.

This year's Roundup combined with Congress promises to be a highlight in the lives of many 4-H'ers, contends McArthur.

### Brucellosis Regulations Tightened On Texas Cattle

AUSTIN—Oklahoma and Missouri are two of several states which are tightening brucellosis regulations on Texas cattle, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, reports.

Missouri has already imposed stiffer entry requirements on Texas livestock, and Oklahoma's tougher regulations go in effect July 1. Iowa has also put in effect a regulation which would treat Texas as a Class C state instead of a B and C state as provided for in federal regulations. That means more testing of this state's cattle for entry into Iowa.

"It appears that Texas livestock producers can expect more states to increase their requirements for Texas' cattle relating to brucellosis," Dr. Holcombe said.

He cited a couple of reasons for this:

1. Several states are taking

2. States free or virtually free of brucellosis want to remain that way, and thus are imposing the more stringent regulations.

Missouri probably has the most stringent regulations on receiving Texas cattle:

All Cattle moving into Missouri, including steers, will require a prior permit from the Missouri Department of Agriculture Animal Health division. Other requirements include: individual identification on health certificates; two consecutive negative tests before movement for females over 18 months of age, followed by a 60 to 120 day quarantine and retest at owner's expense; and one negative test within 30 days of movement for females between four and 18 months of age followed by the same quarantine and retest.

Also, male or female calves under 12 months of age from quarantined herds and adult vaccinated cattle from Texas would not be allowed entry into Missouri under any circumstances. "These same restrictions apply to cattle from Oklahoma, Florida, Louisiana, and Mississippi entering Missouri," Dr. Holcombe noted.

Effective July 1, all female cattle born after Jan 1, 1982, which are four months of age or older, entering Oklahoma, must be official brucellosis vaccinates, S branded, or spayed prior to entry.

S branded cattle may move only to a quarantined feedlot or directly to slaughter. S branded cattle are those which may have been exposed to brucellosis.

In addition, out of state farm origin cattle may be consigned to an approved market in Oklahoma without prior test, permit, or vaccination. Before

being released from such market, they must meet all of Oklahoma's requirements.

According to records of the TAHC, Oklahoma received 213,000 head of cattle and calves in 1981, Missouri received 4,000 head, and Iowa received 47,000 head. "This will give us some idea as to the amount of trading we do with just those three states," Dr. Holcombe said.

Nationwide, Texas shipped more than 2,046,000 head of cattle to other states in 1981. "The Texas' livestock industry does indeed depend on other states' for markets, so it is imperative that we in this state get on with the job of controlling brucellosis," Dr. Holcombe said.

He said the Texas brucellosis plan is geared to control and eventually eradicate the disease, and a great deal of progress has been made in the

past two years when revised regulations were put in effect. "Cooperation of livestock producers in Texas is on the increase, and this is the key to cleaning up Texas' brucellosis problem," Dr. Holcombe said.

### SAFETY TIPS ON POOL CARE

With proper swimming pool care and poolside safety procedures, you can help protect swimmers and save money.

Keeping pool water crystal clear and debris free, and using safety precautions in the pool area, are the keys to healthful, thrifty recreational swimming.

Without proper treatment, pool water can become a breeding ground for bacteria that are easily transmitted from swimmer to swimmer.

Experts recommend frequent filter cleaning and skimming of bacteria-causing debris such as leaves and twigs to make water purification easier. Such cleaning reduces chemical usage and ensures efficient filtration, thus cutting energy costs.

Growth of algae, often caused by excessive debris coupled with insufficient chlorination, should be corrected by adding a larger-than-usual dosage of chlorine, reports David R. Wallis, manager of the PPG Industries' unit which markets Pittlor calcium hypochlorite swimming pool treatment.

"Algae can be destroyed by shock treating the water with two ounces of Pittlor calcium hypochlorite for every 1,000 gallons of water while the circulating pump and filter are operating," Wallis says. "Then wait at least four hours, preferably overnight, before vacuuming the pool bottom."

After cleaning the pool, follow instructions on the label of the chlorinating agent to balance the pH (acidity and basicity) of the water, and obtain a chlorine level acceptable for swimming.

The key to efficient chlorination is control of pH and alkali content, and proper pool water stabilization. By properly using a stabilizer, you can cut disinfectant costs in half and ensure sufficient chlorine residuals to sanitize the pool adequately.

To ensure pool-area safety, heed this advice:

- Keep small children out when there is no supervision.
- Install fences around in-ground pools and make sure that ladders leading to above-ground pools are removed, if possible, when the pool is idle.
- Keep a long pole and life preserver in a visible spot near the pool for easy access in emergencies.
- Always swim with another person.
- Caution all visitors, especially children, against running in the pool area.
- Never dive into shallow water, and always look before leaping or diving.
- Do not roughhouse around or in the pool.

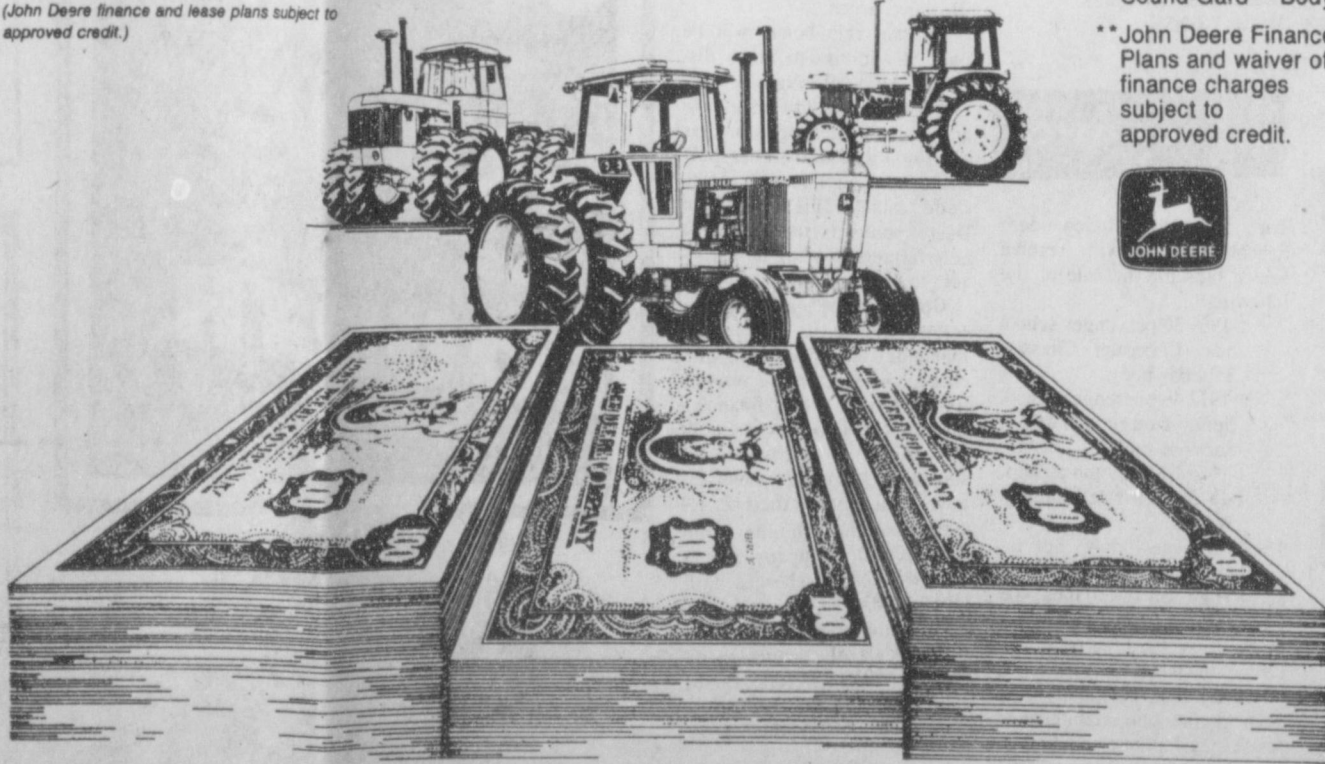

In case you didn't read the article in Thursday's paper about the brown recluse spider, this is a reminder to be as cautious as you can be about this poisonous spider. An entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service suggests you become familiar with the appearance and habits of poisonous spiders. Since spiders nest in a quiet and undisturbed area, frequent cleaning in closets, cellars and other such areas help keep the spiders away. He suggests where possible, to use a water hose to wash off outside areas, particularly under roof eaves. When chemical control is necessary, he advised use of products containing diazinon, Dursban, Baygon, pyrethrin, Sevin, resmethrin, Vapona or malathion. Spray or dust outside under roof eaves, window ledges and porch and patio roofs. Inside, spray around windows, door facings, baseboards, basements attics and storage places.

The effects of a brown recluse spider bite may be immediate or delayed, depending upon the amount of venom injected and the victim's sensitivity. Usually, the bite causes a stinging sensation and then intense pain. Within 24 to 36 hours, a systemic reaction may occur, characterized by restlessness, fever, chills, nausea, weakness and joint pain. The bite also produces a small blister surrounded by a large congested and swollen area. The venom usually kills the affected tissue, which gradually sloughs away and exposes underlying tissues. The edges around the wound thicken, while the exposed center fills with dense scar tissue. Healing may take six to eight weeks, leaving scars of various sizes.

The most distinguishing characteristics are the spider's eyes and back markings. It has three pairs of eyes arranged in a semi-circle on the forehead of the head. The eyes also form the base of a violin-shaped marking on the back. The coloring of the recluse varies from an orange-yellow to dark brown or almost black.

Those rates become effective June 1, 1982.
