pages and picture pages.


If local artists will be as generous for this book as they were for Volume I, the comm tee spokesman stated that they will use all the sketches they have room for in the book.





#### SAFETY TIPS ON POOL CARE

pool care and poolside safety procedures, you can help protect swimmers and save

Keeping pool water crystal clear and debris free, and using safety precautions in the pool area, are the keys to healthful, thrifty recreational swimming.

Without proper treat-ment, pool water can become a breeding ground for bacteria that are easily transmitted from swimmer to swimmer

Experts recommend frequent filter cleaning and skimming of bacteria-causing debris such as leaves and twigs to make water purification easier. Such cleaning reduces chemical usage and ensures efficient filtration, thus cutting ener-

gy costs. Growth of algae, often caused by excessive debris coupled with insufficient chlorination, should be corrected by adding a largerthan-usual dosage of chlorine, reports David R. Wallis, manager of the PPG Industries' unit which markets Pittclor calcium hypochlorite swimming pool

"Algae can be destroyed by shock treating the water with two ounces of Pittclor calcium hypochlorite for every 1,000 gallons of water while the circulating pump and filter are operating, Wallis says. "Then wait at least four hours, preferably overnight, before vacuuming the pool bottom.

After cleaning the pool, follow instructions on the label of the chlorinating agent to balance the pH (acidity and basicity) of the water and obtain a

chlorine level acceptable for swimming.

The key to efficient chlorination is control of pH and alkali content, and proper pool water stabilization. By properly using a stabilizer, you can cut disinfectant costs in half and ensure sufficient chlorine residuals to sanitize the pool adequately.

To ensure pool-area safe ty, heed this advice.

· Keep small children out when there is no supervision. • Install fences around inground pools and make sure that ladders leading to aboveground pools are removed, if possible, when the pool is

• Keep a long pole and life preserver in a visible spot near the pool for easy emergencies.

· Always swim with an

• Never dive into shallow water, and always look before leaping or diving.

#### AUSTIN--Oklahoma and Mis-

ouri are two of several states which are tightening brucellosis regulations on Texas cattle, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, reports.

Missouri has already imposed stiffer entry requirements on Texas livestock, and Oklahoma's tougher regulations go in effect July 1. Iowa has also put in effect a regulation which whould treat Texas as a Class C state instead of a B and C state as provided for in federal regulations. That means more testing of this state's cattle for

entry into lowa. "It appears that Texas livestock producers can expect more states to increase their requirements for Texas' cattle relating to brucellosis," Dr. Holcombe said.

He cited a couple of reasons

1. Several states are taking

Brucellosis Regulations Tightened On Texas Cattle

posed federal rules; 2. States free or virtually free of brucellosis want to remain that way, and thus are imposing the more stringent regulations.

Missouri probably has the most stringent regulations on receiving Texas cattle:

All Cattle moving into Missouri, including steers, will require a prior permit from the Missouri Department of Agriculture Animal Health division. Other requirements include: individual identification on health certificates; two consecutive negative tests before movement for females over 18 months of age, followed by a 60 to 120 day quarantine and retest at owner's expense; and one negative test within 30 days of movement for females between four and 18 months of age followed by the same quaran-

tine and retest.



In case you didn't read the article in Thursday's paper about the brown recluse spider, this is a reminder to be as cautious as you can be about this poisonous spider. An entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service suggests you become familiar with the appearance and habits of poisonous spiders. Since spiders nest in a quiet and undisturbed area, frequent cleaning in closets, cellars and other such areas help keep the spiders away. He suggests where possible, to use a water hose to wash off outside areas, particularly under roof eaves. When chemical control is necessary, he advised use of products containing diazinon, Dursban, Baygon, pyrethrins, Sevin, resmethrin, Vapona or malathion. Spray or dust outside under roof eaves, window ledges and porch and patio roofs. Inside, spray around windows, door facings, baseboards, basements attics and storage places.

The effects of a brown recluse spider bite may be immediate or delayed, depending upon the amount of venom injected and the victim's sensitivity. Usually, the bite causes a stinging sensation and then intense pain. Within 24 to 36 hours, a systemic reaction may occur, characterized by restlessness, fever, chills, nausea, weakness and joint pain. The bite also produces a small blister surrounded by a large congested and swollen area. The venom usually kills the affected tissue, which gradually sloughs away and exposes underlying tissues. The edges around the wound thicken, while the exposed center fills with dense scar tissue. Healing may take six to

eight weeks, leaving scars of various sizes. The most distinguishing characteristics are the spider's eyes and back markings. It has three pairs of eyes arranged in a semi-circle on the forepart of the head. The eyes also form the base of a violin-shaped marking on the back. The coloring of the recluse varies from an orange-yellow-to dark brown or almost black.
