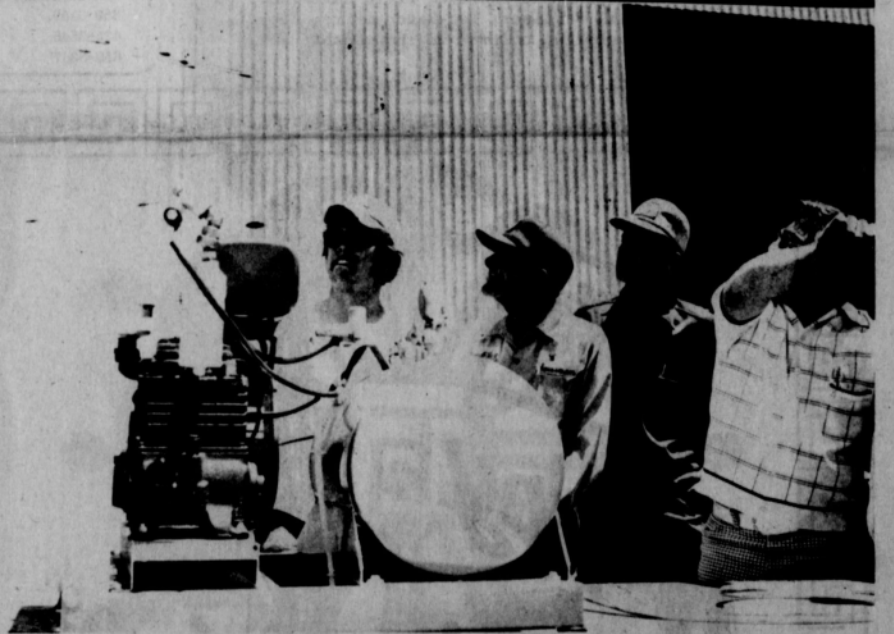

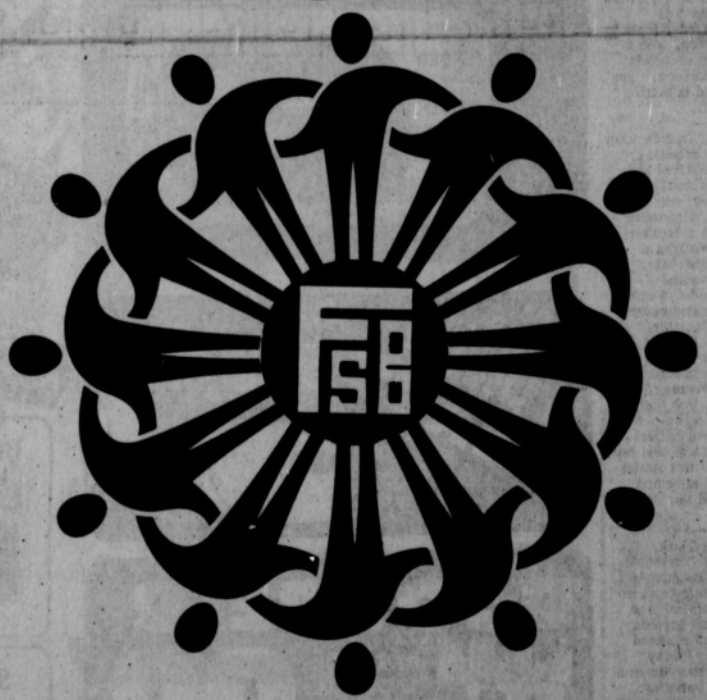

JEFF KINNEY, Kansas City Chief's running back ---gave us a moving account of a former teammate, Rex Lowe, who contracted Hodgkin's Disease yet died a Christian.
DON COCKROFT, Cleveland Browns kicker---shared the fact that he got a second chance both spiritually and on the gridiron. However, he challenged us to not wait for the second chance because we might not still be around then. Don't put off God.
STEVE ODOM, Green Bay Packers receiver and return specialist---brought forth the question "what does it really mean to be a man? He used II Corinthians 5:17 and John 1:12 as text. He added that "in the world, size is relative; in God, it's absolute."
PHIL OLSEN, Denver Broncos defensive lineman

---challenged each conferee to "take something with you from this place" and "don't be bound by humanness." He shared the fact that at a FCA conference four years ago, he realized the importance of letting Jesus Christ take over his life. Referred us to James 1:6.
MARK MOSELEY, Washington Redskins kicker---spoke on fear and loneliness, pairing out "Year is nothing as long as you have Jesus Christ on the throne of your life." Used Scriptures 23rd Psalm, Isaiah 41:10, Hebrews 13: 5-6.
MARK ARNESON, St. Louis Cardinals linebacker ---warned "don't judge your salvation experience by someone else's because they are all different." He related the experience of being ejected from game the day before he was to speak at Billy Graham Crusade and through that learned "God's love is unconditional. He loved me no matter what and accepted me just as I am." We all make mistakes.
DOUG KINGSRITER, Minnesota Vikings tight end---displayed the sincerity and sweetness of his Christianity daily by serving as Dean of the Conference.

Vocational Nursing Class Slated

Vocational Nursing students of Frank Phillips College will complete, in August, their second annual class since merging the North Plains and Highland General Hospital

programs. This new consolidated program is approved by the Vocational Nurses Examining Board and the Texas Education Agency.

The third annual class of Vocational nurses is scheduled to begin August 18, 1975, and the tentative deadline for receipt of applications has been set for July 15. Persons interested in the 1975-76 class are urged to act now. Social Security

Some divorced women may be unaware of possible social security benefits payable to them on the account of a former husband according to Howard L. Weatherly, manager of the Pampa Social Security Office.

Women who were divorced from their husbands after being married for 20 years or longer may qualify for benefits much the same as if they never were divorced.

A woman whose divorced husband is still alive may qualify at age 62 provided the marriage lasted over 20 years, she is unmarried (even though she may have had a subsequent marriage and divorced), and is not entitled to a larger benefit on another record. The most the divorced wife of

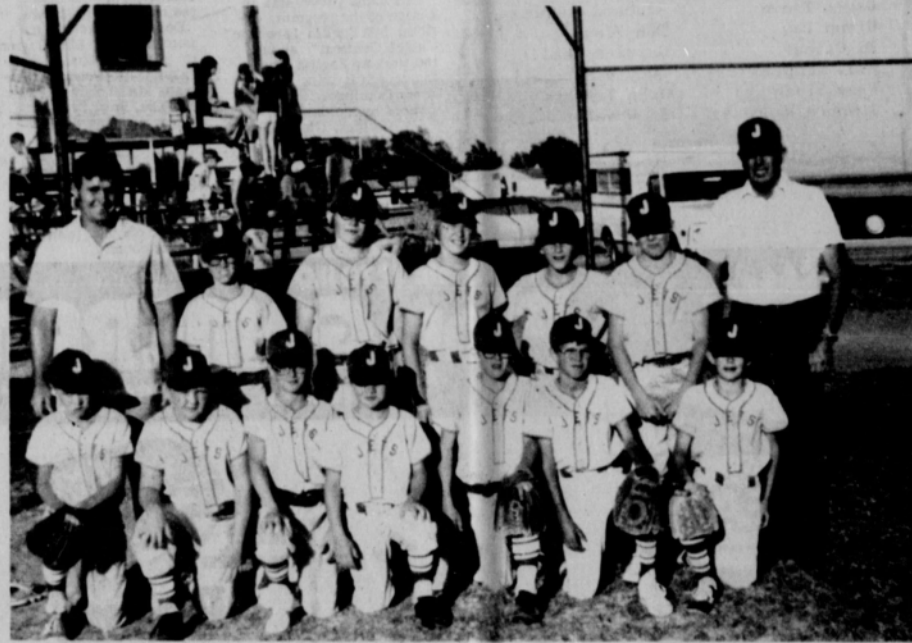
a living exhusband can get is 50% of what he receives. In the case of the surviving divorced wife, one whose exhusband is dead, benefits may be payable as early as age 60, or at age 50 if the woman is severely disabled. The other requirements of not being currently married, of having been married for over 20 years, and of not being eligible for a higher benefit on another account also apply. If the surviving divorced wife is age 65 or older, she may qualify for as much as 100% of what her exhusband would get if he were alive. At ages under 65, it would be reduced.
