Spearman is going to lose its new vocal music teacher!

People are so quick to criticize the Dallas Police Force for letting Lee H. Oswald be murdered they forget what a really remarkable job the organization did in capturing the man in record time.

Oswald did his killing from hiding, no one saw him and he had a city of over a million persons to hide in, yet he was captured in only a few hours.

To us it was not the police's carelessness that led to the killing of Oswald, it was police cooperation. The police had bent over backwards to keep the press informed on everything. There were press conferences every few hours and from the looks of things on television, the police were extremely cooperative in letting the cameras and reporters move about the city hall.

In fact, the officers agreed to move Oswald from the city to county jail during the day, so the cameramen would have better shooting conditions.

Some say the police were just hogging the publicity and trying to make-up for letting the President be murdered in their city. We feel they were trying to avoid the cry of "police secrecy" and "gestapo" that would have rolled across the land had the police handled the matter like they preferred, out of the spotlight.

And, even though they had done so much to help the press, one of the first comments made by a TV commentator in New York after Oswald was killed was: "The Dallas police were unable to protect his killer in the jail basement".

County Joins Nation In Mourning Kennedy

The assassination of President Kennedy, the murder of a policeman and killing of the accused assassin, in Dallas over the weekend left Spearman stunned and shocked that anything of such a nature could happen in this nation, much less in Texas.

In this conservative area that opposed most of the President's program, the feeling was that disagreement politically is American, but violent disagreement has no place in this country.

Many conservatives around Spearman show a feeling that the assassination is part of a larger plot and not the work of a crank. Many feel Oswald was killed to keep him from talking.

Business and all other activity came almost to a halt from the time the assassination was announced until the final services were completed in Arlington National Cemetery Monday. The entire town stayed close to the television and radio for the continuous coverage.

Monday, most businesses closed either all day, or during the

Officers Assist In Arrest

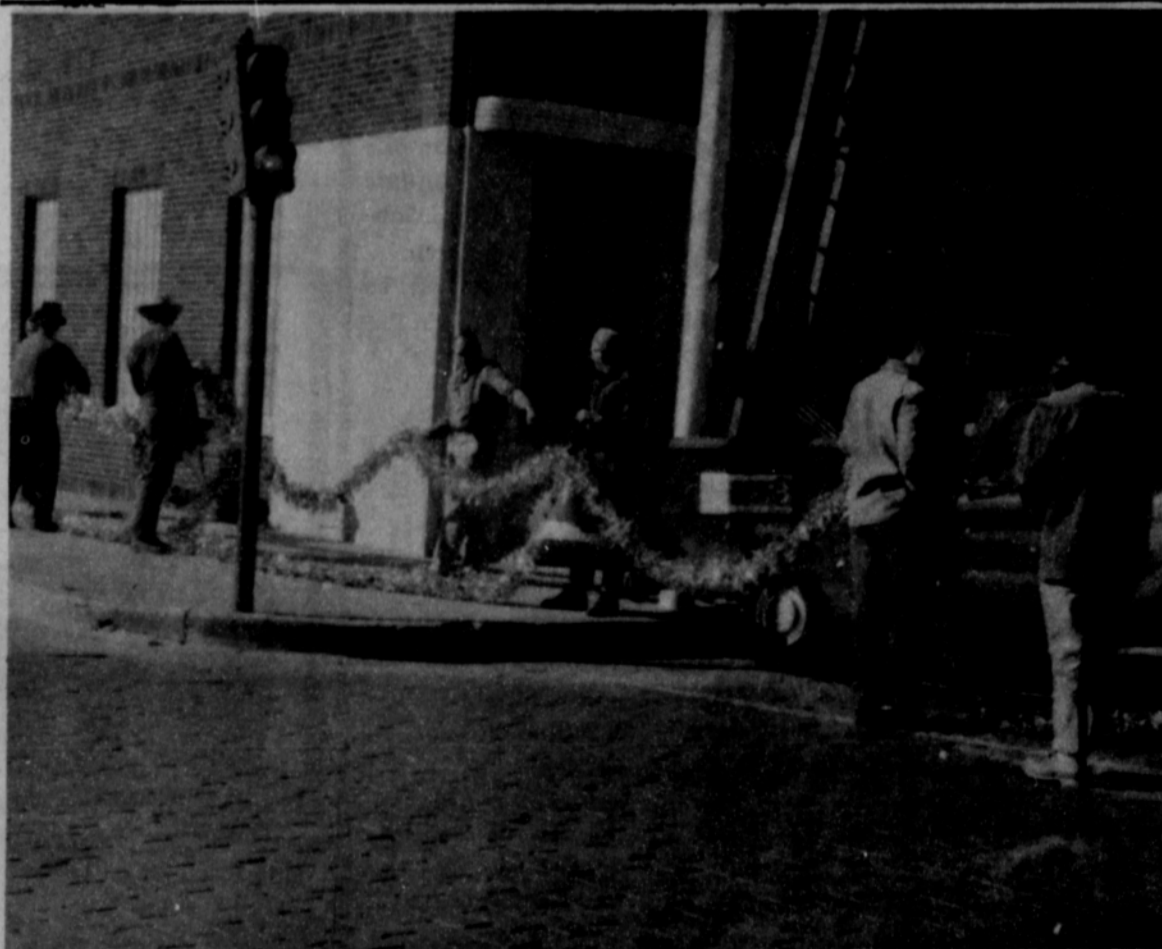
Hansford Sheriff's Officers help arrest and turn over to Oklahoma a Stinnett man wanted for burglary in Texas County.

Two Heroes

Two National Heroes were buried Monday, both men gave their lives in service to their country. One has been eulogized from all over the world and buried with much pomp and splendor. The other rated only a few paragraphs and was buried in a simple ceremony. One will be remembered, the other forgotten, but both are so necessary for the survival of our nation.

Both men, former President John F. Kennedy and former Policeman J. D. Tippitt, in their own ways, had dedicated themselves to service of mankind and family. Their posts in service were eons apart, but each man was giving all of his abilities to carry out the tasks he had been assigned.

John F. Kennedy had wealth, education and political power to be a success at any profession. He chose politics and the climb to the top position of responsibility in the world. He worked hard for what he thought best for the nation and world, and although he carried the world's largest load on his shoulders, he was dedicated to his family and gave them as much time as possible.

J. D. Tippitt grew up in East Texas, apparently married and assumed the responsibility of a family early. All the avenues of the world were not open to him, but he was dedicated to serving mankind as a police officer. Had he not been, there were easier jobs that paid \$490 per month. He was as dedicated to his family, and worked at extra jobs to give them more.

President Kennedy was killed while doing extra work. He was stumping the state trying to bring the Democratic party together. Policeman Tippitt was doing extra work, also. He went back on duty early because his fellow officers needed help with crowds in Dallas to see the President.

Officer Tippitt probably never saw the President, but he did see the man believed to have killed the President. This recognition led to Tippitt's death and the capture of the assassin.

Everyone in this nation will never agree politically, but as long as the great and the small are willing to carry out their tasks with the devotion of John F. Kennedy and J. D. Tippitt, we will survive all attacks from without and within.

School Service in Gruver Honors President Kennedy

Gruver students and teachers conducted a Memorial Service Monday at 10:15 a. m. for the late President John F. Kennedy and watched the funeral services on television sets placed throughout the school.

All students, except for the beginning grades, remained in the auditorium to watch the ceremonies in Washington, D. C. until 2:30 p. m.

The program began with the presentation of the national and state colors and the "Pledge of Allegiance", led by Student Council President Jim Cooksey. Glenda Purvis accompanied the student body in singing the "Star Spangled Banner."

Superintendent W. H. Wiloughby addressed the students and faculty with the following words.

"We have gathered here to commemorate the death of our president. This may be the only service of this kind in Gruver today, and had we the means of communicating to others at this time we would have welcomed everyone. Gruver could have taken the easy way, dismissed school and stayed at home, visited, gone some place or watched the services on television; but we feel that we should make some small contribution toward commemorating the death of our president.

"Today is a day of mourning. It is a day proclaimed by our new President as a day of mourning. Let us make this day just that, a day of mourning.

"Even minutes after our president's death, a new president was sworn into office. The business of the nation must go on. The new president worked all day Saturday and Sunday to pull the slackened reins of our government back in place after so tragic an event. We can do no less. Mrs. Kennedy has had a tiring vigil since her husband's death. We can do no less.

"Our late president was a champion of education. We can do him no greater honor than to do our best to further our education.

"Thomas Jefferson once said in similar words, "A democracy made up of uneducated people cannot succeed. A nation without educated citizens can not survive."

"To say that I am personally sorrowful that our late president was assassinated is a gross under-

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DAY BY DAY

Television, radio and newspaper coverage of the nation's great tragedy last Friday has given us all a front row view of a weird and horrible event in America's history.

It seems that many people felt as we did, that the weekend left us depressed and keenly aware of a nation's and a First Family's grief.

It will perhaps someday be interesting to look back at the years from 1960 to Nov. 22, 1963, when memories and remembrances of the horrible weekend have dimmed. Because, as is always true, only history will record whether or not President Kennedy was one of our greatest presidents.

Whether he is in the class with a few of our presidents whom history has remembered with an extra measure of greatness remains to be seen. But the truth is that he was a popular and much loved president who was felled by the senseless act of what must have been a madman.

Many speculations and predictions have been made already as to what kind of a president Lyndon Johnson will be.

Many of us were disappointed when he accepted the vice-presidency after stating loudly that he wouldn't do so. Others feel that he will be quick to show his most liberal leanings in order to be re-elected next year.

But I have a strong feeling that he should be given every opportunity to prove himself a capable president with as little bias and condemnation on the part of his opponents as is possible.

As someone so ably put it during the weekend, "Surely Johnson can fill his new office ably; after all one chosen from among us has always met the test."

It is hard to find enough superlatives to describe the remarkable job done by Director Enoch Estep in the past 10

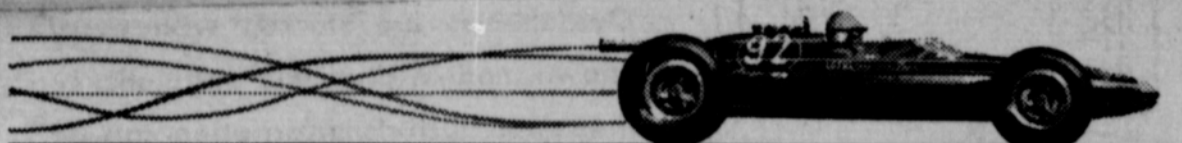

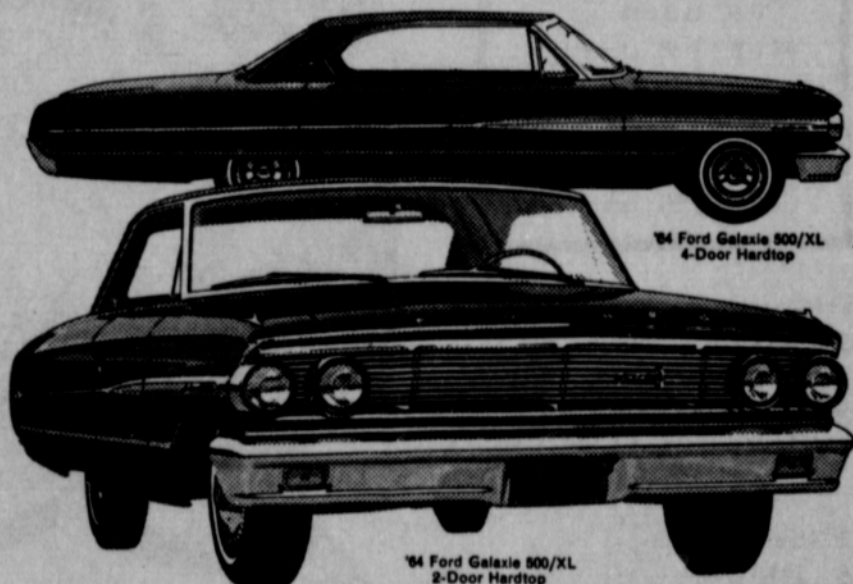
