To us it was not the police's carelessness that led to the killing of Oswald, it was police cooperation. The police had bent over backwards to keep the press informed on everything. There were press conferences few hours and from the looks of things on television, the police were extremely cooperative in letting the cameras and reporters move about the city hall.

In fact, the officers agreed to move Oswald from the city to county jail during the day, so the cameramen would have better shooting conditions.

Some say the police were just hogging the publicity and trying to make-up for letting the President be murdered in their city. We feel they were trying to avoid the cry of "police secrecy" and "gestapo" that would have rolled across the land had the police handled the matter like they preferred, out of the

spotlight. And, even though they had done so much to help the press, one of the first comments made by a TV commentator in New York after Oswald was killed "The Dallas police were unable to protect his killer in the jail basement".

Two Heroes

Two National Heroes were buried Monday, both men gave their lives in service to their country. One has been eulogized from all over the world and buried with much pomp and splendor. The other rated only a few paragraphs and was buried in a simple ceremony. One will be remembered, the other forgotten, but both are so necessary for the survival of our nation.

Both men, former President John F. Kennedy and former Policeman J. D. Tippitt, in their own ways, had dedicated themselves to service of mankind and family. Their posts in service were eons apart, but each man was giving all of his abilities to carry out the tasks he had been assigned.

John F. Kennedy had wealth, education and political power to be a success at any profession. He chose politics and the climb to the top position of responsibility in the world. He worked hard for what he thought best for the nation and world, and although he carried the world's largest load on his shoulders, he was dedicated to his family and gave them as much time as possible.

J. D. Tippitt grew up in East Texas, apparently married and assumed the responsibility of a family early. All the avenues of the world were not open to him, but he was dedicated to serving mankind as a police officer. Had he not been, there were easier jobs that paid \$490 per month. He was as dedicated to his family, and worked at extra jobs to give them more.

President Kennedy was killed while doing extra work. He was stumping the state trying to bring the Democratic party together. Policeman Tippitt was doing extra work, also. He went back on duty early because his fellow officers needed help with crowds in Dallas to see the President.

Officer Tippitt probably never saw the President, but he did see the man believed to have killed the President. This recognition led to Tippitt's death and the capture of the assassin.

Everyone in this nation will never agree politically, but as long as the great and the small are willing to carry out their tasks with the devotion of John F. Kennedy and J. D. Tippitt, we will survive all attacks from without and within.

School Service in Gruver Honors President Kennedy

conducted a Memorial Service Monday at 10:15 a.m. for the late President John F. Kennedy and watched the funeral services on television sets placed throughout the school.

All students, except for the beginning grades, remained in the auditorium to watch the ceremonies in Washington, D. C. until 2:30 p.m.

The program began with the ful presentation of the national and state colors and the "Pledge of Allegiance", led by Student Council President Jim Cooksey. Glenda Purvis accompanied the student body in singing the "Star Spangled Banner."

Superintendent W. H. Willoughby addressed the students and faculty with the following words.

"We have gathered here to commemorate the death of our president. This may be the only service of this kind in Gruer today, and had we the means of communicating to others at this time we would have welcomed everyone. Gruver could have taken the easy way, dismissed school and stayed at home, visited, gone some place or watched the services on television; but we feel that should make some small contribution toward commemorating the death of our president.

"Today is a day of mourning. It is a day proclaimed by our new President as a day of mourning. Let us make this day just that, a day of mourning.

"Even minutes after our president's death, a new president was sworn into office. The business of the nation must go on. The new president worked all day Saturday and Sunday to pull the slackened reins of our government back in place after so tragic an event. We can do no less. Mrs. Kennedy has had a tiring vigil since her husband's death. We can do no less.

"Our late president was a champion of education. We can do him no greater honor than to do our best to further our education.

"Thomas Jefferson once said in similar words, "A democracy made up of uneducated people can not succeed. A nation witheducated citizens can not survive. "

"To say that I am personally sorrowful that our late president was assassinated is a gross under-

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Gruver students and teachers statement. I have met him, shook his hand and listened to him speak. I have a prized letter in my possession-an invitation to come to his inauguration in January of 1961. It will remain a cherished possession.

> "Four presidents of the United States have been assassinated. May we hereby resolve to live in such a way and inspire others to do likewise that such a dreadthing cannot ever happen again to us in this wonderful land of the Free, "

"Our Father, as we congregate here this morning in sorrow to commemorate the death of our late president, may we strive to be the very best Christian and American citizens possible. "May we so live that when our summons calls to join that innumerable caravan that leads to the silent halls of death, we may approach our grave not as a quarry slave scourged to his dungeon at night; but as one soothed and sustained by an unfaltering trust who wraps the draperies of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams, "

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





Bond Sales Announced

October Savings Bond sales Hansford County totaled \$4,387. This announcement was made recently by Mr. C. A. Gibner, Chairman of the Handsford County Savings Bond Committee.


