

# Bankers award banquet held here Tuesday

An enthusiastic crowd was on hand at the annual Bankers Award Banquet, held in Spearman Tuesday evening. The outstanding farmer award went to Rex Shapley of Gruver, and the outstanding homemaker award went to Delinda McLaughlin of Spearman. Willard McCloy, who has spent 20 years with the Soil Conservation Service, received the Outstanding District Service Award.

Rex Shapley, along with Tony Shapley, his brother and Arnold Beck, his brother-in-law, operate seven sections of dryland cropland located six miles west of Gruver.

In 1980 Rex requested technical assistance through the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District from the Soil Conservation Service personnel at Spearman to correct some erosion problems. A Great Plains Conservation Program contract, which provides cost-share assistance for installation of conservation practices, was then developed.

Under this program, assistance is being provided for shaping and vegetating waterways as well as constructing diversion and parallel terraces. To date 45 acres of waterways have been shaped with 5 acres being seeded to western wheatgrass and sideoats grama and 3674 feet of diversion terraces also being constructed.

In the near future an additional 19 acres of waterway will be shaped, 59 acres of waterway seeded to grass and 30,000 feet of terraces constructed.

The farm is continuously seeded to wheat which is either grazed out by stocker cattle or cut for grain. An excellent job of conservation tillage is done utilizing large sweeps to maintain crop residues for moisture conservation and soil protection.

Rex, also, farms an additional 2 1/2 sections of irrigated cropland on which he carries out a conservation program to protect his soil, water and wildlife resources.

Rex, his wife Marion, their children Bart, 15; Dala, 13 and Tara, 5, reside in Gruver. Marion's cousin, Chuck Morgan, also lives with Rex's family and attends W.T.S.U.

Mrs. Danny McLaughlin is an outstanding young homemaker, mother of one son and wife of an active local farmer. Actively involved in Extension Homemaker's Clubwork for six years. Her involvement has been for the betterment of the community, home, and family life. Delinda has exhibited outstanding qualities of devotion, trust and leadership in this community through her activities in church, social and service projects.

As a member of Extension Homemakers, her roles have been many. She is presently Education Chairwoman of the Hansford County Council. Delinda has worked to provide service to the community by coordinating efforts of the Bloodmobile, Veteran's Day Program and Hansford County Extension Homemaker's Annual meeting and Membership Tea. She has assumed responsibilities in her club and on the county level, serving as 4-H and Finance committee chairman, Council Delegate and Secretary from her club. She has been elected to represent Hansford County Homemaker's as chairman for Texas Extension Homemaker's Association.

A member of the Extension Home Economics Family Living Committee, Delinda has played a major role in planning, organizing and conducting clothing construction workshops, clothing seminars, health fair and Family Management Skills Clinics.

A devoted member of the Church of Christ as well as an active member of Rho Rho Sorority. Her talents are many but especially in the field of painting.

This year we salute Mrs. McLaughlin as Homemaker of the Year for her continued interest, time and support of home and community life, and for her belief that the home is truly our hope in a changing world.

## Med-Evac Helicopter stops here



The newly active med-evac helicopter for health emergencies in the Panhandle flew to Hansford Hospital Thursday at 11 a.m. to familiarize EMT and hospital personnel including Dr. Muthali and Dr. McClellan were on hand, when the helicopter landed.

The Amarillo Aircraft Sales and Services, and the three major hospitals in Amarillo have entered a three-month trial period of using a med-evac helicopter for emergencies in the Texas Panhandle.

Patients transported by the

Aerospatiale Star helicopter will be billed by Amarillo Aircraft at a \$525-an-hour rate for flying time from the time it leaves the helicopter pad at Northwest Texas Hospital, according to Ralph Pedigo of Amarillo Aircraft. All patients would be brought to the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center.

During the 90 day trial period, they need 40 hours a month of flight time to break-even, Pedigo said.

Emergency evacuations by helicopter would usually be

made within a 120 mile range (60 miles out and 60 miles back). PEMS board chairman Ken Spaulding said.

Any emergency farther away would call for the use of a fixed-wing aircraft. Pedigo said he believes the service would be a profitable one for the aircraft company as well as provide a badly needed service to the area.

The cost of purchasing or leasing a helicopter, maintaining it and having a pilot ready for duty at all times made operating a med-evac system on its own impossible, according to

EMS director Linda Massey of the 26 Texas counties and three Oklahoma counties served by the emergency service.

The helicopters were owned by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission which administered the emergency medical services programs from 1976 until Jan. 1, 1978, when PEMS became a non-profit organization.

Since PEMS was charging patients for services, the helicopter was classified as an air taxi and had to meet civilian aircraft worthiness standards.

Fast approaching is one of my favorite holidays of the years, Thanksgiving. I realize that in this and many countries there are people who do not have enough to eat due to the economy and this saddens me.

This year I am especially thankful for my 9 month old granddaughter, who will be coming to see me for the Thanksgiving holidays. I am thankful for family and friends, for the community in which we live, for the many blessings we have, which we take for granted most of the time, not even thinking from where they came.

Our American Thanksgiving Day dates officially from 1863 when the nation was locked in a sectional struggle. Mrs. Sarah J. Hale, who had been proposing a national day of thanksgiving for decades in Boston and Philadelphia as a magazine editor, wrote to President Abraham Lincoln—who in October 1863 issued the first Thanksgiving Proclamation.

There had been earlier thanksgiving days; some date the American observance to the days of the early settlers of the nation—who gave thanks for their food supply and the opportunity America offered. The first probably occurred in the Plymouth Colony in 1621.

There have also been observances in other lands but few countries had adopted annual thanksgiving days prior to the American custom. An international thanksgiving day was held in Washington in 1909, having been conceived by the Rev. Dr. William Russell of St. Patrick's Catholic Church.

Thus, Thanksgiving Day, the 25th this year, is uniquely American. We can give thanks for the many blessings all Americans enjoy. In doing so, we can resolve to build a better community and a greater nation—for in spite of our blessings and accomplishments, there is still much to be done.

**LUBBOCK-** Applications are now being accepted for windbreak seedlings from the Texas Forest Service.

These seedlings, grown from seed collected in West Texas and eastern New Mexico, are produced in the Service's greenhouse in Lubbock and in a field nursery near Halfway. Conifer species available this season include Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, Arizona cypress, red cedar and Scotch pine. These containerized seedlings cost \$1 each but are sold only in multiples of 30 seedlings.

Hardwood species include bur oak, green ash, honeylocust, mulberry, native plum and Russian olive. These bare root seedlings are priced at \$25 per hundred. Minimum orders of 100 seedlings will be accepted, but applicants may order 50 of one species and 50 of another. Applicants must also add a four percent state sales tax to the purchase price.

Seedlings ordered now will be ready for pickup and planting in March 1983. Tree seedlings sold by the Texas Forest Service may not be used for landscaping or ornamental purposes.

For applications and information on windbreaks, contact the Texas Forest Service, Route 3, Box 216, Lubbock, Texas 79401. (806) 746-5801. Applications are also available from county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Soil Conservation Service, and Agricultural Extension Agents.

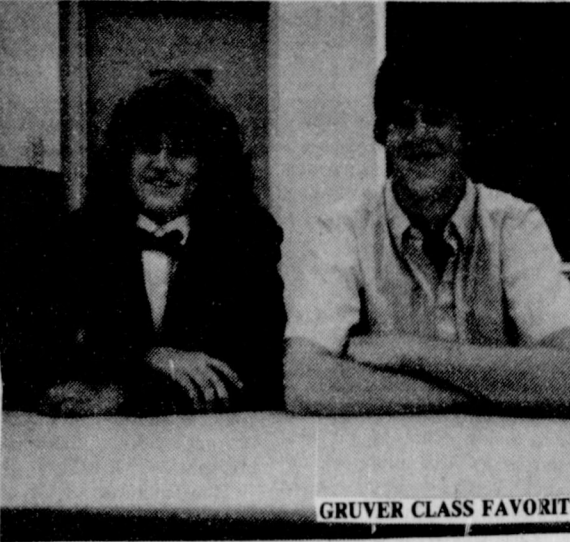

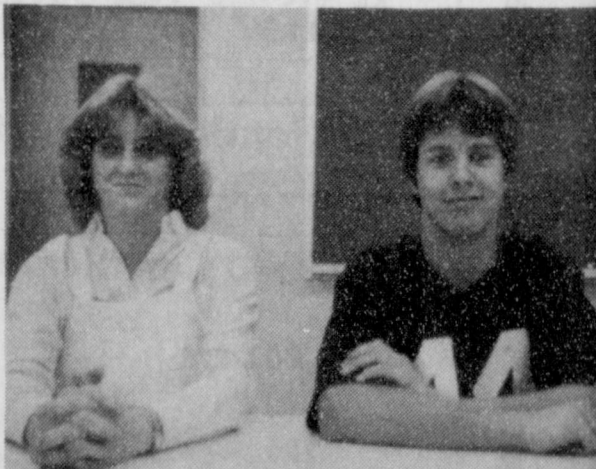

**Farm-City Week Observed**

"Farm and city: Partners in Progress--You Can't Have One Without the Other" is the theme of this year's Farm-City Week Nov. 19-25.

Purpose of the observance is to focus on the involvement of farm and city people as partners in the growing, processing, marketing and consumption of food and fiber.

In other words, Farm-City Week is aimed at promoting better understanding between farm and city people and increasing the knowledge and appreciation of each for the American way of life. Points out Jim Smith, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Farm-City Week is under the direction of the National Farm-City Council, Inc., which is coordinated by Kiwanis International.

Agricultural production, marketing and processing provides jobs and income for about a fourth of the working force in Texas.

One out of every 30 Texans is a farmer or rancher, and 30 percent of the state's retail trade business is directly associated with agricultural production and selling of food and fiber products.

Total cash receipts from Texas agricultural sales were just over \$10 billion in 1981. Economic activity generated from these marketings exceeded \$35 billion.

Total farm assets in Texas are estimated at \$80 billion. With 186,000 farms in Texas, assets average \$430,000 per farm. Many commercial size, full-time operators, have in excess of a million dollars invested in their farm or ranch business.

Texas ranks in third place in total cash receipts among the leading agricultural states, behind California and Iowa. Texas, however, is number one in the sales of cattle and calves, cotton, grain sorghum, sheep and wool, goats and mohair, cabbage and spinach.

One farm worker today provides food and fiber for 78 people. He also creates jobs for more than 5 nonfarm people who produce the things farmers need and who process, transport and merchandise the crops farmers harvest.

American agriculture is the world's largest commercial industry with assets exceeding \$1 trillion. This industry employs nearly 23 million people, a full 22 percent of America's total labor force. The agricultural industry encompasses manufacturing, farming, transportation, processing, and merchandising.

Farm and city people make the best food and fiber team in the world and give this country the capacity to feed its own people and to export for economic gain as well as for humanitarian purposes.

The next meeting date will be December 9 in the home of Gaye Wooley which will be a Christmas supper with husbands or guests.

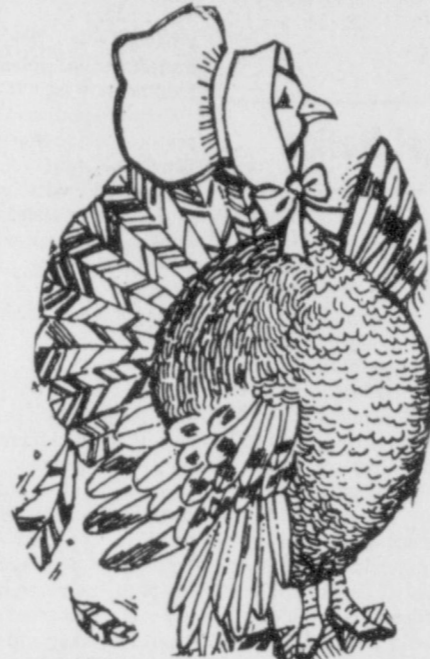

DPS Plans For Thanksgiving

Major C.W. Bell, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "As we approach Thanksgiving Day weekend, all of us are making plans of one kind or another for observance of this traditional season of the year. Many DPS officers will make plans of a different kind. They will be on duty to stimulate safety-consciousness throughout this festive holiday."

During the last Thanksgiving holiday weekend, Texas experienced 53 fatal accidents and 57 traffic fatalities. Major Bell said, "Speed and alcohol are the main contributing factors in the majority of traffic deaths in Texas."

A total of 4,701 fatalities was

recorded on our streets and highways for 1981 and statistics show 923 fatal accidents caused 1,082 deaths and 17,343 injury accidents that caused 27,907 injuries in Texas that involved a drunk driver, according to Major Bell.

"Many drivers are not tested," Bell said, "because Texas has no law requiring chemical test on drivers in fatal accidents and it is probable that more than 50% of the deceased drivers in Texas were driving while intoxicated and were not reported as DWI."

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to avoid the use of alcohol when driving. Let's all slow down a little and live a lot.

### Thanksgiving, 1982

Our American Thanksgiving Day dates officially from 1863 when the nation was locked in a sectional struggle. Mrs. Sarah J. Hale, who had been proposing a national day of thanksgiving for decades in Boston and Philadelphia as a magazine editor, wrote to President Abraham Lincoln--who in October of 1863 issued the first Thanksgiving Proclamation.

There had been earlier thanksgiving days; some date the American observance to the days of the early settlers of the nation--who gave thanks for their food supply and the opportunity America offered. The first probably occurred in the Plymouth Colony in 1621.

There have also been observances in other lands but few countries had adopted annual thanksgiving days prior to the American custom. An international thanksgiving day was held in Washington in 1909, having been conceived by the Rev. Dr. William Russell of St. Patrick's Catholic Church.

Thus, Thanksgiving Day, the 25th this year, is uniquely American. We can all give thanks for the many blessings all Americans enjoy. In doing so, we can resolve to build a better community and a greater nation--for in spite of our blessings and accomplishments, there is still much to be done.

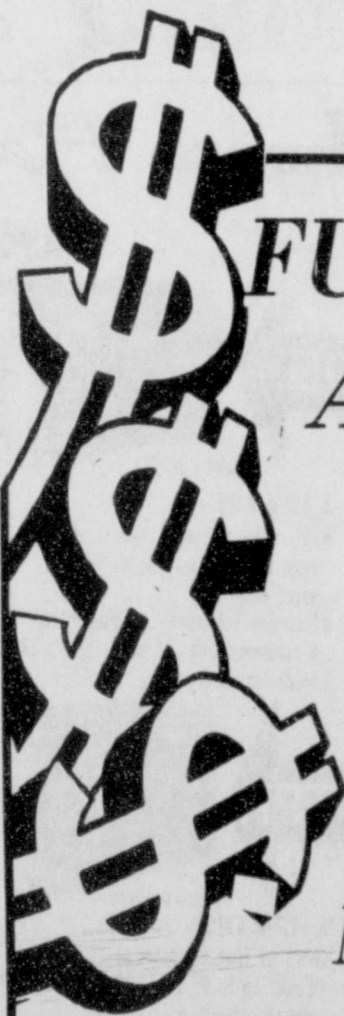

be this Tuesday, November 23. Make plans to see the JV Lynxettes in action!!


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
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
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
