

The A.S.C.S. Office will start mailing low yield wheat payments this week and hope to have all of them out by the middle of October, except the few who have not signed all of the documents required before payment can be made. These wheat low yield payments

should amount to around 1 million dollars. Other payments to be made in the near future are: Wheat Haying feed grain, estimated \$656,000.00.

At this point it appears a wheat deficiency payment of around 50 cents per bushel will be made this year, in December, or in the early part of next year. The payment rate per bushel will be the difference between the \$3.40 target price and the national average market price from June to October.



For example, suppose an individual takes out two fire insurance policies on his home. He may decide that since he is in good shape insurance-wise, he only needs extended coverage on one policy. He may also do this because he feels it is unlikely that a hailstorm, for instance, would cause a total

He is wrong in doing this, and may be making what could amount to a serious mistake. It could mean that he would collect only part of a claim. He should take out # extended coverage on 659-2501.



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
