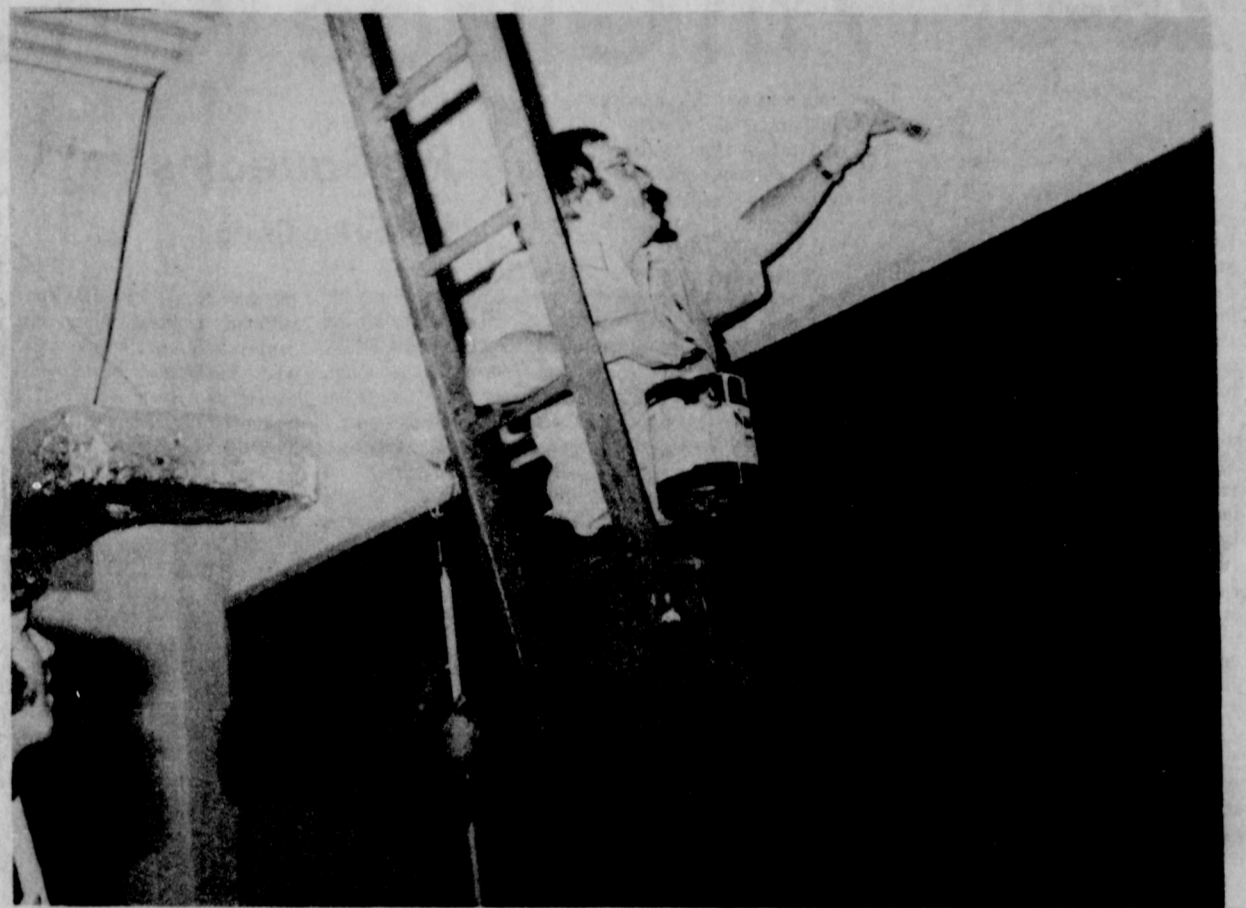

Corn Yields Below Normal

According to Martin Chandler, Hansford County A.S.C.S. director, corn harvest is well under way. Corn yields have been below normal this year, due to the hot, dry weather during the growing season.

The irrigated grain sorghum looks good, however harvest has just begun. Most of the dry land grain sorghum is very poor and some of it may not be good enough to harvest. Chandler said if the yields are below 60% of the farms established yields, within 15 days after completion of harvest and before other use of the land is made.

The 1978 crops planted for harvest in Hansford County are: Corn - 20,390 Acres; Grain Sorghum - 67,780 Acres; Barley - 1,710 Acres; Wheat - 143,306 Acres. Land used for set-aside or diverted acres was 51,165. With 699 farms in the County, 694 participated in the voluntary farm program.

The A.S.C.S. Office will start mailing low yield wheat payments this week and hope to have all of them out by the middle of October, except the few who have not signed all of the documents required before payment can be made. These wheat low yield payments should amount to around 1 million dollars. Other payments to be made in the near future are: Wheat Haying feed grain, estimated \$656,000.00.

At this point it appears a wheat deficiency payment of around 50 cents per bushel will be made this year, in December, or in the early part of next year. The payment rate per bushel will be the difference between the \$3.40 target price and the national average market price from June to October.

This will be multiplied by your farm yield, then times your acres for harvest, less any bushels on which a low yield payment has been made. No estimate on the amount of money at this date.

The 1979 crop wheat planting is not completed but is well under way. Recent rains have made the planting conditions excellent.

The Secretary of Agriculture proposes to make the following determinations with regard to 1979 Feed Grain Program: (a) Whether barley and oats should be included; (b) The amount acreage required, if any; (c) Whether there should be a set-aside requirement and, if so, extent of requirement; (d) Whether there should be land division and level of payment; (e) If a set-aside is required, if limitation should be placed on planted acreage; (f) Loan and purchase levels for 1979 crops of feed grains (corn, sorghum, barley, oats and rye), and soybeans, including commodity eligibility, storage requirements premiums and discounts; (g) Established target prices; (h) CCC minimum resale price and other related provisions to carry out the loan, purchase and payments programs.

Most of the above determinations are required to be made on or before November 15, 1978.

This notice invites written comments on the proposals. They must be received on or before October 10, 1978 to be assured of consideration.

Man escapes with handcuffs here

The Spearman city police, according to Chief Steve, have been having a busy time. On September 24th, a family dispute took place at 313 Hazelwood, but it was resolved and no charges were filed. On Sept. 25th, a window was broken out of an auto belonging to Beth Baker. The car was parked at the bowling alley. There was no way to determine how the window was broken, but it was completely shattered.

September 27, a truck at Spearman Redi-Mix, was vandalized when a rock was thrown thru the windshield.

September 28, Charlene Parks reported that a large dog pulled her dog from her car and mauled the dog badly. She took her small dog to the vet, and the large dog pursued her in the car to the vet, believe it or not! Her small dog was mauled so badly, it had to be put to sleep, and the large dog was given a tranquilizer and died from the shot.

September 28, a Postman was attacked by a dog and bit. The incident occurred at 204 South Archer. The owner of the dog was located, and fortunately for all concerned, the dog had his rabies shots.

October 2, the city police had their hands full in the early morning hours of Oct. 2, a car was running from police in the city of Spearman. The motor one car blew up, and the car stopped near Baker-Taylor yards. The driver and two occupants took off running. One of them was caught and placed, hand-cuffed, in the back of the patrol car. Because of the increased interest in cattle and the decrease in the price of crops, many producers are interested in using crop residues for livestock feed. This will benefit both cattlemen and farmers.

The Livestock Sub-committee of the Hutchinson County Program Building Committee has planned a program for you on Monday, October 9 at 7:30 p.m. in the County Extension Office in the basement of the Court house in Stinnett.

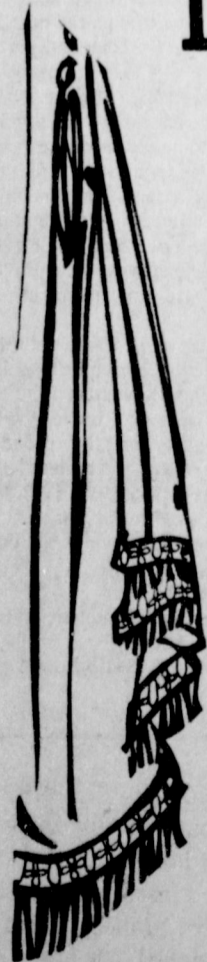

APPORTIONMENT CLAUSES

If a person decides to take out more than one insurance policy on his property, there is an important consideration he should bear in mind. Both policies should have similar coverage.

For example, suppose an individual takes out two fire insurance policies on his home. He may decide that since he is in good shape insurance-wise, he only needs extended coverage on one policy. He may also do this because he feels it is unlikely that a hailstorm, for instance, would cause a total loss.

He is wrong in doing this, and may be making what could amount to a serious mistake. It could mean that he would collect only part of a claim. He should take out extended coverage on

BOTH, making them concurrent. The reason for this is that if there is a violent hailstorm, he would only be able to collect in proportion to the total amount of insurance he carries. If there was a \$400 loss from that hail storm, he would only be able to collect in proportion to the total amount of insurance he carries. If there was a \$400 loss from that hail storm, he could only collect \$200. This is due to the apportionment clause in the policy.

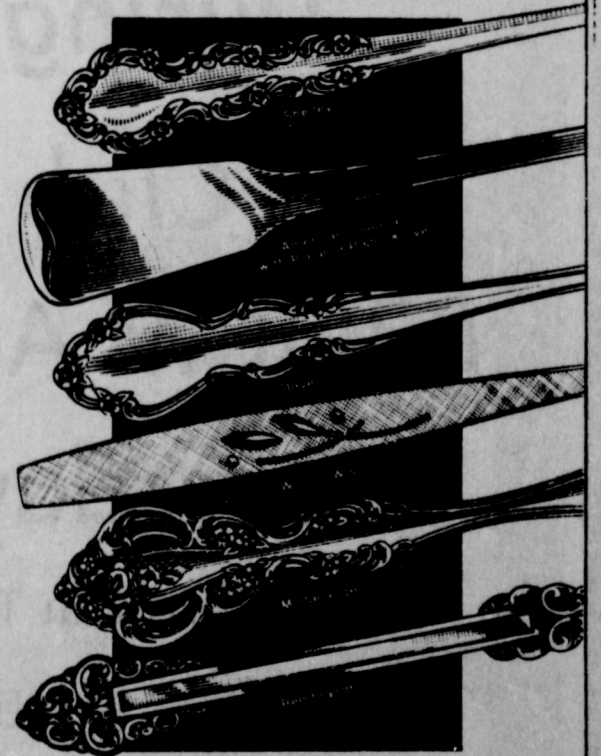

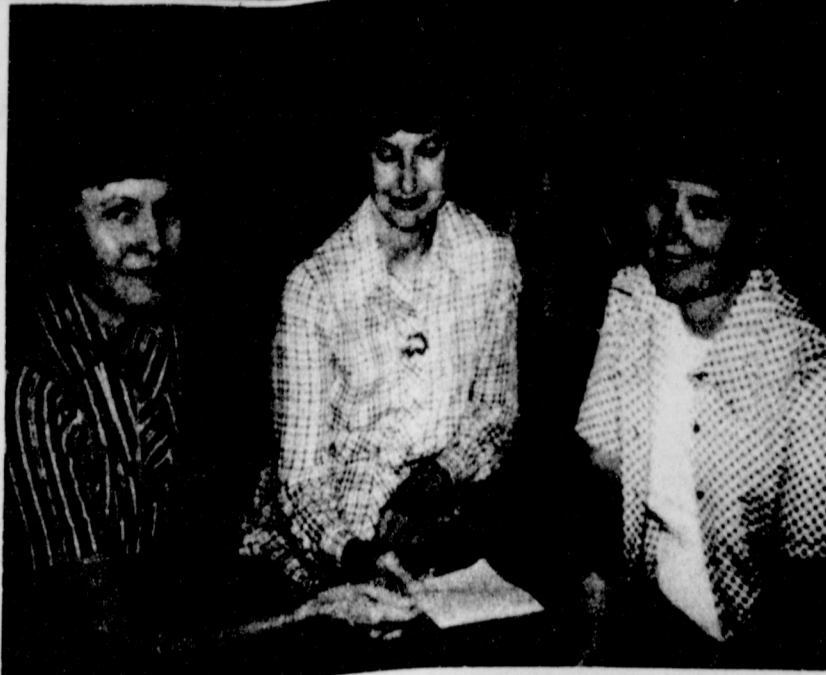

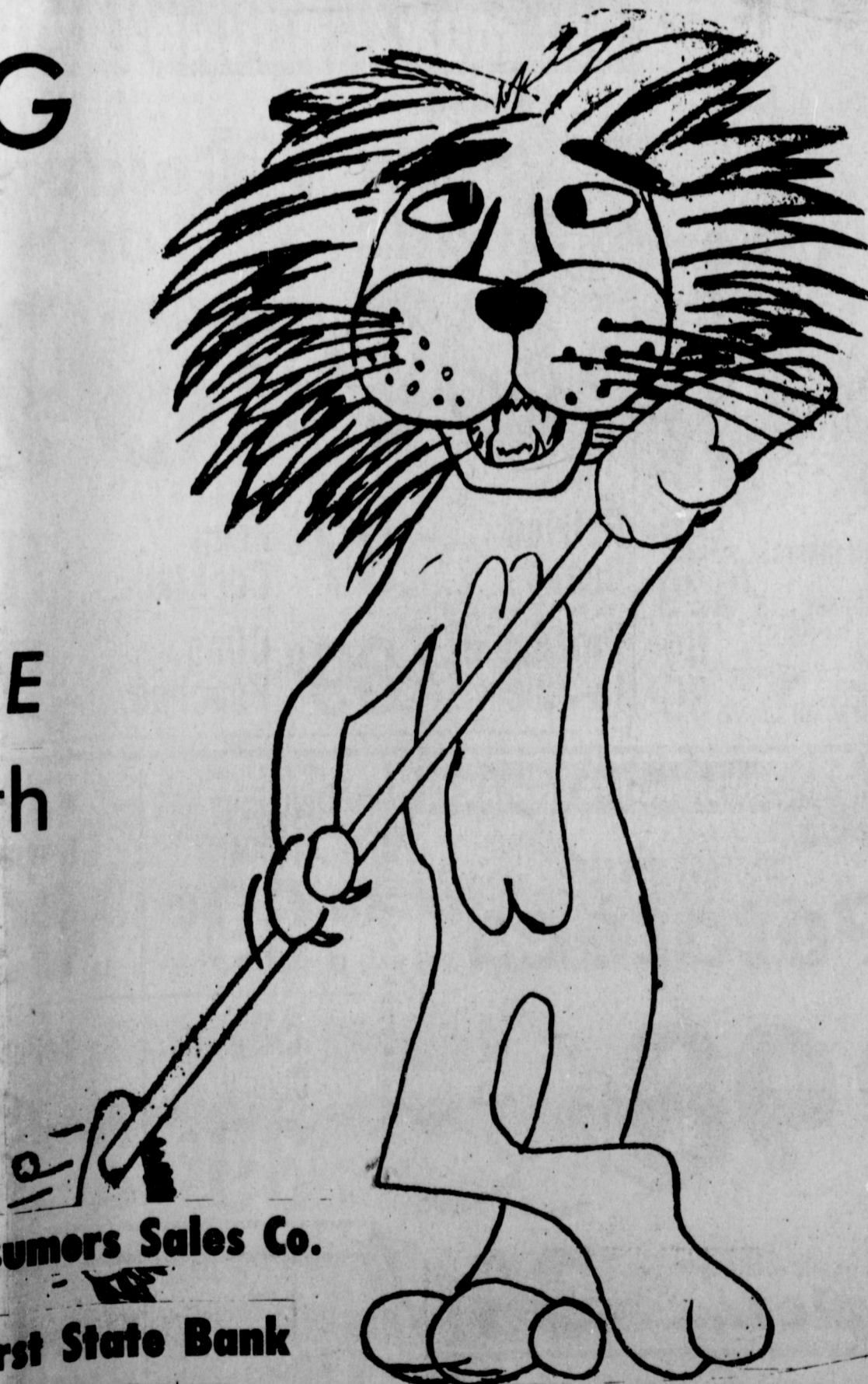
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found 2 illegal aliens; Orlando Garcia and Fidel Segura who were arrested and found to be illegal aliens. They were deported.

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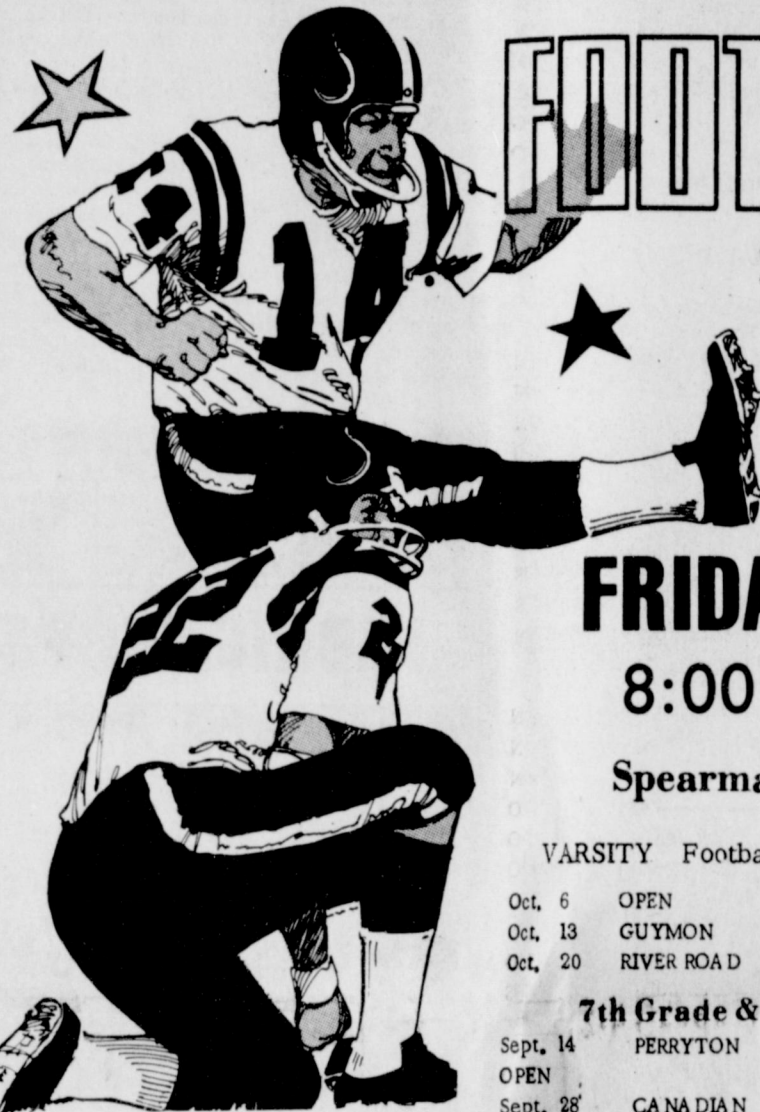
