### 28 Girls Will Compete For Miss Hansford Title

Religious services marked the beginning of the annual Hansford County Celebration last night. Events will continue through Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Jordan Grooms, pastor of the Polk Street Methodist Church, spoke at a community-wide religious services in the First Baptist Church last night. Tonight the activities will be a little square as the Do-Si-Do Square Dance club of Spearman has a big square dance in the Community Building.

Friday night will be the first big crowd night. In the Spearman High School Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. 28 county girls will be competing for the Miss Hansford title. The winner will be crowned by Miss Jane Hoy, the girl who now has the title. Rho Rho chapter of Beta Sigma Phi will host a tea for the contestants and judges at 3 p.m. Friday.

Master of Ceremonies for the contest will be Jim Cherry.

Friday afternoon at 2 p.m. the Spearman FFA will have the first of their three rodeo performances. The first one will be a high school rodeo. Sat. and Sun. afternoon the performances will be open to all amateur performers.

Friday night there will be a teen-age dance in the Community building with the Riveras playing.

Saturday the parade at 10:30 a.m., will begin the activities for the day. After the parade the Jaycees will begin serv-

ing barbecue. The tickets for the meal for \$1 and \$1.50.

The rodeo will keep things hopping during the afternoon and that night there will be a Western Dance at the Community building.

Sunday afternoon the final performance of the rodeo will complete the celebration.

This year's show is being staged by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. All profits will go into civic projects such as work in the Little League park, scholarships for students and other Jaycee projects.

### Police Chief Resigns Job Effective July 29

Spearman Police Chief Wayne Pierce has resigned his position here effective July 29.

Pierce turned in his letter of resignation Tuesday and asked that it become effective at the end of July.

He said he had made application for the Texas Highway Patrol. If accepted, he will enter the training school for patrolmen in August.

Pierce has been Chief of Police here for two years. He began working here in March, 1964, after serving on the Amarillo Police Department for several years.

As Spearman Chief of Police he was head of a four-man

department. Pierce is active in the Junior Chamber of Commerce and has worked with youth since coming here.

A second employee of the city has resigned her position in the city hall. Mrs. Evelyn Lemons has resigned as a clerk and is moving to Amarillo.

She is being replaced by T. J. Pittman who resigned as custodian at the courthouse.

City Manager Darc Foshee said the city was not taking applications for the Chief of Police job. Foshee said he thought the council would find a new chief in the two months before Pierce leaves.

## HOMEMAKING NOTES

With warmer weather approaching, we will begin consuming more ice cream and frozen treats. In fact, an estimate from the International Association of Ice Cream Manufacturers says that this year you will eat an average of 21 quarts of ice cream, ice milk, water ice, and other frozen treats.

Although plain vanilla, chocolate, and strawberry (in that order) are the national favorites, there are more than 200 different ice cream flavor combinations available under twice that number of fanciful names.

New flavors appear every year. They include nut mixtures, all kinds of fruits, and candy flavors like peppermint and toffee. At the present time there are three dozen chocolate variations, a dozen versions each of cherry and strawberry, and coffee in half a dozen blends. In addition, sherbet comes in fourteen flavors, and ice cream is combined with baked goods (cakes, rolls, tarts) to make the selection almost limitless.

**Glossary of Terms**  
Frozen treats vary according to ingredients and come under an assortment of names. Government standards are established for "frozen desserts" (although many items are snack foods or meal accompaniments).

**Ice Cream**, according to government standards, must contain a minimum of 10 per cent milk fat (premium ice cream may contain as much as 18 per cent), and 20 per cent total milk solids. Sugar content ranges between 12 and 17 per cent. Usually rich and creamy, ice cream varies in texture, sweetness, and flavor to cater to consumer preferences in various areas.

**Ice Milk** resembles ice cream in appearance, but contains between 2 and 7 per cent milk fat. It has approximately the same sugar content as ice cream.

**Sherbet** has even less milk fat than ice milk--between 1 and 2 per cent. The sugar content, however, is higher--in the neighborhood of 28 per cent.

Federal standards require the addition of a small amount of edible acid to make sherbet distinctively different from ice milk and give it characteristic tartness.

**Water ice** is similar in texture and flavor to sherbet, but contains no milk fat. It is essentially a frozen mixture of sugar, water, fruit juice, and edible acid.

**Mellorine-type products** are sold in only thirteen states. (They are unknown in the Northeast.) Fat derived from vegetable or animal sources (not milk) and sugar content approximate that of ice cream.

**French ice cream** (frozen custard) is ice cream with eggs or egg yolk solids added to the mix before it's frozen. Closely resembling plain ice cream, its frequently "premium," with a high milk-fat content.

**Dietary dairy dessert** is not manufactured in all states. For those who wish to limit sugar or calorie intake, it is made with an artificial sweetener (often saccharine) substituted for sugar.

**Bisque** refers to ice cream to which a bakery product has been added before freezing. Commonly used are macaroons, lady fingers, grape nuts, and sponge cake. "Biscuit Tortoni" is probably the most famous bisque.

**Pudding** is a frozen dessert (frozen custard, ice cream, or ice

milk) with more fruit than ice cream.

**Mousse** is frozen whipped cream to which sugar, flavoring and/or fruits have been added. Usually molded, it is somewhat richer than ice cream.

**Frappe** is an ice, frozen to slushy consistency, and served in that condition.

**Spumoni** is a fancy ice cream commonly made in a cup shape. The "cup" is usually vanilla ice cream, which is then filled with chocolate mousse (or ice cream) and another flavor (usually strawberry).

**Baked Alaska** is an ice-cream cake or pie frosted with meringue which is quickly browned in the oven.

**Souffle** is sherbet with egg yolks added.

**Calories and Nutrition**

A restaurant dip of vanilla ice cream (1/9 quart) contains slightly less than half a hot dog or half an egg, plus small amounts of vitamin A, B-complex, calcium, and phosphorus. It has about 135 calories, approximately 20 calories more

than ice milk, fruit sherbet, or water ice.

Ice cream should be planned as part of a day's meals, even when it's a snack, and not counted as an "extra."

**Home Storage**

Frozen treats should be kept firmly frozen; softening or partial melting and then refreezing coarsens the texture. Keep at 2° to 5° below zero in the freezer in a moisture-proof container for up to a month, or in an ice tray in the ice-cube compartment of the refrigerator (with control at coldest setting) for a few hours.

Happy "cool" eating this summer.

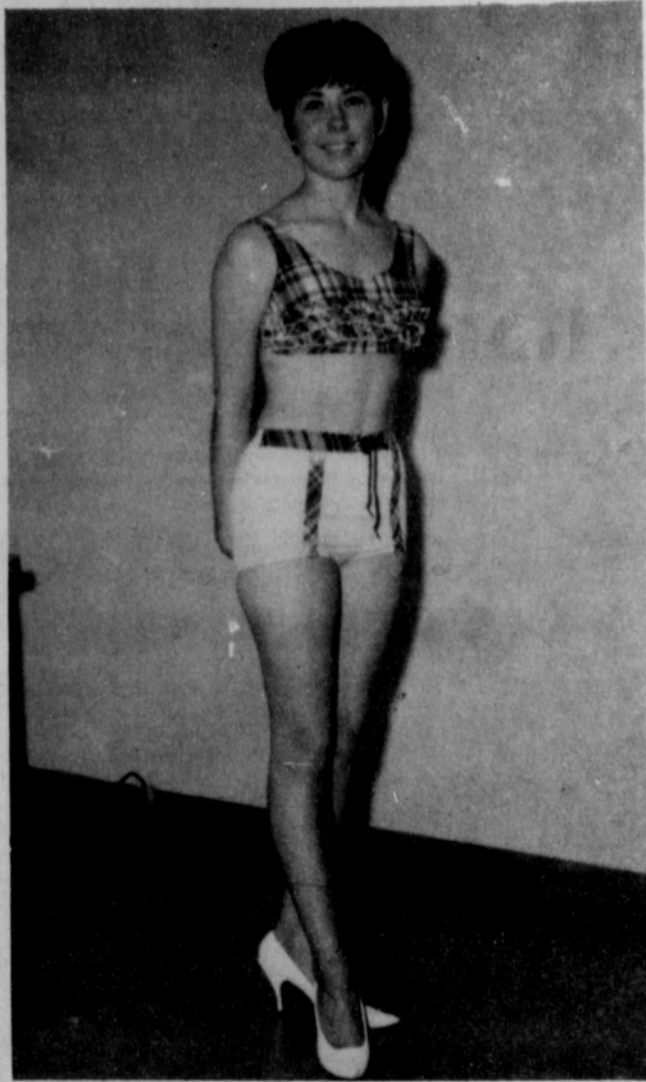

It's a sort of cookie, but there doesn't seem to be any particular name for it. Betty bakes the cookies in a teflon-lined cookie pan, doing away with need for greasing.

Mix 2 cups Bisquick, 4 eggs, 1 box brown sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla. (You can add 1 cup chopped nuts, coconut, dates or whatever you like, or they're good plain.) Spread thin in a cookie pan and bake at 350 degrees about 20 minutes or until done. (These are somewhat like brownies, so don't overcook.)

Swarms of winged termites in a home is good evidence that a well established colony of the insects is nearby. But, point out Phil Hamman, assistant Extension entomologist at Texas A&M University, it doesn't always mean they are coming from the house. They can fly in from other locations.

The subterranean group of soil-inhabiting termites is most common in Texas. Their presence is usually indicated by the sudden appearance of swarms of the winged insects in buildings during the spring. Important signs also are the earthen tunnels or runways built by the insects on the inside or outside of foundation walls, says Hamman.

The swarming termites have four silvery wings of equal length which are about twice as long as their body. The wings break off soon after swarming takes place and are usually evident in the swarming area. The winged termites are sexually mature and produce the workers and soldiers which are wingless. The workers, says the entomologist, are pearly white and make the tunnels or galleries on wood and other materials.

# Girls Attain H.S. Honors But Boys Excel in College

Girls take the scholastic honors in high school, but the honors go to the boys in college, according to L. L. Laws, Counselor at Spearman High School.

To find why 12 of 13 schools in the area had girls with the highest grade averages and girls dominating the honor ranks, Laws did some research and came up with some interesting facts.

Interests and maturity seem to be the biggest factors in girls dominating the scholastic records in high school.

Laws says research shows that girls mature sooner than boys and this maturity gives them a greater interest in education. This maturity causes them to

apply themselves to their studies better.

Almost every study shows that more boys than girls as under-achievers in secondary school. This means the boys are not using their abilities to the best advantage in school work.

Boys in studies have shown they are interested in exploring life, but not through "book learning". This causes them to lose interest in school and they are unable to understand how any teacher can say anything that will benefit them.

Boys also achieve a sense of accomplishment from many physical things, such as athletics, and other things that do not require book study.

They also have a feeling that making high grades tends to make them look "sissy".

In college the situation changes. The boy catches up in maturity and education becomes important in his plans for the future.

With the increased awareness of his educational needs, the boys move forward, while the girls become sidetracked.

In the college years the girls become more interested in finding a husband and starting a home, than in maintaining high grades.
