The Plainsman learned of the Eatep's resignation when they placed an ad in the paper to sell their house.
The energetic director said
he hated to leave Spearman because the high school had both the talent and the money for a good choral music pro$\underset{\text { He sam, }}{\text { gram }}$
He said with the talent there is in the school and the student's willingness to work, there is no limit as to what could be done.
"This year's choir has the best tenor section I have heard in a high school choir," he commented.
Estep was hired as the public school music teacher for all the grades and organized the

Last weekend I had the priviledge of attending a high school exes banquet in my hometown. During the evening I couldn't help but think of that television commercial about the two classmates who see each other many years after graduation. One looks like a glowing 19-year old fashion model and the other is haggard and well-weathered, obviously not using the right kind of "beauty" soap.
As I sat there, noticing how everyone had changed, I wondered into which category I fit. I had some idea a little later when someone said "I didn't recognize you for a minute."

I was really enjoying the recognition of classes by years until Burl, in too loud a voice, said "Okay, Day, get ready, you're next, " just as the 1922 graduates were standing.
Since my Dad is retiring at the end of this year after serving as Superintendent of Schools in Memphis for the last 29 years, he was specially honored at the banquet,
I have always known he is "extra special" but it was really a delight to hear a glowing public tribute to him for all his many achievements and years of service.
When he was elected as superintendent back in 1935, he was the top man among 65 candidates for the job. He has served as a winning coach during war years when male teachers were scarce, a successful teacher when the occasion demanded,
and besides his other duties, found time to coach tennis up and besides his other duties, found time to coach tennis up until about three or four years ago- taking his team to the state finals twice.
He is a highly intelligent individual who sought for himself a better life than he knew as a youngster in a very poor and very large family in South Texas. He worked his way through college, also sending two younger brothers after he graduated. A few years ago, he received his Ph ; D. but he still prefers that people not put "Dr." before his name partly because he has known to many "eggheads" with fancy titles in his day. Notwithstanding several strong opponents with whom he has coped as members of his school board over the years, W.C. Davis is a master in the art of handling people.
I guess that's pretty obvious though, since he has held the post as head of the Memphis Schools for 29 years, the longest tenure of any superintendent in this area.
Speaking of schools, be sure you find time Saturday to vote in the school board election. And speaking of elections, Tuesday is also a voting day, for the offices of mayor and councilmen. It only takes a few minuts to vote. . . and it's importance far outweighs anything else you'll probably dowith the time.

## In Our Own State

Major crime in Texas soared to a new high in 1963 as a felony was committed on an average of every two and a half minutes during the year, it was reported today by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.
Garrisonsaid that crimes reported to the Department tocaled 229, 254 in 1963, representing an increase of 5.8 per cent over 1962, and a hike of 99.6 per cent over the total for 1963.
The crime rate per 100,000 population increased from 2,261 offenses in 1962 to 2, 393 in 1963. Ten years ago, the rate was recorded at 1,583 crimes per 100,000 persons in Texas.
The annual crime report showed an increase in each of the seven major felonies tabulated, as follows:
Murder and homicide, up 8.5 per cent; rape, up 14.2 per cent; robbery, up 10.6 per cent; burglary, up 4.9 per cent; aggravated assault, up . 4 per cent; theft, up 6.6 2.8 per cent.
"The constant rise in law-
" lessness in the past 10 years is a shocking and shameful com-
mentary on the conduct of our society in our time, " Garrison said. "The ever-increasing disregard for law and order in this era cannot be blamed entirely on the increase in population, because the rise in crime is consistently outstripping the population increase.
"It should serve as a challenge to every responsible Texan to examine every possible means of combatting this menace to his community and take appropriate action.
The Public Safety Director noted that Texas is not alone in the crime explosion. He said that while Texas suffered an increase of 5.8 per cent from 1962 to 196?, crime in the United States as a whole, as measured by the FBI Crime Index, rose 10 per cent last year.

In order to point up the frequency with which crime occurred in Texas during 1963, the DPS Statistical Services calculated that one murder occurred every 8 hours, rape every 6 and one half hours, robbery every 3 hours, burglary every 9 minutes, aggravated auto theft every 31 minutes.

tected place in the middle of the barn and calves should be with milk cows so they can suckle and reduce the discomfort of the cows' udders.
Other livestock should be placed in the best shelter avallable, even a shed without sides gives some protection, if build-
ing or shed space is not avall ing or shed space is not avallable for allivestock, those outside should be put in a yard near farm buildings, or grouped together since they could offer each other some protection.
It is essential that stockhave non-contaminated food and water if we are to guard against internal radiation, Protection against this hazard consists of providing adequate cover for food and water to prevent fallout dust from becoming incorporated into these materials. Feed from covered barns would be safe, haystacks could be used If covered by a tarpaulin, or
made safe by removing the out-
side layer of hay. If only a limited reserve of clean feed is available, it should be used for milk cows and other breeding animals.
