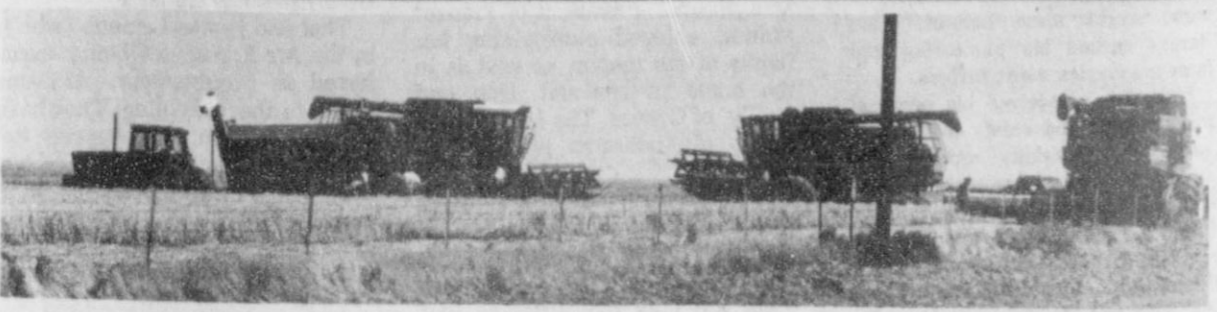

Harvest winding down

Harvest is winding down in the county with almost everyone through with the harvest that came relatively early this year. The wheat this year was hurt some by rust. Some farmers thought that the rust had hurt their wheat yield about 25%. This was an unusual year for wheat, some of the dryland wheat made more than irrigated. Dryland wheat averaged about 30 bushels and irrigated wheat made about 45 to 60 bushels. Some wheat east of town received some hail in a thunderstorm Monday night. The price of the wheat was still below the \$3.00 mark and was registered at the \$2.90 price earlier.

The honor classes this year 1932-33-34-35. They will be introduced in the assembly. The honor classes will be given complimentary tickets for the barbecue.

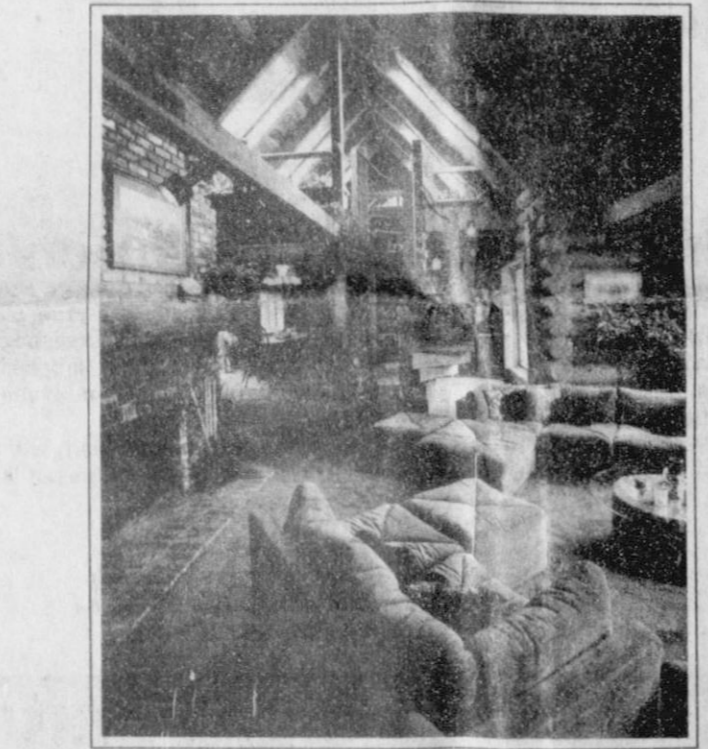

Commissioners discuss budget

County Commissioners met Monday in regular session, hearing minutes of last meeting, ordering bills paid etc.

They set the salary for Judge McClellan's new secretary, Donna Yarbrough.

Discussion was held on the Fair Labor Standards Act which the county now comes under. They have been exempt since 1976 from this wage and hour law. They ordered employees to keep time sheets during July so they can tell how much overtime is used.

Judge McClellan stated that he thought that the overtime which is mainly in the sheriff's office could be kept to a minimum.

They also discussed budget items. McClellan also stated that the new chair lift is ready to use by anyone disabled or unable to climb stairs. This was installed in order to comply with Federal law so that the county could continue to get revenue sharing money.

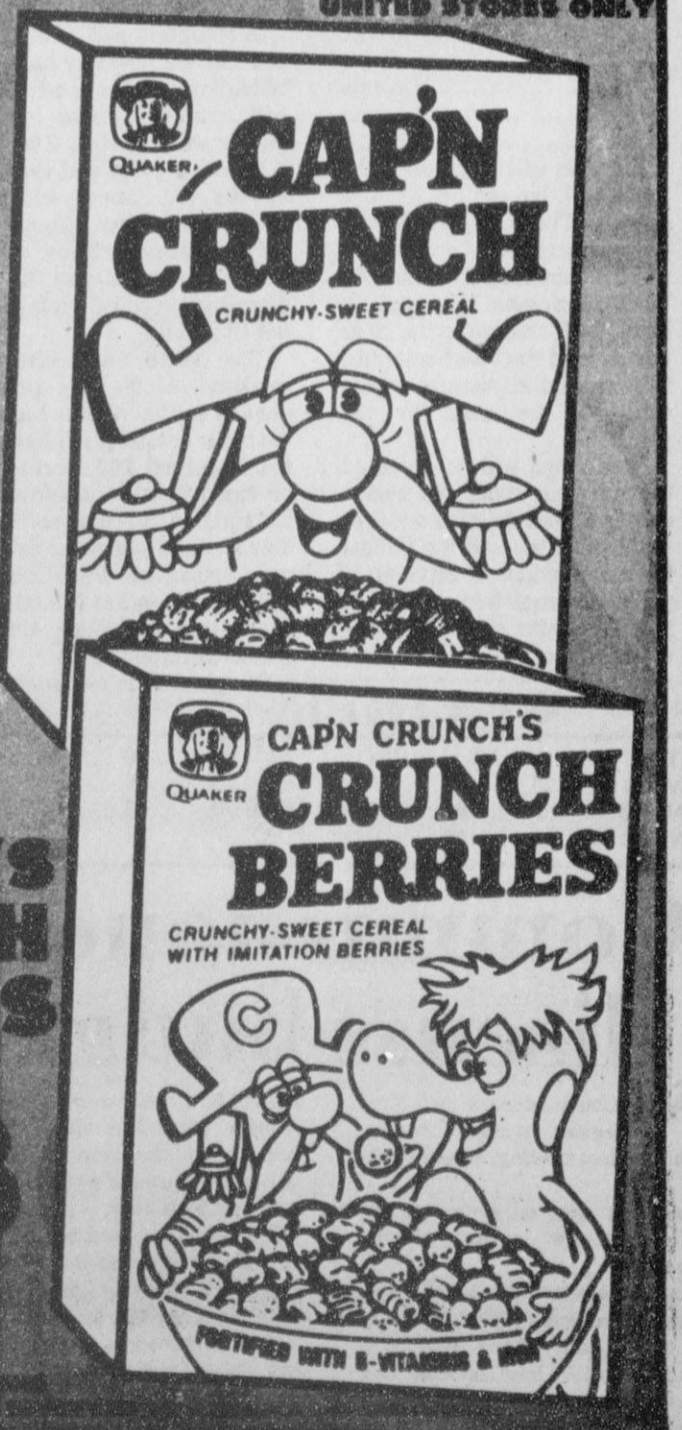

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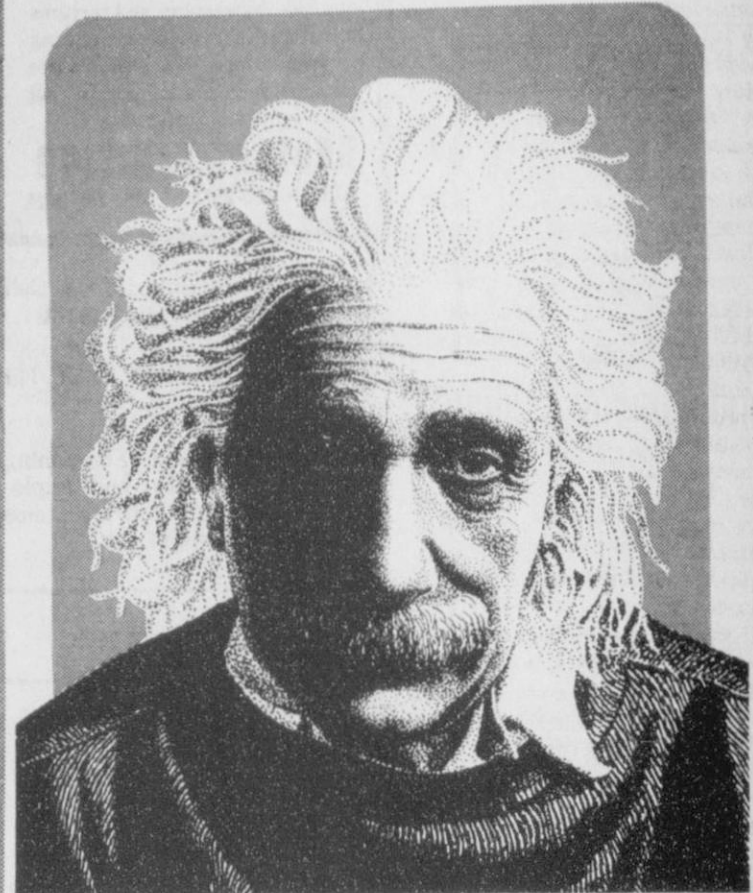

New directories to be delivered

New GTE telephone directories, celebrating the Texas Sesquicentennial (150 yrs.) on the cover, will be mailed to customers in Perryton, Booker, Follett, Darrouzett, Higgins, Libscomb and Spearman beginning June 20, 1985.

According to Robert J. Meyers, Operations Manager for General Telephone, customers should begin referring to the instruction pages of the new directory due to important number changes for repair service, billing questions and buried cable information which are effective July 1st.

Meyers urges all customers to review the entire information section in the front part of the directory for other useful items such as:

- emergency police & fire dept. numbers
- local, long distance and international dialing information
- area code maps and listings
- billing and payment information
- telephone safety tips
- annoyance and threatening call procedures
- telephone company policies
- instructions on how to connect or disconnect your telephone
- custom calling features & instructions
- even postal zip codes for towns in our area

If you do not receive your new directories by July 15th, or if you need additional directories, you should contact the GTE business office. The phone company does have a policy on the number of free directories that are furnished to customers, but Meyers said consideration will be given to special requests.

New number for GTE repair service

Beginning July 1, telephone customers will need to dial a new number to reach GTE's repair service. That number is 1-918-456-0202.

Robert J. Meyers, Operations Manager for General Telephone said the change is brought about by the Company's conversion to a new, efficient trouble administration system. Instead of handling and processing repair requests and records on the old paper IBM cards, GTE has each of its offices in the Oklahoma Division connected to an on-line computer system.

This allows a repair clerk at a centralized location to have instant access to any customer's repair records, take the customer's trouble report and immediately refer it to the proper testing and dispatching location.

The efficiencies gained by centralized repair reporting are a benefit to the customer as well as the telephone company. The repair answer centers are staffed with trained employees 24 hours per day, each day of the year, to provide quick response to customer repair calls. Any request of an emergency nature, during or after normal working hours, is immediately referred to a GTE supervisor for handling.

The new repair number (which is toll free from GTE exchanges), is listed in the new GTE telephone directories that will be distributed to all customers during June and July.

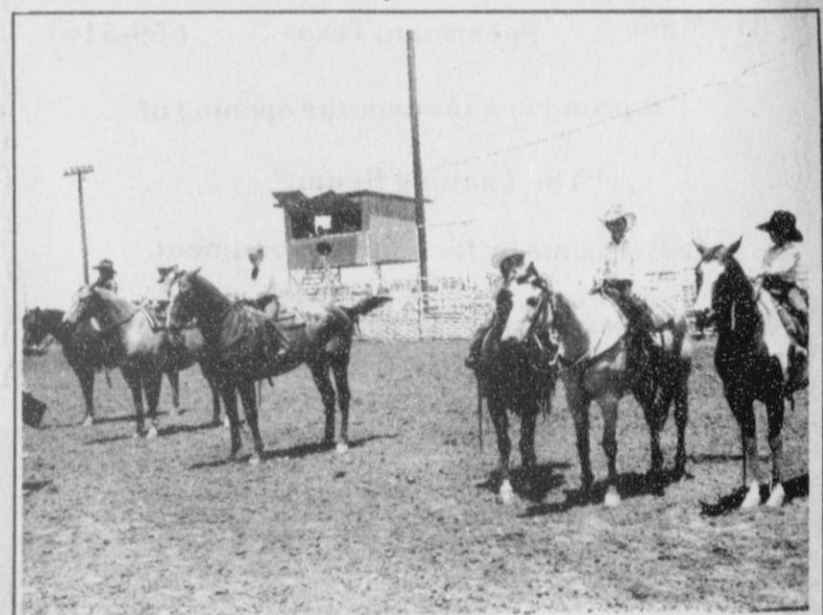

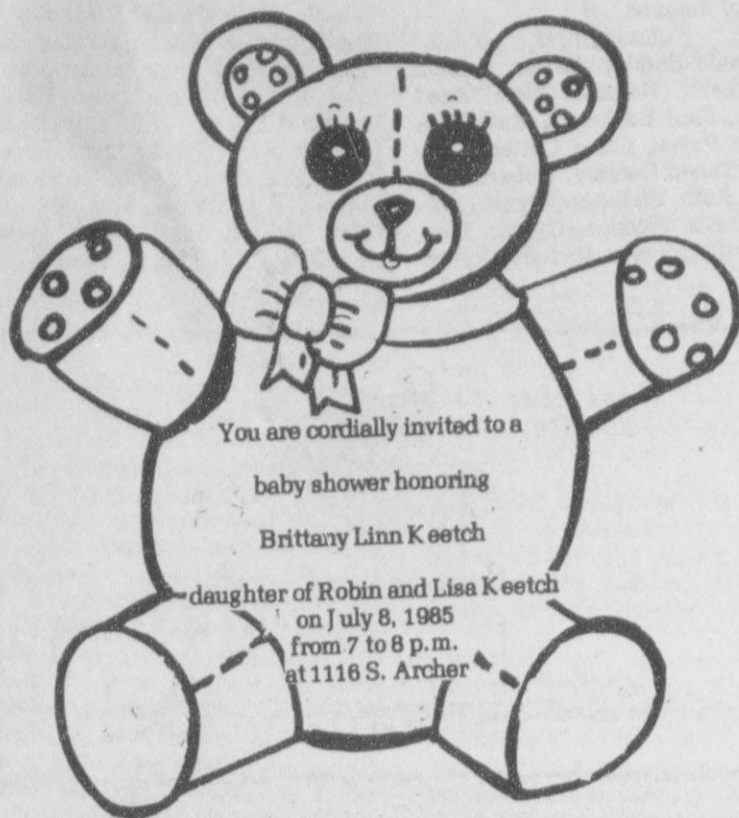

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Mommy said "No"

Spend over ten minutes with any child and you'll run into a problem parents face every day - your will versus his or hers. And you'll have to answer the same question that parents ask. "Should I spank my child? Will he understand if we just talk about it? How should I discipline my child?"

Unfortunately, there is no hard and fast rule for disciplining children. Raising children is a difficult and complicated task, requiring good judgement, flexibility and a careful evaluation of each situation. In the following paragraphs, I'm going to suggest some ways to help parents as they are dealing with this question.

First, what is your goal? What do you hope to accomplish with your child by disciplining? I would suspect, when faced with a rebellious or disobedient child, that this question goes unanswered. Ultimately, we want to teach our children right from wrong, possibly to be obedient to authority, and to be self-disciplined. Keeping those goals in mind, we move on to how to discipline.

Before we go any further, let me say that I am neither for nor against spanking. A few swats on the fanny won't cause brain damage or severe emotional trauma, as long as the child is not spanked 1) in anger, 2) hard enough to leave bruises, or 3) without a reasonable explanation for the spanking. "Because" or "Daddy is disappointed with you," are not appropriate explanations for children (or anyone else, for that matter). "Cleaning your room is your job, and when you don't do your job, there are consequences" is a clear reason, with the task and the misdemeanor clearly stated.

Giving an explanation to a child will help him or her to do two things. First, it improves reasoning skills and introduces the idea of "natural consequences." For example, when you tell a child to be home at 8:00, add the explanation, "because you need your rest so you won't be tired for school tomorrow." The natural consequence of coming home after 8:00 is that the child will be tired at school. Secondly, it teaches the child to

plan. Using the 'if...then' principle of reasoning, a child learns that if he wants to do XX, then he must also do YY. If he doesn't do YY, then he won't be allowed to do XX.

By disciplining in this way, you are giving your child skills that he or she will be able to use long after they have left home and your supervision. By effective discipline, your child learns how to control himself at school, at work, in marriage and with his own children, and that, essentially, is the goal of discipline.

One final word. Be consistent. As with children, there are natural consequences for every behavior. If today you tell your child not to watch TV until his chores are done, and tomorrow you tell your child it's ok to watch TV before his chores are done, you are working against yourself. The natural consequence of that is a confused and disobedient child and frustrated and embarrassed parents. If you say, "Pick up your room NOW or else," decide what the 'or else' is and do it, NOW. When your child knows that you won't follow through with discipline, they have no reason to obey you. There are no natural consequences.

Discipline, as with any difficult task, requires planning, a calm mind and a clear picture of the goals. Keep this in mind and raising children can be a pleasure for both of you and your child.

Fireworks related injuries

Parades, picnics and fireworks displays are all July Fourth traditions enjoyed by most Americans. Another, often overlooked tradition, comes in the aftermath of the holiday—those news reports about people blinded, maimed, or killed by fireworks related injuries.

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness, reports that in 1984, fireworks related injuries rose 19 percent over the previous year. An estimated 9,857 people required hospital emergency room treatment last year, 1,255 of them having sustained eye injuries.

"Fireworks are not toys," cautions Dr. J. Franklin Howell, Medical Advisor of the Amarillo Branch. "Yet, 74 percent of all those people injured last year were under age 24. Without doubt, we need to keep fireworks out of the hands of young people."

In a recent study conducted by Arkansas ophthalmologists, bottle rockets were found to be a leading cause of fireworks-related injuries there.

The study revealed that nearly three-fourths of all injuries resulting in permanent vision loss were sustained by people harmed by bottle rockets.

"Small, but lethal, a bottle rocket is a single firecracker attach-

ed to a stick, and shot from a stationary object. Usually, the suggested object is a pipe. However, more often than not, people use soda-pop bottles," says Dr. Howell.

According to the National Society to Prevent Blindness, these bottles can explode. Glass shrapnel thrown during the explosion can strike the face and eyes of bystanders, often causing severe, painful and irreversibly blinding injuries.

Among the other commonly available fireworks involved in injuries are firecrackers, M-80s, Roman candles, salutes and snakes. Even sparklers are unsafe. The Society says that a blinding burn can result if the sparkler makes contact with the eye.

"We recommend that people enjoy fireworks the one safe and sane way this July Fourth," Dr. Howell adds. "That is, view them at a licensed public display. Not on a street corner or in the backyard."

Established in 1908, the National Society to Prevent Blindness is the oldest voluntary health agency nationally engaged in preventing blinding through a comprehensive program of community services, public and professional education and research.

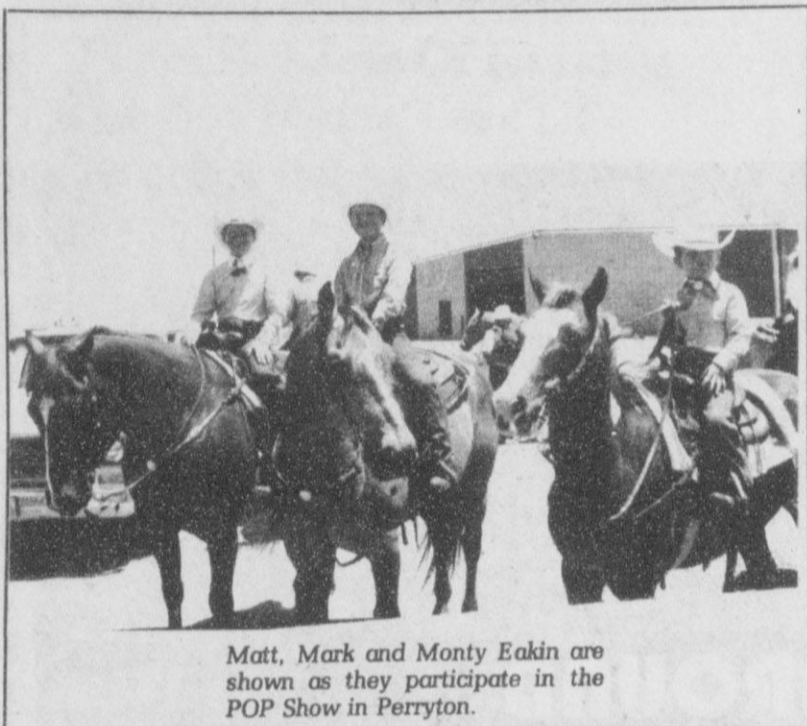
The sessions on public speaking were given by Jackie Sparks of Gruver and John Holman. A motivation

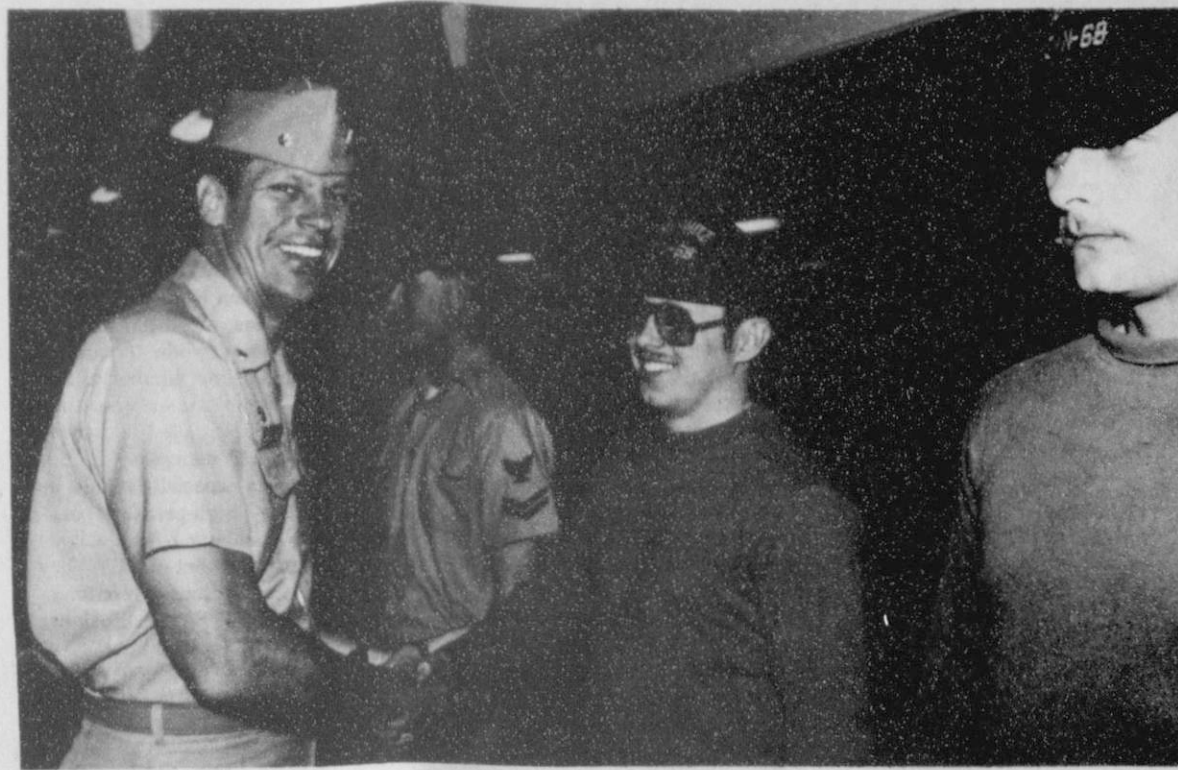

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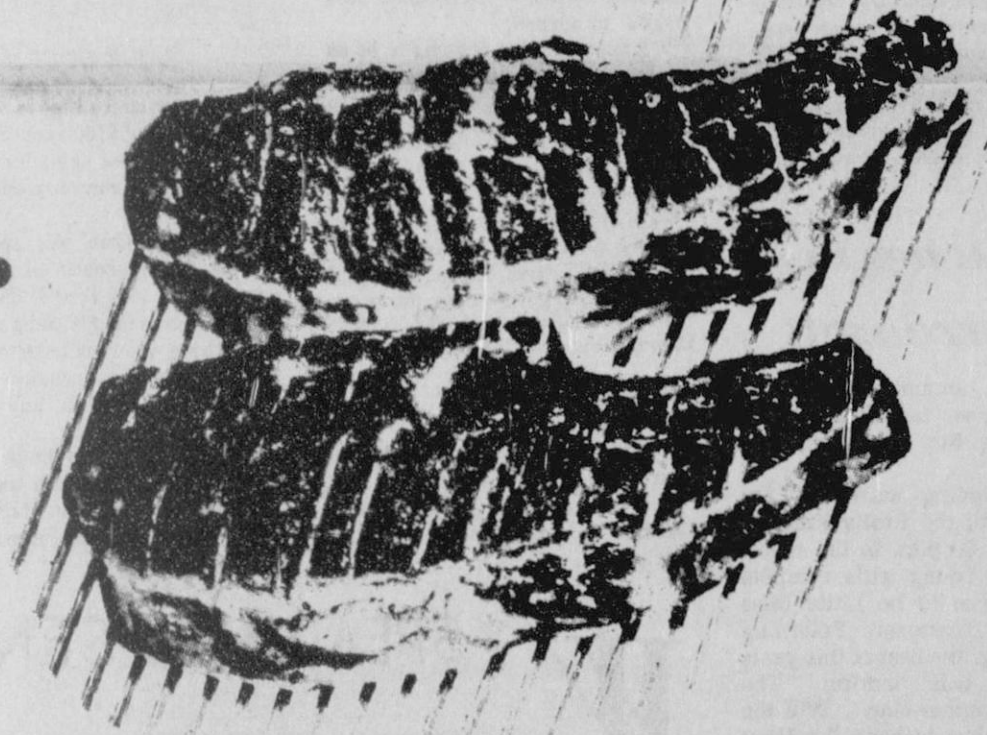

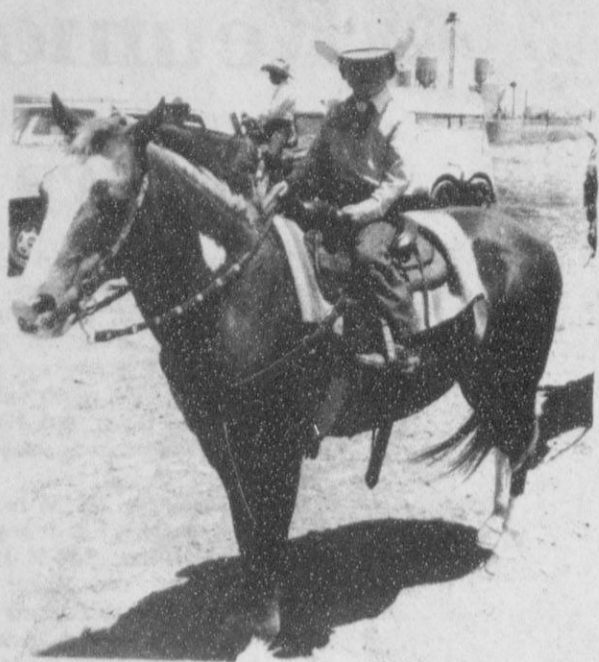

PSU will not close

A recent petition that was signed in the Oklahoma House of Representatives calling for the closing of the University of Arts and Sciences at Chickasha and Panhandle State University was unfortunate. The petition signed by eighteen legislators had no effect of law and was born out of frustrations and the desire to strike back at someone the petition signers viewed as being opposed to their goals concerning taxes. It was viewed by many as a type of pressure tactic to persuade Senator Tim Leonard to vote as the petitioners wished. President Tom Palmer at Panhandle State University said, "This move was unwelcome and came at a very inappropriate time when most legislative leaders were working hard to pass a tax package for the state of Oklahoma." President Palmer continued, "I cannot understand the actions of these representatives because Senator Leonard and Representative Hill from the Panhandle and northwest Oklahoma have always been supportive of education. I have visited with numerous legislative leaders and the

petition was treated in many instances as a joke. I do not consider this a joke when a fine educational institution has been maligned in this matter. It is kind of ironic that we have just concluded celebrating our 75th Anniversary here at Panhandle State University and were really on a high note and then something like this comes up. I wish to inform all people in the area and the students who attended here that Panhandle State University has been in existence for 75 years and will certainly be in existence for many years in the future. Our strong academic programs will continue, and as always we will serve as a center in public service for cultural and athletic activities. It would have been easy to strike out and use the same tactics that were used by those who signed the petition, but this would not have been helpful to anyone.

"It appears there is going to be an adequate increase in appropriations for higher education this year, and we are looking forward to a banner year in 1985-86".

Beware of Fraudulent AARP Agents

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and various law enforcement agencies have been receiving an increasing number of complaints about sales agents who are fraudulently selling estate planning services by claiming to represent the AARP Trust Division. AARP has no Trust Division and no sales agents authorized to visit or telephone members.

Persons claiming to represent AARP services are currently active in north central Texas and use a P.P. Box in Edmond, Oklahoma.

Their general approach is to contact older persons who have responded to an advertising coupon from the National Estate Information Service in Washington, D.C.; this coupon allows people to request information on estate planning and/or the Uniform Gift to Minors Act. People are then contacted directly by individuals who want to deliver the "information" personally.

In similar cases in Weatherford,

Bridgeport, Decatur, and Wichita Falls, Texas, older persons have been deceived into turning over personal checks in the amount of \$963.00.

It has always been a very strict policy of AARP to limit the offering of any AARP services to informational mailings only. There are no authorized agents of official AARP service providers who contact members by phone or in person to sell insurance, financial services, or other products. AARP does not provide the name, address or telephone number of any members to organizations other than those officially designated to provide services to AARP members.

Older persons especially should be wary of any high-pressure sales approach, particularly by individuals who claim to represent AARP. 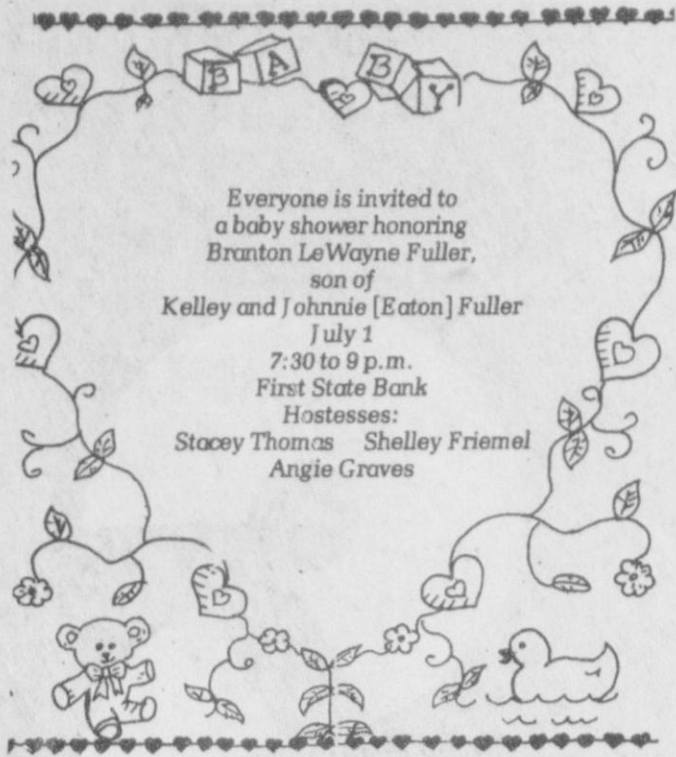

Karen's Kozy Korner

Recent tests on freezing cheese should be good news for those who would like the convenience of having a stock of their favorite cheeses on hand.

Ten different varieties of cheese proved successful for home freezing in tests reported by the Minnesota Experiment Station.

But the success depends on rapid freezing as well as the composition of the cheese.

The temperature in the freezer should be zero degrees F or lower, and the pieces or packages of cheese should weigh no more than one pound.

The varieties of cheese that were successfully frozen and kept in freezer storage for six months in the Minnesota tests were: Cheddar, Brick, Port du Salut, Swiss, Provoloni, Mozzarella, Liederkranz, Camembert, Parmesan and Romano.

The three brands of Blue cheese tested all became crumbly and mealy after freezing. But if Blue cheese is to be used for salad or dressings, this would not be a disadvantage and might make the cheese handier to use.

Since the cream cheese in the tests became watery and mealy, it is not recommended for freezing.

To freeze cheese, cut it in pieces no larger than one-pound size or use packaged cheese weighing no more than a pound. Small-size cheeses like Camembert and Liederkranz may be left in their original package or you can use an overwrap for extra protection.

Any cut cheese, such as wedges of Cheddar, should be closely wrapped in freezer-foil. Press the foil tight with the hands to keep out air. Freeze at zero F or lower, and thaw in the refrigerator.

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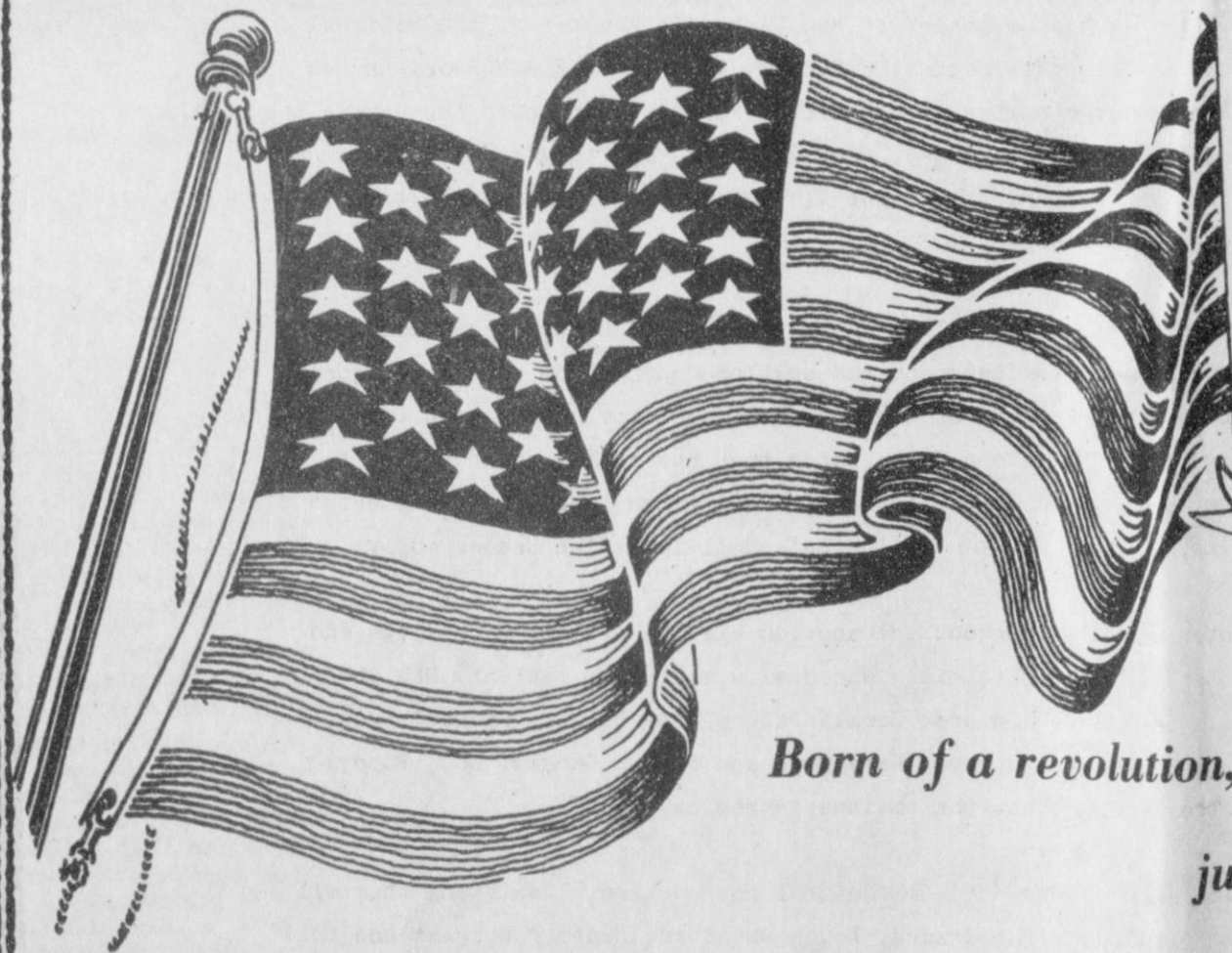
