# Jet-setter in the afterlife

Plagued with health problems most of her life, Vera Anderson of Medford, Ore., traveled little in her 78 years.

In death, however, she has become a jet-setter. Ross Anderson is fulfilling his mother's dying wish of touring the world by sending her ashes to more than 250 cities worldwide, including all 50 states.

Vera Anderson died in January after battling emphesema for 40 years. Relatives said she always wanted to see the world, but her ailments kept her home next to her oxygen tube.

Family members had her body cremated. Ross Anderson packaged portions of the ashes in sealed plastic bags, added a note asking its reader to find a nice place for the ashes, and then sent the bags out across the world.

# He's a gambling whiz

A British man won \$715,000 when a German soccer team outlasted its Spanish rivals in the Champions Cup final, completing a staggering 15-event wager that began for less than a buck.

The man, who has not been publicly identified, wagered only 42 cents with bookmakers William Hill on the outcome of the 15 events at total odds of 1,666,666 to 1.

"This is the most astonishing bet of its type that we have ever taken," Hill spokesman Graham Sharpe said.

# Five Lazbuddie students win state in UIL events

Five LazbuddieHigh School students brought home first places from the state University Interscholastic League competition held May 4-5 in Austin.

Shawndee Nichols and Kati Mimms were double winner, with two firsts apiece.

Nichols won as the first-place individual in accounting and worked with Mimms and Savannah Black to send Lazbuddie's accounting team into the top spot. Mimms was the second-highest individual and Black was fourth.

Mimms, in turn, was a member of the first-place computer science team, along with Jay Seaton and Tobin Redwine.

Other wins for Lazbuddie at state were Kayla Kimbrough, second in poetry interpretation; Mimms, fourth in computer science; Black, third in computer applications; and Seaton, fifth in compter science.

All the above students had won their events at regional.

Also qualifying for state competition was Elisabeth Thomas, who placed third in literary criticism at regional.



# Whitefly tests being conducted

WESLACO — Whiteflies, the scourge of many Texas crops, may be building up a resistance to a popular pesticide, so researchers are trying to stay a step ahead of the tiny bugs.

Entomologists at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Weslaco are combing the Lower Rio Grande Valley collecting whiteflies from melon fields.

Dr. T-X Liu, a vegetable integrated pest management entomologist at Weslaco,

said the project is intended to make sure whiteflies aren't developing a resistance to Admire, a widely used insecticide highly effective in the management of the insects in cantaloupes.

The tiny whiteflies weaken crops by feeding on plant sap and can carry plant diseases.

"It's important to know if and when an insect pest is becoming resistant to an effective insecticide so that we can tell growers to rotate that insecticide with others in order to maintain an effective level of insect management," Liu said.

In similar trials performed on cotton and melon aphids on cucumbers, Liu and his associates discovered that resistance rises and mortality rates of Admire decrease slightly after 12 generations.

"We were then able to advise growers that they should alternate their treatments of Admire with other insecticides to avoid a buildup of resistance. But we're not sure that this will be the case with whiteflies," he said.



# **Reactions Are Often Based** on Perception, Not Reality

It's quite obvious when you think about it, but people react to other people, situations, and issues on the basis of their perceptions of those people, situations, and issues, and not necessarily on the basis of reality.

I mean no particular disrespect to either breed, human or canine, but in that regard I think we humans generally operate a little below the level of man's best friend.

If you meet a dog in the park, thrust your hand out to pet the cute little beast, all the while sincerely holding nothing at all but love, warmth, kindness, and the very best of intentions in your human heart, BUT he nevertheless perceives your action as threatening, you may well draw back a bloody nub. He reacts, you see, not so much to reality as to his perception of reality. And he may be wrong.

If he's an exceptionally intelligent canine, he may later "learn" that his estimation of you and your intentions was flawed. Maybe you'll go on to help him reach a more realistic conclusion as you reach down more carefully to pet him with your remaining hand.

Or, probably more likely, he may run over the hill before you have an opportunity to change his opinion of you, and he may be even quicker to sink his teeth into the next human who quite innocently reaches out *her* hand. He may well go

on to his reward in doggy heaven a decade or two (in dog years) later still firmly wedded to the erroneous opinion that all humans who reach down to pet him are mean, malicious, mutt-haters. Now, he would be absolutely wrong, but he would believe deeply in his error and die not knowing that his perceptions were completely unfounded in reality.

I wish this sort of thing was only a problem with dogs. But I'm afraid that we humans are often just as witless and wrong when we react quickly, and very often poorly, just on the basis of our all-too-fallible perceptions. How hard it is for someone else who doesn't share our fouled up view of a particular person, situation, or issue to try to help us see reality when everything from our backgrounds, our upbringing, our unfortunate experiences, all the way to our lack of sleep and the state of our digestion conspires to cause us to have the wrong perceptions and, to some large or small extent, be absolutely blind to reality.

Then you know what happens, don't you? We go around biting folks who don't deserve to be bitten. And then too often they go off and bite someone else.

The fact that we are such poor judges both of reality and of the motives of our neighbors is one significant reason Jesus warned us not to spend time judging and criticizing those around us. You and I are very, very poor judges. Our dogs are pretty poor judges, too, but I personally would trust a dog with a good nose a lot farther than I'd trust a biting, barking, snapping, ill-tempered human.






