Those present were guest, Linda Crawford and members, Dwayne Smith, Fred Groves, Rusy Tindell and Steven Slater.

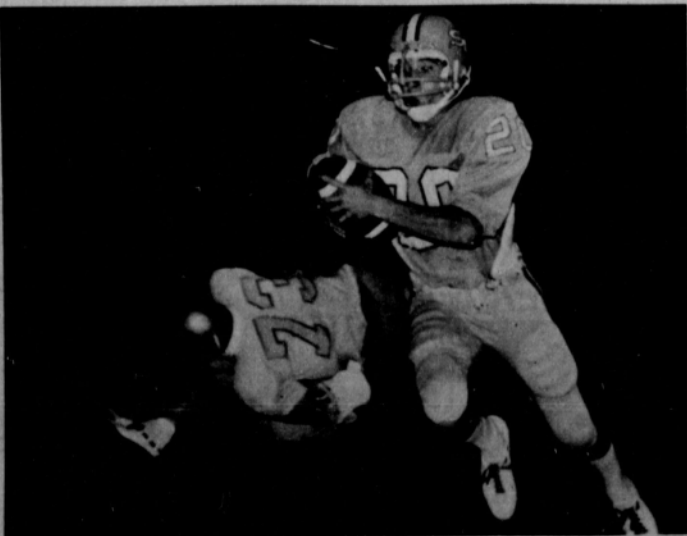

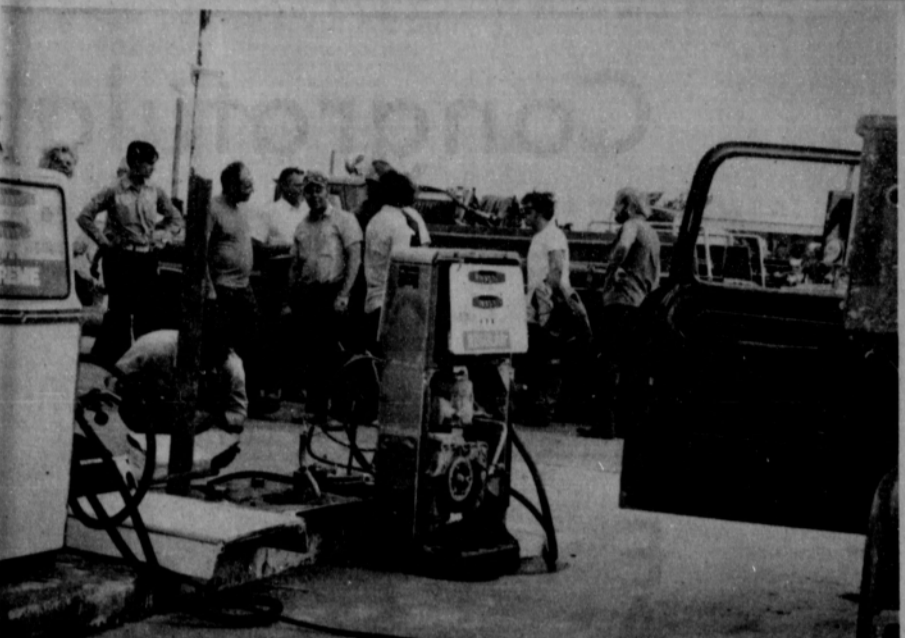
**Two Rural Accidents During May**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural high-ways in Hansford County during the month of May, 1975, according to Sergeant C. E. Henderson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no person killed and one person injured.  
 The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1975 shows a total of 11 accidents resulting in no persons killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1975, shows a total of 524 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 310 persons injured as compared to May, 1974, with 406 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 18 more accidents, eight less killed, and 92 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of May, 1975, occurred in the following counties: one each in Baylor, Parker, Terry, Yoakum, Moore, Swisher; two each in Clay and Armstrong; three in Potter; and four in Wilbarger.

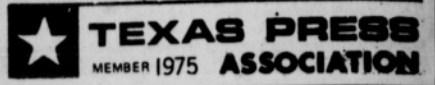

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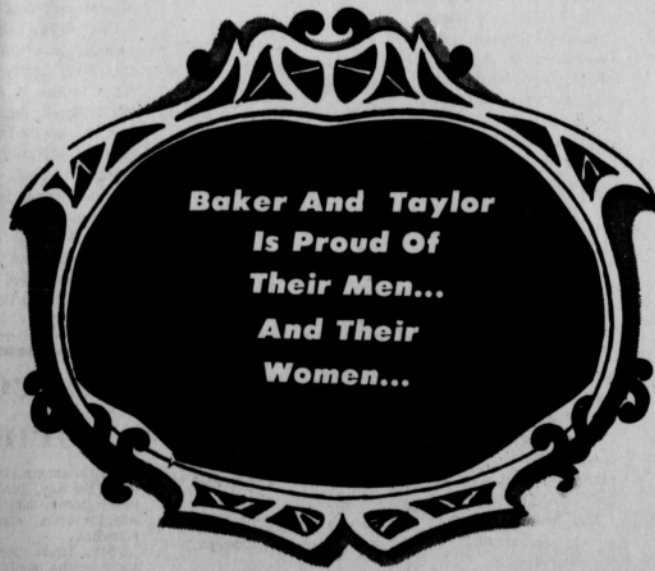

His duties include assisting local chambers of commerce in their efforts to inform area businesses and industries of benefits of the program designed to encourage and assist employers to hire more new workers in permanent and unsubsidized positions. In addition, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will participate in recognition ceremonies honoring employers whose participation in the TEXAS FIRST program has been outstanding.

Five state agencies, headed by the Texas Industrial Commission, are pooling their resources and experience to help local private enterprise expand their payrolls and production. Other agencies are Texas Education Agency, Texas Employment Commission, Texas Department of Community Affairs and Governor's Division of Planning Coordination.

"These agencies stand ready to help with such problems as determining expansion needs and feasibility, training of un-

skilled workers and locating responsible new employees," Smith said.

TEXAS FIRST program goals include placing at least 4,000 new workers in 80 businesses and industries throughout the state. This would mean a \$277 million boost annually to the state's economy.

### 4-Day District Convention Planned by Jehovah's Witnesses

A four-day district convention of Jehovah's Witnesses in Amarillo, July 3-6, will stress Divine solutions to human problems.

The meeting, expected to attract 5,000 delegates, will be held at the Amarillo Civic Center. The theme: "Divine Sovereignty."

K. E. Casper, circuit overseer of the Texas Panhandle & Western Oklahoma area, discussed the import of the program and stressed the human need of lasting peace and security.

"In recent decades," he said, "more and more talk has centered on the need for a world government of some kind. The problems affecting the human family are principally the same in all nations and yet solution to these problems has eluded us."

"The lack of trust among the leadership of nations is apparent," Casper said. "For example, consider one result of this distrust. Though they see how unwise it is, nations nearly ruin their economies to spend billions of dollars on armaments that they hope they will never have to use."

"And yet," he said, "in view of the repeated breaking of peace treaties, nations can see no reason to trust one another, and hence, believe that there is no alternative to such arms races."

no one should get the idea that the earth itself is responsible for man's problems—that it is, for example, incapable of growing enough food for everyone.

Citing a report by the United Nations Food and Agricultural Organization, Casper pointed out that the earth is capable of feeding many times as many people as now live in the world.

"Humans," he said, "have been mismanaging earth's food production as well as the distribution of that food."

"And too," he continued, "the energy crises of the past two years has eliminated many prior demands to clean up our polluted air, water and soil."

Commenting on the overall problem, Casper said that the basic factor in the inability of men to solve global problems is human selfishness.

Citing the key problems: armaments development and stockpiling, pollution, projected famines due to the worldwide population explosion and economic crisis with inflation, Casper said they have become a matter of grave concern.

The effect of selfishness, he said, produce such problems to man. "It is not only prevalent in organizations and nations, he continued, but exists in the very roots of human society."

Casper emphasized that thus, due to expediency, man is trying to delay reforms urgently needed to sustain human life in the future."

Casper stressed that global problems are too difficult for man to cope with.

"That does not mean this situation is hopeless," he concluded. "Although many people refuse to accept Divine intervention in human affairs as possible, nevertheless, it is true."

"God's purpose is to bless humankind with a righteous world government that will unite all peoples on earth, Jesus Christ devoted his ministry on earth to telling people about this government. He urged his disciples to pray for it, saying, 'Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done in earth, as it is

in heaven.'"  
Casper said God's kingdom will come in a shocking way to most people of the earth. It will bring an end to all unrighteousness, he said. "But the literal earth will survive that judgment and God will preserve righteous men to fulfill his grand purpose for our earth," he said.

Casper said the convention program would be devoted to a full explanation of man's problem—human survival—and explain in detail how it will be achieved.

He said the public is invited. All seats are free and no collection is taken.

**TEXAS TALK**



By Vance Snider

Q: What are the symptoms of the plant disease called Wheat Bunt?

A: Wheat Bunt, also called Stinking Smut, is caused by a fungus and is commonly recognized by several symptoms. Most obvious of the indications is the stunting of the plant's growth. Infected plants may reach only one-half the height of healthy plants. Other symptoms include early head maturity compared to normal wheat and the tendency of the heads to develop a bluish-green cast just prior to maturing. Smut balls, the smutted kernels from the diseased plant, are filled with black spores which have distinctly unfavorable odor described as best as "fishy". Generally the disease is carried from one crop to the next by the germination of the spores making up the smut balls. Wheat producers have successfully stymied the spread of the disease by using special fungicides in the treating of wheat seeds prior to planting.

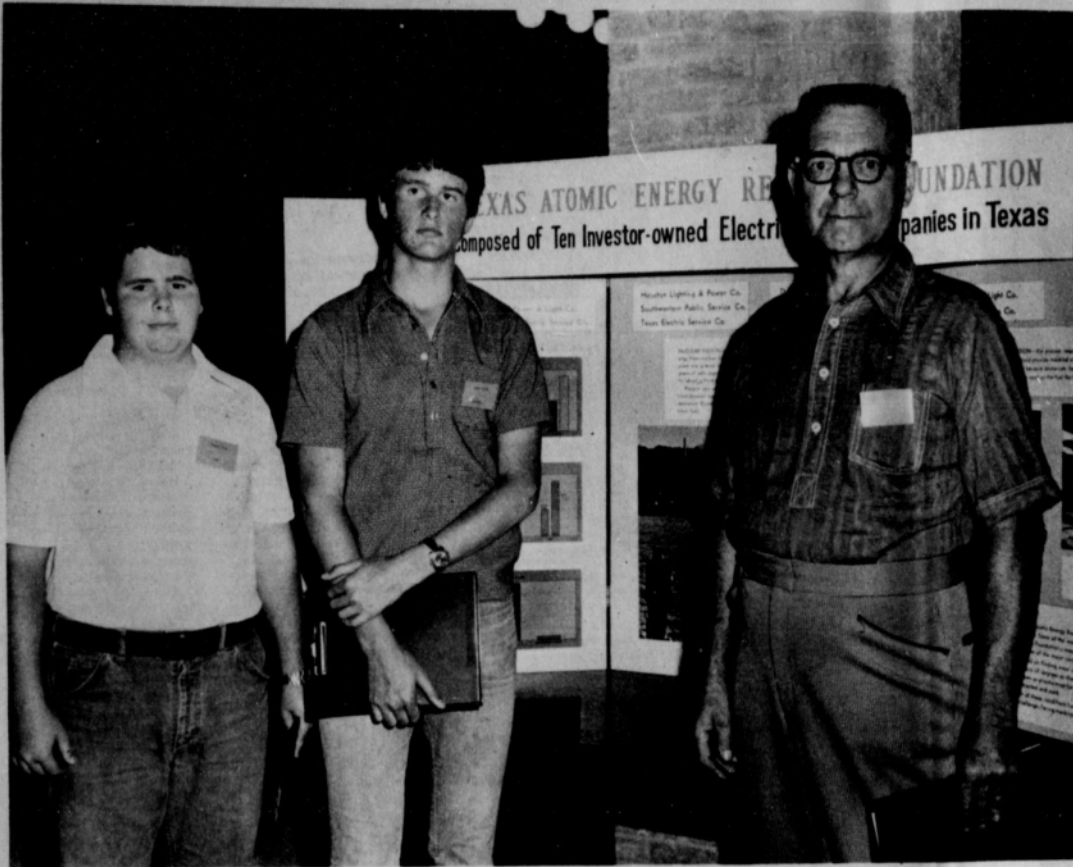

The Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag was led by Roscoe Nelson, followed by the Invocation given by Mayor Coy Palmer.

**MINUTES**  
Motion by Jackson, second by Nelson, to approve the minutes of the regular City Council meeting of May 27, 1975, as read. Motion carried.

**LEASING OF CITY OWNED LAND - JERRY FORD**  
Jerry Ford discussed the possible leasing of city owned property around the golf course and the estimated cost of construction of one-half mile fence. Motion by Nelson, second by Jackson, that this proposal be tabled until the regular City Council meeting of June 23, 1975. Motion carried.

**MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT**  
Fire Marshal Littlejohn discussed the need for a contract on fire protection with surrounding cities. Motion by Nelson, second by Ellsworth, that Littlejohn and attorney for the city J. E. Blackburn draw up a contract for approval of the council on a mutual aid agreement with Gruver and Perryton. Motion carried.

**LIABILITY INSURANCE**  
J. L. Brock explained the city's liability, workmen's compensation, and gas explosion insurance coverage. After lengthy discussion by the council, the City Secretary, Mark Neff, was instructed to publish proper notices for bid quotes, as the city's policies expire June 23, 1975.

**REMOVAL OF SOLID WASTE**  
City Manager Ed Thompson and Fire Marshal Littlejohn discussed with the Council the removal of metal from the solid waste disposal site. It was Council opinion that the City Manager should work with the contractors on a contract to remove as much metals as possible.

**WATER LINE EXTENSIONS - OUT OF TOWN RATES**  
Craig Hutchinson met with Council and asked if it might be possible to purchase water from the city for out of town properties, if he would lay and maintain a line from the city limits to the existing property, approximately one-half mile east on FM 760. Council discussed our present need for additional water supply for residents of Spearman, the city's liability outside the city limits and the bonded indebtedness on the present water works system. Motion by Nelson, second by Ellsworth, that further discussion be tabled until the next council meeting. Motion carried.

#### PAVING REPAIRS

City Manager Ed Thompson discussed with the Council the survey he made of paving repairs needed at the present time. He proposed that the city needed to seal-coat seventh street, from State HW 207 west to the city limits, repair waterways within the city limits, and miscellaneous seal-coating within the city with an approximate total cost of \$11,000. Motion by Jackson, second by Ellsworth, that the City Manager should proceed with sample paving based upon his recommendations to the Council. Motion carried.

#### SEWER TAP FEES

Discussion by Council and the City Manager over sewer tap fees in Golden Circle Addition. No action was taken at this time.

#### SEWER LAB FACILITIES

City Manager Thompson discussed with Council the need for water and gas lines to the sewer plant, at an approximate cost of \$3,000.00 for the lines and \$6,000.00 for lab equipment. No action taken.

#### CLOSING OF 12th AND GLOVER AND VACATION OF GLOVER TERRACE PLAT UNIT 4

Attorney for the city J. E. Blackburn, discussed the need to clear up Glover Terrace Plat #4 and the closing of 12th street and Glover street at this time. Motion by Nelson, second by Jackson to approve petition to vacate original Glover Terrace Plat unit #4 and close 12th and Glover Streets of that plat. Motion carried.

#### REVENUE SHARING PLANNED USE REPORT

City Secretary Mark Neff presented revenue sharing funds planned use for the proposed budget of the entitlement period 6. Motion by Ellsworth, second by Nelson, to approve the planned use report as follows:

### Water Rights Threat

WASHINGTON—Federal regulations are being drafted that could strangle the liberty and prosperity of millions of American farmers and ranchers with miles of bureaucratic red tape. I'm doing what I can to remedy this situation.

Under proposed rules being prepared now by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the rancher who wants to enlarge his stock pond, the farmer who wants to deepen his irrigation ditch or plow a field, or the mountaineer who wants to protect his land against stream erosion could be required to get a federal permit first.

The proposed regulations constitute "a harassment to farmers and ranchers trying to grow this nation's food supply," according to Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz. "Millions of people, as they now operate... could be fined up to \$25,000 a day and imprisoned for one year for violations" of the new rules, Butz warned.

The proposed regulations were drafted in response to a federal district court decision last March in a suit brought by environmental groups against the Corps of Engineers and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

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# County Population Shows Residents Getting Younger

NEW YORK--How young is the Hansford County population, measured in terms of its contact with the major events of the last few decades?

How many of the local residents were around in 1929, for example, when the great depression took place and the stock market crashed?

How many were on hand in 1936 when King Edward gave up the British throne to marry Wallis Simpson, or in 1941 when Pearl Harbor was attacked?

According to an age breakdown compiled by the Census Bureau, no more than 15 percent of the local population alive in 1938, when World War I came to a close.

In 1933, when prohibition ended, nearly 14 years after it went into effect, only 33 percent of Hansford County's current population was around to witness the event.

The advent of the atomic age, in the early 1940's, following the first nuclear chain reaction, can be remembered by only 46 percent locally, the figures show.

All of which points to the fact that the population of the area is relatively

young. The age level in Hansford County, taken as a whole, is found to be well below what it was a generation ago.

Local residents are slightly younger, also, than their counterparts in most parts of the United States.

The median age of the local population is given as 27.5 years, which means that there are as many below that age as there are above it.

In the United States the median age is 28.1 and, in the State of Texas, 26.4.

Despite the fact that there has been a pronounced drop in the birth rate, nationally, in the last few years, there is still a preponderance of young people because of the big birth rates that followed World War II.

Currently, the largest five-year segment of the population consists of those between ages 10 and 15. They total more than 20,800,000. Next in order is the 5 to 10-year old group, 19,890,000.

Just how large a concentration of young people is represented in this 5 to 15 age span is indicated by the fact that it contains twice as many persons as are in the over-65 ranks.
