The proposal, published in the Federal Register February 26, would implement a special program allowing producers to graze out their wheat crop instead of harvesting it for grain and still be eligible for any deficiency payment. A producer would be able to graze out up to 40 percent of the planted for harvest acres and be protected by the program.

An example would be if a producer's Normal Crop Acreage is a thousand, acres, he sets aside 20 percent and plants 500 to wheat and 300 to corn. The farmer can graze out 40 percent of the 800 acres or 320 acres.
