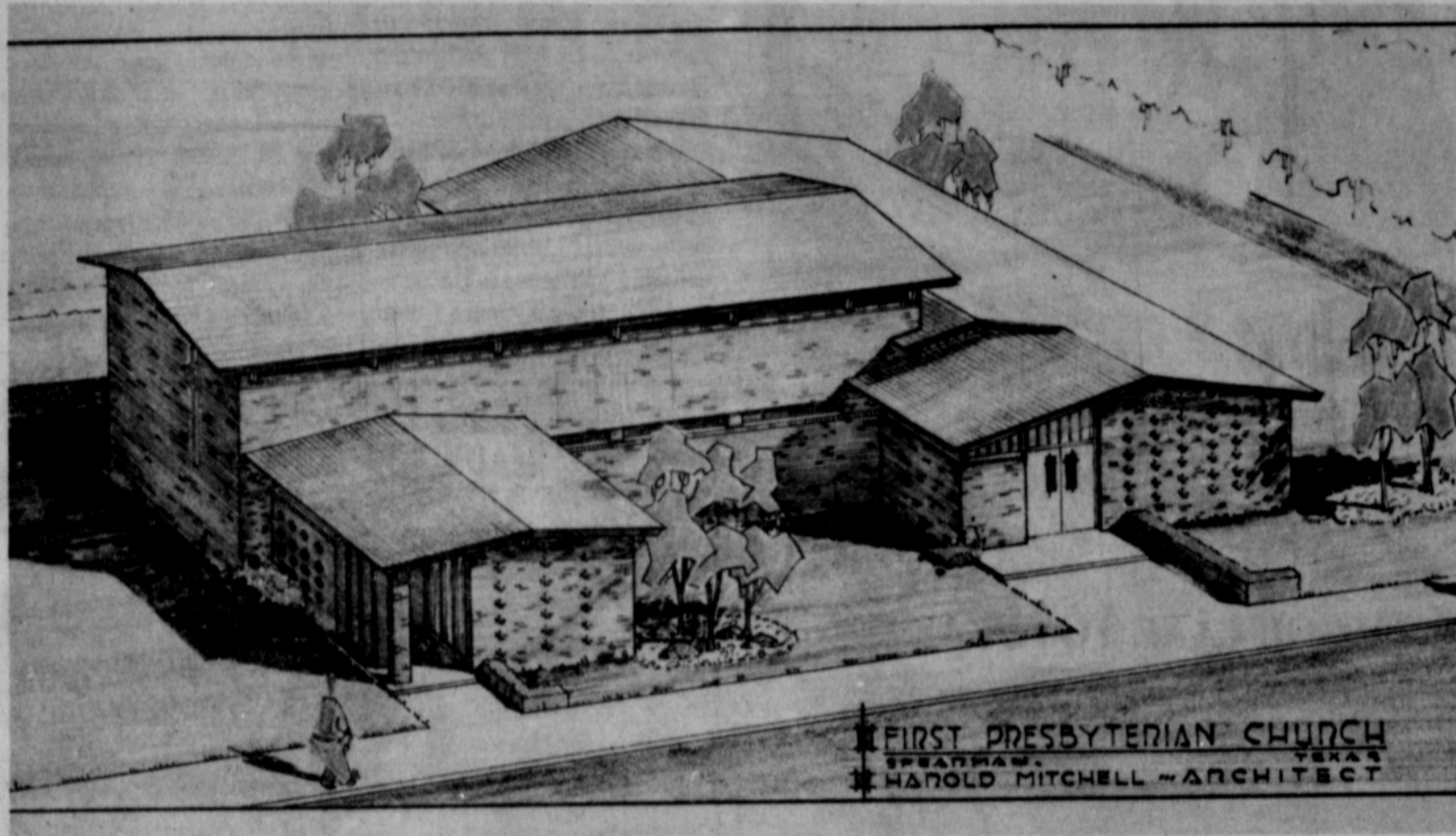

Modern Presbyterian Church To Be Opened in November

The First Presbyterian Church building is scheduled to open its doors in early November. Located on the corners of 11th St. and Cotter Drive, the \$46,000 structure consists of a sanctuary, pastor's study, four classrooms, a kitchen and two baths. The exterior is of rock-faced Norman brick and the sanctuary will be lined with Norman brick and walnut paneling. The church will be equipped with central heating and refrigerated air-conditioning. This building is actually an educational unit and constructed in such a way that additional units may be incorporated as the need arises.

The architect is Harold Mitchell of Amarillo; the construction firm is Nor-Tex of Borger. The building com-

mittee consists of Ralph Blodgett, Chairman, Chalmers Porter, Ceril Batton, Kenneth Conrey, Henry Cornelius, Everett Cain, Mrs. Bill Hutton and Mrs. Richard Holton. Color co-ordinators, working with the decorator, are Mrs. Bill Hutton and Mrs. Max Baggerly.

The Presbyterians organized their church here in 1960. The Rev. Clarence Wylie of Lubbock

was their first minister. He was followed by the Rev. James O. Jarrell, now of Whitesboro. The present pastor is Everett H. Cain, Jr. of Liberty. Mr. Cain and his family will be introduced to the people of Spearman at an Open House when the church is completed. The exact date of the Open House will be announced later and everyone in the area is cordially invited to attend.

School Taxes Total Over Half Million

A school tax bill of \$572,195.43 was mailed to 2,870 tax payers Monday as the annual tax paying season start-

ed on Oct. 1. School Business Manager Orville Latham said the tax bill comes from a total tax assessment of \$29,800,860 on real estate, producing royalties, personal property and public utilities. Taxes are assessed on 30 per cent of the true value.

Real estate and producing royalties were assessed \$25,447,690. Personal property and public utilities were assessed \$4,353,170.

In 1962 the total assessment was \$24,700,835. This produced a tax income of \$494,016.70.

Latham said the increase this year was from a small natural increase and a 20 percent increase in valuations to meet the expanded expenses of the growing school system.

Latham reminded tax payers that the school business office is now located in the new high school building in the southeast corner of town. He recommended that persons come to the east entrance of the building. The business office is just inside that entrance and makes payment of taxes much more convenient.

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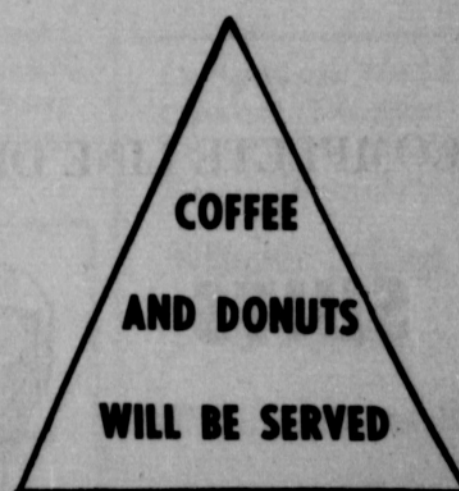



Walter Rogers Says...

Canadian Wheat Deal Is Wrong

A call is being made by some Americans for a re-examination of United States export policies in the wake of Canada's half-billion-dollar sale of wheat to the Soviet Union. Strictly from a business standpoint the deal was a good one for Canada; the Canadians will receive, good hard cur-

rency--not soft Russian rubles--just as they're receiving good, sound dollars in their \$700 million past and future grain deals with Communist China. Strictly from a business standpoint, Canada's deal makes it possible to move more of our own wheat into world markets--some of it to Canada itself to replace de-

pleted reserves. But business is not strictly business where the Communists are concerned. Despite talk that Canada's deal amounts to a political setback for the Soviets, whose agricultural failures are thus pointed up for all the world to see, the deal can only strengthen the economic position of the Soviet and its Iron Curtain satellites--and Cuba. The Soviets have plenty of gold. They can afford to part with some of it in exchange for the grain they must have if Russians and satellite peoples are not to become restive.

Food is as much a weapon in the Cold War as is the military. It is a cruel fact of life in the modern world that warfare--hot or cold--involves the total commitment of national resources, populations as well as industrial and agricultural productive capacities. The current phase of the East-West conflict amounts to an imposing test of the abilities of two opposite systems to provide for the well-being of humanity. Our conviction, and certainly that of the Canadians, is that freedom under democratic government is the best way for man to attain his material and spiritual goals. The Communist belief is that state supremacy through totalitarian control is the only course through which man can attain an abundant, if soulless, existence. The conflict between the two systems will continue through the foreseeable future, and as it goes on

the capacities of the Free and Communist worlds to provide for their peoples will continue to be tested.

Some argue that for humanitarian purposes we should modify our export policies to sell foodstuffs to Iron Curtain countries, including the Chinese Communists. It is an appeal that bypasses the dominant fact that these nations are bent on the destruction of free men and their governments, including the United States.

At the moment, the United States--in assessing Canada's action--is in the same position as would be a sporting goods store owner who sees his competitor across the street sell a basket of revolvers to a gang of known criminals. We wish we'd gotten the dollars in our till, but we know that the effect of sale may be to hasten the day that the gang returns to stage the promised hold-up.

I regret that the Canadian government can't see that point. And I trust our own government, despite our wheat surplus and balance-of-payment problems, will not lose sight of it.

Almost everytime I get involved in writing up an elaborate church wedding ceremony, it occurs to me that there's very little to say about the bridegroom. In fact, it's often

said that he is only mentioned to be polite.

This write-up, borrowed from the Dalhart Texan, gives the bridegroom a place of prominence that you'll rarely ever see.

"I'm sure that nearly every male newspaperman has had an urge to write a wedding story from the man's viewpoint. The following wedding account was written by Bob Grant, publisher of the Illinois Valley News, after expected information failed to reach him. He collaborated with the father of the bridegroom, Rev. Claude Canterbury furnished us a copy of the account from "The Douglas Budget," Douglas, Wyoming. The account is as follows:

"Leland was beautiful in a black suit of wool with matching lapel pressed down sharply against the chest. Peering out of the left breast pocket were four tips of a cleverly folded white linen handkerchief while on the left lapel quaintly held by placing the stem through an unused button hole and securing it with a small silver hat pin, was a white carnation.

"He wore a shirt of white nylon, severely plain, which was held together at the front by little buttons of plastic. Around his neck and under the shirt collar was a tie of black jersey, knotted carefully in decorative style, and held to the shirt front with a clamping device of gold plated brass. The cuffs of the shirt sleeves were closed with links of the same plated metal.

"On his left wrist he wore a mercury battery-powered watch, a Christmas gift from his father, that was held in place with a metal band. His trousers, of simple pleated design, matched the coat and were supported by a belt of black goatskin. His shoes of black horsehide, covered socks of some dark material and were fastened with a bow.

"He wore no hat and had his hair combed back and then forward from his forehead in a slight wave with no visible means of holding it in position.

"The bride wore the customary white."

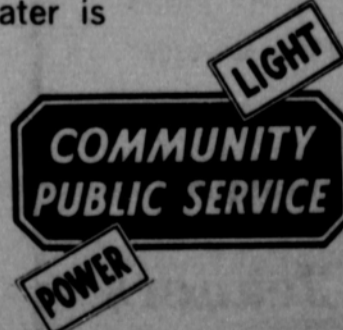

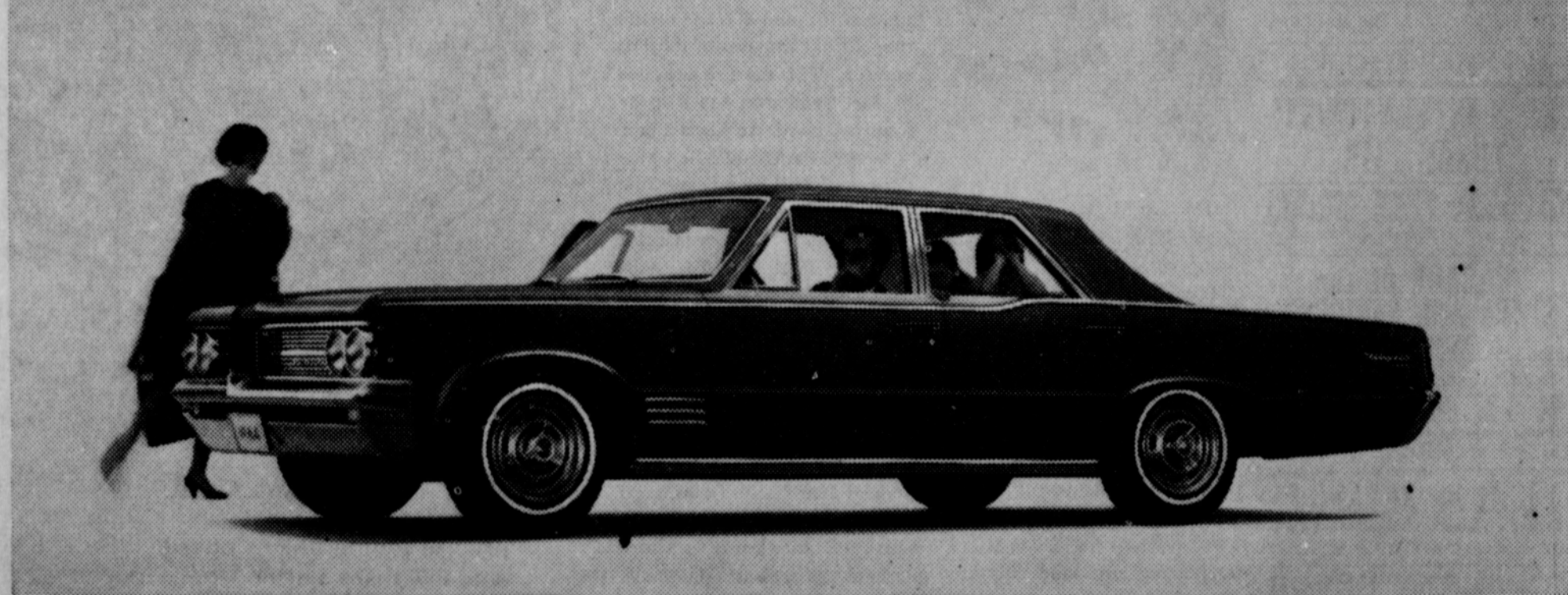

ARMYWORMS IN WHEAT

Many of you may be interested in learning about the fall armyworm that has been infesting and damaging wheat over the area. You may want to clip this information out for future reference.

DESCRIPTION & LIFE HISTORY

The moth is about 3/4 inch long with a wing spread of approximately 1 1/2 inches. The hind wings are grayish with the front pair dark gray, mottled with light and dark areas, with a light spot near the tips. The life span of the moth is 10 to 14 days. During this period, they may fly considerable distances and the female may deposit as many as 1,000 eggs.

Eggs are laid in clusters on or near the food plants. The eggs hatch in two to four days.

The larva becomes full grown in two to three weeks at which time it burrows into the soil and pupates. After eight to ten days the adult emerges. The larva has three yellowish-white lines down the back from head to tail, on each side is a wide dark line below which is a wide, wavy yellow stripe spotted with red. A prominent white inverted Y-shaped line appears on the front of the head.

DAMAGE

The small larvae begin feeding soon after hatching. The larvae usually attack the young wheat at or just below the surface of the soil. The worms will move in mass to other areas after devouring plants in the area where they hatched.

CONTROL

The following chemicals are recommended for the control of fall armyworms in wheat.

Restrictions concerning grazing should be closely followed.

Toxaphene (6 lbs/gal) 1 1/2 to 2 qts/acre

Toxaphene DDT (4-2 lbs/gal) 1 1/2 to 2 qts/acre

Do not feed DDT or Toxaphene treated forage to dairy animals or animals being finished for slaughter. Do not apply DDT after heads start to form.

Endrin (1.6 lbs/gal 1 1/2 pt. Do not apply endrin more than once per season or within 45 days of harvest or feeding.

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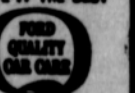
