Business conducted by the members of the Spearman city council at the regular meeting, Tuesday night, ran the gamut from zoning through grass leasing, traffic control, appointment of fire department officers, a board of equalization and a status report on the development of additional mobile home additions to the city.

Lots 7-12, block 42 of the original Spearman township were rezoned to allow mobile home residences there. The same approval was granted for lot four, block 31 of the original township for the same purpose.

Members of the council then ratified the necessary ordinance (#469) amending the Spearman municipal planning and zoning code to permit the foregoing actions.

Bids were opened on the leasing of some 86.3 acres of city property located next to the Hansford Golf Club and a proposal of \$10 per acre by Ron Clark appeared to be the highest offer. Members of the panel approved the second ordinance of the evening (#470) authorizing both existing traffic control devices, the installation of new traffic control devices, signals and signs and directing the Chief of Police to erect such devices, signals and signs as may be provided for in any subsequent ordinance and providing for the prima facie evidence rule with respect to such . . . as may be actually installed.

Council members appointed persons to key positions in the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department. Ronnie Antelex is Fire Chief-Fire Marshal; Ed Williamson, first Assistant Chief; Robert Cochran, second Assistant Chief; Ronnie Bulard, Captain, Company One; Ronnie Willis, Captain, Company Two and Johnny Vera, Captain, Company Three.

John Trimmell is president of the volunteer firefighters

group; Bill Porter, secretary and Robbie Schaffer, treasurer. These were elected within the group and did not require council action in regard to their posts.

Bill Pitman, Roy Bulls and Pete Fisher were appointed to the city board of equalization. With ratification of these appointments, it was noted that this is the last year the city will have to appoint such a panel. Next year and thereafter, the Hansford County Appraisal District will conduct all board of equalization hearings.

City Manager Jim Murray noted that all three of these men had been contacted and expressed their willingness to serve.

Bob Pearson gave the group another status report on his efforts to interest developers in the establishing of a mobile home addition for the city of Spearman. He had previously reported at least two groups from Perryton were interested in such a development if land could be acquired. Since his first status report at least one group has conferred informally with Mayor Ralph Blodgett. No definite action has been taken.

The goal is to create an addition that would be something more than a placing of mobile homes in rank and file in the smallest space possible. Pearson said one possible developer had said-possible on the possibility of acquiring and preparing a certain specific parcel of land-that lots there, developed and ready for occupancy, would sell for about \$7,000.

It must be emphasized at this point that that price is speculative. It was not believed it would be much-if any-higher and might be lower than that figure.

June 9 and 23 were approved for meeting dates next month and the proceedings were adjourned.

Weather Watch Almost Dry Run

A storm system moved through the Panhandle and South Plains, Thursday night, bringing a tornado watch to several counties including Hansford and rain from Guyton, Okla., to Floydada to the west and Paducah to the east on the South Plains.

Beaver, Cimmaron and Texas counties in the Oklahoma Panhandle were under the same tornado watch and severe thunderstorm warning.

Neither the twisters nor the bad thunderstorms materialized. Nor was there significant amounts of rainfall in agricultural areas. Measurements-unofficial at the press time-ranged from .17-inch at Guyton to .54-inch at Paducah.

Some .21-inch was the highest unofficial measurement in Hansford County with most farmers who keep close tabs on their rain gauges reporting .15 to .18-inch.

While some moderate flooding hit Amarillo city streets and Childress had wind gusts to 75 miles per hour, no damage had been reported at press time from over the entire Panhandle-South Plains area that lay under alert until 1 a.m., Friday.

Check Pressure Canner Gauges

Before harvest and gardening rush, take time to get your food preservation equipment in order. Steam loss from your pressure canner interferes with obtaining adequate pressure for safe home canning.

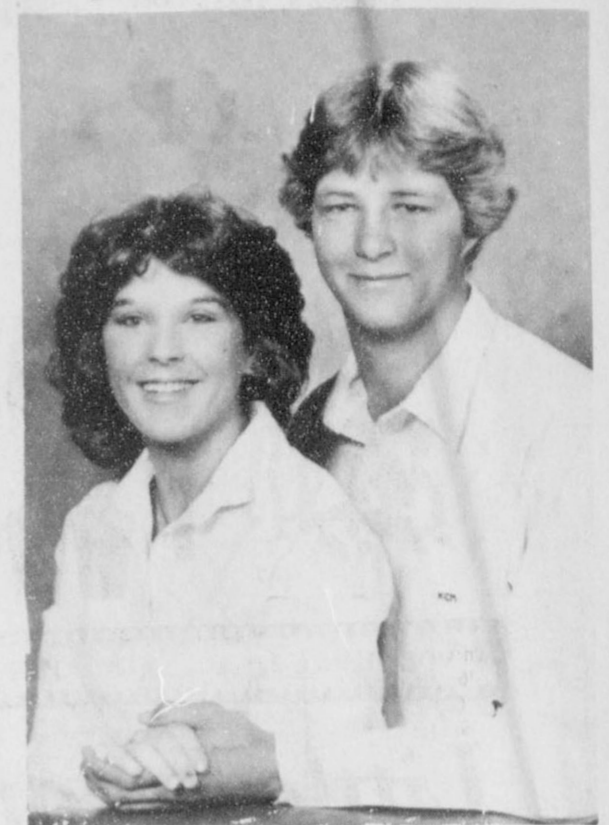
If your rubber gasket has hardened and shrunk to the point where steam is lost, remove the gasket from the lid. Pour boiling water over the gasket and allow to soak for about 30 minutes to an hour. Remove and stretch gently to prevent breaking. Replace in lid and with about an inch or two of water in the canner, place the lid on the pressure canner. Heat to let steam escape, close petcock and allow pressure to rise in canner. If the pressure rises to 10 pounds with no

leakage of steam, continue to use the gasket. If steam leaks, purchase a new gasket.

For pressure canners that seal metal-to-metal, if steam escapes where metal meets metal, clean kettle and lid with a mixture of whitening and vinegar or clean carefully with fine steel wool and soap. Dry and rub with vegetable oil. Test for seal the same as above.

You may have the steam gauge on your pressure canner checked for accuracy June 8 at the La Casita Room of the Gruver State Bank or June 9 at the Spearman Homemaker's Clubroom, anytime from 1:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. If your steam gauge is off more than 2 pounds, you need a new gauge.

Texas volunteer homemakers gave more than \$6 million worth of time to improve quality of life for their fellow citizens last year--and they're working this year to top that.

As we face economic hardships and dwindling resources, Texas volunteer homemakers stand as one of the state's most valuable renewable resources.

Who are they? Members of the 23,000-strong Texas Extension Homemakers Clubs across the state.

For more than 50 years, these club members in more than 200 Texas counties have learned home economics skills and passed that information on to others.

In 1980, they held 55,680 meetings with educational programs. Last year they gave 1,817,000 hours--an average of 79 hours per person or a total of 622 years--in volunteer service.

Figured at \$3.45 per hour, they donated \$6,277,650 of volunteer time--and they reached into their pockets for an additional \$28,000 in cash--to improve their communities and make life better for the people who live there.

Community projects conducted by Texas Extension Homemakers Clubs varied across the state because of varied needs in the different counties, but more than 100 community projects involved health, safety, family life, citizenship, cultural arts,

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School's Out!

Extra Safety Urged

Spearman faces as increased safety problem with bicyclists and pedestrians—further aggravated by the end of school and an increased number of youngsters out and about the city in various forms of summer recreation both on wheels and afoot.

After two serious accidents involving bicyclists and some "near misses" involving pedestrians, Spearman Police Chief

Ron Robinson said there would have to be a tightening of enforcement activity.

In one bicycle-car accident, the cyclist was at fault for failure to yield the right of way. In the other, the motorist was at fault for the same reason.

Chief Robinson reminded that bicycles are operated in a traffic pattern the same as autos. The bicycle must be ridden in the right lane of traffic

obeying the rules and giving the signals laid down for automobile traffic.

A bicycle should NEVER be ridden on the left facing oncoming traffic.

But that is the way pedestrians should walk—or run if jogging—in the city streets.

There are many walking for health reasons and most have been observed doing so on the wrong side of the street. Two women walkers were narrowly missed recently when a motorist, traveling at a proper rate of speed, made a right turn onto another street and had to make a panic stop for there were two ladies walking the lane where the law gave the car the right of way.

Pedestrians in the street MUST ALWAYS WALK FACING ONCOMING TRAFFIC.

Chief Robinson expressed concern for the safety of youngsters particular in the vicinity of the swimming pool, the "Y" and Jaycee Park.

"The safety hazard is so great at Jaycee park," Chief Robinson said, "We are instituting regulations there and they will be strictly enforced."

The Jaycee Park roadway is now a one-way thoroughfare with a 10 mile-per-hour speed limit. According to the Police Chief, traffic to the park will enter from the west and exit to the east. Motorists parking in that area on the roadway will park parallel instead of "nose-in" as they have been doing.

Signs are being posted accordingly, authorized by the city council, with strict enforcement a fact of life for the summer, according to city leaders.

Chief Robinson emphasized that the purpose of strict enforcement is not to issue citations but to emphasize the need for safety.

"Safety should be practiced throughout the city and not just in recreational areas," Chief Robinson pointed out. "We have visitors within the city all of the time. Many times, they are looking for a street sign or a house number and are particularly vulnerable to careless safety practices—which are also very un hospitable for a friendly city such as Spearman."

Children Can Be Taught Dog Bite Prevention

CHILDREN CAN BE TAUGHT DOG BIT PREVENTION

With an increase in the number of pets, contact with dogs are frequent and—at times—threatening.

Studies have show that dogs that bite are well known to their victims, have a reputation for being "nice" and are pets, not guard dogs trained to defend property.

In many cases, say Texas Department of Health veterinarians, victims may unknowingly invite attack by their actions, or out of fear. Children often are bitten while just trying to play with a pet or neighborhood dog. When frightened, a child may scream, throw up its hands and attempt to run away, bringing on an attack. Screams also may frighten a dog into attacking.

Experts say that most dogs that bite are not vicious, and that the size of a dog has nothing to do with its biting tendencies. Even so-called friendly or altruistic breeds, such as the St. Bernard, may be aggressive at times.

The dog has certain body language which tip you off to its mood. The barking dog, which proverbially won't bite, actually may be a misfit in our society.

Dogs that bark too much, are kept penned up, are teased, frustrated or start out in life with little human contact may be candidates for biting. Dogs are protective of their own territory and may attack a person who enters this domain.

A playful dog, or pup, avoids direct eye contact, may look from side to side and expose its throat. It also may lower its head and pounce and thrust its body at you.

A potentially aggressive dog, on the other hand, will keep eye contact, show its teeth in a snarl and raise the hair on its shoulders and rump. It may walk stiff-legged, as if on its toes, or may raise a front leg and even wag its arched tail slowly.

What do you do if you feel threatened? Experts in "Pet Journal" have these suggestions:

1. Never disturb a dog, even your pet, while it sleeps or eats.
2. If a dog is restrained or confined, never enter its domain.
3. Never tease, throw rocks or sticks, or dangle food or a toy while playing with a dog.
4. Hands, arms and voices should be kept down around dogs, especially one that appears threatening. Screams and

quick movements may provoke a dog.

5. Avoid a pack of dogs at all costs, and notify authorities of such a pack. They are highly dangerous and may attack without reason.
6. Be especially wary of big breeds of dogs, which can quickly cause serious injury.
7. Stay calm and as still as possible if a dog runs at you, and never turn your back or run away from the animal.
8. Attempting to scare it off by clapping your hands may have an adverse effect. Best bet is to speak in a soft monotone, don't look the dog in the eye, and keep your palms turned up and your hands below your hips. Keeping your head down and your eyes averted is a show of submission.
9. If chased while riding a bicycle, pedal smoothly and speak soothingly. It may be necessary to dismount and push your bike away slowly without turning your back on the dog.
