

SENATE ELECTION TUESDAY

Probably one of the most important elections in Texas in many years will be held Tuesday, when the state votes on the Constitutional Amendment to enlarge the State

Senate from 31 to 39 members. All 10 voting precincts in the county will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. The only change in the voting

places will be in the Kimbell community where the election will be held in the Gus Renner home. This amendment is being voted upon to allow the Senate

to be enlarged, so under the reapportionment of the state, the rural areas will not lose so many senators. If this amendment is not passed, the senatorial districts

will be changed in such a way that Senators will be taken from rural areas and given to the more populated urban areas. The election has been re-

ceiving very little publicity in city papers over the state, apparently in an effort to shift the control of the state political power from the rural to the urban area.

Strong Sunray Bobcats Upset Spearman 16-14 in Grid Opener

The highly touted Spearman Lynx got their noses rubbed in their prestige Friday night by a big, tough bunch of Sunray Bobcats. The Cates gave their new Coach Gene Offield a 16-14 upset over the Lynx.

Sunray's fondness for a passing game and a holding penalty in the first half allowed the Lynx to leave the field with a 0-0 score at the half.

Statistically, the Lynx beat the Bobcats in most departments but the scoring. Spearman had 263 yards rushing and 59 passing for a 322 total offense.

Sunray mustered only 140 yards rushing and 69 passing for 209 total offense. Spearman's Ken Shufeldt was the big running gun for the Lynx as he rolled up 194 yards and two touchdowns in his efforts for the night.

The halfback ran inside and outside to lead the running attack. His biggest effort was a 46-yard touchdown run after Sunray had taken an 8-0 lead early in the third quarter.

Pass interceptions, fumbles and dropped passes both on offense and defense in the first half stymied Spearman's efforts.

On the first series of downs, Spearman lost a scoring chance when Shufeldt let a Dave Clement pass go through his hands after he had the defense beaten by several yards.

The second time Spearman got the ball Shufeldt fumbled on the Sunray 39 after two passing plays to Butts from Clement and the second from Shufeldt had gained 16 yards.

After John Grey recovered the fumble Sunray drove in to the

Lynx four before being stopped. The big play was a Max Greer to Tommy Gain pass for 23 yards. Bain was dropped on the Lynx seven.

After Spearman was penalized for piling on after the whistle, Sunray had a third down and needed only four to score.

Green have the ball to Bain and Skipper Robinson nailed him for what looked like a good loss, but Bain managed to throw as he was going down and Larry Butts intercepted on the Lynx five.

On the first play, Butts was smothered in the backfield and just managed to get to the one to prevent a safety and two points for the Bobcats.

Butts quick-kicked on the next play and the ball rolled to the 50. A Lynx was downfield on the play, but ran by the ball and let Ronnie Dugan pick it up and race to the Lynx 31.

The defense stiffened and Spearman got the ball back at the 22. On third and 13 at the Lynx 40, Clement tried a screen pass only to have Jerry Staton intercept on the Lynx 38.

Sunray rolled into scoring territory and after Greer hit Sammy Manning on a 15-yard pass Sunray had first and goal at the Lynx eight.

Dugan, behind a wave of blocking that wiped out the entire right side of the Lynx defense, scored, only to have it called back for a holding penalty.

Harley Reeves broke up the next Greer pass. Then little Mike Babbs, hobbling on sore ankles, dropped Bain for a one

yard loss. Shufeldt let a Greer pass get away from him at the five, then Bain tried to punt for the corner and it went nine yards to the Lynx 16.

From the Lynx 16, Spearman drove toward what looked like a score. Butts and Shufeldt rolled on running yards, but the

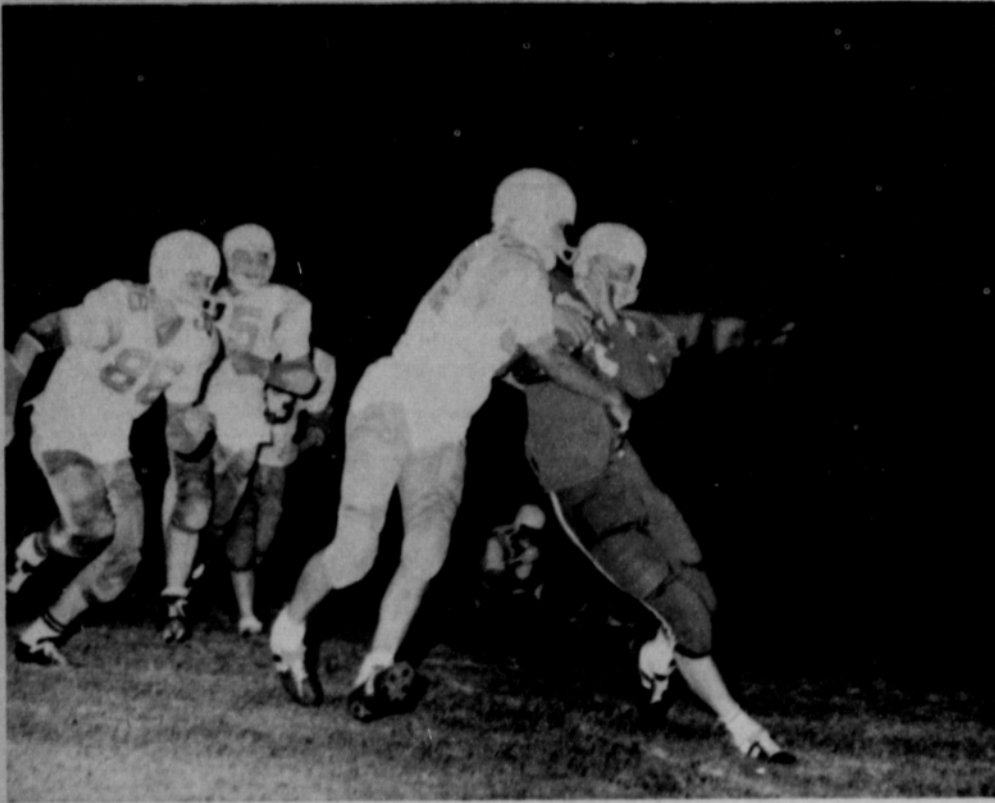

big play was a pass from Clement to end James Schnell. The tall end took the ball over his shoulder and raced to the Bobcat 25 before being overhauled. Here, the offense sputtered on a penalty and a loss as Clement was smothered on passing attempts. Then Dugan picked off a pass at the 25 and ran it out to the Sunray 47.
In the opening minutes of the third quarter the teams exchanged fumbles. Randy Moore

recovered a Bobcat miscue at the Lynx 26. Two plays later, Clement was hit as he tried to pitch on the option play and Tommy Bain recovered on the Spearman 25.
Don Harris and Jerry Staton hit the Lynx defensive guard and tackle on five consecutive plays and Harris scored from the five yard line.
Greer passed to Bain for the extra points for an 8-0 lead.
Spearman drove 62 yards on five plays to score. Shufeldt brought the drive to a sudden close with a 46 yard gallop around right end. Quarterback

Dave Clement threw the key block to spring him free in the secondary. Butts swept to the left for the extra points to tie the score at 8-8.
Harris and Staton went back to work on the right side of the Lynx line and in 17 plays Sunray was back in the lead. Greer scored from the Lynx two when he faked the ball to Harris at the tackle hole, then kept it and went in to score around end. He was untouched. Greer passed to Manning for the two points to give Sunray a 16-8 lead.
Shufeldt, Cochran and Butts

found plenty of holes in the line as Spearman went from 63 yards out in nine plays to score. Shufeldt scored from the seven. Cochran tried for the two points to tie the score but his blockers left him naked and he was stopped by three defenders about a yard short of the goal.
Mart Brillhart and Robinson went to work on the defense and in three plays and with 2:30 left on the clock, Spearman had the ball again at the Bobcat 45.
Shufeldt got 14 big yards. Then the defense tightened and the three running backs had to dig for five or less.

10 passes and had two interceptions. He was rushed hard. Shufeldt completed one of one. Butts caught three passes for 21 yards and Schnell had one for 38.
Butts punted twice for a 41 yard average and Sunray's Manning punted four times for a 27.5 average.
Spearman fumbled twice and lost both of them. Sunray fumbled twice and lost one.
Sunray threw 18 passes and completed seven. They had one intercepted.
Spearman was penalized three times for 14 yards and Sunray had three fouls for 20 yards.

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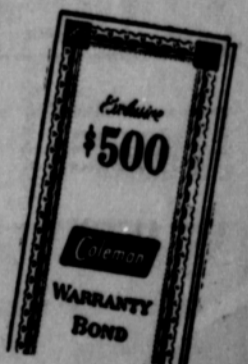

Yarborough Gets More Funds for Texas Projects

The Senate has passed two bills, the Public Works Appropriations Bill and the Military Construction Bill, which include money for major Texas projects.

The Public Works Appropriations Bill provides money for thirty-two Texas projects totalling nearly \$95 million.

In addition to the thirty projects that were included in the House Bill, I was able to have \$800,000 added to initiate and complete construction of a ship channel from the Gulf Interoceanic Waterway to Palacios, Texas with the co-operation of Congressman Clark Thompson. Another project put in the Senate Bill, but left out in the House Bill, was \$150,000 to plan a \$33 million flood control project for the protection of Abilene, Texas.

Among the remaining public works projects was \$17 million for improvement of the Sanford Reservoir in the Brazos River System; \$4 million for the Stillhouse Hollow Dam; and \$4.1 million for hurricane protection in Texas City, Texas.

The Military Construction Appropriations Bill which was recently passed in the Senate included twenty-two Texas projects amounting to almost \$49 million.

In addition to the twenty

Texas projects included in the House Bill, I was able to have \$1,300,000 added for a Medical Laboratory at Brooks Army Medical Center and \$492,000 added for a replacement building at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, with the co-operation of Congressman Henry B. Gonzales.

Texas is fortunate to have the two senior, ablest, and most influential members of the House Appropriations Committee, Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock and Congressman Albert Thomas of Houston. It is a privilege to work with these two fine Congressmen in getting the appropriations for deserving Texas projects.

The War on Poverty Bill has also passed the Senate. This is one of the major components of President Lyndon Johnson's Great Society, and it has made an impressive record in its first year of operation.

The Senate supported my proposal to eliminate the Governor's veto power from locally sponsored projects such as community action programs, Neighborhood Youth Corps, and adult basic education projects. The elimination of this veto power gives control back to the local communities and encourages initiative on the city, county, and town level.

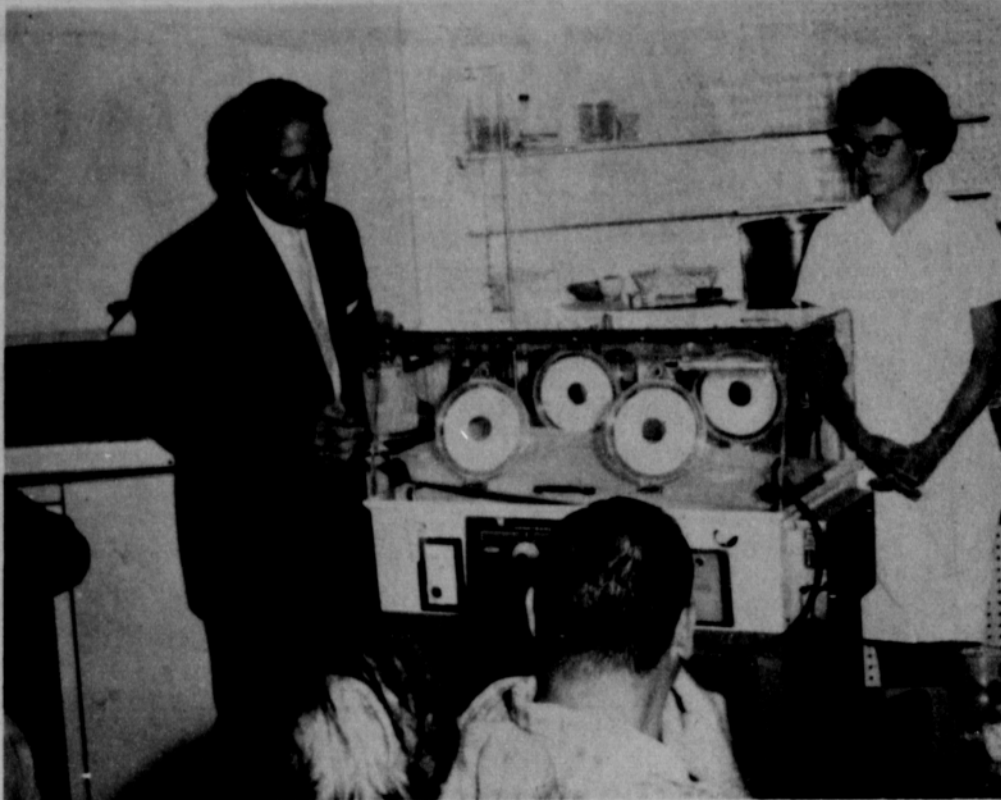
presided at the business session. Roll call was answered by "Something Old That I Treasure".

Milo Crop Nears Record

With a good growing season the rest of the year, a record per acre yield on feed grains and soybeans is being predicted by the Santa Fe Crop reporters.

Texas production is expected to be over 30 million bushels above the 215,864,000 bushels harvested last year. This year's grain sorghum harvest is predicted at 248,262,000 bushels.

Nationwide production is expected to be up some 134 million bushels. Last year the nation produced 490,253,000 bushels and this year the production is figured at 624,048,000.

Grain sorghum is being harvested as far north in the state as the Low Rollings Plains and the southern High Plains.

In Western Kansas and Eastern Colorado there are some areas that must have a late frost if the grain sorghum is to mature. It was planted after mid-June.

Texas cotton production is predicted to be 4,250,000 bales, an increase over the 4,122,900 bales last year. This increase is in spite of a decrease in acreage this year.

While there are some areas in Texas and Oklahoma that continue to need rainfall to stimulate range growth, range feed supplies are above average in most mountain states. Higher elevation pastures continue to provide pasture.

Over the 17 western states range conditions are better than at the same time in 1964.
