WES NIVENS, well known local fiddler, was unanimously elected President of the National Old Time Fiddlers Association during a board meeting of the Association held at the Super Bowl Fiddle Contest and Country Jamboree in Cortez, Colorado June 9-15. The National Association represents some 2,000 members. Nivens, who has been fiddling since he was a teenager, will be traveling throughout the country judging contests and helping to organize new chapters. He is a certified judge. The purpose of the Association is to preserve and perpetuate old time fiddling. Nivens and his wife, Lena, who was appointed secretary of the NOTFA, make their home in TorC.

## Winn Crenshaw assumes duties as director of Hansford YMCA

Hansford County YMCA has a new director.

Winn Crenshaw arrived here July 5 accompanied by his wife Dana and sons Nathan 8, and Austin, 5.

Mr. and Mrs. Crenshaw came to Spearman from Dallas where they had been serving as house parents at Buckner Baptist Children's Home. But they did it the hard way, winding up here on the tail end of a 703 mile trip that included a "stopover" in Andrews in far West Texas for a visit with Dana's folks.

Although his last job was not with the YMCA, working for the "Y" is nothing new to Crenshaw. A resident of Dallas area most of his life and a graduate of Richardson High School in a Dallas suburb, Crenshaw worked for the Dallas YMCA. He has also worked for "Y's" in Albany, Ga. and Ft. Myers, Fla.

Crenshaw was graduated from Stephen F. Austin University in Nacogdoches with a bachelor of arts degree in sociology. He also holds basic and advanced fitness specialist certificates from the national YMCA.

In fact, much of Crenshaw's background with the "Y" has been in physical fitness.

"I'm certified for fitness testing and prescription and one of the things I'd like to start at the 'y' here is a fitness program," he said.

"I'd like to see the 'Y' become the fitness voice of the community."

He said one of the things he would like to start here would be a Health Enhancement Programs for people of all ages.

This would include a professional running fitness, stress management and weight control program, he said.

"I'd also be interested in starting a running club and a bicycle touring group," he said.

Personal interests and hobbies of the new YMCA director include tennis-if time permits, I'm an avid tennis player."

He also enjoys outings with his family, bicycle riding, plays "a little guitar, mostly country-western dance," enjoys Western art and of course, runs, runs, runs.

"I've run a marathon before--the Dallas White Rock Marathon," he said.

Did he win?  
He grinned, "I finished."

He said he has also run some half-marathons, some 10 milers, and some 10-K's, "but that was 15 pounds ago. If we ever get moved in here where we won't be eating so

much, I'll lose some of that," he commented.

Dana Crenshaw is a graduate of Texas A&M University in elementary education and has taught in Houston area public schools and in a Dallas private school. They first met in church, he said.

Dana does not work directly in physical fitness although she does share her husband's interest in bicycle riding.

The Crenshaws are presently renting a house on S. Haney.

### Appraisal review board to meet

The appraisal review board (ARB) for the Hansford County Appraisal District begins hearing taxpayer appeals on July 12, 1983 at 9:00 a.m. Property owners have until July 11, 1983 to notify the ARB of their intention to protest some aspect of their property appraisals.

The ARB is a group of citizens of the appraisal district who have been appointed by the district directors to equalize property values and consider claims for exemption and agricultural value. With the implementation of the central appraisal district, taxpayers are now able to address a single equalization board instead of one for each taxing unit in which their property is located.

According to Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the Hansford County Appraisal District, a property owner may protest any of seven specific actions of the appraisal office, as well as any other action that applies to the owner and adversely affects him.

- The seven protest areas are:
1. The appraised or agricultural value of the property.
  2. Unequal appraisals of the taxpayer's property in comparison.
  3. Inclusion of the property on the appraisal records.

Wes Nivens, a former Spearman resident who was a popular entertainer while living here, is still just 'fiddlin' away.

Nivens and his wife Lena moved to Truth or Consequences, N.M. in 1977, after Lena retired from teaching school. They chose their new home because of its location in the middle of Fiddlin' USA.

Wes was elected president of the National Old Timers Fiddle Contest and Country Jamboree in June.

Some of his many trophies include first place in the following contests: Senior Division, Mesilla Park, N.M., 1981; Senior Division, El Paso, 1982; Springville, 1978; Grand master Winner, 2 years, Yuma, AZ., JayCees; Trick & Fancy Round Valley, AZ., 1978; Cotton Festival; Pagosa, CO., 1977; Hatch, N.M., etc., etc., etc.

Wes was born in Parnell, Texas in February, 1917. He heard music from an early age, as his mother played a guitar, and the family had a player piano. His mother died when he was eight years old. He wanted to learn to play her guitar but his arms were too short so he tried to make the guitar smaller by sawing off the neck; of course he couldn't put it back and that was the end of that guitar.

A few years later Wes and his brother and sisters decided they wanted a guitar badly enough to pick cotton and earn enough money to

buy one. It was a great day when Wes took their hardearned money to Memphis and bought a Kalamazoo guitar. One of his brothers still has and plays this guitar. In time the three older boys and younger sister learned to play...tuning the guitar from the player piano.

But this wasn't enough for Wes, he wanted a fiddle, too. He can't remember a time when he didn't want to play the fiddle. Before he ever owned one, Wes practiced with two sticks--one for a fiddle and one for the bow. He got his first fiddle when he walked 20 miles to his uncle's house to collect one promised to him. He carried it home in a flour sack, often playing it as he walked. The first tune he learned to play was Carroll County Blues, which he played until the family's patience ran out and they begged him to learn something else.

A highlight of Wes' teenage years was knowing Bob Wills' father and younger brothers and sisters, who lived about four miles from Wes' family. The Wills played anytime musical entertainment was needed in the community.

Uncle Johnny Wills was a strong influence on Wes, who often joined the family jam sessions. Wes kept a sharp eye on a pawn shop when Uncle Johnny pawned one of his fiddles, and was able to buy the fiddle for \$15. He still has the fiddle, although he doesn't play it anymore.

Wes had a band, the "Hall County Rambles" before his marriage to Lena Fay Vaughn, a school teacher in Estelline.

Wes was called into the Army in World War II and his first overseas duty was in Hawaii where he would go to the USO where there were musical instruments whenever he could. When he was shipped out of Hawaii, the USO gave him a fiddle which he carried to Australia and New Guinea.

The Nivens family have held many family reunions with lots of playing and singing.

The fiddle Wes plays most now was given to him several years ago. It was made by Francisco Salazard, the well-known Russian luthier, and is about 200 years old.

In recent years Wes has participated in many fiddle contests, both as an entry and a judge.

Since moving to New Mexico, Wes had made four more albums and last August he began teaching fiddling to 18 eager students in Safford, Arizona. He goes to Safford two weeks each month for the lessons.

Wes is a man who loves to play fiddle music and oftentimes has 10 or 12 couples at his home for jam sessions.

## POLICE REPORT:

On Saturday, June 25, 1983, while an officer was on patrol, he was checking the swimming pool, when he found two female subjects swimming. The subjects stated they were there on a dare. While the officer was talking with the subjects, another subject drove up and explained to the officer why the subjects were at the swimming pool. Criminal trespassing charges were filed on the two subjects and were advised that they would be contacted when to appear in court. No further action at this time.

On Sunday, June 26, 1983, an officer had gone to the dog pound. Upon arrival the officer noticed that the gate to the far East dog cage was standing open and two dogs were missing. Upon further checking, the officer noticed that the lock was still on and part of the chain was lying on the ground. It appeared that the chain link had been cut by bolt cutters. The case is still under investigation.

On Monday, June 27, 1983, an officer observed an open door at a Spearman business. It was also observed by the officer that the glass section of the door had been broken. The officer conducted a search of the building. The owner was notified to come down to the business. After the owner made a check of the building, it was secured. No further information at this time.

On Monday, June 27, 1983, a subject entered the Spearman Police Dept. and advised an officer that while he was washing his car he had put some money on top of the coin vending machine. The subject stated that he moved his car to the drying area and while he was moving his car, another car had pulled into the wash area. He said that when the other car had left, he went back to get the money he had left and found it missing. He stated that he chased the other car and stopped the subject and asked if he had the money. Subject stated he did not. Subject and vehicle description were given to the Police officer and a complaint was filed.

On Tuesday, June 28, 1983, the Spearman Police Dept. received a call from the Hansford County Sheriff's Office about a trailer house being damaged. Officers arrived and spoke to the owner of the trailer house. She advised that while she was in her house she heard a loud noise. She then checked outside and discovered the damage to the trailer house. Damage was at the North-east side panel of the trailer house. On July 2, 1983, officer received a call from a subject in reference to the damage to the trailer house. Damages were taken care of. Case closed.

A year-long effort by local civic and medical leaders to attract a new doctor to Spearman was fulfilled Thursday when Dr. Peter Takhar, M.D., opened his practice here in the Hansford Clinic.

Because of just completed renovations, there is a new entrance to the area housing Dr. Takhar's office, located on the east side of the clinic at 720 S. Archer.

Dr. Takhar and his wife Karen arrived in Spearman Monday, found a place to rent until they buy or build a place of their own, and immediately began planning and working toward opening the doctor's office.

Karen will assist Peter in the doctor's office. They are both enthusiastic about the friendly welcome they have received here and about Takhar's opportunity to serve the community as a physician.

"The people here seem very nice, very friendly," Dr. Takhar said.

"Yes," Mrs. Takhar said, "when

we first came here to look over the town and inquire about the opportunity here, we were impressed with the quality of the people—they're just good, solid people."

Most important, Dr. Takhar said, "was how sincere they were about needing another doctor here. Even the other doctors stressed the need for another doctor." We didn't want to go where there was not a real need.

Dr. Takhar was born and reared in northern India where his father, a graduate of Edinburgh (Scotland) medical school still practices medicine.

Peter attended college in India for five years, did his internships in England, and his residencies at Brackenridge Hospital, University of Texas, Austin.

Karen was born and reared in Baytown and worked as a nurse there. She met Peter while she was visiting her parents who had moved

to Trinity from Baytown after her father had retired from duties with an oil company.

After completing his three years of family practice residency in Austin, Takhar had gone into private practice in Patterson, Calif., and later moved to Trinity and set up practice there.

Shortly after moving to Trinity he was on-call for duty in the emergency room in the hospital at Trinity. That day the hospital called Karen and asked if she would help out in the emergency room there while she was visiting her parents.

She agreed and there met her future husband. Mrs. Takhar laughs and admits she was impressed by Peter. So much so that she talked her parents into inviting him to stay with them as a house guest until he could find a place to stay in Trinity. And she extended her own visit with them.

They were married last October.

Dr. Takhar said he first heard of the need for a doctor in Spearman through the Texas Medical Association, which had been contacted by hospital officials in Spearman.

The doctor contacted Al LaRoche, hospital administrator. LaRoche said that after they had checked out Dr. Takhar's background the hospital board gave him the go-ahead to invite Takhar here

for an interview.

## Doctor's background proves interesting

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following information was written by Dr. Takhar as a biographical sketch to go with his resume when applying for the position in Spearman. It was released with his permission and is printed, in part, as it gives additional information, and a fascinating insight, into the new Spearman doctor's background.

My father was born on April 1st, so was I in 1949. Our home is in Shankar, a small town in the northern state of Punjab, India, a part of the most fertile land in the entire Indo-Gangetic plain.

I went to high school at the Royal Lawrence School Sanawar Simla Hills. Simla was the summer capital of India during the "British Raj." The motto of the school was "Never Give In" and the pride of the school was in producing the best polo players in the country. The school followed the traditions of Harrow and Eton, the famous British Public schools. Rudyard Kipling was closely associated with our school and in his book "Kim" he mentions "Send him to Sanawar if you want to make a man out of him." At school I was a "Blue" in cricket, soccer, hockey, track and field. At the age of fifteen I broke the long jump record set in 1929 by clearing 21' 8 1/4". For this I was elected member of the "Spartan" club. My current interest is flying.

I attended my Pre-medical education at DAV College Jullundur, Punjab. In the Pre-university examination I stood first in the entire state, and in the Pre-medical examination I was tenth in the entire state of Punjab. I went to Medical School at Government Medical College Patiala. Graduated in the first ten percent of the class, and my greatest achievement was winning the first prize in Physiology and Biochemistry.

House jobs [residencies] were done in England. I did a STRAIGHT six month Internal Medicine residency under Dr. Alec Paton at Dudley Road Hospital, Birmingham.

We had the biggest liver and gastrointestinal unit in the Midlands. This was followed by STRAIGHT six months in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Marston Green Maternity Hospital in Birmingham.

In 1976 I decided to cross the Atlantic and started my residency in Family Practice which is sponsored by the Central Texas Medical Foundation in Austin. While I was waiting to join the residency program I did general practice for four months in Cold Springs, a small East Texas town.

I acquired two things from my father, who was himself a physician in the British Army: love for hunting and riding, though I was never as good as he in either. He is a crack shot at the rifle and we often went for partridge and stag hunting, and our house is full of trophies. My brother is a Brigadier in the Cavalry [17 Horse] and in keeping with the school traditions is among the best ten polo players in the country. My mother is a devoted housewife and the inspiration behind us all.

### Grain sorghum farmers election

Grain Sorghum farmers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on September 15. Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are Paul Cobb of Plains; Lee Hill of Dalhart; C.C. Reed of Kress and Olan "Jack" Crowl of Morse. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their names placed in nomination for membership on the Board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and ten

others who are eligible to vote. All nominations must be filed by August 15 at the TGSPPB office, Box R, Abernathy, Texas 79311 to allow time for adding their names to the ballot. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPPB office by September 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 1, may obtain one at his County Agent's office.
