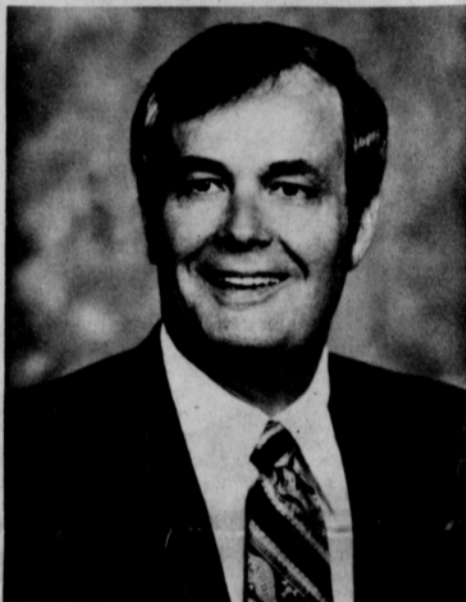

Beedy Announces For Councilman

Brad Beedy has authorized the Reporter-Plainsman to announce his candidacy for the position of city councilman of the City of Spearman, subject to the action of the voters in the April 3rd general City elections.

Deadline Nears

The deadline for buying and applying 1976 stickers for license plate on vehicles is fast approaching and according to Helen Dry, County Tax Assessor-Collector, there are many who have not purchased the stickers.

The deadline for application of the sticker is midnight, April 1, 1976 and the deadline for purchasing the sticker at the tax office is 5 p.m. April 1.

Mrs. Dry asks that everyone that can purchase the stickers before the last day in an attempt to avoid the last minute rush at her office.

Also, persons with out-of-state vehicles will need to have their original titles to get Texas licenses.

Hansford County 2nd In Wheat Production

AUSTIN--With a total crop of 5.9 million bushels, Hansford County placed second in 1975 Texas wheat production.

According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, county farmers harvested some 204,000 acres with an average yield of 28.9 bushels per acre.

Wheat seeding started on the High Plains in late August following drought-ending rains, and most areas were generally behind schedule. As a result of the rains, surface moisture conditions were near ideal and underground water supplies were approaching normal. Drier weather in November allowed seeding to get back on schedule, and planting was completed by the third week in December.

The crop made excellent early growth and grazing was abundant with heavy stocking being evident around most of the state. Overgrazing was common as dry weather in the late winter depleted pastures, and high feed prices and

low cattle prices prevented the normal culling of herds.

As dry weather, along with the normal crop dormancy, reduced grazing conditions, some farmers began the early movement of livestock off fields.

Others, discouraged by the declining grain prospects and short grazing, plowed up their fields in the hope of conserving moisture for a spring-planted crop.

Light rain in the spring brought some temporary relief, and harvest started in South Texas in late April and reached statewide completion in early July.

Despite the period of dry weather, Texas wheat farmers produced a record 131.1 million bushels last year.

Deaf Smith County led the state with a production of 10.2 million.

Absentee Voting Ends Tuesday

Absentee voting will continue through Tuesday, March 30, in two local elections slated to be held on Saturday, April 3. Area citizens will be voting on who will comprise the board of trustees for the Spearman Independent School District, and who will comprise the Spearman City Council. The regular elections

will be held at the high school on April 3. Absentee voting is currently underway at City Hall for the city elections and ballots in the trustee elections may be cast at the school business office.

In the city councilmen election there are seven men running for the two positions open on the council. They are Hal Shufeldt, Tim York, James Brown, Verlin Behne, J. K. Hicks, Bill Pittman and Brad Beedy. Ralph Blodgett is running unopposed for the position of mayor.

In the school board election, five candidates have filed for two places on the school board. They are Kent Guthrie, Perry Dixon, Jimmy Greene, Jim Evans and Charles Eaton.

A check with business offices at press time showed 7 persons had cast absentee ballots in the school election and 1 voted absentee in the city election.

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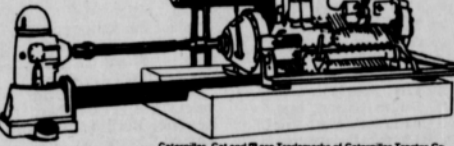

The boys assume responsibility for almost all the work done at the Ranch. They raise most of their food, milk their cows, bottle the milk, raise livestock, care for the lawns, learn mechanical and carpentry work, and prepare and serve the meals in the dining room. Each boy applies for and is given a job, for which he is salaried. He then deposits his earnings in personal checking and savings accounts to meet his present and future financial requirements.

There are approximately 400 boys residing at Boys Ranch. This year thirty-nine young men will graduate in the largest graduating class in the Ranch's history.

Cal Farley believed that "A boy is all God has to make a man." This belief, and Mr. Farley's unique humanitarian hopes and dreams are living on each day at Boys Ranch in the dedicated men and women who live and work there, and in the boys themselves who are given a chance of a better, more loving, and more productive life.

Mr. Hendricks then presented the Twentieth Century Club with an autographed copy of his book, which will be donated to the Hansford County Library.

Bob Pearson Is Speaker

Bob Pearson, attorney from Spearman, was guest speaker for the Eta Alpha Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, international honor society for women educators on Saturday, March 20, in Gruver, Texas. The speaker was introduced by Miss Dorothy Roden from Spearman.

The meeting was held at the El Vaquero Restaurant in Gruver with Mrs. Tom Bergin, Mrs. J. T. Hoy, Mrs. Vinita Knight, and Mrs. Don Clark as hostesses.

In the program "Laws Concerning Equal Rights for Women", Mr. Pearson spoke on the changes of the Family Code or Texas Marital Property Act. He outlined the two major changes made in 1967 in the management or control of community property and the conservatorship and support of children.

Under the new code, each partner in marriage has equal rights to manage and control property. Prior to the act, the husband had complete control of property. The two major changes in the conservatorship and support of children are that "sex can not be used to determine custody" and that the decision of conservatorship must be made on the promise of "what is in the best interest of the child". He stated that if the child is awarded to the father, the wife has the "right, duty, and obligation to pay child support".

After presenting the laws concerning the equal rights for women, Mr. Pearson answered specific questions asked by the members. He stated "that the old idea that young children should remain with the mother was based on the promise that the mother could spend more time with the child. Now that most mothers have to go to work after a divorce, the argument is no longer valid. In cases of a nine year old or older who needs father control, the court would possibly give custody to the father."

Republican Women Host Luncheon

The Republican Women of Hansford County met March 19th for a 1:00 P.M. luncheon at the El Vaquero in Gruver with James C.

Brandon, Reagan District Chairman from Amarillo; and Don H. Reavis, Ford District Chairman from Dalhart, as guest speakers.

Nadine Gregg and Charlene Lacy, Reagan District Co-Chairmen, both from Amarillo, were also guests for the meeting.

Jim Brandon stated that Ronald Reagan was doing much better than some reports showed and noted that because of some prior precinct caucuses that it was anticipated that Reagan would receive 36 delegates from Iowa; 38 delegates from the state of Washington; 19 delegates, Alaska; 18 from Nevada; and 36 delegates from Oklahoma--with hopefully all of South Carolina!

Jim Brandon said, "when Reagan took office in 1967 as governor of California, the state was confronted with a deficit of 194 million dollars and when Reagan left office in 1975 there was a surplus of 500 million dollars."

The number of individuals on welfare roll in California decreased by 400,000. Individuals on welfare were offered jobs in the free enterprise system and after the second offer was refused by an individual they were then dropped from the welfare roll. The truly needy persons that were on welfare received a 4% increase in benefits."

Mr. Brandon also stated that the Reagan support came from the grass roots and not the party machinery. It is the first time Texas Republicans can directly elect their delegates to national conventions as prior to this it was done at the state convention.

Don Reavis, Ford Chairman, stressed the importance of solid support of the nominee that emerged from the National Convention in Kansas City in August. Don also instructed his audience that in voting in the May 1 primary for delegates that each person voting had four

votes to cast for four of the delegates and that the voter did not have to vote for all Reagan or all Ford delegates. The vote can be split, voting for two delegates for Ford and two delegates for Reagan for example.

In Mr. Reavis' support of Gerald Ford for president, he pointed out that as President Gerald Ford has vetoed 30 liberal bills and that during the time Ford has been in office the nation has faced an energy crisis and the worst depression since the 30s and yet today the economy is recovering with the Dow Jones surpassing the 1,000 mark last week.

As to the embargo on grain, Reavis said that George Meany and the Democratic Congress were to blame. 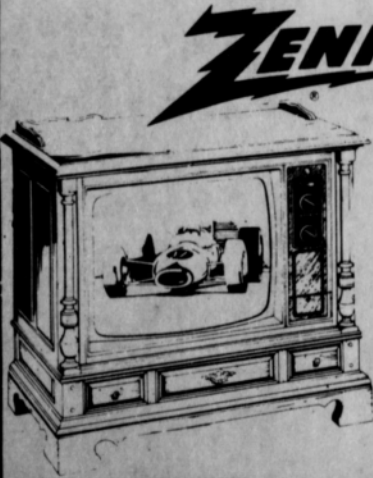

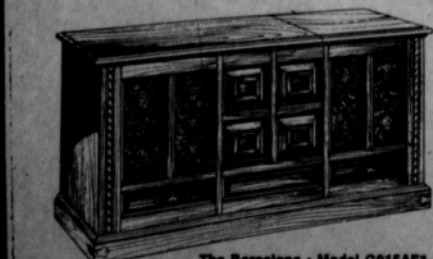

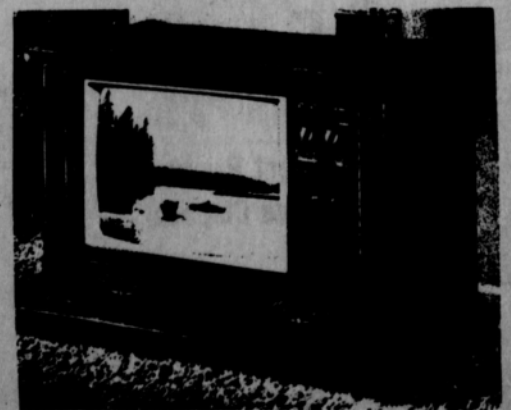
