Free & Reduced **Price Eligiblity** Income Scale

### FREE AND REDUCED PRICE GUIDELINES FOR CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAM

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the attached scale are eligible for free or reduced price meals. If children are eligible for free meals, they are also eligible for a free carton of milk extra, if served at a time other than the lunch hour. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills or shelter costs in excess of 30% of your income, or special education expense due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children still may be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced price meals and milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the attached scale.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and you wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application. All children are treated the same, regardless of

ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin. Applications for free and reduced price meals may be made anytime during the school year and forms are available in the school offices.

## FREE AND REDUCED PRICE ELIGIBILITY

**School To Serve Breakfast** 

Spearman I.S.D. will begin serving breakfast to comply with the Texas State law bill, #136 that makes the breakfast program mandatory. Breakfast will be served in each cafeteria from 7:45 to 8:15 only.

Texas is mandated by public law #136 to offer the breakfast in all schools where 10% or more students are eligible for free and reduced price lunches

Beginning with the 1978-79 school term, a nutritious breakfast will be offered for it's students. It must be pointed out that the breakfast will be a very light, not heavy, breakfast and will provide 1/3 of the daily nutritional requirement of the 10-12 yr. old students.

As specified in the breakfast regulations, the school breakfast shall contain as a minimum the following components: 1/2 pt. fluid milk served as a beverage or over cereal; 1/2 cup serving of fruit or vegetable or both or full strength juice; bread or cereal - 1 slice bread, enriched, or an equivalent serving of biscuits, rolls, muffins, etc., or 1/4 cup of whole grain cereal; or any combination of these items. Protein rich foods and other additional foods may be served with breakfast as desired. Doris Wilde, lunchroom supervisor, states that the students will be served

Beginning with the 1978-79 school term, the as often as possible. During the rest of the time, the breakfast will be light, but still comply with the Federal guide lines and provide the students with 1/3 of the daily nutritional requirements.

Students may enjoy breakfast for 25 cents. Teachers will be charged 50 cents and students on reduced price will be charged 10 cents for breakfast. Parent or guest price for breakfast will be 75 cents. Spearman I.S.D. serves nutritious lunches

every day in the cafeterias. Students may purchase lunch for 55 cents at Elementary, 60 cents at Jr. High and 65 cents at the High School. Extra milk for the students is 5 cents. Faculty prices for lunch is \$1.00 and guests are \$1.25. The type A lunch pattern is at least 2 oz. meat or meat alternate; ¼ cup fruit and or vegetable; 1 slice bread or equivalent; and 1/2 pt. whole fluid

Beginning with the 1978-79 school term, students in High School do not have to take the full meal on their trays, but have to take at least 3 of the main food components listed in the type A lunch. This is called the Offer-Versus Serve Program, but regardless of what 3 foods the students take or chooses to eat, they must still pay the full price for their meal. It will be no cheaper because only 3 foods may be chosen. This is for grades 9 - 12 only.

the U. of Washington, has developed a prescrip tion for preserving newspapers (and editors): Dissolve a milk of magnesia tablet or one tablespoon of milk of magnesia emulsion in a quart of club soda, recap tightly and let stand in the refrigerator overnight. Pour into a pan large enough to accommodate the flattened newspaper. Soak newspaper one to two hours, remove and pat dry (editor too). The solution cannot be reused. Estimated life of the paper is 200 years! Chemically, the magnesium oxide combines with the carbon dioxide in the soda to form magnesium carbonate which neutralizes acids in the paper that cause deterioration. And speaking of preserving newspapers, our old file copies are all at Texas Tech in Lubbock being micro-filmed and will be preserved forever on film.





THE MULTI-BILLION DOLLAR BOOST that oil and gas industry operations gave to the Texas economy in 1977 was shared by the citizens of Hansford County.

The marketed value of petroleum production in the county has been calculated at \$66.1million in an economic activity profile of the state's top producing counties prepared by the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.


'Texas' oil and gas industry remains the cornerstone of the economy of the state and of many of its counties," said the Association's president, H. B. (Hank) Harkins, Alice, independent producer and drilling com pany executive. "It is imperative that the state maintain taxing and regulatory policies which will encourage the growth of this industry.

Hansford was one of 201 counties last year which produced petroleum with a marketed value of \$100,000 or more. The county ranked 65th in the estimated total value of petroleum produced. The Association has computed that some \$4.7million came from the product-ion of 521,800 barrels of crude oil, which approximately \$61.4million attributed to an output of 67.9-million MCF of natural gas. Payments last year to owners of royalty in the county were calculated at \$8.3-million.

While paying local, county and state property taxes, pro-ducers in the county also helped support state government through production tax pay ments estimated at \$4.8-mill-This included \$217,000 from crude oil output, \$4.6-million from natural gas.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, during 1977 some 358 employes worked for the industry in the county. The reported payroll amounted to an estimated \$5million

The search for additional petroleum continued in Hansford County last year. Oil and gas developers spent an esti-mated \$15.1-million in the drilling of 43 wells, including one classified as a wildcat. Some \$4.5-million of that amount was on Sunday. Processing also contributed to the county's petroleum-related economy through the operation of two natural gasoline processing plants with a combined daily capacity of 333.9million cubic feet.
