Baker & Taylor, North Plains International-Job Fair Award Recipients

The Amarillo Job Fair held last December was sponsored by the Texas State Industrial Development Committee. Homer Tucker, who is on that committee was the guest speaker at a luncheon Wednesday, to speak to several business leaders of Spearman, and to present award to the two Spearman businesses that participated in the Amarillo Job Fair. Mr. Tucker stated that over 900 job vacancies had been filled in the Amarillo area as a result of the Job Fair.

Dick Elbert accepted an award for North Plains International's participation and Francis Loftin accepted the award for Baker & Taylor's involvement.

After presenting the awards, Homer Tucker spoke to those present at the luncheon echoing what Frank Smith from Borger had already said last week. He stated that 25,000 Chambers of Commerce were trying to attract new industries to their cities every year, and that only 2500 new plants were being established each year. Like Mr. Smith, Homer Tucker emphasized the fact that a community must begin at home working on community attitude and community needs to know what it has to offer, and how to make improvements. It is imperative to have a good industry

of available buildings and industrial sites with firm prices on these. He said that industrial financing would need to be available and talked a little about prospecting for new businesses. Tucker invited Spearman to form an Industrial Development Team and go to Austin for a one day seminar that the State offers such teams. He added that on the team was formed and had attended the seminar, representatives from the State Industrial Development Committee would come to Spearman to further the Industrial Development Team's training with professional help.

City Requests Airport Planning Grant

An application for a \$20,000 airport planning grant has been completed by Mayor Ralph Boldgett and other city officials and forwarded for consideration to the Federal Aviation Administration, the Texas Aeronautics Commission and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. City Manager Mark Neff announced Friday, May 27. Neff announced the grant is requested for use in check-

ing out data on area sites, to study possible expansion of Amarillo.

In making such application, the City of Spearman will provide about \$2,000 in local funds to go with the grant funds if allocated, the existing airport and facilities, to handle some mapping operations and other work.

Application papers went to the FAA office in Albuquerque, New Mexico, to the TAC

in Austin and the FRPC in The paperwork was completed several weeks ago but no reply has been received in Spearman as of May 27, Neff announced.

City Council Session Held

City Council met in regular session May 24, with all members present for the discussion of several agenda items including appointment of a member to the Parks and Recreation Board and an executive session for discussion of personnel. Council approved the recommendation of the Parks and Recreation Committee and named Billy Haden to a term of three years, the term to expire in 1980. Council spent two hours and 37 minutes in executive session at the conclusion of which Mayor Ralph Blodgett announced that no business was transacted and no votes taken. In other action: Council moved to place a city employee, Ronnie Blard, in a higher job classification. Also, Council authorized a pay increase for police personnel, raising salaries of uncertified officers from \$700 to \$750 and the pay of certified officers from \$750 to \$800 per month. It was noted during the discussions attendant to such mid-year budget revision actions that salary increases for other municipal personnel were not taken at this time pending work on the October budget. Meetings next month will be June 14 and 18 for regular sessions. The Pledge of Allegiance opening last Tuesday night's meeting was led by Mayor Blodgett. City Attorney J. Blackburn gave the Invocation.

Two On WTSU Deans List

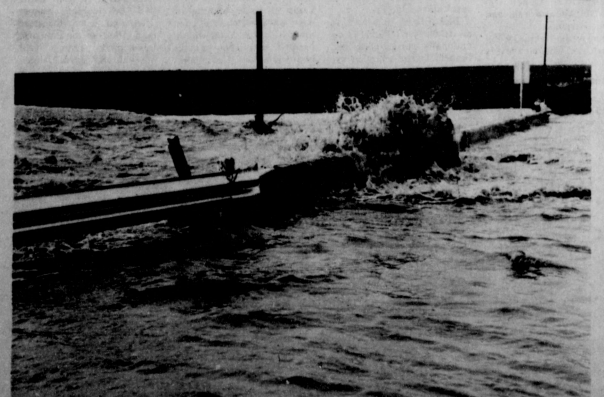

MINIMAL DAMAGE - High water in Hackberry Creek for a time Thursday afternoon threatened to take out this bridge on State Road 1261 north of Spearman. The water subsided overnight and normal traffic was resumed over the bridge Friday while State Highway Department personnel replaced fill material which had washed away and repaired any damaged guard rails, reflector signs and roadway markings. Hansford County Judge Johnny Lee reported no county roads or bridges damaged by high water as a result of rains in the county during the past week.

LEGAL NOTICE

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Corn Growers Association, 105 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027, a referendum election on July 29, 1977, under provisions of Article 55C, Vernon's Civil Statutes on the proposition of whether or not corn producers in the following counties shall assess themselves an amount not to exceed 1/2 cent per bushel on all corn sold to be collected at the first point of sale, and to elect members for a 6-person commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, promotion, and education designed to encourage production, marketing, and use of Texas corn. Counties included in the referendum are: Area I - Deaf Smith, Palmer, Castro, Bailey, and Lamb. Area II - Randall, Swisher, Brisco, Hale, and Floyd. Area III - Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, and Carson. The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county courthouse in the referendum area. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent offices, or the Texas Corn Growers Association. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at 105 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027, before midnight three days prior to the election date. Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced corn for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners or farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

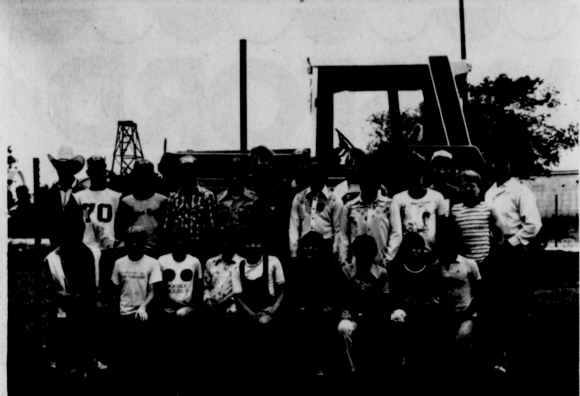

Tractor School Held

A tractor school was held in Spearman on May 25 with registration at 10:00 a.m. in the Home Demonstration Clubroom. This school is for the purpose of training 14 and 15 year olds in the safe operation of a tractor.

Under the current U.S. Department of Labor provisions farmers must not hire youth under 16 years of age for hazardous occupations around farms which includes among many jobs driving a tractor, except under certain conditions. Some of these conditions that allow farmers to work youth under 16 years of age is as follows: the

youth be at least 14 years of age, be familiar with the normal working hazards in agriculture, complete 10 hours training on the 4-H tractor program, pass a written examination on tractor safety and demonstrate the ability to operate a tractor with a two-wheeled trailed implement to include backing.

Any youth age 14 or 15 who plans to or wants a job driving a tractor must complete this course and receive a certificate of successful completion. The only exception is where a youth under 16 is employed by his parent

on a farm owned or operated by his parent or person. If any farmers or youth have any questions, call the County Extension Office, 659-2136. Youth must attend all sessions to be certified as having completed the course. The course was under the supervision of the Hansford County Extension Agent, Jim Kuykendall, local implement dealers assisted in some phases of the program. Summer Youth Career Program

Texas State Technical Institute and the Texas Panhandle Employment and Training Alliance in conjunction with the balance of State counties will conduct a special summer program for Panhandle area youth. The Texas Employment Commission, First National Bank of Amarillo, Ansell College of Vocation Arts, Amarillo Trade School, West Texas State University, The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum as well as the Vocation Programs at TSTI will be visited by youths attending the summer program. Students will spend about 8 hours in the classroom on how to apply for a job, employment interviews, keeping a job, banking, budgeting and personal hygiene. Recreational time will include movies, swim parties and various sports activities.

Upon completion of the 40 hour program, certificates of completion will be presented to all participants.

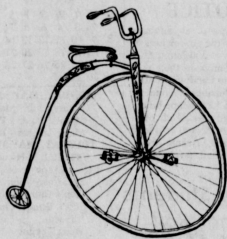
