
# Christmas Giving







Where much energy can and should be saved, of course, is in the field of display lighting. Store windows should not be brightly lit until late hours; signs, billboard displays, string lighting at car lots, decorative lighting of utility buildings, etc., consume huge amounts of energy.

These wholesale usages of energy can easily be curbed. Home reductions can be effected without abandoning decorative lights, which are a meaningful, significant part of the observance of the principal ecclesiastical event of the year.
