Mailbox that meet the above four important requirements also contribute to a more efficient delivery operation, and the result is an improved service to the entire area.

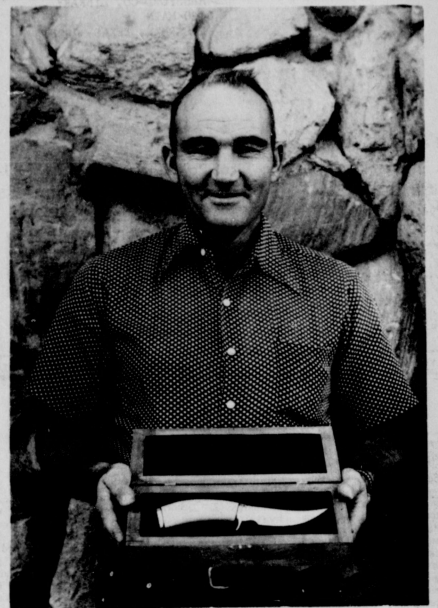
Drive-in Theatre Opening May 18

Shelton Has Interesting Hobby

In this day of advanced technology and automated industrial equipment, the assembly line and mass production have just about taken the place of handcrafted items. Hand-cut glass and hand-carved wood products have given way to the mold, shaper, grinder, router and sander. One day, the handcrafted arts, which were once practiced for a living, and many of which are now only retained as a hobby, will join the old Egyptian practice of preservation in obscurity. Even the necessitated hand control that goes into the laying and finishing of so common a thing as concrete is yielding its control over to the machine.

A Spearman resident, Max Shelton, is doing his part to preserve the dying arts of handcraft. Max makes custom hunting, fishing, and show knives. He orders his materials in the raw and starts from scratch, cutting, shaping, sanding, finishing, and polishing everything by hand. His work is very good and anyone could count himself the proud owner of one of Max's hand-made knives, whether it be for use, such as in hunting or fishing, or whether it be a show item, such as Max makes upon request as a gift for a young lad.

Max told us that he does this in his spare time saying, that working with his hands is much more enjoyable to him than, "watching the

tube". His full-time occupation is with the Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America. He has been with them for 20 years. Max has a wife, Peggy, and two daughters, Willetta and Loretta. Loretta and her husband have made proud grandparents out of Max and Peggy with a one-year old granddaughter, Audrey Renee.

Mental Health Program Held

Approximately 25 persons including resource persons from the surrounding area attended a very informative program on Mental Retardation-Nature and Causes, May 5 in the United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

Sue Buchner of the Amarillo State Center for Human Development coordinated the presentation given by a panel of four including: Judy Wilson, Director for the Amarillo March of Dimes; Dr. Sherry King, Geneticist; Tom Harper of the Perryton Family Service Center and Mrs. Buchner.

Mrs. Buchner gave a slide presentation on services available at the Amarillo State Center, emphasizing that a positive approach is most important in working with the mentally retarded. She also brought out the fact that some illnesses can cause Mental Retardation in children that were normal at birth.

Statistics given by Dr. King concluded that "25 babies born every hour are born with a birth defect. 20 per cent of these birth defects are due to genetic causes (inherited)." Other causes for mental retardation include poor nutrition, drugs (aspirin, nose drops, etc.), venereal disease, and alcoholic mothers. "An unborn baby receives alcohol in concentration 3 times greater than what is in the mother's blood."

Mr. Harper said the "I.Q. is never the only criteria used to determine mental retardation. Early diagnosis is most important in any case."

Testing newborns for PKU is a state law in Texas according to Judy Wilson. There are however, several other tests which are not required and could be done if only parents were aware of them and asked for them. Two such tests are for thyroid deficiency and hypoglycemia. These tests are inexpensive and identify problems, which if treated in time, can prevent mental retardation. "It is so much cheaper to prevent birth defects and mental retardation than to treat these problems later."

Exhibits were provided by the March of Dimes in Amarillo and Planned Parenthood in Spearman.

Mistress of Ceremonies for the evening was Mrs. Lou Howter of the Old Hansford Home Demonstration Club. Participants for the meeting were registered by Mrs. Tot Rosenbaum, Chairman of the Home Demonstration Council Education Committee.

The program was sponsored by the Hansford County Home Demonstration Council and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The main danger with minibikes is that they are usually operated by "minipeople". This lack of driving experience can lead to all sorts of personal injury. According to a research study recently conducted at the DuPont Institute in Delaware, at least 10,000 accidents involving child or adolescent operators of minibikes occurred last summer. At least 1,000 of the youngsters involved will be handicapped for life.

operation of off-highway vehicles, in many cases, can have tragic results. Parents must make sure that their children are properly trained before presenting them with minibikes. Also, laws for regulating off-highway vehicles should be enacted in all of the states - not just some of the states.

"So many children have been injured in motorized minibike accidents that the problem has reached epidemic proportions", state the study researchers. Control of this epidemic can only come about through public education. People must be made aware of the fact that the

Wilbanks Observe Wedding Anniversary



The L.E. Wilbanks
55 years of marriage

It was open range country around Hansford County back when Lawrence E. Wilbanks of 103 S. Townsend first arrived in this part of the Panhandle in 1902. To get from here to there, you just took off across country.

Wilbanks was a member of the Floyd Wilbanks family which moved from Cleburne into Hansford just after the turn of the century. He got his readin', writin' and 'rithmetics at the McCou School, a one-room structure then, located some five miles southeast of Spearman.

Like so many of the other pioneer settlers in this part of Texas, Wilbanks' father was a farmer and as a result, Wilbanks received his education of book-learning and farm and ranching instruction.

This glimpse into the history of Hansford County was furnished by Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence E. Wilbanks on the occasion of their having just quietly celebrated their 55th Wedding Anniversary.

During those growing-up years between 1902 and 1918, Wilbanks kept active; school work, farm activities, taking out across the open range on a motorcycle after antelope.

World War I was in full

swing when Wilbanks volunteered in 1918 and was assigned to Austin, Texas, for training as a mechanic to provide service for the tractors the Army then had in service as well as for some others which were coming off the production line and into service. Little did he know that at the time he went in, the fighting would end, but it did. As Wilbanks describes it, "I got in and shut down the war."

He brought his Army training back to this area where, combined with what he learned at McCou School and at an agricultural and mechanical school in Goodwell, Oklahoma, Wilbanks began drilling water wells, running threading machines (streamers and the early day gasoline powered ones) and doing mechanical work along with his agricultural activities.

Wilbanks hadn't been back in Hansford County too long when he went visiting up Oklahoma way.

He took off across the territory on his junket and wound up visiting cousins in Butler, and this is where he got entangled in affairs of the heart which led to his marriage with his bride of more

than 55 years.

Virus Cuthbert was one of the B. B. Cuthbert family in Butler with farming and stock-raising interests and she was a friend of the cousins Wilbanks was visiting.

One thing led to another and before you know it, Lawrence Wilbanks and Virus Cuthbert were Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Wilbanks. They were married on a Saturday in a late afternoon ceremony after Wilbanks had returned from Arapahoe, the county seat of Custer County, with the license. The ceremony was held in the home of a Baptist pastor and friend of the bride.

The young couple almost immediately headed west across the open country, and came back to Hansford County in a Model T, enjoying every mile of the trip in a time when paved roads were few and far between, roadside fast food firms were non-existent and air-conditioning consisted of the breeze blowing through the open windows of the car.

Arriving in Hansford County, the young couple settled on the Wilbanks homestead property five miles east of Spearman and stayed there until 1947.

In those years, Mrs. Wilbanks kept busy as the wife of a farmer, rancher and mechanic and occupied herself with cooking and hand-work as this information allowed.

All this information came to light during an interesting session of talking with Mr. and Mrs. Wilbanks on May 12 after they had started in training for their 56th anniversary.

In 1947 the Wilbanks moved from the farm into Spearman, occupying an apartment in a complex which used to be where Allsup's is located. About 1952, the residence at 103 S. Townsend was completed, a nice and comfortable structure which is home for a couple who still retain an enjoyment of life. And a long way from his first home here, a dug-out.

They are members of the First Christian Church, Mrs. Wilbanks is now Chaplain of Chapter No. 721, Order of the Eastern Star, in Spearman, an organization in which she was worthy Matron in 1960-1961.

Wilbanks is a member of Hansford Lodge No. 1040, A.F.&A.M., in Spearman, a membership he has continued since 1937. He also has been a church deacon and

associated with such other organizations as Woodmen of the World and the International Order of Odd Fellows.

Their 55th anniversary went by without undue fanfare on May 11 but lots of local friends wished them well, there were some calls from out-of-town and cards from other places, a pretty good recognition for an occa-

sion the couple didn't intend to let anybody know about.

He is 80 and she is 71 and while they are shooting for their 60th anniversary, observing those between now and then as they occur, they can look back on a long and eventful life and offer a few words of advice to married people of today: "Fight, make up and keep going."

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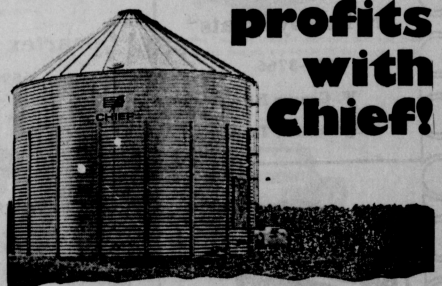

water and sunshine—which make all living things possible."

Many special programs and church services are being planned throughout the state to call attention to the responsibility of all people for the protection and proper care of the Lord's earth, adds the Extension specialist.

The custom of setting a side special days—called Rogation Days—for worship and prayer in thanksgiving for bountiful resources began more than 1,500 years ago in France when the country was suffering from crop failures and widespread hunger. The people united in prayer and penance and God answered their call.

"During Soil Stewardship Week, we should all acknowledge before God our gratitude for His gifts of the soil and all the bountiful resources associated with it," urges Harris.

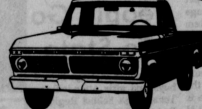

All major publishers have submitted text materials for the Texas adoption in selected elementary and secondary school subject areas, according to Dr. Kenneth M. Laycock, Executive Director of the Education Service Center. Books will be studied in detail by members of the State Textbook Committee and their local advisors throughout the summer. The 15-member committee, which includes public school administrators and teachers, will be appointed by the State Board of Education at its May 14 meeting in Austin.

A series of public hearings will be held at Austin in order to gather citizen viewpoints and opinions before the State Board of Education makes final adoption of textbooks in early November. After that date, copies of the approved texts will be distributed to school districts, where local instructional personnel and administrators

will make their choices from the adopted materials. Elementary subjects scheduled to receive new materials include elementary Spanish for grades three through six, Texas history and geography for grade seven, and literature for grades seven and eight. Secondary subjects on the list include English composition, drama, biology, chemistry, German, Spanish, fundamentals of the free enterprise system, general business, office procedures, business mathematics, and driver education and traffic safety. New materials for instruction in all areas may be adopted for a maximum of six years.

Copies of every book submitted to the Texas Education Agency for the 1977 state textbook adoption will be available to all interested citizens for review at the Region XVI Education Service Center, 1601 S. Cleveland, Austin, beginning May 15, 1977. Sample books will be on file at the Service Center resource library during regular business hours, 8:00 A.M. until 5 P.M.

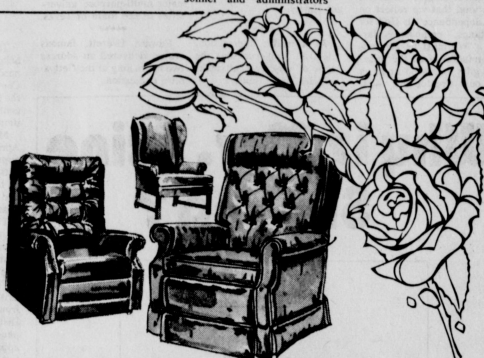

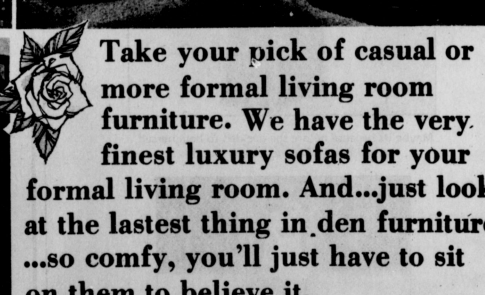
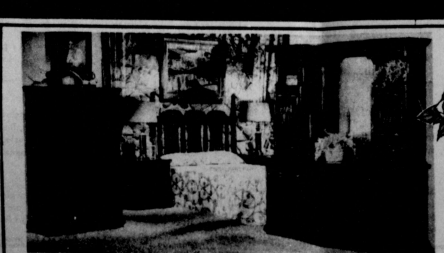
