## Two Charged With Theft Of Engine

Two men have been arrested by Sheriff J. B. Cooke and charged with theft over \$50 in connection with the theft of an irrigation well engine.

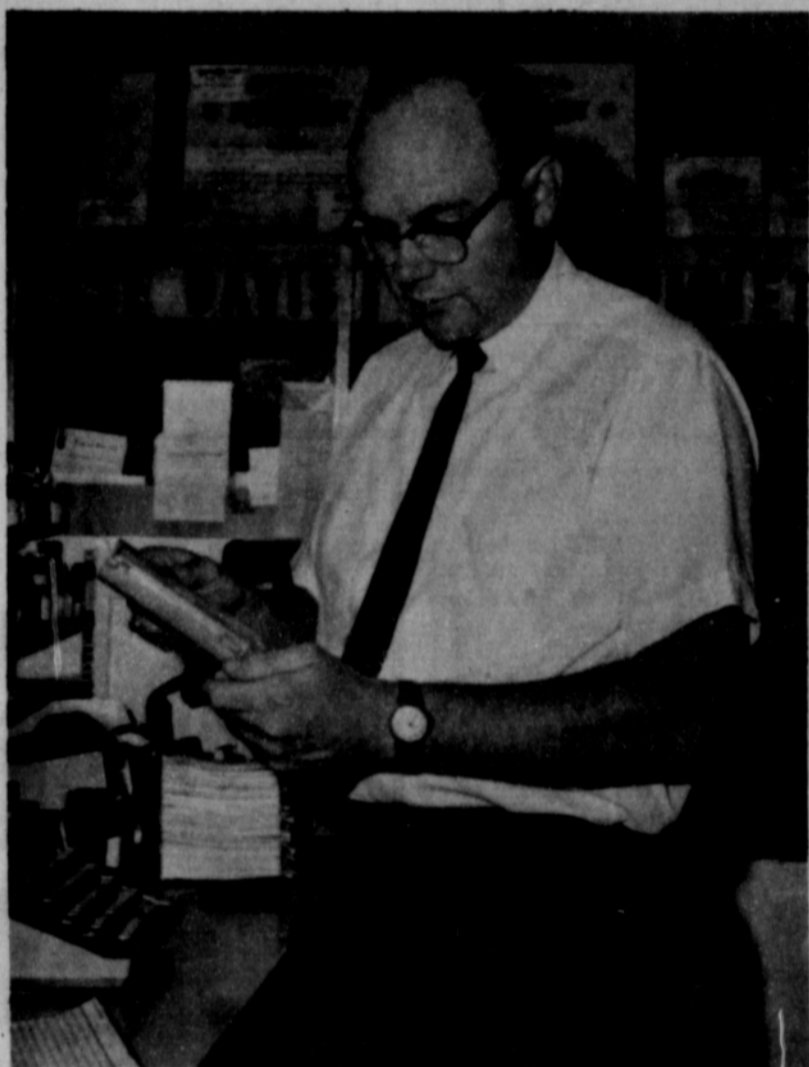
J. D. Parker and Carroll Parker, both of Hart have been charged with theft over \$50 and their bond set at \$3,000.

The two men were arrested after sheriff's officers spent several days investigating the theft of an irrigation engine from a well on the Lloyd (Duke) Roberts farm 20 miles north of Spearman.

Officers said the engine was taken last Thursday night.

The Sheriff's department is also investigating an attempted burglary at the Gruver School. Sheriff Cooke said the burglar failed in his effort to open a fireproof filing cabinet. Nothing was taken.

Officers are also looking for a burglar who broke into Equity at Morse and took about \$1 in pennies recently.

## Board Hires New Teacher; Approves Largest Budget

A budget was approved and the hunt for teachers continued by the Spearman School Board Tuesday night.

The resignations of three teachers were accepted and one teacher was hired. Two of the three resigning had announced their intentions earlier.

Those resigning were Robert Williams, who was hired this summer, Assistant Coach Larry Dawson, who is moving to Eagle Pass, and Miss Pat Farren, who resigned to move to Eagle Pass.

Dawson's position was filled when the board hired, on Supt. James Bramlett's and Athletic Director Don Seymour's recommendation, Darrell Davis of McLean.

Davis was head coach at McLean four years. He resigned to move to California to teach. He was going to teach in the elementary grades, but did not qualify to teach in the California elementary grades.

Davis has taught seven years, has Bachelor and Master's degrees and is recommended by his former administrators as an outstanding coach and strong classroom teacher.

In four years at McLean his football teams compiled a 23-10 record. His basketball teams were district champions one year and runner-up three years.

Bids were accepted for bread and milk supplies for the school cafeterias. The milk contract went to Borden's on a bid of 4.95 cents per half pint. The bread bid was given to Mead's bakery on a bid of 22 cents per loaf of bread with a 5 per cent discount on all accounts.

A budget of \$717,231.00 was approved for the 1964-65 school year. This is an increase from the \$678,801.73 spent this year.

The single largest increase was in salaries for instructors that went from \$336,840.00 this year to \$366,560.00 next year. More students makes it necessary to increase the size

## Football Players Take Physicals Saturday

If football practice is here, can fall be far behind?

Although the mercury does not agree, fall is fast approaching as Spearman Lynx footballers, all 75 of them, prepare to open two-a-day drills Monday.

All high school boys planning to try for a place on one of the three high school teams will report at 3 p.m. Saturday afternoon for physical examinations. The exams will be given in the gym.

Equipment will be issued to the veterans and hopefuls at 3 p.m. Sunday in the gym.

Head Coach Seymour is expecting about 75 boys to report for practice sessions which will begin Monday.

A veteran squad from a 3-year season will greet coaches Seymour, Fred Dawson, and Jerry Taylor, Monday. Only four members of the squad completed their four years of eligibility last year, three of them were starters.

Seymour will be looking for replacements for departed starters tackle Mac Crawford, center Bill Blackburn, and fullback David Batson.

Heading up a backfield full of lettermen will be quarterback Johnny Crawford and halfback Mike Morris. Morris missed the last half of the season with an injured knee, but he says he is ready for his senior year.

Other veterans in the backfield will be Ken Shufeldt, Ronald McDonald, Rennie Ber-

ry, Dave Clement and a couple of newcomers in Bill Greenway, a promising sophomore and Clayton Cochran, moving back to fullback from tackle, where he lettered two years. Crawford, Morris, and McDonald are seniors.

Veterans will be available at ends with Leroy Callaway, Larry Butts, Jim Ownbey and Gary Haner. None are big, but all are tough.

The all important tackle slots are open. Several boys will be grabbing for these spots.

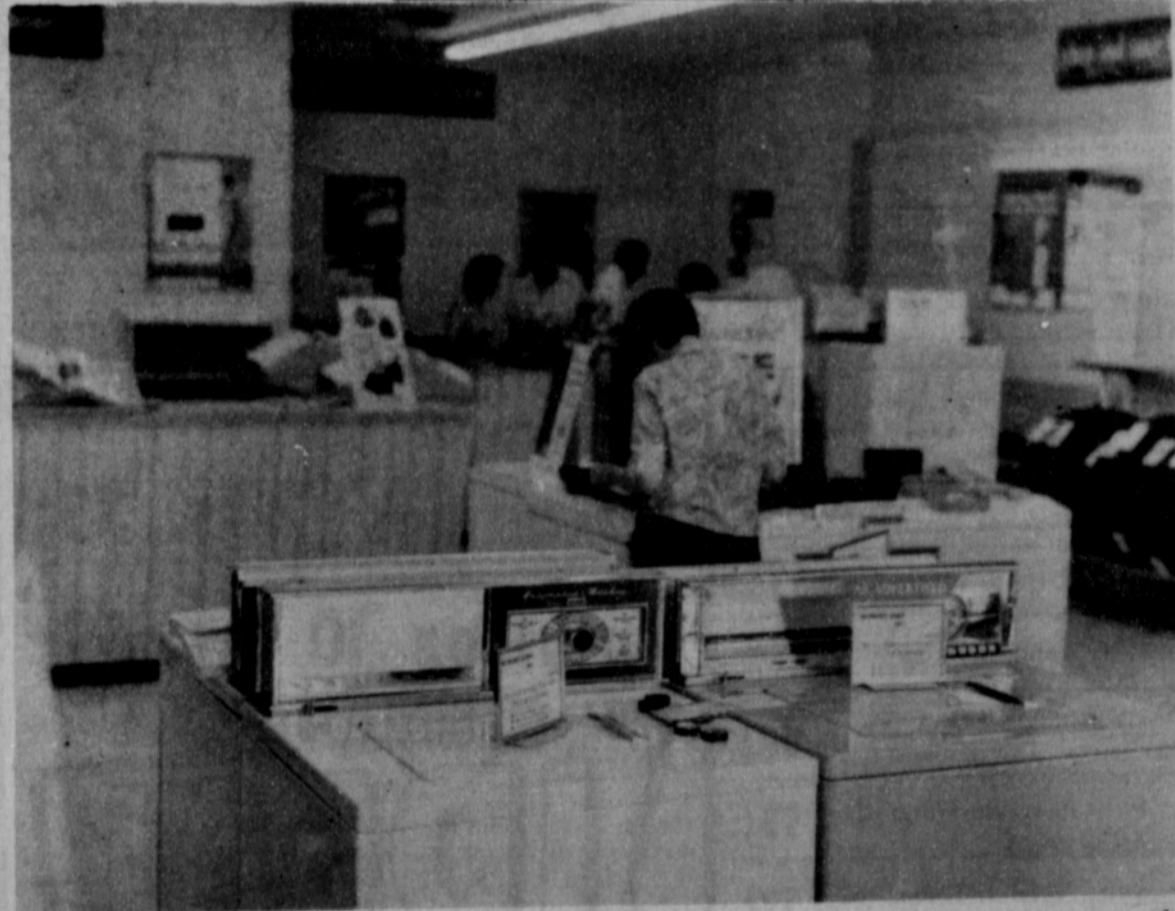

**County Agent's Report**

**SORGHUM MIDGE REPORT**

Sorghum midge activity has increased in the Lubbock area during the week. Adult midge have been observed in a few fields of blooming grain sorghum in Lubbock County.

At present, no data are available concerning the number of adult midge which constitutes a potential economic infestation; consequently, treatments should be applied when midge are found among the newly-emerged heads.

Producers who have grain sorghum which has started to bloom should check closely for adult midge.

Precise timing of insecticide applications is necessary for effective control. Insecticides should be applied soon after head emergence or no later

It just stands to reason, if it did that football season and crisp, apple-munching weather would never arrive.

Speaking of apples, I'm very curious about a "mock apple pie" I keep reading about here and there made without apples and with soda crackers. How in the world can crackers taste like apples with just the addition of a few spices ordinarily used in apple pies?

Just as I was trying to figure that out, I came upon a recipe in a newspaper last week for pinto bean pie, no less. Actually it isn't called that, its name is Mock Pecan Pie, but I'm just as puzzled, or maybe moreso, about it.

It says "When you cook 'red beans' next time take out a cup for this pie and see what your family thinks of it."

"For the pie you will need 1 cup cooked, mashed pinto beans, 2 cups sugar, 3 whole eggs (well beaten), 1 teaspoon vanilla (optional) and a pinch of salt."

"Beat the eggs, sugar and salt together. Add the beans and mix well. Let stand for half an hour to ripen."

"Pour into unbaked pie crust and bake in a 425 degree oven until crust begins to brown. Reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake for 30 minutes more or until center of pie is set."

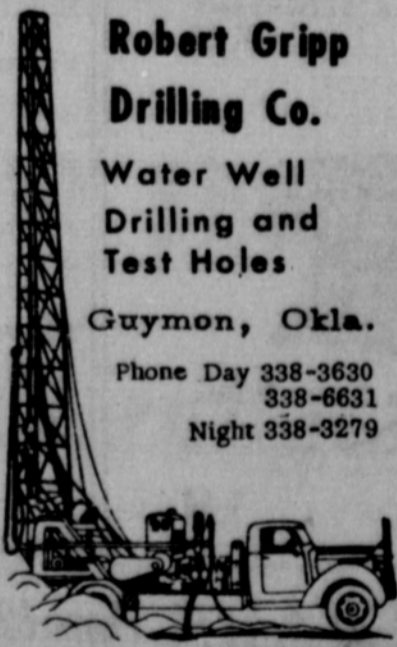

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

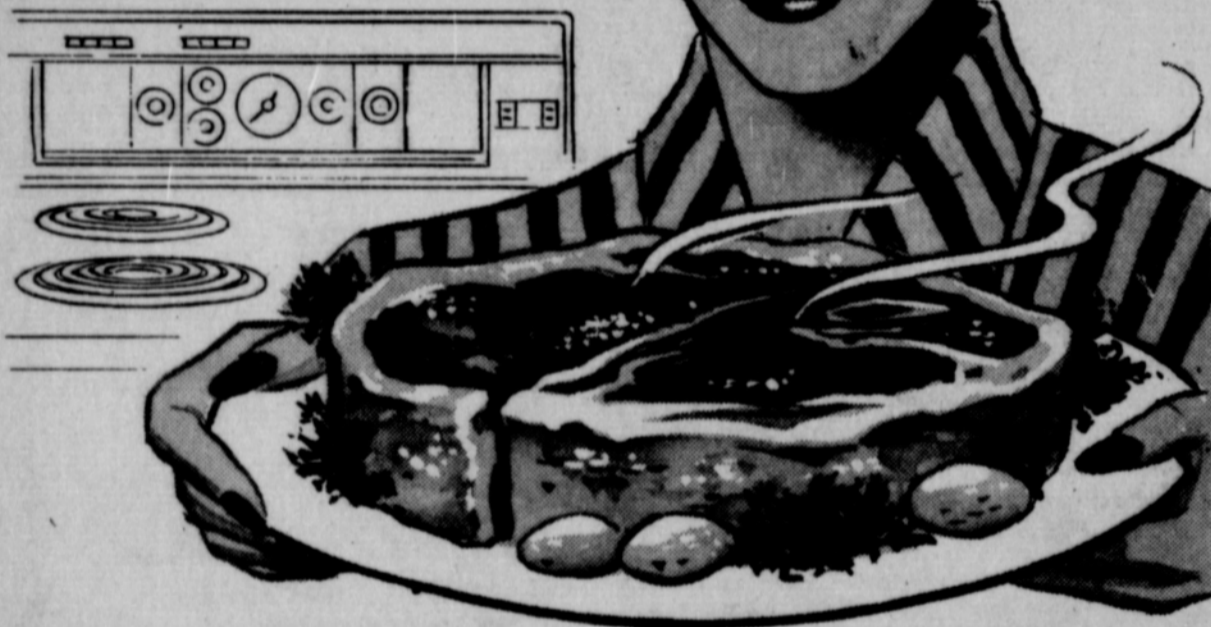
Spearman opens the season Sept. 4 with Sunray. Then play Booker, Gruver and Stratford on successive Friday nights.
