Two Students Attend Youth Conference

Dee Green of Gruver and Rebecca Hutchinson of Spearman are among the 1300 outstanding youth leaders from throughout Texas who gathered in Austin for the fourth annual Texas Youth Conference. The Conference was being held August 18-21 on the campus of the University of Texas under the sponsorship of the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation of Austin.

The Conference emphasized teen juries, tutoring programs for combatting 6th grade dropouts, and community service for youth this year. A number of new films on youth problems were shown which are available to local groups through the Conference.

The program is in its fourth year and involves over 250,000 Texas youths. Delegations from four states attended to gather material for organizing similar conferences.

Many law enforcement officers credit the Texas Youth Conference with playing a major role in the 7% reduction of juvenile crime in Texas during 1965.

Austin attorney Robert T. (Sonny) Davis serves as Director for the Conference.

Cris has a sister, Maria Helena, 19, who is attending a university near the Lobo home.

Cris attended the Instituto de Educacao Regente Feijo and is in the "classico" studies. She is studying Portuguese, English, French, Latin, World History, Physics and Philosophy.

She is 5'10" tall, or as she wrote the Wildes, 1.77 meters, has dark blonde hair and dark green eyes.

Summer Vacation Is Over; School Year Begins Thursday

Summer vacations end this week for Spearman students when they register for classes Thursday and Friday, Aug. 25-26.

Superintendent Bill Reeves said the faculty is now complete and ready to begin classes at 8:35 a.m. Monday, Aug. 29.

First grade students will register at the elementary building from 9 until 12 a.m. Thursday, according to Principal Allen Alford.

Alford said all first graders

must have their medical form, birth certificate and supply fee of \$2.75 when they come to register.

Thursday afternoon all new students in grades 2, 3, and 4, will register at the elementary building.

Friday from 9 until 12 a.m. all students in grades 2 through 4 will register. These students will need only their \$2.75 supply fee.

Junior High Principal James Pendergraft said all new students in grades 5 through 8 will register Thursday. New fifth grade students register at 9 a.m., sixth grade at 10 a.m., seventh grade at 11 a.m. and eighth grade students at 1 p.m.

All students in grades 5 through 8 will report to the school auditorium at 9 a.m. Friday, Pendergraft said there will be a short assembly, then the students will be divided into grades and home rooms.

At the high school, Principal Kenneth McKay says all students will register Thursday.

New high school students will register from 8 until 9:30 a.m. Seniors will register from 10 until 11 a.m. and juniors from 11:15 until 12:15. Sophomores will register from 1 until 2 p.m. and freshmen from 2:15 until 3:15 p.m.

When the students register

they will be given their schedules and their locker numbers. The text books for their courses will be in the lockers.

Any student with schedule difficulties will meet with Principal McKay Friday morning.

Buses will make their regular routes Monday morning, and there will be a full day of classes that day.

Two Attend Conference In Austin Spearman Participates In Title III, PESO

Two Hansford County youths are delegates to the Texas Youth Conference which ends today at the University of Texas in Austin.

Delegates to the convention are Rebecca Hutchison of Spearman and Jerry Green of Gruver.

This convention, sponsored by the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation, stresses the prevention of delinquency through developed programs and youth citizenship development programs.

The delegates have had three days of programs and seminar discussion on subjects ranging from how to organize a teenage jury to citizenship training.

Delegates are selected from outstanding students in High School. They are expected to report to students and adult clubs on the work of the conference when they return home.

J.L. Brock served as chairman of the Hansford County Chapter of the Youth Conference.

The students went to Austin Wednesday.

Spearman schools will be among 101 school districts in the Panhandle to benefit from a program to implement Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 following acceptance of \$375,095 in federal funds approved by Gov. John Connally Friday.

The 10 month program to be financed on the funds is designed to allow educators to gather new information and technical devices for dissemination among the 101 school districts participating in the program in the 36-county area of the Panhandle and South Plains.

The new program will be labeled the Texas Cooperative Dissemination (TCD) Project.

Canyon Independent School District was appointed the fiscal agency for the 101 school districts, to enter into a contract with the Panhandle Educational Service Organization (PESO) to provide the services.

Superintendent of Spearman Independent School District, Dr. B.E. Reeves, stated the Spearman schools would be participating in both Title III and PESO.

Originally the school districts had requested \$404,095 with which to operate the program for 11 months but the U.S. Office of Education asked the program be trimmed. The second request, approved Friday, calls for \$32,000 less and a 10-month program.

According to Dr. Emitt Smith, director of PESO, the program's purpose is to accelerate and multiply the importance of new information. The information, covering all areas, is to be by national-level research groups such as the National Science Foundation's Project, English, and Project Social Studies.

Dr. Smith said the program will differ from any project ever attempted in the country and will allow the secondary and elementary educators to work with research material and techni-

cal instruments converting them to language that can then be taught in public schools.

Headquarters of the TCD project will be with PESO at 1601 Cleveland in Amarillo, and a portion of the money will be spent to remodel the building for the project's use.

The TCD project is different from the Title I of 1965 legislative act in that it deals with all teachers, pupils and subjects, instead of only with those children which were economically and educationally deprived, especially in reading capabilities.

According to Dr. Smith the building will contain a laboratory in which the innovations in technical teaching will be demonstrated to participating teachers. An information center will be at the office.

Activating the TCD will be a central staff to include elementary and secondary teachers drawn from the region to serve as consultants, and a specialists staff of West Texas State University professors from various academic areas.

Bee Stings May Be Fatal To Sensitive Persons

Summer can be a time of danger for you and your youngster.

As the season draws to a close, many families are looking forward to a camping trip before school starts, a visit to a relative's farm, or just a weekend away from the city.

Even the most city-pent adult knows that bees and their relatives, hornets, are to be avoided. But some very young children might not know. Be sure to tell them.

"Some persons are so sensitive to bee stings they may die from only one sting unless a doctor treats them quickly," warns World Book Encyclopedia.

It isn't usual, but it does happen. In mild reactions, all that may develop after the initial pain is a large local swelling which may last several days and itch very intensely.

But in moderately sensitive persons, a sting by a bee, wasp, yellow jacket, or hornet, may cause wide-spread swellings or hives, wheezing, faintness, dizziness, vomiting, abdominal cramps, or diarrhea. There also may be some shortness of breath, nasal discharge or stuffiness in the nose, and some tightness in the throat. Occasionally, there may be aching and swelling of the joints, and a bruised appearance may develop at some part of the body distant from the sting.

The highly allergic person can sustain one sting which can produce shock and prove fatal within minutes. Fortunately, these extreme reactions are rare.

The mechanism of allergic reactions to insect stings is not completely understood, but, frequently, the degree of sensitivity in the allergic individual increases with each succeeding sting.

In other words, if you once were stung by a bee and suffered little more than localized pain and swelling, your next bee sting may have more serious consequences.

Suntan lotion attracts bees and other insects, and so do perfumes, hair spray, hair tonic, and many other cosmetics. Don't dress your children in floppy clothing in which insects might become caught--and don't dress that way yourself. Bright-colored clothing, flo-

very prints, and black clothing should be avoided. On the other hand, light colors, such as white, green, tan, and khaki, are believed neither to attract nor to antagonize bees.

Children should be taught not to pick up toys without checking first to make sure that no insects are on them. Public trash baskets should be avoided.

If you are stung by a honeybee, scrape the stinger off immediately. This can be done with one quick scrape of the fingernail. Don't try to pick up the venom sac between your thumb and forefinger; this merely squeezes more venom into the wound.

If you or your child should be stung by a bee or other stinging insect, a trip to a doctor is a wise precaution no matter how mild the reaction.

The best way to avoid stings is to keep away from stinging insects--and see that your children keep away, too.

Bacon Drippings Good for Dressing

Just for a change, season cooked snap beans with a sweet-sour dressing made from bacon drippings, sugar and vinegar.

The drippings should be white in color and mild in flavor--and they will be if you save the fat from bacon that is cooked over very low heat.

Financier Will Speak At Tech

LUBBOCK, -- Nationally known financier Troy V. Post of Dallas will address the annual Century Club banquet of the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association on Oct. 21, Association Executive Director Wayne James announced Thursday.

James said the banquet, part of the yearly over all Homecoming observance, would be held on the Tech campus.

Post, a well know business executive, was born and raised in Haskell. He has been the subject of numerous articles in national publications. Life Magazine recently noted that Post may be the largest individual financier in the nation.

His holdings include life insurance companies, a major airline, banks and real estate. Fortune Magazine, in a recent lengthy article, had this to say of him:

"At first glance, he seems the very stereotype of a minor executive of some insurance company or bank calmly waiting out the years to his retirement. But Troy Post is nothing that he seems. Behind the facade there a man most emphatically in insurance and banking, but a quite remarkable man who almost singlehandedly controls assets of more than \$2 billion..."

Clint Formby, Hereford radio station operator and Century Club chairman, noted that the Association was "fortunate to secure a speaker-- a native West Texan--of Mr. Post's reputation and ability."

Last Century club speakers have included President Johnson, then the Vice President, Rep. George Mahon, television newsman Frank Blair, "Tex" Thornton, Chairman of the Board of Litton Industries, and Ford Motor Company Vice President E. F. Laux.

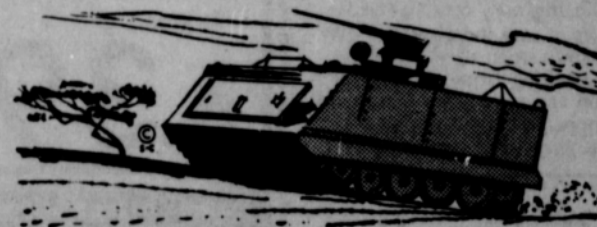

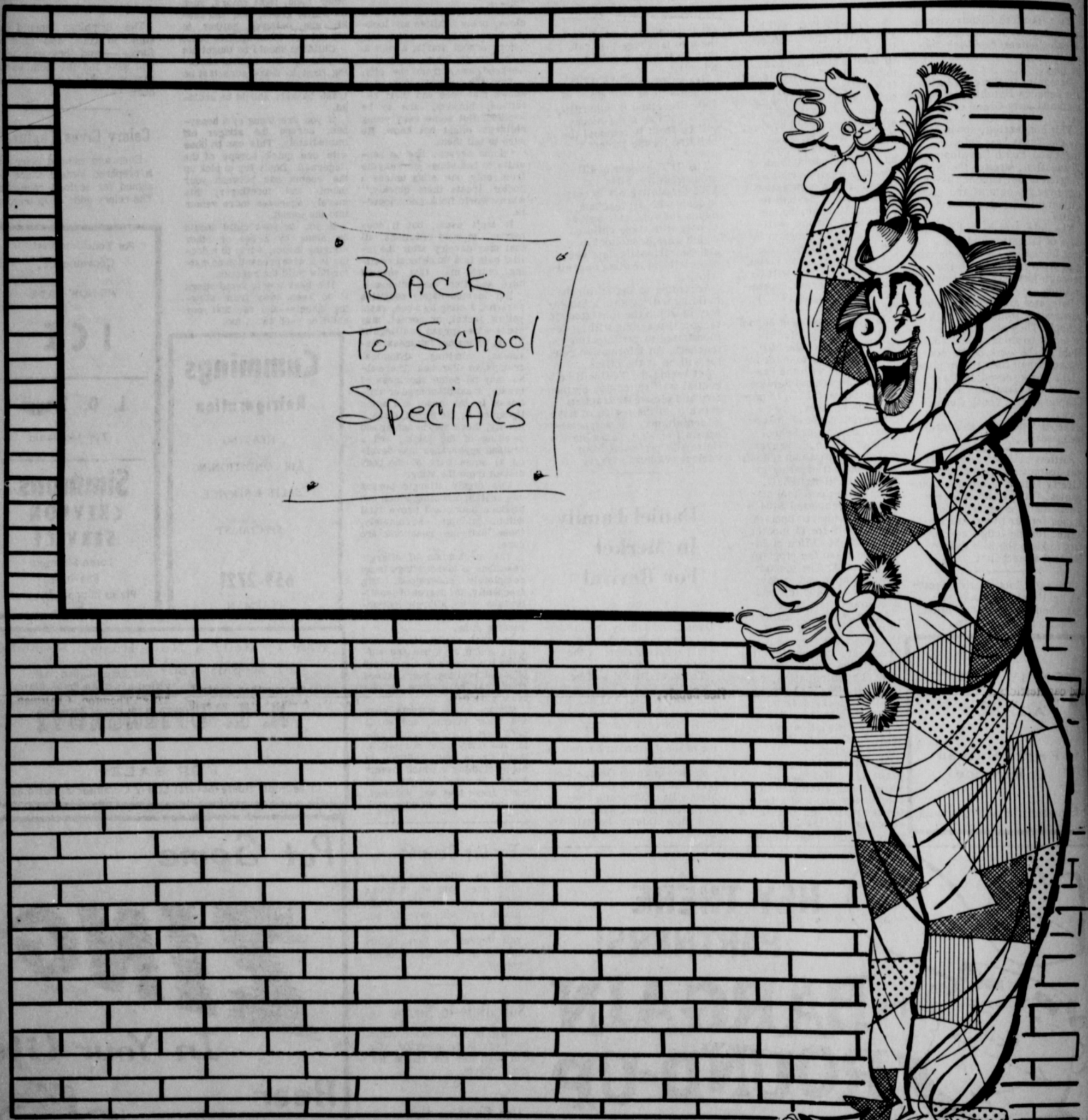

HemisFair 1968 World's Fair Plans On Schedule

SAN ANTONIO, Tex.--HemisFair 1968, a World's Fair opening in San Antonio on April 6, 1968, is on schedule with construction well underway and major exhibitors being signed up almost weekly.

James M. Gaines, executive vice president of the international exposition, said that HemisFair is ahead of the schedule maintained by the Seattle World's Fair at a comparable point of time before it opened in 1962.

Gaines said that HemisFair now has 15 announced participants. Among the governments who will have exhibits at the Fair will be the State of Texas, Mexico, Spain, Switzerland, Peru, Bolivia, Panama and Canada.

Private exhibitors include the Pearl Brewing Co., General Electric Co., Coca-Cola Co., Humble Oil and Refining Co., Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., International Business Machines, Inc., and Pepsi Co., Inc.

Several other foreign nations and giant industrial firms have indicated they will participate and will make their official announcement in the near future.

HemisFair officials are currently planning for a visit of delegates of the Bureau of International Expositions. Members of the 32-nation organiza-

tion are scheduled to be in San Antonio for three days starting on Sept. 15. The purpose of the visit is to acquaint them with the plans and progress of HemisFair in order to secure European participation in the exposition.

Double Up On Farming

CARTHAGE, -- Doing two jobs with one time over the field saves time and money, says Roland and Grady Shivers, who have a dairy farm and run a fertilizer business here.

They topdress their pastures with liquid nitrogen--and mixed right in with the nitrogen is 2,4-D to kill weeds.

Works real well, says Panola County Agent Alfred Croix. It seems the nitrogen causes the weeds to take up more of the 2,4-D. The result is a better weed kill while the grass gets a good dose of fertilizer.

In the spring, they plant millet and spread granular fertilizer from the fertilizer truck. The millet seed and fertilizer are mixed right in the truck and applied together. Then all that's needed is a light tilling to cover the seed and fertilizer.

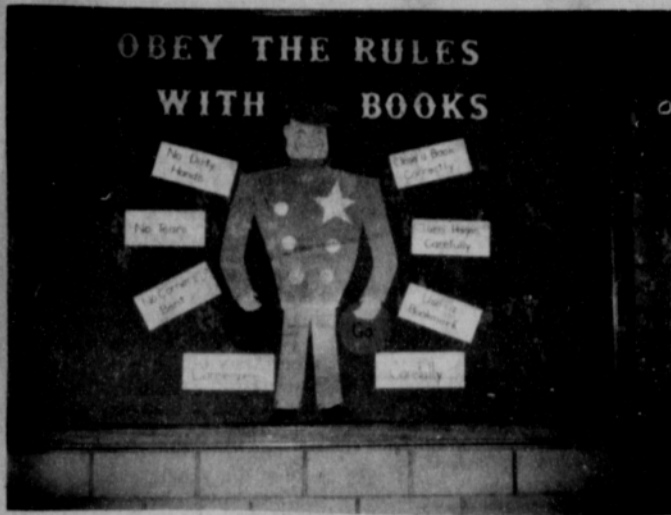

11 Persons Are Injured In 17 Rural Accidents

There were 17 rural accidents in Hansford, Ochiltree, Hutchinson and Sherman counties during July, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Sergeant W. J. McLean, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area said there were 11 persons injured and the total property damage in the accidents was \$16,495.

In Hansford County there were three rural accidents and two people were hurt. Property damage was \$5,475. Ochiltree County had five accidents which injured five persons and did a total of \$6,875 in damage.

Hutchinson County was the leading county with eight accidents, but only four persons were injured. The property damage was \$3,945.

Sherman County had only one rural accident in July and no one was injured. The property damage was only \$400.

During the first seven months of 1966 Hansford County has had nine rural accidents. There have been one person killed, eight injured and the estimated property damage of \$11,350.
