## **Two Students Attend Youth** Conference

Dee Green of Gruver and Re-becca Hutchinson of Spear-man are among the 1300 out-standing youth leaders from throughout Texas who gathered in Austin for the fourth annual Texas Youth Conference. The Conference was being held August 18-21 on the campus of the University of Texas un-der the sponsor ship of the Tex-as Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation of Austin.

The Conference emphasized The Conference emphasized teen juries, tutoring programs for combatting 6th grade drop-outs, and community service for youth this year. A num-ber of new films on youth pro-blems were shown which are available to local groups thr-ough the Conference. The program is in its fourth year and involves over 250, 000 Texas youths. Delega-

000 Texas youths. Delega-tions from four states attended to gather material for organizing similar conferences.

Many law enforcement of-ficers credit the Texas Youth Conference with playing a major role in the 7% reduc-tion of juvenile crime in Tex-as during 1965.

# **Summer Vacation Is Over; School Year Begins Thursday**


Summer vacations end this week for Spearman students when they register for class-es Thursday and Friday, Aug. 25-26.

Spearman schools will be among 101 school districts in the Panhandle to benefit from a program to imple-ment Title III of the Elemen-tary and Secondary Educa-tion Act of 1965 following ac-ceptance of \$375,095 in fed-eral funds approved by Gow

John Connally Friday. The 10 month program to be financed on the funds is designed to allow educators to gather new information and technical devices for dissemination among the 101 school districts participating in the program in the 36-county area of the Panhandle and South Plains.

The new program will be labeled the Texas Coopera+ tive Dissemination (TCD)

Project. Project. Canyon Independent School District was appointed the fiscal agency for the 101 school districts, to enter in-to a contract with the Pan-handle Educational Service Organization (PESO) to pro-vide the services.

Vide the services. Superintendent of Spear-man Independent School District, Dr. B.E. Reeves, stated the Spearman schools would be participating in both Title III and PESO. Orginally the school dis-tricts had requested \$404.4

tricts had requested \$404, -095 with which to operate the program for 11 months but the U.S. Office of Ed-ucation asked the program be trimmed. The second request, approved Priday, calls for \$32,000 less and a 10-month program

calls for \$32,000 less and a 10-month program. According to Dr. Emitt Smith, director of PESO, the program's purpose is to accelerate and multiply the importance of new informa-tion. The information, cov-

Headquarters of the TCD project will be with PESO at 1601 Cleveland in Amarillo, and a portion of the money will be spent to remodel the building for the project's

use. The TCD project is diff-erent from the Title I of 1965 legislative act in that it deals with all teachers, pupils and subjects, instead of only with those children which were economicall and educationally deprived, especially in reading capabil-ities.

According to Dr. Smith the building will contain a labora-tory in which the inovations in technical teaching will be de-monstrated to participating teachers. An information cen-ter will be at the office.

Activating the TCD will be a central staff to include elemen-tary and secondary teachers drawn from the region to serve as consultants, and a special-ists staff of West Texas State University professors from various academic areas.



"Some persons the so sen-stive to be stings mey may die from only one sting unless a doctor treats them quickly," warns World Book Encycloped-ia.

warns World Book Encycloped-ia. It isn't usual, but it does happen. In mild reactions, all that may develop after the in-itial pain is a large local swell-ing which may last several days and itch very intensely. But in moderately sensitive persons, a sting by abee, wasp; yellow jacket, or hornet, may cause wide-spread swellings or hives, wheesing, faintness, dis-ziness, vomiting, abdominal cramps, or diarrhea. There al-so may be some shortness of breath, nasal discharge or stuf-finess in the nose, and some tightness in the throat. Occas-ionally, there may be aching and swelling of the joints, and a bruised appearance may devel-op at some part of the body distant from the sting. The highly allergic person can sustain one sting which can produce shock and prove fatal within minutes. Fortunately, these extreme reactions are rare.

these extreme reactions are rare

The mechanism of allergic reactions to insect stings is not completely understood, but, frequently, the degree of sensit-iveness in the allergic individ-ual increases with each suc-

ual increases with each suc-ceeding sting. In other words, if you once were stung by a bee and suf-fered little more than localized pain and swelling, your next bee sting may have, more sectors, consequences. Suntau lotion attracts bees and other insects, and so do perfumes, hair spray, hair tom-ic, and many other cosmetics. Don't dress your children in floppy clothing in which insects might become caught -- and don't dress that way yourself. Bright-colored clothing, flo-
